EDITORIAL.

It is unfortunately impossible for us to follow the advice of the old proverb regarding the swapping of horses while crossing a stream, and we consequently find ourselves faced with a change of Rector at a time when the state of finances necessitates a considerable rise in School fees, the effect of which on our numbers in the near future is a cause for some anxiety.

We record with much regret the retirement of the Rev. E. E. Benson, Rector of the School for the last fourteen years. In his place we are on the point of welcoming the Rev. F. V. Dawkins, who comes to us with a great reputation from Bishop Cotton's School Bangalore, of which he has been Principal for some years, and we have no doubt that the choice of the Governors will be fully justified.

The rise in School fees by Rs. 10 and Rs. 5 per month will make St. Paul's, though still comparing favourably with English Schools in this respect, the most expensive School, in India, and the decision was not arrived at without anxious thought. There seems however to be no other course to pursue, if the School is to be maintained at a satisfactory standard of efficiency. It is gratifying to find that many of the parents realise this, and several have expressed their readiness to incur the extra burden.



SCHOOL NOTES.

We were all glad on our return to School to find ourselves welcomed by the Rev. E. E. Benson who had returned to the Rectory in February looking wonderfully well after his severe illness, but found with regret that he had merely returned to settle up his private affairs before retiring. Though only here *Ex officio* he continued to take the greatest interest in the affairs of the school and rendered valuable assistance by taking classes during the temporary absence of one of the Staff. He also continued to conduct the School Chapel Services.

Mr. Benson finally left on May 2nd to catch the 'Morea' at Bombay. We are glad to hear that he arrived safely after a pleasant voyage, and wish him every success in a preparatory School which we understand he proposes to start in Wiltshire.

We are glad to welcome Mr. C. E. Berry B. Sc. of London University who arrived, with Mrs Berry, in February to take the place of Mr. Dillon as Science Master.

Mr. Dillon, whom we were all sorry to lose, sailed for England in March after having been delayed by a fire discovered at the last moment on the Ship in which he had taken his passage.

Stamp collectors have been delighted to find a friend and ally in Mrs. Davey, who has joined Mr. Davey this year.

As the departure of the Rev. E. E. Benson left the School without a resident 'Padre' we have been very fortunate in securing the services of the Rev. W. A. Hobson who has been appointed by the Bishop of Calcutta to officiate as Chaplain until the arrival of the new Rector. Mr. Hobson has also worked as a member of the Staff to which he has proved a very useful and popular addition as master.

An outbreak of chicken pox put the school in quarantine for March, April and part of May, Mr. Berry being among the victims. One of the junior boys developed this on the day, after his arrival. He was promptly put into hospital in the hope of stopping infection but the mischief was already done.

We congratulate the five Seniors and seven Juniors who succeeded in passing the Cambridge Local Examinations in December. The full list is given elsewhere.

On May 10th the Cadet Corps was inspected by General Cubitt who expressed himself as very pleased with their smartness and efficiency. A half holiday was given next day by the officiating Rector at his request.

The staff has been unlucky this term, as in addition to Mr. Berry, we have had two other masters temporarily absent from nervous break-down. They were fortunate in having in the first place Mr. Benson and in the second Mr. Hobson to supply their places.

On June 15th a surprise awaited the Cadets in the form of their long expected pay, on the strength of which the seniors among them went to see the Hawaiian Troubadours in the evening

Miss Heinig's dancing classes are being eagerly frequented by boys anxious to qualify for a School Dance, which it is hoped will take place later in the year.

The Gymnasium, which had to be used as a Music Room last year, has now been fitted out to serve its original purpose, and the voluntary classes conducted by Mr. Humphries and Sergt. Hepburn are being well attended. The old Carpenters shop is making an excellent Music Room.

On June 29th eighteen boys from the School presented themselves for confirmation by the Bishop of Calcutta at St. Andrew's Church. The candidates were instructed by the Rev W. A. Hobson.

On the last Saturday in March, the school being in quarantine, an intrepid party of explorers under Mr. Berry set out to scale Tiger Hill. Arrived at the summit they as usual 'viewed the mist and missed the view'. They secured however a snapshot of Lady Lytton, whom they had encountered on the way, and who graciously allowed herself to be photographed.

