THE GREAT SURPRISE.

Truly the East is the realm of surprise. For that the traveller is prepared as some bitterly chilly morning he boards a grimy and cheerless P. and O boat in the Royal Albert Docks and gazing on the peasoup-like atmosphere longs for the land of sun well up in his Kipling of course, says he has "'eard the East a calling," disclaims all participation in the error of Paget, M. P. Solar-Myth fame, and settles down to enjoy the coming surprises. And they come It is with a feeling of incredulity that he sees the originals of Caton Woodville's pictures, stage-scenery, and books of adventure. He can scarcely believe his eyes as before him rolls a grand panorama of real deserts, the actual Suez Canal, camels not in a Zoo, palmtrees, plantains, Arabs, vultures, rickshaws snake charmers. For five weeks or so he gazes at them, till at last, almost sated with novelties, he feels as he lands at Calcutta that he is already an Anglo-Oriental, and defies the future to sur prise him further. Little does he guess that the Great Surprise of all is still in store for him. A glimpse of the Eastern Metropolis fails to move him; a night journey broken by a crossing of an invisible river in an uncomfortable steam ferry merely bores him: to sit in a rickety tramcar which scrambles like a goat up precipitous mountains, clothed with lovely forests, has the one virtue of giving an appetite, and to settle in a district composed of nothing but hills is wearying to the body and wearing to the soles. for a moment (or perhaps a little more) the glories of the snows spur his jaded sensations to admiration and awe. But yet the great

surprise awaits him. Slowly and reluctantly his gaze drops to earth and with a shock he realizes that he is-in England! For where, oh where are the glories of the East? Where are the cobras, the tigers, the mosquitoes, the topees, the fevers, the sun, of which he had read? He is wearing a tweed cap and overcoat, his bed is innocent of muslin curtains, but rejoices in five blankets, and the hail that is falling is suspiciously like the weather of which he hoped he had seen the last five weeks before. And what is this building on the hill? No oriental savant sits here crosslegged instructing his scantily clad disciples in Black Magic and Astrology No. here are the familiar faces of the British Schoolboy; here are the well-known caps and gowns which recall the 'Varsity. Now there rings a chapel bell, now from the classrooms re-echo the (more or less familiar sounds of 'Mensa, Mensa, Mensam,' and 'Let x equal the number of miles in a furlong.' Here as at home, the monitor holds sway: Here as at home the youth 'learns to tell the truth and shoot straight' (at the goal).

Yes to find a life, a climate, a society, so closely resembling that of an English or Scotch School (especially a Scotch one, as regards climate) after travelling so many thousand miles, seems almost ridiculous.

And yet, long may it remain so. After all, the qualities of the Briton, truth, honour, pluck, and chivalry, are harder to dispense with than the frivolous delights of prickly heat, snakes, mosquitoes, and sunstroke, the joy of which, I am told, soon palls. So let our young Anglo-Indians rejoice that they need not endure a six years separation from their parents, and the risk of mal-de-mer, to obtain all the advantages of work, games, and 'tone,' which a Public School can offer them here as well as in the Old Country. Let them drink deep of the spirit of this place, this England of the East, and then when they leave it to play a man's part in the work of the British Empire, India may feel certain that 'she need never blush for the sons she herself has reared to be a credit to the British name.

NOTES.

The Rector has presented to the Chapel an artist's proof of Gustave Doré's great picture "Christ leaving the Praetorium," which has been hung over the altar.

The Rev. H. Conway, of the Oxford Mission to Calcutta, preached in the Chapel on Sunday March 29th, and the Ven'ble, the Archdeacon of Calcutta on Whitsunday.

H. H. the Lieutenant-Governor, who as one of our Governing Body has always taken the keenest interest in the school, was kind enough to arrange a match for us against an eleven of his own on the Shrubbery ground in the course of our opening season. His Honour, who himself captained the I. C. S. team against us two years ago, was unfortunately prevented by pressure of work from playing on this occasion. A tiffin of a sumptuous kind was most kindly provided by Mrs. Bourdillon in the Durbar Hall. The fielding of our opponents in this match was superior to our own, and taught us a lesson the fruits of which became apparent in the match against St. Joseph's.

