





Through the inverted telescope of the term, seen through the eyes of December, we began 1981 like the third movement of Beethoven's Seventh Symphony, the continuing apotheosis of dance and of well co-ordinated routine instrumentation with known targets.

The pace quickened after the farewell of the outgoing Sixth Formers and 1980 Prefects and Captains, and the appointment of the new School Captain and Prefects. The School reached a crescendo of activity other than routine, with visits by the new Chief of the Naval Staff, Admiral Ronnie Parriera, the new Governor, of West Bengal, H.E. Mr. B. D. Pande, and Mrs. Pande, the Army Chief, General K. V. Krishna Rao, PVSM, and Mrs. Krishna Rao, the G.O.C.-in-C, Eastern Command, Lt. Gen. A. S. Vaidya, PVSM, and Mrs. Vaidya, and the Chairman of Grindlays Bank, Mr. Adrian Evans, and Mr. Ashok and Mrs. Dayal and Air Chief Marshal Arjan Singh, DFC, (Retd.)

But all this is detail. The Rector's letter has less-and-less to say as more-and-more gets done. We are moving towards successful culmination of the Primary Wing Project and the first Squash Court, both to be operational next year. With these, perhaps, will come observable renaissance beyond brick-and-mortar. Already, I see the change, and would almost say that we have arrived.

With the School functioning in a unison of team work, there is some time to analyse our strength and weaknesses. And, perhaps, both are best exemplified, if not also exaggerated, in the larger than life images projected by the Prefects and the Sixth Form. This group of 39 boys, led by the School Captain, Kinley Dorji, represents not only our hopes and our achievements to date, but also our apprehensions and our imperfections. Each year is better than the rest and every Sixth Form is the best Sixth Form we have ever had. There is a profound truth in this article of faith which sometimes occasions derisory scepticism. It is the Sixth Form and the Prefects and the Captain who give the School its character in the subtle alchemy of psycho-educational growth, the dreams the boys dream in the Primary and the Junior, the nightmares they entertain through the Senior, the ambitions and motivations, follies and shortcomings they display throughout then find surrogate and magnification in the achievements and foibles of the Sixth form. Even the personality of teachers, administrative and domestic staff find a reflection in these boys as they move into their climatic months of school. Each year the mirage of perfection eludes the grasp leaving behind another brighter milestone. For, from this illusion does the education of young people evolve.

Only an elderly Headmaster tired after the tenure would say he had nothing more to do. Here, at Jalapahar, there is much more to be done, and what has been achieved will be found in the pages of this Chronicle of 1981.



Class Eleven boys reported back on March 31st.

Unless you are told about it, it is often difficult to keep track of the change of season here in Darjeeling at this time of the year. Spring, so the poets insist, is one of the best times of the year. But examining the bleak Darjeeling sky, and shivering in woollies, it is hard to imagine the atmosphere being any different from mid-winter. However, the sporting calendar of St. Paul's and the Darjeeling Flower Show are always useful guides and clear indications of the official switch to a more bracing climate. We won all the cricket matches and also the Edinburgh Shield, and Mr. Lahiri, the cricket captain, Ujjal Roy, and all the cricketers deserve to be congratulated. Amal Das deserves our praise for scoring 119 not out against Planters. All eyes that day were focussed on this dimunitive figure who pleased the spectators by scoring a chanceless century.

We won as many as fourteen prizes at the Darjeeling Flower Show. St. Paul's was again awarded the Best Garden Prize. Among the gardeners who received prizes were Shir Jeet Bahadur Chettri, Head Gardener, Shri Shiv Narayan, Shri Kalu Lepcha, and Shri Sunder Lepcha. In the Posy Section, Ripundam Shahi (Tz) and Vivek Bhatnagar (Ca) were each awarded the first prize, while Rupin Dang (HI) and Chayan Mehra (Be) each won the second prize.

After a lapse of about twelve years, the school now has a full-fledged meteorological laboratory —thanks to the efforts of the Rector. The equipment has been given to us on a longterm basis by the Alipore Observatory, Calcutta, and includes dry bulbs, wet bulbs, maximum and minimum thermometers, anemometer, wind vane, mercury barometer, rain gauge and snow gauge. Mr. M. C. Mitra of the Alipore Observatory helped us in setting up the observatory. The wind vane and anemometer have been established on the water tank near the tennis courts while all other instruments are set up near Dawkins'. The approximate cost of the observatory, together with all accompanying literature and tables, is Rs. 25,000/-. Rohan Lobo, A. 






H. E. The Governor of Sikkim addressing the School







Then came the hockey season and with Thapa, Sharda, Daniel et all in our midst we were no longer the underdogs. Our stalwarts did not disappoint and despite some nail-biting moments, we rounded off our triumphs on the games field by getting the Hockey Shield in our bag.

Our boys continued to strive in their studies throughout the year and several boys won prizes on Speech Day. Among special prizes, Santanu Pal won the Gregory Mathematics Prize, Rohan Lobo won the Clarke Geography Prize for the second year in succession and was also crowned Brain of St. Paul's. Prosenjit Basu was second in the latter contest and retained the Tower History Prize, besides being highly commended in 6 others. Srijit Basu won the Moore Divinity Prize for the middle school while Nitish Tandon, Rajesh Modi and Sanjay Sinha performed creditably in other prize examinations. We were in the running for the Sikkim Shield.

Besides all our cups and shields, Havelock House boys shown in other fields too. Vikram Dutta and Rajesh and Rajiv Modi played in the School Band, Shankardev Chowdhuri is the best pianist among all present day Paulites and Jit (best boxer) and Somendra did us proud in the Annual Boxing Tournament while Sameer Chopra showed promise as a boxer.

Our house play was unique and undoubtedly one of the finest and most cultured of its like in the last decade or so. The opera by Gilbert and Sullivan, "The Mikado", a most ambitious and difficult venture, proved a resounding success with Daniel, Arunava De, Anil Welinkar, Deepak Gupta and Basu singing their best. The other play, 'The Chinese Mask', was also well appreciated and the performances of Jehangir, Sanjeev, Vikram, Prosenjit and Rohan are worth mentioning here.

