OUR LOSSES.

CINCE the publication of our last issue we have lost many excellent friends from our daily life. The resignation of Bishop Welldon has been a great blow. We shall miss his constant and kindly interest, and the powerful support which has enabled us already to do so much towards making our standard what we wish it to be. But short as his connection with the school has been, it has left its mark in the securing for us of the Cambridge Local Examination in place of the eminently unsatisfactory system, from our point of view, which existed before. By the departure from India of our other trustee, Archdeacon Stone, we have lost a friend, the value of whose steady and loyal support only those on whom the weight of the responsibility for the conduct of affairs rests can fully appreciate. We wish them both heartily a happy future in England, and we know that they will not soon lose their interest in us and our fortunes.

But the loss which of all others comes closest home to us this term is that of our Second Master, Mr. C. W. Newton For utter self-sacrificing devotion to the school we may safely assert that our records may be searched in vain for a parallel He was with us only for three case to Mr. Newton's. During this time he entirely created our system of athletics and exercised an incalculable influence as a teacher and stimulator upon the work of the school. He spent his time, his money, and himself, ungrudgingly in our service. A Fives Courts and a Challenge Cup due entirely, and a Gymhasium. Library, and a Cricket Pavilion due largely, to his munificence and energy, remain among us as permanent memorials of him. But he has established a deeper and more abiding claim to be remembered in the gratitude that so many of us will ever feel towards the master who first taught us how to work and why; and, alike in work and play, by precept and example, constrained us to sink our own personalities in the larger life of the school itself.

NOTES.

The Whitsuntide Holidays (Saturday the 17th to Tuesday the 21st May) were almost entirely devoted to cricket matches. On the 17th we encountered and severely defeated the Jalapahar Depôt. The whole of Monday and the latter half of Tuesday were occupied with a match against the Officers of the Garrison, in which we "clashed with our fiery few"—but did not win.

On Tuesday morning the Rector very kindly offered to take the Upper School to the Art Exhibition; and all true lovers of art availed themselves of the opportunity. The third prize for original drawing was awarded to August ma, who sent in a piece of shading very good for "a child under 16."

Mr. Shawcross, who has before this been in command of a Cadet Company, has succeeded Mr. Milsted as Captain of ours, while Mr. Adams has joined as Second Lieutenant. We have already noticed an improvement in the discipline of the corps.

Most of the cadets have been served with new uniforms, which fit them instead of their having to fit the uniforms, as in the "good old days (?)"

Secondé left us on the 21st of April for King's College, Cambridge, the first, we believe, to leave St. Paul's for either of the Universities, and we trust not the last. Though he did not win his spurs in cricket, he gained glory and a broken thumb on the Hockey field: the former remains untarnished, and the latter is again as good as new.

Though last year our hopes for the Debating Society were disappointed, there is every reason to believe that that valuable institution will be revived once the rains have fairly set in. Fortnightly meetings will (if we are going to have a Debating Society) probably be held in the Library after prep.: we would suggest that membership be confined to the Staff and the Sixth Form.

There have been no entertainments of any kind hitherto, a fact which we may safely attribute to the departure of Mr. Milsted, who was a great acquisition to us, especially in our recreation hours.

He has secured the Head-Mastership of the Armenian College, Calcutta. The fact that he has already found time to visit us, shows that he still has a lingering regard for the school, and we feel sure he will be as popular among his new boys as he was here.

We shall soon resume our "manly toil" in the Gymnasium under an instructor from the Depôt. While there is rain there is hope of forming an VIII, which shouldat least reach last year's standard of efficiency, and there is no reason why it should not surpass it, since most of the boys who failed to gain a place last year have grown considerably, and practically the whole of the Upper School has seriously started on Sandow's system of physical training. Of the new fad lately started, that most of Sandow's pupils are shortlived, we can only say the remark is rather previous.

All last year's VIII have returned, except Connor and Linton, who held the first and second places respectively, and Stubbs ma, who occupied the sixth.

The Bugle and Drum Band, though not as good as it has been in former years, still enlivens the short half-hour between breakfast and school with

strains of martial music, while the Choir during the same period makes very laudable efforts to make itself heard above, what it considers, the noisy din of the other. We would remind each that "music hath charms to soothe the savage breast," and thereby, like the chorus in Greek plays, smooth the ruffled feelings of both.

