



EDITORIAL





My thanks are due to Rector for providing me this excitement year after year and to my colleagues for their cooperation.





The Chairman with Rector




P. W. Building under Construction














RECTOR'S LETTER, 1982

From being a break with tradition, Rector's Letter in the Chronicle has stabilized into a precedent which it is now proving difficult to avoid. In a period of campus and institutional growth, and educational change with stability by the grace of God, Masters' Common Room and the Rectory, if not in the economy and inflationary trends, perhaps this year the Editor will be kind enough to spare readers the sight of the same Rector in the photograph, thus saving the Rector the growing embarrassment of an elderly and growing waistline.

I owe to Manohar Malgaonkar, the famous Indo-Anglican author, the book "Rector Of Justin" set in one of the traditional American east-coast Boston Brahman residential schools, which I hope to visit this coming winter, and the atmosphere and values of which are remarkably reminiscent of St. Paul's School, though we are somewhat younger. At Justin-Martyr, too, history was measured in rectorships and decades, and here at SPS of 1982 may truly be said to have inaugurated the decade of the eighties a dynamic and ambitious trajectory which humbles our pride in the many achievements of the school and the boys, by the vastness of the promise ahead and the enormity of the opportunities and constraints which will confront us. There is such trepidation in face of the eighties at SPS that one may be forgiven a qualm of diffidence. Will we be up to it, for we are launched on a hitherto untried trajectory of excellence as makes one ponder. But perhaps the chapel hymn now included in the first-ever book of Hymns and Canticles printed by SPS for the Chapel Service gives the guidance, "I don't wish to see the distant scene, one step enough for me".

The inauguration and occupation of the three new buildings and the Primary Wing campus, named after the Metropolitan Bishop Aurobindo, Bishop Bryan and Metropolitan Bishop De Mel, has indeed been a signal achievement which gives solace, when we worry about the very substantial dues still to be cleared for this three-million-rupee project which has added 23,000 sq. ft. floor space to the school. The first squash court, inaugurated by the President of the Squash Federation of India, and the number of domestic staff quarters constructed, as well as further improvement in the water-supply and genset electrical power, and the currently under-way SBI bank branch project through banking and institutional finance, are all satisfying programmes heading for implementation. The proposed Darjeeling Dairy Project will cost more than a million rupees and apart from providing good milk to the boys as requested by the

P.P.T.A., it will be our first major effort in Community Service for the improvement in the economy of Darjeeling, and the creation of employment opportunities for the people of Darjeeling.

The greatly increased academic motivation and improved staffing and classroom instruction, the effective functioning of a system of committees of senior staff for adminission and staffing and the more expeditious preparation of the Chronicle 1982 and the Calendar 1983 are all on-going achievements, reflecting improvements made possible by the willing and dedicated cooperation of a harmoniously functioning staff-team at all levels. That fees continue to rise is an unfortunate, if inevitable, offshoot of the continuing inflationary pressures, but the financial viability attained in the 80's is indeed a most basic achievement for a school like SPS.

Having submitted the Indian Youth Award Scheme for reformulation to the Government of India, we at SPS have resumed the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme late this year as an umbrella programme to rationalise and possibly reduce, the time spent on co-curricular and outward bound activities by our boys, who now need to spend more time on studies with maximum efficiency for achieving in this new trajectory of excellence, success in obtaining placement, for further and higher education at institutes of technology and for careers and courses in India and abroad through sheer ability and merit, with some from our wide net-work of contacts and well-wishers, through competitive entrance in India and abroad.

After nearly a quarter century of school teaching, which I shall complete next year, more than half as headmaster in our school system, I have been able to resume my own reading. writing and academic work, and will be visiting snow-leopard zoos for a Captive Snow-Leopard Breeding Project, as well as residential and other educational schools, and college-institutions and universities in Europe, the UK and the USA for visits and lectures in December and January this winter, in a further effort to ensure that we at SPS, while wedded to our traditions. and adaptable to the needs of India and south Asia for our largely Asiatic and Indian children from the Third World, do not lose sight of the tremendous advances in the educational fields being made all over the world particularly in the developed countries. Next year should see the beginning of an experiment in videocassette recorded scholastic instruction, with the help of staff, through the generosity of two of our parents from abroad.