We deeply regret to hear of death on June 26th, from peritonitis following enteric, of R. W. Barker who left us last year, and deeply sympathise with his parents in their loss of such a promising boy. He was studying for engineering at St. Joseph's College, Naini Tal.

D. L. Utting is now studying at the London Tutorial College here he finds a brother of Mr. Adams among the lecturers.

A. E. James has our congratulations and best wishes on his marriage with Muriel daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. W. Maltby which is to take place at Cambridge on July 28th.

A handsome donation from the Lord Bishop of Calcutta has enabled us to start a Junior Library. This we have needed for a long time. It is to be hoped that those using this library will remember that books are an expensive item at the present time, and will be careful to return them undamaged.

A Reading Room has also been provided for the Junior boys as well as for the Seniors. Both of these are in a somewhat rough condition at present, but it is proposed to improve them gradually if they seem to be appreciated.

St. Joseph's vs. St. Paul's.

On the 30th and 31st May at St. Paul's

The shield match against St. Joseph's came off on the 30th and 31st of May. The weather was fine, and a keen contest was expected. The toss was won by St. Joseph's, and they put themselves into bat. Our bowling was good, and we dismissed them all for 97. For the College, Lake only did himself justice with the moderate score of 26. For St. Paul's our Captain W. Emmett took 6 wickets for 19 runs. Our opponents might not have reached such a score if our fielding had been up to the mark; but as most members of the team suffer from nervousness this could not be helped.

The second day St. Joseph's went in, and though our bowling and fielding were good, raised their score to 108. Their first two wickets fell for the paltry score of 11, and our men had great hopes. However nervousness again got the better of us, and our team collapsed like a house of cards. Barrett our steadiest man being bowled for 0. Emmett therefore to avoid another calamity changed the order, and tried in vain to stop the 'rot'. Our side were dismissed for 65. For the College H. Renaux scored 41, and K. Cleary 26 not out. The bowlers were Chestney, 30 runs for 3 wickets, and E. Keystone, who for 18 runs took 4 wickets. For the School Harvey was the only member of the Team who reached double figures; his score being 27 not out.

CRICKET CHARACTERS.

C. W. Emmett (Capt). An excellent and indefatigable bowler. A splendid bat on his day. Brilliant in the field especially in his returns. As Captain has been untiring in his efforts to improve his side.

V. Gasper. A good bowler whose breaks are often astonishing, but who must learn that break without length is useless. A forceful bat and a very reliable field. Is keen.

G Barrett. Has an excellent defence but should learn to be more aggressive. A useful bowler and a sound field.

D. Hodges. Has good style and is capable of making runs. Shows considerable promise as a Wicket Keeper but is sadly lacking in keenness.

N. Harvey. Can score rapidly and has a very fair defence. His fielding at times was very weak: Should remember to use his feet only as a very last resource.

J. Dawn. Is a promising bat and realises the importance of length in his bowling. Ought to develop into a very useful all round cricketer.

S. Neish. Has a very promising style and has greatly improved. A safe field. Should develop into a useful fast bowler.

S. Emmett. One of the best bats on the side, but has never "come off" in matches. A sound and reliable field. Ought to be very good all round in a couple of years.

H. Bailey Has made rapid strides in his batting but is still very stiff. His fielding could be much better

H. Sherman. A good field and a fair bat. Will improve with practice.

H. Farrow. A steady bat, but not a run getter. Has no strokes A very fair field.

FOOTBALL.

At the time of writing we are in the middle of the Football season, so we are not able to judge either way as regards our prospects in the forthcoming tournament for the "North Point Challenge Cup"—a trophy of which we are the present holders.—

The season so far has not been very successful for the school, but our players must not be discouraged by this statement, for they are both inexperienced and greatly handicapped by the superior weight of the opposing teams; the team taken as a whole is very hard working, and although lack of combination and failure in accurate shooting is still noticeable, it should soon compare favourably with the teams of other years.

We had a short spell of football before the cricket season started and were fortunate to have a match against a team brought up by Major Villa. We lost this match, the score being 4—1

As nine teams entered for the Herlihy Memorial Cup this year, the committee decided to play the tournament on the "knock out" system, and not on the league system as in former years. We were unfortunate to have been beaten in our first match against the Head Quarters Coy. of the Royal West Kent Regt. stationed at Leborg, the same fate awaiting St. Joseph's College. The match was played on St. Joseph's ground, and although we were defeated by the large margin of four goals to one, the difference between the standards of play by the two teams must not be judged by the score.