The King's birthday parade was held at Lebong on the 30th of May. On the eve of that day the class rooms rang with the warlike sounds of side arms and chin-straps, which grew brighter as we gazed. The promptness with which handkerchiefs, etc., were sacrificed by these youthful defenders of the State to polish their accourrements, recalled to the mind of the spectator the memorable occasion on which the Carthaginian women parted with their hair for their country's service.

Major Nott, I.M.S., has succeeded Major Leahy as Civil Surgeon. We hope not to give him much trouble in the exercise of his professional duties. It is a source of pride to us that we do not often trouble the doctor. Long may we keep up our present record of complete freedom from infectious disease, and indeed from anything but the slight accidental ailments inevitable in a large community.

The Lord Bishop of Calcutta will hold a Confirmation in the School Chapel on Friday afternoon, July 4th.

Amongst those who have visited the School this year are Mr. Oscar Browning of King's College, Cambridge, Prince Louis D'Orleans and Prince Henri de la Tour D'Auvergne.

Mr. J. S. Slater, acting Director of Public Instruction, visited the School on Thursday, April 24th. Mr. Slater has an interesting family connection with St. Paul's, his father, the Rev. S. Slater, having been the second Rector, from 1849 to 1852, when the School was still in Calcutta. The move to Darjeeling took place in 1863. The School was founded in 1845 as a choir school for the Cathedral in Calcutta, whence it derives its name.

His Excellency the Viceroy, when in Darjeeling in February last, expressed great interest in the School, and displayed much knowledge of us and of our history. His Excellency is one of those who have watched with considerable interest and sympathy the effort that has been made to create in India a school that shall prescribe the best traditions and tone of English public school life, while at the same time frankly recognising the requirements of modern life as regards curriculum and education.

The Governing Body.

Several changes have taken place in the composition of the Governing Body, Bishop Welldon and Archdeacon Stone having left India, and Mr. E. Cable having gone home for some time. Mr. Worgan has also retired on his departure from India; and Mr. Shaw on leaving Darjeeling for Assam.

Mr. W. C. Macpherson, I.C.S., and Mr. A. Earle, I.C.S., have become Governors, and Bishop Copleston and the new Archdeacon Trustees.

AD PORTAS.

The custom of receiving distinguished visitors at the entrance to the main school buildings, borrowed from Winchester, was inaugurated at the reception of the new Bishop of Calcutta, on the occasion of his first visit to the School on Monday, May 26th. His Lordship, who was attended by the Rev. H. O. Moore, Domestic Chaplain, arrived punctually at 1-30. The School were drawn up on the slope of the path leading up to the quadrangle, while the Monitors stood in front of them. The Rector and Staff, in full academical dress, received the Bishop under the archway. After the members of the Staff had been presented, G. A. C. Badham stepped forward and welcomed the Bishop with a neat Latin speech. His Lordship replied in English, expressing his pleasure at making his first acquaintance with the School, and his hope and desire to be of service to it in the future. He referred to the past history and traditions and the present position of the School, and added a few words of advice and counsel addressed specially to the Monitors. He concluded by asking for a half-holiday to mark the occasion, as requested in the last few words of the speech addressed to him. This having been granted by the Rector, L. H. Burton called for three cheers for the Bishop, which were heartily given, and the ceremony ended.

The Bishop lunched at the Rectory, and afterwards made

the round of the School.

The text of Badham's speech, which was compiled by himself and did him much credit, was as follows:—

THE ALCESTIS.

A Greek Play in India must certainly be regarded as a somewhat unusual occurrence. It is unlikely that, at all events since the days of Chandragupta, such a performance has been witnessed between the Himalaya and the Ganges. Yet we propose, probably in October, to put on the Alcestis of Euripides. Exercising the usual discretion claimed by those who attempt revivals under such very different circumstances from those of the original play, a wide latitude has been exercised in the preparation of the acting edition. For want of adequate musical interpretation the choruses have been unsparingly cut down; and a Therapaina has become a Therapon. The play will be divided into two acts, the first ending before the departure of the funeral procession, with the expression of confidence in the future reward of rectitude by the chorus. The theatre will be the dining-hall, and the requisite preparations are already in hand.