Our Hospital Nurse, Mrs. Campbell, left at the end of last term, to be married to Mr. Henderson, the Manager of the Senchal Dairy Farm. She carries with her our best wishes for the future. She has been succeeded in the Hospital by Mrs. Corbett, from the General Hospital in Calcutta, who has many links of relationship, both past and present, with St. Paul's.

Major Nott, the Civil Surgeon, has been promoted since our last issue, and his place has been filled by Capt. Maddox, I. M. S.

There was a great forest fire some weeks since, on the borders of Nepal, which lasted for several days, did much damage, and rendered the air most oppressive, besides plentifully bestrewing our compound with the ashes of burnt leaves and twigs.

Our warmest thanks are due to Captain Umfreville for the keen interest he has taken in our cricket by coming up to coach the eleven at the nets and by playing in several games. We have been specially fortunate in having such a sporting regiment as the West Ridings up this year, and have already played more matches than we could secure during the whole of last term.

Mr. Dobbyn, too, has been very good in bringing his R. A. team from Katapahar to play matches against our A. team, as well as against the first eleven. These games have been most useful in enabling us to test the merits of our players of the second rank against outside bowling.

C. H. James, our head-monitor and captain of hockey, left on May 30th for Shillong, to sit for the Superior Accounts. He has our every good wish for his success, though if he passes in we shall lose our best and most useful man from the hockey team.

The Darjeeling Municipality are taking up a piece of our land which borders on the Terpsithea estate for the construction of a reservoir to supply the station. Unluckily this appears to be the only possible site for this undoubtedly necessary work. For we confess to an infinite reluctance to the alienation of any part of the school land, in view of the probable future requirements of the school itself.

We offer our respectful congratulations to Mrs. Newton on winning the prize for the best landscape in oils at the Darjeeling Fine Arts Exhibition this year.

By the retirement of the Rev. H. O. Moore to England, the School will lose the bodily vision of one of its best, truest and oldest friends. His memory will be kept alive here by his latest act of generosity, the endowment of the Moore Prizes, of which we give the conditions elsewhere.

We tender a hearty welcome to Mr. F. A. deV. Robertson, B. A., Keble College, Oxford, who has joined the staff of the school this term, and who is devoting himself to the Rifle Corps and to the Gymnasium.

Our hockey prospects, without Burton and James, are uncertain to the last degree. The loss to any team of a first class centre forward and centre half is not easily remedied. But August and Bion may be able to fill their places sufficiently. We played our first match on Saturday, June 20th, against a station team which contained the best players up, and won by 4 goals to 2, after a somewhat scrambling game.

The Senior Game propose to devote one game a week to football. Seeing that many of them have had the advantage of Mr. C. W. Newton's coaching in past years in the Junior Game it is hoped that their football will be as scientific as the limitations of the ground will permit. The juniors will continue to make football their chief game, and will meet the St. Joseph's juniors in the course of the season.

Only one change has taken place in the constitution of the Governing Body, Mr. E. Cable, a former Governor, being reappointed to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of the Rev. H. O. Moore.

H. H. the Lieutenant-Governor has sanctioned the exemption of this school from the necessity of offering candidates for the Primary and Middle School Examinations, and has accepted the Cambridge Local Preliminary and Junior as their equivalents, pending the orders of the Government of India. This has proved of the utmost value in unifying and simplifying the teaching of the school. We are now in a position to offer a first class education ordered on modern English lines right through the school, which will prove of inestimable benefit both to those who are proceeding to England and to those who complete their course by taking the Cambridge Senior Local, seeing that the lower Code examinations afforded no useful preparation for the latter.

The Debating Society opened its season on Friday, June 26th. This term has also witnessed the formation of a Shakespeare Reading Society, which meets at the Rectory on alternate Fridays, so as not to clash with the orators.