Thus we bade farewell to '81 with joy in our hearts at the depth and variety of our triumphs, mingled with sorrow at Mr. Banerjee's departure. We welcome Mr. N. K. Sharma, our new Housemaster, and hope that under his guidance 1982, too, may turn out to be a year of Havelock House.




I end this brief account by expressing the hope that next year will be a more glorious than this.



SIKKIM SHIELD—Hastings

SPEECH DAY, 1981

The 158th Speech Day celebrations took place on October 3rd. Mr. S. P. Acharya, Chairman, Shaw Wallace and Co. Ltd., was the Chief Guest. In the morning, we had the Commemoration Service in the chapel at which the Rt. Rev. Bishop Amritanand, Chairman, Board of Governors of St. Paul's School, addressed the congregation. The Prize Giving, which followed the Commemoration Service, began with the singing of the School Song. Then the Rector welcomed Mr and Mrs S. P. Acharya, and the Board of Governors, comprising the Chairman, the Rt. Rev. Bishop Amritanand, Rev. Canon B. Manuel, Mr. K. K. Dutt, and Grp. Capt. A. K. Chaudhury, and Mrs Amritanand, parents and guests.

The following is the text of the Rector's speech:

Mr. & Mrs. Acharya, my Lord Bishop, Governors of the School, Ladies and Gentlemen:

The 158th Speech Day of SPS, the 118th in Darjeeling, is thrice blessed, with the privilege of having as our Chief Guest today Mr. S. P. Acharya, Chairman of Shaw Wallace & Co. Ltd., and the gracious Mrs. Acharya, the Chairman of our Board, the Lord Bishop of Calcutta, presiding over the function with the gracious Mrs. Amritanand. Our students and my colleagues on the staff are delighted to have so many members of the Board of Governors and parents of SPS, and distinguished guests and Old Paulites with us this morning.

The Rector's Report on Speech Day is inevitably long if it is to cover all the important points, but it would be selfish of me not to share with you today some subjective preoccupations which are becoming an obsession with me as I approach my Silver Jubilee as a schoolmaster. These will serve, perhaps, as milestones for the next year in reminding us of what we are trying to achieve here in the controlled habitat of St. Paul's School on Jalapahar. The past four years have rendered it possible to undertake this exercise in assessment of aims only because we have successfully achieved an optimal stability which now enables innovation.

As I saw it at the Doon School and in Delhi and as Lovedale Sanawar and Mavo or others see it at good residential hundred elsewhere: the few odd elsewhere in Britain schools of India, semi-residential as Europe, aim at excellence, versatility, the quality

discrimination and lifelong education, of initiating the processes of learning to be in the young men who leave us. We aim that they shall learn to travel innocently and confidently with clean limbs and clean hearts, compassionate and charitable, with fine-honed intellect and balanced judgement, not only achieving through consistent and patient effort worldly success and material prosperity, but also attaining, albeit modestly and unassumingly, the desire and the ability to help others individually and to help their communities and the world on a more ambitious plane through qualities of effective leadership in service.

Thus, we expect our young men to go out into the world not only with the necessarily selfish aim of success and prosperity, status and prestige, high achievement and fulfilling material rewards but also with an inspired dream, a staunch and spontaneous character equable through triumph and failure, moving steadfastly towards goals higher than themselves-self-imposed, disinterested goals, ideals of greatness without conceit in whatever field of endeavour they choose to pursue. If they can develop an even richer amalgam of qualities which push them by their virtues into positions of not only inconsiderate eminence and affluence, but also positions wherefrom they can beneficially influence the destinies of people around them, so much the better. Otherwise, we as schoolmasters and parents should be content so long as they lead lives even after school which are fully stretched. Fulfilment is theirs in such lives even if success eludes them. Too often in the past have old boys of elitist schools been content to remain opportunistic, elitist, selfish snobs. After my four years and the 154 that went before, it is now clear to me that we at St. Paul's. Darjeeling, have crossed this first bridge to some extent.

However, this brings me to my obsession with the grave doubt about whether the qualities we are aiming to inculcate of innocence and spontaneity, of versatility and staunchness and integrity, individuality and idealism and unselfishness, are really going to be helpful, or disastrous in an environment increasingly dominated by the very opposites of these virtues. It has been an effort to escape from the ivory tower of St. Paul's, Jalapahar, from the intellectual and pragmatic isolation of this very stability which we have achieved with great effort, away from these parameters of virtue, to plunge into the real world of pragmatism and conflict below. And from each such visit to the cities and the plains I have come back with this obsessive doubt. Having spent four years building up and rediscovering the strength and the power of goodness, of innocence, of being versatile, of avoiding excessive specialisation, of idealism, of spontaneous living, of individuality, of integrity, I am driven to the sad conclusion that we must also inculcate a healthy understanding of the weakness of the good, and the futility of such virtues, unless these are allied through school years with exceptional strength and academic excellence. The Public School personality thus imposes an even greater challenge, not only of flourishing in this hot-house society of St. Paul's, but of becoming so strong in it that the contradictions of reality outside the school environment do not find a brittle perfection in the leaving Paulite but a malleable, flexible, durable strength.

Apart from such pragmatic considerations of the possible clash with objective reality which our Old Boys might have to face, there is also the anxiety regarding the continuing socioeconomic relevance of our professedly "changeless traditional values".

Perhaps a theoretical idea, but of such theory is good education made, and if it is made anywhere, it is, I feel, now being made at St. Paul's. This imposes an even greater burden of excellence and perfection on the schoolmasters of St. Paul's for we, too, must understand and master the contradictions of this our chosen profession. And what applies to St. Paul's in microcosm, applies on the larger scale to all such and other schools in India and eventually to all schools everywhere where institutionalised education continues to flourish.

ACADEMICS: The academic effort, and consequently, performance, of the boys of St. Paul's, as you all know, have improved progressively over the last few years. The ICSE 1980 results were the best ICSE results at SPS but those of another school a thousand kilometres west of us were still better than ours in 1980; we hope to overtake all other residential schools in the next two years, though metropolitan day schools will continue, through a narrower and more intense focus, and screening, to do academically better than residential schools. The ISC (81) results showed every one passing, but I am not happy still with the qualitative performance. This is an ongoing process and we are evidently set on the right trajectory.

