DEVELOPMENTS.

It is an old proverb that everything comes to him who knows how to wait. That proverb is proving itself true once more in our case. No one can question the fact that we have had to wait for what we wanted, but we are getting it by degrees. It is after all not so very long ago since it seemed hopeless to expect to get a good English examination for European schools in India. Now, not only have we secured the privilege of entering for the Cambridge Locals ourselves, but owing to the agitation first set on foot by La Martiniere and us those examinations will soon be within the reach of others.

In numbers we have long since exceeded the long desired hundred, without making any sacrifices with regard to the tone and class of the school.

Financially, we have secured the St. James' Fund with its resultant exhibitions, and also the Malchus Trust, now a handsome sum, which is due to the liberal bequest made to the school by the late Mr. Malchus of Calcutta.

The completion moreover of the Government scheme for clearing off the encumbrances which have hampered our efficiency for so many years is now approaching. We enjoy already the large special grant which is a portion of it, and which we have put to such excellent use. The continued existence of the school on a basis of the highest efficiency, so long a matter of anxious doubt, is now secured, and all we have to do is to show ourselves worthy of what has been done for us. In the honourable burden of this responsibility we all share alike. May we all approve ourselves, both here and hereafter, loyal members of the oldest and best of English schools in India.

THE RIFLE CORPS.

"E." Company, N. B. M. R.

The work of the Company has gone on much as in former years. The system of the changing-room lends itself to the easy refitting of the company at the beginning of each year and this refitting was carried out even more quickly than usual. Thus we were able to get on with the company training and with the assistance of our new Instructor, Sergeant Hemblys, the company quickly looked smart. On May 23rd, Colonel Thorold, of the Duke of Wellington's Regiment, very kindly paid us a visit and gave us valuable hints for the perfecting of our company training. He expressed himself as agreeably surprised at the company movements and gave the section commanders much valuable advice. We owe a debt to Colonel Thorold for his interest in the company and for his kindness in giving us so much of his well earned spare time. The next parade was mostly devoted to the teaching of the correct methods of taking cover for individuals and for sections advancing under fire. In the former some very smart pieces of work were done, whilst in the latter Sergeant Dalley's section showed up best being under better control of its commander. In some of the sections there was a tendency to drop as soon as fire was opened instead of making a dash forward to the nearest cover. The General Inspection took place on June 2nd. E and F. Companies paraded at 9-15 on the Shrubbery ground and received the Inspecting Officer, Major General A. H. Pearson, C. B., who was accompanied by Major Grant-Gordon, with the general salute at 9-30. The Inspection opened with a few Company movements under the Company Commanders and then the sections were drilled in close and open order by their respective Section Commanders. E. Company gave a display of physical drill and F. Company of Free Gymnastics. With these the Inspecting Officer expressed himself very pleased and the Inspection concluded with light refreshments provided by the Corps. We regret that we have lost our popular Adjutant but most heartily congratulate him on his Majority. He has always taken the deepest interest in the welfare of the company and we owe several improvements to his initiation.

For the present Captain St. Hill, of the Duke of Wellington's, will act as Adjutant. For the last few weeks we have been unable to use the Range at Katapahar and it renders once again the firing of the course very difficult. It is quite time that something was done in this matter. We hear that we are likely to have shortly a miniature range on the compound and we have every hope that the shooting of the company will be greatly improved thereby. We have only had one shooting match this term and that concluded very much against ourselves. It seems almost hopeless to compete with our carbine against the short rifle of the regulars. We hope that when the General Commanding this division inspects us, which we expect will be towards the

end of October, we shall be able to turn out a Company as smart as any in this Command. The section commanders are at the present perhaps the most capable we have had for several years and with their assistance there is no reason why we should not improve upon the form displayed last year. We understand that the Corps is shortly to be supplied with new helmets of cork.

Rules.

6. That the subscription to the Club shall be Rs. 6 per annum.

7. That every member shall be regularly supplied with the "St. Paul's School Chronicle" at the expense of the Club.

8. That the colours of the Club be a dark blue coat with brass buttons, with the school arms in crimson and white on the pocket, with cap, tie, scarf, and hat riband to match. The Club colours to be obtained from Messrs. Whiteaway Laidlaw & Co., in Calcutta.

9. That the Committee shall meet before the annual dinner, and that the general meeting of the Club shall be held on the evening of the dinner.

10. That the Committee shall elect to membership of the Club, each case to be dealt with as it arises. Every candidate to be proposed and seconded by a member of the Club. This rule does not, of course, apply to original members.

The Cricket Season just ended has been, under the circumstances a satisfactory one. We were very unfortunate in losing four of our last year's bowlers, while the new material at our disposal was decidedly limited in quality. On the other hand the batting of the team, especially of the older men—

bers, has been good—in the case of Shaw extremely good, and some steady form has been shown by the younger players. The fielding maintained the high level of excellence it reached last year.