THE LIBRARY.

The annals of a Library do not usually provide subjects of thrilling interest, and this time there is even less to record than usual. We wish to thank the Rev. H. O. Moore for his gift of books, which have been greatly appreciated and in constant request. The newspapers, formerly provided by the kindness of Mr. C. W. Newton, have been greatly missed. Judging from the number of books taken out each week, it is satisfactory to notice that the taste for reading in the school seems to be on the increase. Rather too light an order of literature is usually favoured, but perhaps one must not expect too much. Many of the volumes are in a very shattered condition, and a general overhauling of the shelves is proposed, which will provide the Librarians with occupation during the rains.

THE RIFLE CORPS.

This term the Corps started with a considerable augmentation in strength. There are now 66 names on the roll, of whom 14 are recruits. Such progress has however been made by the recruits, that several are now placed in the Company on Parade. Mr Shawcross has now taken command of the Company, being gazetted Captain, 12th February, 1902. Mr. Adams has joined as Second Lieutenant.

The first month was spent in Class-firing, as it was suddenly discovered that this had not been completed last year. Permission was granted to use the Lebong range, as our own was for the greater part of the day enveloped in mist. A very enjoyable day was spent at the range, lunch being provided

Our first public parade was occasioned by the sudden death of P. Nolan, Esq., I.C.S., late Colonel of the Northern Bengal Mounted Rifles. On 30th May, the Company, fifty strong, attended the parade at Lebong, and commemorated the birthday of the King-Emperor. The bugle band, despite its short term of practice, played us on to the parade ground in good style. The March Past was favourably commented upon by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor. The firing also was very good.

On June 5th, the Company, fifty strong, attended Divine Service at St. Andrew's, to commemorate the signing of peace.

Considerable progress has been made in drill, and though there is still much room for improvement, on the whole the Company is to be congratulated on its efficiency.

CRICKET.

The results of the first part of the season have been satisfactory, if not so brilliant as those of last year. We have won exactly half of the six matches played up to date, and have encountered very much stronger teams than we have generally met in the first season. By common consent there are more good cricketers up in Darjeeling this year than in either of the two preceding years, and it is natural that our averages should be lower in consequence. Owing also to atmospheric conditions of wind and rain, the season has not been propitious to heavy scoring, and our sensational dismissal of the Norfolk Regiment for 33 was almost immediately paralleled by our own collapse against the Station for 25. In each case, but more especially in the latter, a storm of wind and dust made it very difficult for the batsmen to face the bowling.

Our bowling is still by far the best feature of our cricket, if we except the wicket-keeping of our Captain, which is as good as ever, and which we missed sadly in the earlier matches. The batting has been moderate, but goes right down to the tail of the team, which is always a hopeful sign, and if this should improve after the rains, as we all hope it may, the team should yet fulfil its promise of last year.

The fielding on the whole has been good and keen, and we have not suffered much from slackness in this direction.

But it is essential that all the members of the team should realise that steady batting at the nets is imperatively necessary. The foolish practice of concluding every quarter of an hour at

the nets with three or four wild slogs has been directly responsible for the loss of many a good wicket on a match day, and there is very little appreciation at present of the sufficiently obvious fact that a prolonged period of steady play is necessary, even against mediocre bowling, before any batsman is entitled to hit out with a view to rapid scoring. The bowling of all our opponents this year has been far too straight to allow of any such liberties, and assuredly hinc illæ lacrimæ.

We affix the full scores of the matches played so far, together with the averages of those who have played for the School.

The Junior Game season has strangely resembled that of the Seniors, in that the batting has been distinctly inferior to the bowling and the fielding. Of the former Junior XI, only Badham mi, Le Patourel ma and Toogood were retained in the Game, and Ashton, Egan, Cave and Siddle mi, having received their colours, there will be four more caps for competition in the second season. Scores of 50 and over have been singularly few, a condition of things largely to be accounted for, as in the case of the 1st XI, by exigencies of wind and weather. Wet sodden matting, and shadows of clouds flickering across the pitch, are certainly against the piling up of runs.

The appointing of definite sets of juniors to practice at the nets at fixed times has produced good results, by avoiding over-crowding and throwing the best bats into the continual company of the best bowlers.