Mr. C. W. Newton and his colleague Mr. Page have removed from Ascham House, Bournemouth, and united with St. Christopher's Eastbourne. We are all glad to hear that his school is doing exceedingly well, and that he himself is much better in health and able to play cricket again.

The rise in our numbers this year is strikingly evidenced by the fact that it has become necessary to run three games for hockey and football. This will be a great boon to those who cannot count upon being picked to play regularly in the ordinary games.

Mr. A. C. Edwards, Officiating Director of Public Instruction, and Mr. W. W. Hornell, Officiating Inspector of European Schools, have visited the School already this term, and we are expecting a visit shortly from the Director-General of Education in India, Mr. H. W. Orange, an old schoolfellow of the Rector at Winchester.

Examination Results.

L. H. Burton passed into the Bengal Police, Superior.

In the Middle School Examination Penn was placed in the 1st class, with distinctions in Arithmetic, Euclid, and Algebra, and secured a Government Scholarship. Gregory, winning the same three distinctions and a scholarship, was 1st in the 2nd class. Smith and Stuart passed in the 3rd class, the former distinguished in Arithmetic.

THE ST. JOSEPH'S MATCH.

After an interval of three years it has been decided to revive this match and to make it an annual fixture. The conditions agreed upon this year were that no one should take part who was older than twenty, or who was not a bona-fide resident at the School or College. As long as our opponents will accept these conditions we shall always be very willing to meet them, in spite of our temporary inferiority in numbers and the consequent limitation of our field of choice.

The match this year aroused a great deal of interest in cricket circles in the station. St. Joseph's College were admittedly strong in batting, they had a good wicket-keeper in Martini, and a dangerous bowler in Rayneau. They had besides the reputation of being a clever fielding side. Our batting, was considered uncertain, our fielding dubious, but if Sharling and August both proved to be in form there were many who thought that the match might prove a close one after all. Both teams had done some good performances during the season against strong sides, but the general anticicipation was that St. Joseph's would prove victorious.

By the kind invitation of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor the match was played on the Shrubbery ground on Tuesday, June the 9th. St. Paul's won the toss and went to the wickets first. No sooner had the decision been arrived at than a mist swept across the ground, and rendered the

light difficult for batting.

Badham ma and Price opened the innings, to the bowling of Helps and Rayneau. Off the first over by Helps seven runs were scored, the first ball of the match being cut hard by Badham to point, a difficult but possible catch. Rayneau's first over was sensational. The first ball was nearly a wide on the off, the second beat Badham, passing just over the off stump, the third took the off stump and dismissed Badham. One wicket for 7. Sharling came in, was completely beaten by Rayneau's fourth ball, and bowled by his fifth. Two for 7. The sixth ball of this fatal over was safely played by the new-comer Badham mi. Four overs later Badham mi was neatly taken low down in the slips by J. Martini off Rayneau's bowling. Three for 19. Hutchison followed, but soon fell a victim to Rayneau. Four for 29.

With the advent of August ma things improved considerably, except the light, which grew steadily worse. The score mounted rapidly, both batsmen scoring freely. Stubbs, Ryan and O'Sullivan, were all tried, but eventually Price was caught in the slips of a mis-hit for 31. Five for 70. Millard was then bowled by Rayneau. Six for 80. August, who was still batting confidently, was bowled all over his wicket by Helps, but with a no ball. Outhwaite, having put together 10 in good style, was very smartly taken by Bryan at square leg off Stubbs. Seven for 99. August was the next to leave, at 103, for an invaluable 39, being beaten by a leg break from Rayneau. It was an innings without a chance, most of his runs being scored as usual between point and cover. The remainder of the team did

nothing much, and the innings closed for 110.

St. Joseph's opened with their two most consistent batsmen, Martini and Bryan, but with the score at 8 the latter was clean bowled by August. Stubbs came in, and the stand of the innings took place, which ended in the dismissal of Martini by Badham ma. Two for 51. The retiring Captain had played very carefully for 12 runs. The third wicket fell for 59. and when an adjournment was made for lunch the score stood at 70.