Through the pages of the Chronicle will be found many other examples of beginnings being made to further this process of educational pioneering in India, while we at the same time continue our efforts at improving our administrative efficiency.

ACADEMIC NOTES

St. Paul's has always been reputed for all-round education, but the growing competitiveness for access to professional and higher education at good colleges and universities was beginning to pose an obstacle to our boys who spent much time on para-academic pursuits. One of the aims in 1977, when the first professional Indian Rector took over at St. Paul's, was to set in motion balanced strategies to ensure increasingly competitive Public Examination results, without sacrificing traditional versatile educational character and personality development and moral values.

The progressive success of this effort at academic improvement, a process which takes time to display results, is apparent from the statistics given in this 'note'.

One of the indices of how students are applying themselves in the classroom is the 'Commendation' system, and, in increasing numbers, the commendation lists are swelling—so much so that we have had to 'stiffen' the system to make it more difficult for a boy to get commended.

Results at a public examination are invariably one of the criteria by which a school is judged. We are increasingly aware of this factor and the tabulation below will indicate our improvements in this field:

In August, 1976, the then Rector, Mr. Michael Cross, and the Boards of Governors of St. Paul's School and of St. Andrew's School, Darjeeling, decided to ask St. Paul's School to take over the administration of St. Andrew's, which was a co-educational, mainly a boarding establishment housed in Edenfalls in somewhat sub-standard accommodation, with over a hundred children in the Primary classes.

Mr. David Howard, a very senior member of St. Paul's, was given the job of sorting out the situation at St. Andrew's, and make it ready for the 'complete' take-over of St. Andrew's School scheduled for August 1978 as per agreement. This take-over was duly effected after two years of excellent work by Mr. Howard, who then handed over St. Andrew's as the integral Primary Wing of St. Paul's School, to the new Head of the Primary Wing, Mrs. Renuka Dang. Mr. Howard then came up as Second Master and later as Senior Master.

But the sub-standard buildings and the increased strength with this step entailed posed a problem. Mr. Michael Cross had anticipated there would be extra space; instead, there was acute dissatisfaction amongst parents who felt the St. Andrew's Campus was just not of St. Paul's standard. Earlier, the then Rector had proposed a new building, but the estimated cost was considered too high for us to raise resources successfully.

However, the new Rector, who took over in October 1977. felt this could be achieved, and was necessary for attaining organised academic streaming, with Classes I to V being housed in Primary Wing to be constructed at a cost of 15 to 20 lakhs, and Classes VI, VII and VIII in the Junior Wing, and Classes ICSE IX/X and ISC XI/XII in the Senior Wing. It was this aim which was realised almost miraculously on the 20th March 1983, though the cost of the 3 buildings of the new PW around a central quadrangle has escalated, and what with expensive plumconcrete revetment walls, and additional, ancilliary and extra works, the total cost of the Project will be Rs. 38 lakhs, all resources being raised by the parents and the Rector and his staff. The new PW buildings were commissioned for use on 20th March 1982, a complex complete with 9 classrooms, 2 large dormitories, a library, infirmary, music room, play-room, dininghall and kitchen. This was in addition to the Edenfalls complex and the existing buildings. As a result of the new PW complex there was considerable easing of space in the SW and we have been able to re-locate the Biology and Physics labs in the old Lefroy Infirmary, create a parents' lounge, a new and larger MCR, an extra 2nd language room and a large classroom in the JW which will hold a general science laboratory.

Class strengths have been maintained at an optimum 25 students per section and from Classes V to X we have three sections so as to ensure effective teaching.

In Clases XI and XII we have been able to take in large numbers of our own boys who, in increasing numbers, wish to return to us to take the +2 course as our results and the School improve. From 1979 when we sent up 29 candidates for the ISC (12) till now, our Sixth Form numbers have steadily increased. This is a healthy sign. In 1982 we sent up 39 candidates and March 1983 we will send up the optimum of 49 candidates. For qualitative results we have decided not to allow more than 25 students in any individual class of XI & XII, and subject-sections are still very much smaller.

Over these last years we have introduced the additional subjects of Economics and Commerce to cater for the larger demand for these subjects. We have also introduced special classes for Public Exams for entry to the IIT, Medical Colleges and the NDA. This is in addition to the normal demands of the ISC (12) syllabus. Special tutorial classes are arranged in all classes for those boys who appear to be slower at learning or who have missed part of their syllabuses for one subject or another. Academically, this has placed St. Paul's School squarely on a sound footing, with at least two senior (subject) teachers in each ICSE or ISC subject as needed, instead of the earlier adhocism, and the academic results are now progressively improving.