GAMES & SPORTS: The traditional aim remains that of the healthy mind in the healthy body and is progressively being attained with strengthening of systems and widening of participation. After a lapse of 5 years we regained the Edinburgh Shield, notching up a string of cricket victories through the season, being cheerfully brought up *short* by the Ranji-Trophy-star-studded team of Tata Iron & Steel Co., who taught us more about cricket sportsmanship in their visit to St. Paul's than we could have

learned in three seasons of Inter-School fixtures. We are grateful to Mr. Russi Modi, Chairman of TISCO, for the fixtures which have now become part of our calendar, and our boys are looking forward to playing TISCO & TELCO again at Jamshedpur on the 6th and 7th of December. Similarly, the fixtures with the Dooars' Planters, the Darjeeling Planters, and particularly the games we have regularly been playing with Shaw Wallace have reestablished and strengthened the sporting cricketing tradition at St. Paul's, as have the Home and Away fixtures so kindly organised through courtesy of Lt. Gen. K. Balaram and the XXXIII Corps of the Indian Army, at all of which we appear to have played well and won.

We were fortunate in obtaining the football coaching services of the great Olympian, Mr. Chandan Singh Rawat, and the improvement in the skill and performance of our football team, which is much younger than comparable teams, was obvious and enabled us to retain the Albert Amritanand Football Shield in our annual fixture with La Martiniere for Boys on the C C & FC grounds in August in Calcutta. At basketball, standards have remained high ever since 1979 and at hockey, new additions and older members of the staff have greatly revitalised the game and our performance. Eton Fives and the tennis courts continue to be utilised fully with Squash becoming increasingly popular. The construction of the first Squash court began on Monday, the 28th of September, and we hope to build a Squash court every year as this is one of the most suitable sports for a heavy monsoon area like Darjeeling.

Swimming, as you know, began at St. Paul's in 1978 through the courtesy of the then Principal of Mount Hermon School, Mr. Graeme Murray, when we won the Swimming Meet in our maiden effort, and we are grateful to Rev. J. Johnston, the Principal of Mount Hermon School, Father Van, Father Anthony and Father German of St. Joseph's School, for allowing us the continued use of their swimming pools, even though we churlishly continue to win more than we deserve. The swimming pool project at St. Paul's espoused by earlier Rectors was relegated in our priorities in 1978, to possible consideration for the combined new Dining Hall project which would be part of the indoor sports complex possibly to be taken up for construction in 1982/83 for completion by 1985 after the Primary Wing New School Buildings Project has been fully executed and implemented. This means that in the foreseeable future we shall not have a swimming pool of our own.

Tomorrow, five members of the staff with the Rector, led by Mr. Daljit Singh, and 15 boys start for their attempt, along the Singhalile ridge approach, on Kang Peak (18,280 ft) in Western Sikkim. They are due back on the 29th of October at Yoksum Forest Rest House and have undergone training, courtesy HMI and Mr. Passang Namgyal, the Instructor.

Judo and Karate continue as part-time sports activities, though Karate was discouraged by the tragic death of our part-time instructor, late Krishna Subba after police-firing in town.

Boxing, which was revived at St. Paul's in the Primary Wing in 1979, has been growing from strength to strength with caution and courtesy. In 1980 we had the Primaries and Juniors and a few exhibition bouts by the Seniors, presided over by our Chairman, the Lord Bishop of Calcutta, and this year we have had Brig. A. S. Kalkat, PVSM, AVSM, BGS, 33 Corps, as our Chief Guest over a full-fledged boxing programme including individual bouts by the Senior School. In boxing the response from the Senior Wing this year was indeed very encouraging. About 50 boys used to turn up for the boxing workouts daily to undergo training in the School Gym. The JW and PW boys also turned up in large numbers for their inter-house boxing championships. The elimination rounds were undertaken in the third week of August so as to select the finalists scheduled for the 10th of September '81. Some of the final bouts were, however, conducted on the 8th September for the PW and the JW boys to accommodate more SW fights on the 10th. There were altogether fourteen bouts on the card for the 10th, eight of SW, three each from the P.W. and the J.W. The judges adjudged one best boxer and one best loser from each Wing.

Basketball-Our first match this year was for Class X under, against St. Joseph's School which we lost narrowly. Our losing by the Juniors did not affect our Senior boys, who beat Mount Hermon twice at their home courts. The junior boys played their second match against Goethal's from Kurseong and won it comfortably. At the carnival in Kalimpong our Class X and under played very well but could not make the grade in the final round. In the opens at Mr. Hermon grounds our senior boys lost in the semi-finals against St. Joseph's College whom they had beaten earlier in the qualifying rounds. After the carnival the basketball training was ceased to enable the boys to participate in other games of the season. We also played and lost an exciting match against King's College, Bhutan. There is need to continue to carefully monitor the enthusiasm generated by their boxing bouts to make sure that they do not get out-of-hand, and that boxing remains a gentlemanly sport at St. Paul's as it has now been re-established.

Gymnastics has continued to flourish and attain each year very high standards of performance, and this year's gym display at the Darjeeling Gymkhana Club presided over by Old Paulite (CI-1939), Mr. Puran Chand Sawhney, was indeed memorable, not only for the calibre but also for the large participation.

HOBBIES & ACTIVITIES: Staff talent and enthusiasm, facilities and space are the controlling factors in the development of hobbies and we are grateful to our staff for the time and trouble they have taken over the progressive widening of hobby choices. It is our effort for next year when more space will be available to introduce a full-fledged printing-press for publishing and printing of school work and The Paulite, and already this year, in addition to the existing facilities and activities, A Class 12 (b) Met. Observatory has started functioning on Dawkins' spur. This will be upgraded to a Class (1) Observatory in due course and we are looking forward to the self-recording seismograph and other electronic Met. instruments which will be made available in due course, now that St. Paul's and Darjeeling have been accepted by the UN Met. Programme as an international climate station. Data recorded by our Met. group is in fact being fed throughout India already. Radio astronomy is another field we have in mind for next year along with and a greatly increased and improved wood-workshop and metal-workshop.