On resuming, the wickets fell faster, August bowling exceedingly well. Seven wickets fell before the St. Paul's total was passed, and the innings closed for 157, Rayneau and Martini putting on 20 for the ninth wicket,

the top scorer being Stubbs with 31.

The second innings of St. Paul's produced a good exhibition of batting though Badham ma was unlucky enouga to cut a ball into his wicket at 17. Hutchison and Sharling, playing the bowling with ease and freedom, raised the score to 71 before they were separated. Both of them were eventually bowled by Bryan, and at the close of play the total stood at 85 for 3 wickets, Price not out, and August not having yet gone in. Rayneau was apparently tired, for his bowling was wholly ineffectual in the second innings. Had the match been a two days' fixture, as it is proposed that it shall be in future, a close and interesting finish might have been looked for. As it was St. Joseph's won on the first innings by 47 runs.

The fielding on both sides was good, though a few mistakes were made by our opponents. We have nothing to reproach ourselves with, except a couple of catches missed at the wicket, the holding of either of which might have altered the result of the match.

Our warmest thanks are due to His Honour for lending us the ground, and for hospitably entertaining both teams at lunch. He and Mrs. Bourdil-

lon were interested spectators of the game.

We were a little unlucky in the light, which behaved badly in our first innings, and cleared for our opponents. We also made the two highest individual scores in the match. On the whole, although defeated, we feel that we can look back with satisfaction upon the game of 1903 and hope for many a keen and well fought out match in future.

THE MOORE PRIZES

The following are the conditions of the prizes endowed by the Rev. H. O. Moore.

INTENTION.

- 1. To promote an intelligent knowledge of religion in accordance with the principles of the Church of England.
- 2. To promote the study of Latin and Greek.
- 3. To encourage a wider culture of mind than is involved in getting up set books for examination.

TRUST.

The capital of the fund, (Rs. 3,000), shall be held by the Bishop and Archdeacon of Calcutta for the time being as trustees, and shall be invested in Government securities.

ADMINISTRATION.

- The Income of the fund shall be administered by the Rector of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, subject to the following conditions:—
- 1. Two prizes, of the value of Rs. 75 and Rs. 25 respectively, shall be awarded annually in St. Paul's School for proficiency in Divinity and Classics, all the competitors being examined in both subjects, the money to be spent upon books approved by the Rector.
- 2. Each prize shall be awarded on written papers in both subjects, the whole conduct of the examination being left in the hands, of the Rector.
- 3. The papers shall be of a general character, no text book being set before hand.
- 4. The standard shall be of an "Honour" rather than of a "Pass" character, and the prizes (either or both of them) may be withheld in any year, if in the opinion of the Rector a sufficiently high standard is not reached.
- 5. In the case of a prize being withheld in any year, the money apportioned to it for that year may be spent upon books for the School Library selected by the Rector.

ADDENDA.

I. In the event of the character of St. Paul's School being so altered as to make it impossible to fulfil the above conditions, the kector may use the income of the fund for the school library, until it becomes possible again to fulfil the intention of the Trust.

2. In the event St. Paul's School ceasing to exist the Trustees may use the income of the fund for prizes or a scholar-ship in any school of which they are Trustees, having regard as much as possible to the Intention expressed above.

THE LIBRARY.

The appearance of the Library has been improved by a rearrangement of the school groups, and by the addition of a very fine photograph of one of the scenes in last year's Greek Play. The usual grant from the Athletic Fund has been employed in rebinding a number of the older books, many of which needed it badly. It is encouraging to note the large number of books which are taken out every week, very few boys needing to be pressed to do so, which seems to show that the taste for reading in the school is on the increase. The books read have been, naturally enough,

chiefly of the lighter order, such authors as Cuctliffe Hyne, Anthony Hope and Stanley Weyman being the chief favourites; but there has been a fair demand for the older standard authors, as also for historical works, and for some of the poets.