The most remarkable performances have been those of Shaw and August, the former having developed into a really first class bat, while on some occasions August's success with the ball has been astonishing, as will be seen by a study of the Bowling Analysis.

Colours have been awarded to August and J. P. Dalley, while bats have been presented to Shaw, R. P. Dalley, Allison and August.

THE ST. JOSEPH'S MATCH.

Our Annual Match against St. Joseph's College came off during the Whitsuntide Holidays, on Monday and Tuesday, June 4th and 5th. By the kind permission of Mr. Hare it was played, as usual, on the Shrubbery Ground. From the results of Matches previously played by the two Schools it was expected that the contest would be a close one, and the interest excited by the Match was even greater than it was last year. Col. Thorold Commanding the Duke of Wellington's Regiment, who had throughout the season taken a keen interest in the Cricket of the two Schools, very kindly entertained the two teams at luncheon on the first day, and brought up the Regimental Band, which helped materially to increase the pleasure of the many spectators.

But to turn to the Match itself.

St. Joseph's won the toss and went in first. They commenced to bat very carefully—indeed, from a spectator's point of view, the game was almost painfully slow, only 25 runs being scored during the first hour. At length after some good defensive play had been shown by most of the side, and some really good batting by Holloway (54) and Ready (29) the innings closed for 176. Our fielding was throughout of a very high order, with one or two notable exceptions, and Allison at point was especially brilliant.

We sent in LePatourel and Toogood; both failed to do much; but when Shaw and Allison got together some fine batting was seen, and runs came fast. Allison's innings of 72 was invaluable, and was by far his best innings this Season. Of the remainder, Sims played a steady game for his 18, but taken as a whole the tail was a weak one—the innings closed just before the close of play for 174, 2 runs behind our opponents' total.

Before the game was resumed on Tuesday it was suggested that, if there were any possibility of playing the Match to a conclusion, the game should be continued until 6 P. M. To this, unfortunately, the St. Joseph's Captain would not consent. We are bound to say that, considering the very even character of the Game at the time, we consider his decision an unsporting one—However.

In their 2nd innings they were unfortunate in losing Holloway for 1, but Ready again came to the rescue, and was well supported by Willmott, Singleton and Wood. After another rather tedious display the innings closed for 134, and we were left with 137 to get to win, and 65 minutes in which to get the runs. After the game had been saved, and defeat was impossible, we determined to make a bold bid for victory, and thanks to the magnificent hitting of Shaw, ably backed up by Allison, runs came at a terrific pace, and the score went up by leaps and bounds. Only 26 runs were wanted, and we had still 7 wickets to fall when time was called, and robbed us of an almost certain victory. Shaw received a well-deserved ovation on his return to the pavilion—his batting had indeed been marvellously good, for during the greater part of his innings the light had been the worst possible, owing to a heavy mist.

The fielding of our opponents was excellent, and their joint, Singleton, was as brilliant as ours.

The match from a spectator's point of view was not particularly interesting. The one idea of our opponents was to make a draw of the match if possible—and a match played under these conditions loses half its interest. We cannot but think that, had our opponents forced the game and tried to score more freely off our bowling, which was by no means difficult, they would have fared better. The teams were not up to the level of former years; each side relied too much on its one or two "stars" and the tails in both elevens were disappointing.

We have several very fair batsmen who are difficult to displace unless they give way to mere slogging, and our bowlers rely more on length and break than on pure plugging. The net-practice, too, has been taken seriously and improved, we hope, both the batting and bowling considerably. One fault may be found with the usual Captains, that they have suffered rather from the bowling itch and have not taken themselves off soon enough; but this fault often arises from keenness, and, on the whole, there has been plenty of enthusiasm, and there seems to be plenty of talent and material on which the Senior Game may draw in the future.

I should like to express my full approval of the scheme, which, I hear, is at present occupying the minds of the Authorities of the School—namely that proposed—I believe—by the Rector for the enlargement of the Playground. It is thoroughly evident that our playground, though quite long enough, is too narrow to admit of five Hockey forwards playing properly. On examining the ground I think the following would be as good a plan as any other. It is evident that the only way of enlarging is by pushing the corner against the hillside further in. On the hill side overlooking this corner above the lowest pathway there is a kind of gully coming down the hill. Below this path the ground comes out more on a level with that on either side. I think by cutting away this portion of the hill below the path and including the path, and by making a flush continuation of the gully above, a very considerable lateral space would be gained. Probably a low stone wall at the bottom, and a drain down the hill would be necessary to make it quite safe. This work should not occupy longer than a month, especially as material aid could easily be afforded by the organisation of voluntary bands of sappers and miners drafted from the seniors under the supervision of our engineeretic (I mean energetic) Mathematical Master. Hoping to see the work taken up as soon as possible.
