EDITORIAL.

This School Chronicle, which should have been out at the end of July, is very late in appearing; owing to an unfortunate concomitance of circumstances, of which the chief perhaps is the incompetence of the one into whose hands the work has fallen owing to the fact that the permanent Editor is otherwise engaged; and his temporary locum teneus, though able to plead a certain amount of claims upon his energies out of school hours, has also to confess to such a sluggish and procrastinating nature as to rank him with the able seaman who, when brought before the ship's doctor and asked to describe his symptoms, declared—"Well, Sir, I eats well, and I drinks well, and I sleeps well, but when I sees a job o'work, lor, sir, I'm all of a tremble."

M. s., the school medical officer, for his unwearied and extraordinary attention to our Rector, whose life he undoubtedly preserved.

The Rector left Darjeeling on May 25th for Bombay en route to England, in charge of one of the nurses of the Lady Minto Nursing Home on Salt Hill Road, where for many weeks he had been the object of very devoted and skilful nursing.

Mr. Adams is acting as Rector, and in all his twenty years of good work for the school has probably never rendered it better service than he is now doing.

In the place of Miss Baker we welcome Miss Robinson who took her place on August 1st and was immediately seen to be an experienced and able teacher.

EDINBURGH SHIELD MATCHES

St. Paul's School vs. Darjeeling C. C. (Played at St. Paul's on 11th and 12th May.)

This was our first match for the Edinburgh Shield, the School winning easily by an innings and 119 runs. The D. C. C. could do nothing with our bowlers making 59 runs in their first innings and 68 in their second. The School had no difficulty in making 275, H. G. Langley (67) and Lawrence (60) being the chief scorers.

In our opponents' first innings Kelly bowled well taking 5 wickets

for 9 runs.

St. Paul's School vs. St. Joseph's College, (Played at St. Joseph's on 16th and 17th May.)

St. Joseph's won the toss and put us in to bat; getting us out for the small score of 77. Lawrence (36) and Allum (22) being the only batsmen to reach double figures. Our side were very nervous and fell easy victims to the bowling of Chestney and Hill

St. Joseph's did not do much better the whole side being out for

106. Jones (32) being the only one to do anything.

In our second venture we did much better, the first two men, H. J. Langley and Watson, taking the score to 54 before Langley was bowled. After the fall of his wicket things looked bad until H. G. Langley and Lawrence got 'going' putting on about 60 runs the innings closing for 203. H. I. Langley (34), Watson (36). H. G. Langley (28), and Lawrence (64), did most of the scoring.

With only an hour left for play St. Joseph's began their second innings, but again failed before our bowling being dismissed for 105

in three quarters of an hour

We thus won the match by 69 runs

Lawrence and H. G. Langley are deserving of the greatest praise, the former for his two really sound displays with the bat in which he scored a total of 100 runs in his two innings, the latter for the very plucky way in which he continued to bat after his finger was badly smashed and furthermore undertook to keep wicket under what must have been very painful circumstances. That his wicket keeping was successful is shown by the fact that he stumped two of our opponents whilst only two balls were allowed to pass him. Gasper's 'googlies' proved very puzzling to the batsmen and he took 4 good wickets at a critical stage though occasionally the batsmen rather took liberties with him. Good fielding and keenness played a very important part in the winning of the match.

At the beginning of term before the commencement of Oricket we had a short Football season during which Major Villa very kindly brought teams to play us on two occasions. Our team was not at that time at its full strength and we lost both matches. Later on several Old Colours returned to School and added very considerably to the strength of our team.

We have played in two Cup Competitions this year the first being for the 'North Point Challenge Cup' The first match was played on the St. Joseph's ground on the 25th June and resulted in a victory for us 3-1. In the first ten minutes Kelly scored for the School. During the second half Langley by brilliant play scored two more goals whilst our opponents scored once towards the end of the game.

The second match against St. Joseph's was played on our ground on the 29th June. The weather conditions were very bad; and there was an incessant downpour throughout the game so that it was a matter of great difficulty to control the ball. Langley scored for us in the first half but St. Joseph's equalised in the second half and the game ended in a draw 1-1. As this competition is played on the League system the cup was won by us by 3 points to 1.

In the Herlihy Cup Competition our results have not been up to expectation. The Soldiers have been too strong for both the Schools, both in skill and in avoirdupois. Our last and most important match was against St Joseph's College on our ground. During the match an incessant gale was blowing and it was impossible to judge where the ball would bounce. St. Joseph's scored the only goal of the game in the first half and though we simply bombarded their goal in the second half we met with no success though there were many occasions on which it appeared that we could not help scoring. This weakness in front of goal was apparent throughout the season and undoubtedly lost us several matches. Our team this year contained seven "old colours" and considering the strength of the side the results have been very disappointing. Kelly's departure has been a great loss and Ripley's absence, as a result of measles, from nearly all the League Matches has been keenly felt.

We congratulate our second eleven on their victories over another "B" team from Jalapahar, some of them show promise for the future.