The following new books have been added—"The Captain" (2 vols.) and "Cyril" (Drage) presented by Mr. Brownrigg, to whom we are also indebted for a constant supply of the current numbers of 'The Captain' and the Navy 'League Journal,' and "Youth and Duty" (Welldon) and "The Marriage of Esther' (Boothby) presented by Mr. Shawcross.

THE RIFLE CORPS.

The Rifle Corps has once again a fair record to show. At the beginning of Term Mr. F. A. de V. Robertson joined us as 2nd Lieutenant having been three years with the Oxford University Light Infantry. We welcome such a keen and enthusiastic officer. Instructor Brittain of the K. O. S. B's. was specially retained and excellently has he done his work.

We began with company parades on Wednesdays and squad drill daily and a good level of efficiency was soon reached.

The Company has steadily increased till at present we have an enrolled strength of 78.

Our losses have been few: Lieutenant Adams has resigned. We all missed our late Col. Sergt., L. H. An informal inspection by Lieut.-Colonel Marindin took place on June 10th, when the Company acquitted itself with great credit, there being very little to criticise adversely.

On June 13th Major General J. S. Collins, Inspector General of Volunteers, inspected the Company. The General, accompanied by Major Wimberley, was received on the parade ground at 3-20 with the general salute. The inspection began at once without any more ceremonial drill. The work was very varied and thorough, all Officers and N.-C. Officers being called upon to exercise the company or sections selected by the Inspecting Officer. The steadiness of the Company in all its movements surprised even ourselves. As a criticism on the Parade we cannot do better than quote the opening paragraph in the General's Notes. "The Drill and training of all ranks, Officers, N.-C. Officers and men was good." After the Parade a section under Col. Sergt. Petter proceeded to the range, where some good practice was made in rapid volleys and independent firing. Afterwards the Armoury was inspected. Our bugle band surprised even the Inspecting Officer by its proficiency. We have at last got an instructor who takes a keen interest in the band and we are all proud of it when it leads us on Parade or on the march. The thanks of the whole Company are due to its members and its efficient leader D. Badham for the keenness shewn in their work.

It is a thing indeed worthy of note to find volunteers anxious to join its ranks. And finally a word as to our weaknesses. The saluting by all ranks is not what it should be, there is a considerable want of smartness in it. Again words of command are not given by the majority of N.-C. Officers with the clearness and sharpness which are necessary if they wish them to be obeyed with smartness.

We hope to see a considerable improvement in the sections, owing to the kindness of Major Wimberley who has offered to give a prize to the most efficient section.

We have received several challenges to do battle with various companies of the West Ridings, but time has unfortunately been wanting to enable us to accept them.

CRICKET.

The results of the first season are as follows. Out of a total of 13 matches we have won 7, lost 5, and drawn 1. The bowling and batting have been consistently good, and the team this year seems to have no tail. The fielding, which began by being very slack, has improved with every match, and in the last match, against St. Joseph's, was really excellent. If this improvement can be sustained there is no reason why we should not have a most successful second season. There are only two vacancies from last year's eleven, though three caps may ultimately be awarded if all last year's team do not retain their places.

The season has been marked by the revival of the match against St. Joseph's, by the playing of two A. team matches, and by the match played by the united schools against the Station.

The Junior eleven have twice met St. Joseph's. The first match was spoilt by the inclusion in the visiting team of a player whose height in the field looked rather out of proportion to that of the rest. As he made 74 not out it is probable that the game would have been much improved by his absence, and so it proved in the return match at St. Joseph's which was hampered by rain. On this occasion we had considerably strengthened our side, and St. Joseph's sportingly did not play their young giant.

The united schools put out a fine team, and defeated the strongest available civil and military eleven by a handsome margin. This happy result was mainly due to the long stand by Martini and Bryan for the first wicket, to Hutchison's 31 not out, and to the bowling of Stubbs and August. All cricket enthusiasts will look forward to the two days' return match which it is proposed to hold in the Pujahs, and will join us in the hope that the West Riding Regiment may be still at Lebong to assist the station.