Spontaneous flowering of musical talent at St. Paul's is another aspect of nurture given by the Music Staff to latent talent.

ELOCUTION & DEBATE: The year has seen a flowering of debating and speaking talent at St. Paul's, and though we failed to recover the La Martiniere Debate Shield the boys improved

upon their performance. On the 1st Nov. we initiated the Inter-School English Debate at St. Paul's Darjeeling.

SOCIETIES & CLUBS: The Hindi Parishad, the Bengali Society, and the Nepali Parishad once again put forward commendable performances and programmes on society concert days and apart from excellent stage performances, inter-house and inter-school elocution contests in these three languages and in English were organised, and were of very high calibre. The school play you have already seen last evening, and is a credit to the cast of boys.

ESTATE & MESSING: More than in most other residential schools in the strenuous environment of Darjeeling, it is the Estate Deptt. and the messing system, which form pillars of the establishment of functional level. It is a truism of 1980-81 that the Estate Deptt. has added 25,000 gallons additional fresh water-storage capacity in steel and masonry tanks, 10,000 gallons of rainwater storage provision and capacity, and added 10 more toilets to the dormitories, not to mention the happily faultless functional multiple-generator system which made electricity supplies and water arrangements critical problem-areas ten years ago. The amount of effort and dedication that the Steward and Estate Deptt. and all the staff and employees put into these areas, and if I may say so the expenditure, are quite phenomenal.

STAFF: Since Speech Day last year we lost Mr. Michael Enos to status esthmaticus, a chronic allergic condition, which hospitalised him or months, but we were fortunate to find in Mr. Rogcford Miller an even better teacher. We were happy to welcome Mr. Neelkantha Gupta, of an eminent family of Calcutta. and high intellectual and moral calibre, on the staff to teach French, and we trust he will stay with us long enough to start and develop the first-ever language laboratory at St. Paul's next year. We welcome Mr. Mervyn Watson from Coonoor, Mr. M. P. Yadav from Cambridge School, Delhi, Mr. Clyde Quieros from St. Stephen's College, Mr. Nicholas Gomes from St. George's, Mussoorie, Mr. Roy Robinson from St. Joseph's School, Darjeeling, and Mr. Iftakhar Hasan from Lawrence School, Sanawar. It was with genuinely affectionate feelings of regret tinged with pride in his new appointment as Vice-Principal of Sri Dasmesh Academy, Anandpur Sahib, Chandigarh, that we bade farewell to Mr. & Mrs. K. N. Dar over Independence Day. Clive House welcomed Mr. & Mrs. Anthony but they will have a challenging job in replacing Mr. & Mrs. Dar, in which, I am sure, they shall succeed. We also welcome Singhdendu Bhattacharya in the Bursar's Department. Mr. D. A. Howard took over as the Senior Master on the departure of Mr. M. N. Tankha last year and I am happy that the Board of Governors accepted my recommendation to appoint him as SM in January, '81. We would also like to congratulate Mr. Howard on completing his M. A. in English Literature from the University of North Bengal and standing first amongst private candidates.

It was in 1978 that the Board of Governors and I decided that it would be a good idea to supplement the excellent medical cover of the Insurance Scheme provided by the DDMA under the PMO, Dr. T. Y. Pemba, and the School Infirmary under the experienced control of Sister Moktan, by having a Resident School Doctor available round-the-clock. After a false start and a wrong turn, and with the blessings of Dr. TY Pemba, we have finally attracted the services of Dr. P. K. Sharma, MBBS, DPH, MD, as Resident School Doctor for the three Wings. Where he takes the School Infirmary next year with his team of Senior Infirmary Sister, Mrs. Moktan, Col. Jacops (Retd.) and Mrs. Dolly Sharma, is something still being discussed but we are glad that he has joined the team which provides medical cover at St. Paul's. Mrs Stuart has joined us as SW matron.

Last year we had welcomed Sydney Ellis's bride to the campus and some of us had the premonition, when we came to know that her father was a senior educationalist in Nigeria, that he will leave us, and it was only too true, as it turned out, when we bade farewell to the Ellises this April on their way to take up the flight at affluence in oil-rich Nigeria.

Mrs. Phylis Prince, our SW/JW Caterer, decided to relinquish this onerous task in June-July, and while thanking her for her service for 5 years, we are happy to announce the appointment of Mr. Desmond Martin (Ex Indian Navy) from Woodlands Nursing Home as our new Caterer. We also welcome Mr. P. Blazey as the PW Caterer.

LEAVERS & OLD PAULITES: The number of boys wanting to leave school after completing the ICSE examination in Nov/Dec. 1980, which was alarming in 1977, has been following a declined graph and only four wanted to leave this time. We had to persuade seven more that they would benefit more from higher education in a less 'restrictive' environment. Truly, the shoe is now on the other foot and out of the 68 boys who will take the ICSE examination in Nov., 1981, only 46 can be offered a place back at St. Paul's, a matter of as much concern to concerned parents as to us, who wish all our boys well. Criteria have been

evolved to ensure a fair selection of the fortunate 46 who will be invited to complete the ISC+2 course at St. Paul's.

All the ISC '+2' leavers to whom we bade farewell on the 27th of March after a moving Chapel ceremony and a torch-lit farewell song up the Chapel slope to the Quad, and at supper, have somehow found their way into colleges and universities though we wish they had done better to obtain better courses. Dip Kapoor recovered from open-heart surgery, which had made him relinquish School Captainship half way last year, and not only passed the ISC Examination in a calvary of pain and anxiety, but also obtained admission to St. Stephen's College, as did several others. Kursung Gombu, for the first time a boy from St. Paul's, won the United World College of the Atlantic Fellowship in Wales. This UWC Fellowship generally used to go to boys from other public schools whom I shall not name, and we are grateful to the Barclay's Bank International and to the Headmaster of the UWC of the Atlantic, and to Sir John Hunt for the support St. Paul's and Kursung Gombu has received.