Our first and only public appearance this year was to line the streets on the arrival of the new Governor Lord Lytton. We upheld our reputation, and once more were declared the smartest of the cadet platoons present.

Our instructor, Sgt Hepburn, of the Northumberland Fusiliers is still with us; there was a rumour afloat that he was to leave, but we are glad that he is here still, very ably instructing the platoon in bayonet fighting.

Something of novelty has been added to our platoon in the shape of a Lewis Gun. The team which consists of twelve members of the platoon is being instructed by Sergeant Major Bishop, who gives a weekly Lecture.

On May 5th the Adjutant inspected us, prior to an inspection by the General Officer Commanding.

On May 10th General Cubitt inspected the platoon and was thoroughly satisfied with it. He showed his appreciation by asking for a half holiday, to which Mr. Adams readily gave his consent.

Before bringing these short notes to an end we must congratulate the platoon for once more winning the Baker Shooting Shield. And although they were unable to break the former record of seventy six hits established by the platoon in 1920, they created a record for rapidity of firing.

Presentation to the Rev. E. E. Benson.

On May 1st the Staff and boys assembled in the School Hall to bid farewell to the Rev: E. E. Benson. The Head-boy G. O'C Heefke in a short speech expressed the pleasure which it had been to all to see the Rector here again after his long illness, and how difficult it was to realise, to the deep regret of all, that he was now leaving altogether. For fourteen years long before any of those present had made his first timid appearance in form IC the Rector had been at his post, taking a keen interest in Sports as well as

games, and always ready with a cheery word of encouragement or advice. Occasionally the stimulus had been of an unpleasant form applied—where it was likely to do most good!—but all felt that, even so, it had always been administered wisely, and with considerable skill. If, as he hoped we might claim, the character of the Paulite past and present was a thing to be proud of; a great deal of the building of this character was due to the Rector. In his absence the boys of St. Paul's School would do their best to show that they had not forgotten the good traditions which he had handed down to them.

In conclusion he begged him to accept the piece of plate which the boys past and present wished to give as a token of their keen appreciation of all that he had done for them, and in the hope that it would occasionally recall to himself and to Mrs. Benson the boys of St. Paul's School.

The Rector in reply said that he was at a loss to express his thanks for the handsome farewell present that he had just received. Neither he nor Mrs. Benson would need anything to remind them of the boys of St. Paul's School, in whose future they would always take the liveliest interest, and many of whom he hoped to see again some day.

The School had for some time been beset with great difficulties which were not over yet; but he was confident that these difficulties would be eventually surmounted, and that St. Paul's would in the end reach a position of equality with the best English Schools and of universal recognition as the leading School of India. Finally he related some amusing stories of the struggles of the School in his early days, when the numbers were under 100, of the excitement when he at last succeeded in securing a new boy and the general consternation when the same boy fell ill and left the School again a week later. A few more reminiscences of the same kind fairly "brought down the house" and effectually disposed the gloomy feelings with which we had at first assembled.

The boys' present was a handsome silver table centre. Later in the evening the Rector attended a farewell dinner given by the Staff in the Common Room who begged his acceptance of a silver solver as a token of their friendship and esteem.

Entertainments

A performance combining amusement with instruction was given in the School Hall by Mr. Leo Wallace Young on May 26th. His impersonation of characters from Shakespeare and Dickens were extremely clever, and kept all interested for nearly two hours. Among the smaller boys possibly the best appreciated item was an imitation of a recital of the Charge of the Light Brigade by various persons from the Drill Sergeant to the School-Girl.

A lighter form of amusement has been provided by impromptu concert got up by the boys themselves. Form V led the way with a small variety entertainment in their class room one evening. The programme ranged from a quite original rendering of some scenes from Shakespeare to the latest comic song, with a skirt dance thrown in as an interlude. Though somewhat interrupted by a section of the audience who felt themselves called upon to supply the comic element, this was generally voted a success, and was followed shortly afterwards by similar efforts both in Mrs. Denley's and Mrs. Jones's dormitories, both of which managed to pass a very enjoyable evening, and revealed some budding talent.