We now have nearly 680 boys with 52 full time and a large number of specialised part-time staff on special fixed-duration arrangements. This gives us preferably the best teacher-pupil ratio in India. Since good teachers have been attracted to the staff once again, to strengthen the excellent existing staff, and all are working in unison and harmony, the syllabuses and classroom instruction have also improved, and the system of Scheme of Work has also been implemented and the Science Faculty also greatly strengthened and improved.

The intake pattern has now crystallized over the past few years into an approximately equal sharing of boys from successful professional, service (salaried) and self-employed (business) backgrounds, and admissions are handled by an Internal Admission Committee procedure which is functioning very smoothly, and giving us good versatile potential which is developing the traditionally balanced and all-round traits for which St. Paul's is justly renowned. We have also increased our intake from the hill areas, e.g., nearly 60 Nepalese boys as against 10 or fewer earlier, and from Assam and Bombay, and from abroad without reducing our firm base in Bengal and Calcutta.

St. Paul's School now lives up to the statement of Faith which our prospectus represents.

FINANCIAL NOTES

After nearly a decade of deficit financing and overdrafts we at last achieved viability in 1980, in spite of double digit inflation, improving quality and rising costs. 1981 and now 1982 should also be viable. However, the preliminary estimates for 1983 show that the pattern will not be repeated unless there is an increase in class strength currently at 24/25, which is against our policy.

It should be clarified that both the financial viability and the funding of depreciation, general reserve, gratuity, etc., have been achieved without any cutbacks on our standards of food, medical and pastoral care, maintenance of estate, and terms and conditions of service, all of which have been greatly improved. For example, never before has so much excellent fruit, like apples, etc., been served to our boys, nor, ever before, have we had a full time Residential School Doctor (Dr. P. K. Sharma, MBBS, DPH, MD) and three nurses, in addition to the DDMA, and that the terms and conditions for all categories of staff are comparable to those prevailling in the best public schools, for we must attract the right type of dedicated staff in order to achieve the desired results. For instance, we have just appointed the first 'trained' caterer ever to join St. Paul's School. We welcome Mr. K. G. Samuel who has been trained in Switzerland and has had several years' experience in top class establishments in India, Nepal, Denmark and Austria. The bursary staff has also been strengthened as part of the process of improving our methods and systems, and it is hoped that we shall go from strength to strength in all spheres, now that, after a sustained effort a traditional financial control, an ongoing process, St. Paul's is viable and stable.

THE SCHOOL CAMPUS

Apart from the erratic electricity and the inadequate water supply, the major crisis I found confronting the School when I joined in March 1980 was the un-acceptably sub-standard, overcrowded and unhygienic St. Andrew's School (PW) Edenfalls buildings and campus. Whether we could raise sufficient resources and actually build healthy and adequate Primary Wing accommodation was doubted by most people. However, in a tour-de-force of remarkable creditability, the Rector and the entire staff of the school achieved a virtual miracle in raising funds and completing the job by 20th March, 1982, in record time and at record economy of costs commensurate with quality, safety and viability of the P.W. complex. (Details as given in Appendix A).

Consequent upon the construction and occupation of the three new school buildings for the Primary Wing (covered area approximately 23,000 sq. ft.) and the commissioning of allied facilities, large covered areas were released for re-utilisation (in fact the entire 'old' Primary Wing Campus of Edenfalls was available for reallocation). The decision to change/transfer/re-locate laboratories, staff accommodation, the School Infirmary, etc., was taken by the Space Utilization Committee (Sputcom) approved by the Board of Governors and implemented within pre-set deadlines. As a result, we were able to have:

- (i) a large School Infirmary with quarantine rooms, a sunroom, a Consultation Room, an attached residential flat for the Resident School Doctor and an independent kitchen (which can be and is used as and when need arises during 'epidemics' of measles, etc.).
- (ii) over half-a dozen staff flats and mush needed bed space for school visitors and teams,
- (iii) a place to house the School Printing Press (the printing press machinery is under installation and awaiting commissioning).