INSERVICE TRAINING: Pursuing the decision to qualify all our staff with training degrees, Mr. S K Banerjee, Mr. S P Sharma and Mr. Kabir Mustafi were given facilities to complete their B. Ed. courses through courtesy of the RKBT College of the University of North Bengal in Darjeeling, and another three members of the staff, Mr. Baljit Bawa, Mr. Arun Jayal and Mrs. Raji Sharma, sought and obtained admission to RKBT College for 1981-82.

COMMUNITY AND SOCIAL SERVICE: In 1981, so far, Darjeeling appears to have escaped major natural calamities and our annual disaster relief expedition was not found necessary. However, a feasibility report is being prepared through consultants for a possible project along the Alloobari Road where we hope next year to start developing dairy/poultry/piggery/rabbitry and also to develop an employment research centre in the years to come to assess and solve the long-term socio-economic problems of the hill areas, particularly of Darjeeling. A tourism project report is also under preparation to be submitted to the Government at various levels, and we hope to pursue these till we can convert them into an on-going extension programme of substantive benefit to the environment and people of Darjeeling, to whom we owe so much.

I am grateful to the people of Darjeeling, and particularly to the staff of St. Paul's School, each in his proper station, for

doing so much so cheerfully, and for tolerating my shortcomings so generously. This has made us a staff fit to run a school like St. Paul's and if only in this least useful gesture, I would like to place on record on behalf of the parents, governors and myself our gratitude to the teamwork of staff. Time is measured in decades and rectorships at St. Paul's School in this timeless world in the mountains, and as I finish my first four years here, it is with a sense of privilege returned, for the School has again reached its optimal excellence, and great strides have been made in any directions.

The Chronicles are the proper form for recording such progress, but it is good to be able to express gratitude for the grace of God which has enabled us to do so much in so short a time.

We also express our gratitude to Grp. Capt AJS Grewal for his seven years of help and guidance on our Board of Governors. He has taken over as Principal of Punjab School, Nabha. We should also record here the personal help and guidance we have received from Gp. Capt. A K Chaudhuri, Principal, HMI, who will be leaving our Board of Governors at the end of the year when he rejoins the Air Force. We warmly welcome on our Board of Governors Mr. K. K. Dutt, the eminent financial expert and consultant of Calcutta, whose presence has already been salutary for our organisation. In our welcome to Rev. W. S. Rajpal on to the Board of Governors of St. Paul's School there is more than the usual warmth as he has been my teacher at College and is now Principal of St. Stephen's College, Delhi.

I am informed that this may be the last Speech Day at which we shall have the formal and official presence of the Rt. Rev. Joseph Amritanand, the Lord Bishop of Calcutta, since 1969, and I need hardly underline the great role of spiritual leadership and temporal understanding, constructive support and wisdom that Bishop Amritanand has displayed over a decade in the destinies of the boys and the staff of the School. It is in retrospect that one appreciates the true worth of people and, therefore, it gives me the satisfaction of prescience, and the prophesy to assure His Lordship of our gratitude, and the acknowledgement of generations of school boys and of the School for what he has done for us. We shall remember him and we shall hope that he will visit us again and again with his blessings, his prayers and the presence of himself and his family in our midst even in the vears to come, as has done for over a decade of vicissitudes and progress.

May I now request Mrs Acharya to give away the prizes and Mr Acharya to deliver the Speech Day address?

Mr Acharya first expressed his gratitude for the privilege of all that he and his wife had seen of the life and work of the School during the past two days. He went on to say, "Your Rector has presented a long catalogue of achievements. When you move upwards it is not easy to keep your perspective and also keep improving. By looking at your performance in sports, drama, co-curricular activities and academics, and at your behaviour, one cannot but be impressed by the dedication of your staff. The way knowledge is doubling itself every ten years, it is difficult to comprehend the implication of the growth of knowledge. If you can accept change and adjust and adapt yourselves without compromising your basic principles you will have succeeded in your life. St Paul's is a fine institution and you are getting a firm foundation amidst great surroundings with a history to bring a sense of perspective. Here you are being given a chance to develop a pattern of logical thinking, physical fitness, art of concentration, and the habit of sustained effort. You also learn how team work produces the best result. In our country what we need today is qualitative development and it is here at St. Paul's that you have the fortune to develop in such a way."

After Mr. Acharya's speech, Mr. K. K. Dutt, a governor of St. Paul's, proposed a vote of thanks. The celebrations ended with the singing of the National Anthem.



REVIEW

JOSEPH KESSERING'S 'ARSENIC AND OLD LACE'

More work for the undertaker, Another little job for the tombstone maker, He won't be cold this Christmas!

These lines of an English lyric seem to sum up this year's School play, a drawing room comedy in a Brooklyn boarding house, while the theme seemed straight out of Ronald Dahl.

Mortimer Brewster, living with his aunts, Abby and Martha, inadvertently stumbles on a corpse in the drawing room. Alarmed, he sounds out these apparently harmless old things and it appears that they have been poisoning prospective lodgers for some time now; and that there are eleven cadavers languishing in the cellar. The affection with which they recount details of the murders fills one with a fascinated revulsion.

Shaken to the core, Mortimer (Kinley Dorji) now plays Prince Charming, striving manfully to try and stop his aunts' gruesome cult, and at the same time prevent discovery of the corpses, much against their wishes. Enter Jonathan (Sudipto Sircar), Mortimer's brother, and evidently the villain of the piece from the outset, with eleven murders to his name. On the run, he intends making the Brewster home his base, along with his shifty accomplice, Dr. Einstein (Imran Darbar), who periodically changes Jonathan's face, via plastic surgery, to avoid detection. In keeping with the play, the unfortunate Jonathan now has the face of a well known villain due to the antics of an intoxicated Einstein; In Vino Veritas. The aunts are bullied into letting him stay, after feeble protests fail.

So far, so good; but it appears that these two intruders also have a corpse to dispose of; and when it is brought into the house, a hilarious double game ensues, made all the more exciting as less than half the characters actually know what is going on. Mortimer's efforts to turn Jonathan in boomerangs, because of the particularly dullwitted New York cops whose help he enlists. Simultaneously, he tries to shield his aunts, who have no intention of being shielded. The entire play is punctuated by appearances of Teddy, the eccentric Brewster uncle who is convinced that the corpses are yellow fever victims, played by Arup Bose to the manner born. He provides much needed comic relief in the tense confrontation between two Brewster brothers.

So Mortimer strives to convict Jonathan, and as his fiancee's patience runs out, there are several close shaves when it seems that one or the other party's cover will be blown. Indeed, Mortimer is almost done in, but is saved due to the intervention (inadvertent though it may have been) of a policeman. It seems that the poli emen are too stupid to see the light, and it is only fitting that Jonathan is arrested for an offence not even remotely connected with his murky past; assaulting a policeman who remarks on his ugly mug. Lieutenant Roony appears o: the scene at this juncture; At last! an intelligent cop! His sarcasm heaps coals of fire on his subordinates' heads.

As always, everything turns out all right in the end; the two aunts and uncle being sent to a home for the aged, and Jonathan caught by that long and sweaty arm of the law. To avoid an utter success, however, Dr. Einstein is allowed to get away, as it is understood that he is not all bad. The last victim of the aunts, the highly strung Mr. Witherspoon, brings out the essence of this expose.

Abby (Zubin Medora) and Martha Brewster (Shiv Anand Lal) were most convincing as senile aunts engaged in a gruesome activity; Sanjoy Dutta and Joy Dasgupta were bumbling New York cops to a T, and Kersi Vajifdar acquitted himself well as a headstrong young woman, Elaine Harper. Sudeb Chatterjee, her father, as the Rev. Dr. Harper, gave us a compact, if brief, portrait of a clergyman, while Subarno Chattarji is competent as a sour old gentleman, saved from the jaws of death by Mortimer, to the chagrin of the aunts.

Dr. Einstein cuts a fine figure as a shifty accomplice, always playing second fiddle to Jonathan and maintaining his guttural German accent magnificently to the end. Anil Welinkar as Officer O'Hara displayed an amazing degree of stage presence, rarely found in amateur performances, to look the most natural character. Sudipto Sircar left us in no doubt as to his disposition though his mannerisms were a whit too pronounced at times. Kinley Dorji has a number of qualities as an actor not all of which spring to mind. He had by far the longest role, but managed to look laboured and contrived.

The stage was complex, with two floors and several openings of an upper landing. In fact, a large number of characters were able to squeeze themselves into these. The credit for the entire performance goes to Mr. Bawa; this is his third play in succession, and a scintillating example of deft direction.

Two new members were added to the music staff, Mr. Gautam Lepcha, an aspiring young violinist, and Mr. Kaysang Tshering, a versatile classical and rock guitarist. They were assigned exlusively to the junior and primary wings—'Catch them young', as Rector so aptly expressed it.

Three days after this meeting Rector's 'Abracadabra' produced 16 new violins, 16 new guitars, 13 music stands, 50 manuscript books and 4 new sitars. Enrolment and lessons commenced right away and the response was heart warming.

The School Choir: Inspite of its short comings and unfair competition with sports and games, the choir has carried away 'On Wings Of Song' laurels of praise and appreciation. Our Easter anthem, 'Break Forth Into Joy'; Commemoration Service anthem, 'Praise Your God, Ye Righteous'; Carol Service anthem, 'There Were Shepherds' were well received by the community. Special guests and visitors to these services mounted the steps to the choir loft to express their appreciation.

Inter-House Western Music Singing Competition: It is an excellent competition indeed! Keenly contested with balanced chances of winning for each participant.





The artistes' introductions to each work with brief musical demonstrations of what we were expected to listen to was delightfully narrated, especially the story background of 'Don Juan.' To use a sparklet from the Montgomery Advertiser, Alabama, 'They created the kind of electrical discharge between audience and performers that makes an excellent concert memorable'. A special word of 'Thanks' is due to Rector and Mrs. Dang for playing hosts to these two brilliant young concert pianists and to the 'Avari' family of Darjeeling who so kindly introduced us to them.

Mr. Peter Cooper visited the school on 17th Oct. after an extensive tour of Sri Lanka. We were happy to have him as a guest on our campus and to attend his piano recital that evening. What statred as a farce in the auditorium with a little bat swooping and diving all over the place along with the heads of the juniors and seniors matching its sonic flight, Mr. Cooper, who understands young people, was patient enough to wait till the little brat found its way out. Restless and perhaps a little excited from all this bat flapping our Paulite audience failed to give of its best—our sincere apologies to Mr. Cooper and it is hoped that no one will be subjected to this again. Mr. Cooper still retains his magic touch and dexterity and his performance of Beethoven's 'Fur Elise' is still the much requested encore of young Paulites.

After the Inter-House Western Music Singing Competition Mr. W. S. Deshpande from Welham's School, Dehradun, entertained us with some excellent vocal virtuosity of Indian classical and folk compositions. A composer performer and authority on Indian Music, Mr. Deshpande brought an awakening to our young minds of what we would be missing in the future if we failed to give Indian music its fair place in a changing society. His useful and effective talks at music appreciation classes, which were informative, were well received.

The Adam's Music Prize was shared by Kailash Pradhan and Pulak Pal, two bright instrumentalists and leaders of the school band. Kailash has tremendous music talent being able to play the tenor saxophone, guitar and jazz percussions. Pulak or 'POP' Pal, as he is known to most, is a capable lead trumpeter.

For the first time in the history of the school and chapel a small 'chapel orchestra' consisting of Woodwind and Brass with nine members performed at matins on 20th. Sept. They provided a four part harmony to all the hymns sung that morning with a special touch of warmth to the voluntary's, a very successful innovation indeed and one that I hope will be repeated in the years to come. This well balanced team also provided the music for the school play in the month of October.

After the purchase of a much wanted Jazz percussion set for the department we were able to revive some dormant 'POP' groups who were bursting to get on the disco scene. Another electronic guitar was added by Himraj Dang and all was set for the first 'Musical Snortie!' on Sep. 6th.

'The Shock Absorbers', 'Hot Ice', 'Zed's' 'Thatold' and what-have-you proved their mettle and talent. The show was a dymanic success and much credit must go to Arup Bose and Indranil Mookherjee—lead vocalist and lead guitarist, respectively of 'The Shock Absorbers' for hatching the idea.

We also discovered two up and coming young pop vocalists from the junior wing, Aditya Burman of class 7 with his flare for showmanship and renditions of the very latest movie hits and Suman Thapa of class 6 for his near perfect imitation of the 'Beatles'. If audience reaction is anything to go by these young gentlemen will be remembered and wanted on stage for quite-a-while.

The last musical evening of the year saw another rising group of staff talent from the primary wing which included Mr. Rocky Miller (pianoforte), Mr. Kaysang Tshering (lead guitar), Mr. Kabir Mustafi (percussions) and Mr. Gautam Lepcha (violinist). Here was matural musical talent at its best, a closely knit group with a perfect understanding of each other's limitations yet with the right approach to musical content. Our budding young guitarists and percussionists had much to watch and learn from this delightful group.

A bouquet to Daniel Ghaznavi and his team of Sixth Formers for daring to come on stage and steal the show with their 'Your World and My World' and a 'white plume' in the head-dress of Imran Darbar for his captivating drum solo.

My 'Thank You' is reserved for Mr. Rufus Paul for being patient with my uncoventional choice of choir music and for

sharing in the many problems that are ever present up in the choir loft. From all accounts received, our carol service was 'Second To None';

To my musical Mentor, Mrs. Monisha Chaudhuri, whose never ending questions drive me to find the answers, my gratitude for keeping me 'B-sharp' and 'C-sharp'.

MUSIC APPRECIATION

Music at St. Paul's continues to flourish despite grumbling from some, adverse criticisms from others, and downright condemnation by a few. None of these, however, will stop the dedicated few from persisting in their efforts to teach and learn music. For me in particular nothing thrilled me more than being asked

by a Class 11 boy, "Aren't we going to have M. A. classes this year, Ma'am?" Of course, they are, but having come back one month later than the rest of the school they will have to be fitted into the time-table next term, I replied.

We could do with more gramophone records and we could do with another battery gramophone. To depend on electricity is foolish for it is seldom present when needed.

Amongst the group of boys there are also those who will never learn to appreciate, let alone appreciate music-regardless of the kind presented. The various types of Jazz and non-Jazz which are played to them leave them bored, but who cares? They do not count. Of the rest, one day, as has been proved by so many Old Paulities I meet, they will eventually enjoy that 'concord of sweet sound', that 'subtlety of cross rhythms with melody intertwining', that 'perfection which is the work of the true musician', whether he be composer or exponent. One day Paulites will understand my favourite and repeatedly expressed bon mot, 'there are only two kinds of music, good and bad.' Before that day comes, I am very happy to have with me a few who sincerely try to understand and appreciate music.

I must here admit that maintaining discipline in a class where one third of them are unruly is a task in which I have to admit defeat and the only thing left for me is to give up teaching. Last year I had suggested to the Director of Music, Denzil Prince, that he should not help out with his presence as it was my job to maintain discipline. Well, I did, but only to a point. There is always that unruly gang which maintains unruliness throughout their school career.

Unlike other schools in Darjeeling, St. Paul's has many musicians on its staff to impart their knowledge of pianforte, brass and reed instruments, violin and guitar, and, of course, Indian instruments. It is one school where academic tuition and that for music go side by side, so to speak, and without one detracting from the success of the other. Next year we plan to go in for more sophisticated equipment and hope to produce it indigenously instead of relaying on foreign collaboration.



JUNIOR WING DEBATING SOCIETY



The prize winners for the year 1981 also selected their books from the ones that had been brought up by Oxford Books and Stationery Co., Darjeeling.

On the occasion of the Speech Day a book exhibition on Indian authors writing in English was organised by the English Department. The Chief Guest, Mr. Manohar Malgaonkar, author of some repute and standing, was highly impressed. METEOROLOGICAL SOCIETY

After a lapse of ten years, St. Paul's once again has a meteorological observatory (the last one was closed down in 1971). The equipment has been given to us by the Government of India on the long term loan basis and the observatory was set up in March. The society lost some of its popularity after the initial enthusiasm had worn off and secondary because of the grind of going up to Dawkins, every day to take the readings (even in the monscon season when it once rained as much as 135 mm in 24 hrs.). In fact, had it not been for the added attraction of S.U.P.W., the society would have had even fewer members. The equipment comprised a wind vane, rain-gauge, barometer (calliberated in millibars), a Stevenson's screen, thermometers-wet bulb, dry bulb maximum and minimum. The wind instruments were set up at the old positions at Dawkins'. The readings were taken at 0830 hours every day till September and after that at 1730 hours also. The reports were sent to Calcutta every month. Besides the temperature, vapour pressure, rain, average wind speed and its direction, the cloud cover and visibility also had to be monitored. It provided a tedious job for boys to go up to Dawkins' to record all these data in monsoon. The total rainfall (from March to November 1981) was 1606.2 mm. Exceptionally high winds in March (about 36 m/h) were also recorded as well. Minimum temperature in November and in March were 3.9°C and 4.1°C, respectively, and maximum 24.0°C in June.

The hard work done by Rohan Lobo and Arijit Datta and the accuracy of the readings sent to Meteorological Department, Calcutta, have shown good results. The Society has been told that Meteorological Department of Government of India is planning to upgrade this observatory to class I A from class II B, the present status of the observatory.

I would like to express my thanks and gratitude to the Rector for his guidance and help in setting up this observatory.

News also filtered to us that there was a tiger in the vicinity which had incidentally managed to lift a cow the day before. We could not see it, though.

Placed in lovely surroundings, Paulites have always nurtured a deep sense of appreciation towards nature. The N.C.I. has been instrumental in strengthening this intimate bond of Nature and Man.






The actual session of the Camera Club began with the return of the boys in March. This year the number of members rose considerably to thirty-four. It was an encouraging beginning for the Camera Club.

I would like to express my thanks to all those who have helped the Forum in its endeavours.







BOXING





Last year 97 cadets appeared for NCC Certificate A (Pt. I) Examination, and 3 for Pt. II Examination. All of the them have passed with merit.




We organized short annual training camps at Sureil and Mungpoo in the month of May.

Cadets Sujay Madhok and Laltharzuala represented the school at All Bengal NCC Day Camp at Calcutta from 15th November to 24 November.





We eagerly look forward to next year when boys will be able to demonstrate their prowess in the game on their very own courts.






Everest Range from Kang Pass



of juice. A tough trek took us to Sandakphu and after a nice hot supper we slept well after the rigours the day. For some of us this was the highest altitude we had been upto—12000'. On Wednesday, 7th October, we has to trek 24 km. to Phalut. The trek was compensated by lush green meadows which encouraged the tired to take those few extra steps. We slept for the first time in tents at Phalut as the bungalow there had seen its best days. This strenuous trek was compensated for by the next day's trek to Chiabhanjang. It was a short trek and we encountered a few yaks (our first) on the way. We conquered our first peak-Singilila Peak (13000) on the way as it happened to lie slap across our path. This peak stands mightily on the confluence of Nepal, West Bengal and Sikkim. The day being Dussehra we celebrated it in fitting grandeur by cutting a goat and having mutton curry that night. After the calm of the supper came the stormy rain which brought an end to the super weather.

The next day we began trekking to Dhund. It was literally an uphill climb which reminded us that all was not fun and games where trekking was concerned. We would surely have lost our way among the misty mountains had it not been for a guide we picked up at Chiabanjang. Scrambling over landslides was an experience and Bidhan and Sanjeev were close to heaven when they slipped. After a tiresome, irritating trek we reach Dhund, only to find that it was a yak hut. We had left civilisation way behind. Thus we spent a horrible night at 13000' with the rain washing through our tents, sleeping bags, clothes and right to the bones. Saturday, 10th October, began with the continuous rain and despite the cold, everyone forgot their troubles by wishing Sanjeev a very happy birthday and going for breakfast 1000' down the hillside where water was available, i.e., a stream, not rain. A porter casually decided to run away as the weather must have been the last straw for him. The other porter thought he was possessed by the devil. Amidst such nonsense a search party was organised but in vain. Evening came and the rain stopped. Problems arose, as some porters wanted to go back. Thus our party split the next day into 2 groups. Mr. Tamang, Mr. Yadav, Mr. P. Kumar, Dr. Sharma, Mr. Gupta, D. K., Danny, Jaswinder and Welinkar decided to turn back. Thus the 15 remaining of the party and a few porters carried on trekking to the next destination— Megathang. Since this place was in Nepal we had to leave at 5.30 a.m. next morning because of the three army personnel with us. At this altitude of 15000' it was tough getting up but we managed and a very tough climb got us through the Karakhetbanjang Pass back into India. We had brunch in a small yak hut and dillydallying we got behind schedule. We got our first glimpse of the majestic snow clad peaks of Kanchenjunga, Pandim, Kobru and last, but not the least, our objective—Kanghla-Kang. Admiring the view we forgot time never waits and when darkness enveloped us we lost our porters who went in a different direction. Luckily we had a tent and like cavemen slept with boulders for pillows. Mr. Pasang and Mr. Singh woke early to take photographs of the mountains. Tuesday, 13th October found us all back together (porters and us) and after a beautiful trek through a valley, one could call his Shangri-la, complete with a stream and flowers, we climbed upto Boktok. That night we slept in a yak hut as there were 3 of them with a super fire blazing in the hut, to keep us warm. Next day we passed through yet another exquisite valley and after a tiring trek we descended into a valley where we were showered by the first flakes of snow. We could sea our dream-peak-Kang in the horizon clad in snow and our hearts warned (brrrr) to it. After a short delay when Mr. Pasang and 4 boys took the wrong path, we arrived at Tekepla-chu, our last stop before base camp.

Wednesday, 14th October, saw twelve members of the party trekking happily amidst bright sunshine to the base camp (the army stayed behind). In 1 hr. we were there and as the day being just great we attempted the peak after a short rest and lunch. Every member with his ice-axe and ropes felt grand as we began our final ascent. A tiring climb with rest after brief steps saw us reaching a point 17000' high. We were on a 'wedge' with precipices on both sides. It was a rather cold feeling. After studying the peak Mr. Pasang decided it would be a folly to attempt the peak without advanced technical knowledge of pitons, of which we had none. So disappointed, but not beaten, we toasted Kang with tin juices and slowly made our way downward.

After a well deserved rest that night, we left for the Kang Pass early next morning. After walking 3 kms beside Kang Peak we stood on the Kang Pass and we got our first view of the Everest range with Everest and Makalu majestically towering over the rest. After a brief stop we left this altitude of 18000' and returned to Tekepla-chu, from where we left for Bigbarion our return journey. If we thought the return journey was all downhill, we were mistaken as mountain after mountain loomed over us.

We crossed a fast flowing glacial stream the next day with ropes and in underpants which left us numb all over. After this experience we staggered all the way to Chogga and the next day to long awaited Yoksum where there was real electricity, bungalow and to our delight we even saw a jeep on a real tarmac road. Our school jeep arrived with the Rector's brother, Col. Dang, Mrs. Dang and a whole lot of food. We had super meals that night and the next day to keep us content.

Fully rested, we left in jeeps for Darjeeling on 20th October. The warm welcome and effusive tributes after the harrowing fortnight were sweet music to our ears. The experience in the mountains had taught us a lot—perseverance, resistance and courage in the face of adversity and to accept things as they are. The struggle was rewarding and we were rich in experience now. We had enough stories now to tell our grandchildren for this rendezvous with the mountains will undoubtedly retain a permanent niche' in our minds.






In the Hindi Elocution contest the house stood first with R. Sanganeria and P. Lochan doing exceptionally well.


Though being piped at the post for Solomon Cup the Andersonians are not those who give up and therefore have resolved to reclaim the honour next year with more enthusiasm and dedication.




WESTCOTT



Boxing, which began primarily as a test for sustained stamina by the primaries, has now caught on and is organised on school basis.


The amateur philatelic club of the Primary Wing brought laurels to the school collection with a tally of six bronze medals.