The Lefroy Building, from where the School Infirmary moved out, now houses the Physics and Biology laboratories, a science masters' room and a staff flat. In turn, the old Physics Laboratory was converted into the Senior Wing Masters' Common Room and the Old Biology Laboratory into a Photography Studio-cum-Darkroom-cum-Exhibition Area, and the Hindi Language class-room. The Rector got back his original office.

We are in the process of improving our campus communication network through the installation of an inter-communication system.

On 26th September, 1982, we were able to have Mr. N. N. Atal, Managing Director of McLeod Russel Ltd., and President, Squash Racquets Federation of India, to inaugurate our new (the first one at St. Paul's) squash court. We could have built a few more but the only draw back at the moment is the lack of funds.

Failure of electricity (from the State Electricity Bcard) is more of a rule rather than the exception and there have been occasions when the power failure has lasted for 48 hours! However, this does not bother us at all any longer, though it was chaotic during the period 1975-77, thanks to our diesel powered generators and back-up electronic power supply systems (located in the School Infirmary, New Primary Wing, Centenary Hall cubicles for Sixth Formers and the office areas). We also have a portable 500 watts HONDA petrol generator for energising, say, a TV set, or, may be, a campsite or a sports field or Prep Hall at any given time.

Water scarcity in Darjeeling, like the weather, still remains a favourite topic of conversation. But while the townsforlk of Darjeeling have to buy a rupee-a-can of water whenever the daily municipal water supply fails, we at St. Paul's just turn to our 'reserves' (which in a crunch can last for at least six days). We have built up these reserves within our fair share of Darjeeling water, by economising, rationalising and avoiding wastage.

Our routine maintenance system seems to be working as we are facing less frequently panicky emergency situations.

The loyal and dedicated group of domestic staff help keep St. Paul's ticking through rain, sunshine and the bitter winter cold. The school's socialistic policy of general democratic all-round development applies to our domestic staff also and we not only try to keep improving their living conditions, but also try and improve their standard of living by way of personal attention and enhanced emoluments and better facilities, (our School Estate Hockey team won the coveted Tempa Shield this year much to the charging of many.) Recreation facilitites have been improved by installing a T. V. set and a Table-Tennis table.

Under the broad policy of general development we have taken on a Rupee-Ten-Lakh-plus Bank Branch Project, work for

which is in progress. The 3-storeyed 10,000 sq. ft. building may also house a post and telegram office and other facilities. A temporary State Bank Branch is on operation on the ground floor of the Goddard Pavilion.

In the negotiation stage is the Microwave Terminal Station, to be located up in the Dawkins, area (Mt. Vernon), while the 'CLIMAT' station project has been shelved for the present.

Besides positive contribution to the economy of Darjeeling, the school provides indirect employment through purchase of goods and services locally, as far as possible. As a natural extension of this policy we are planning to provide further employment under the 'Aloobari Community Service Project'. As a first step we have in the pipeline a Dairy Project (to be located on the St. Paul's School Estate alongside Tenzing Norgay Road) and a Weighbridge Project (to be located near the Jorebungalow-Senchal Forest Checkpost on the main Siliguri-Darjeeling Road-Hill Cart Road).

Through the active and effective efforts of our Rector, full moral and advisory support of our Board of Governors and with the kind cooperation and help of our parents, Old Paulites and well-wishers we hope not only to keep improving our environment but also to try and make a model for others to emulate. We feel ourselves to be a part of Darjeeling and are now poised to contribute more directly by creating employment opportunities through our 'Aloobari Project'.



The Board of Governors of St. Paul's had their biannual meeting at the Rectory, at which the Bishop presided, on May 8th. In the evening they met the new members of staff.







Apart from the three new buildings and the Primary Wing campus, (Metropolitan Bishop Aurobindo's, Bishop Bryan's and Metropolitan Bishop De Mel's) creating nearly 23,000 sq. ft. of additional floor-space on the campus at a cost of nearly three million rupees, a substantial part of which is still due for clearance, we have inaugurated the first squash court through the gracious generosity of some parents, when the President of the Squash Federation of India visited us in September. Currently, the SBI Bank Branch costing over a million rupees, through banking and institutional finance, is being constructed on the site of old chowkidar's quarters at the school entrance, and will

be of benefit to the school, and a convenience to parents when it is ready. Water supply and genset electrical power have been further improved, and the campus maintenance and roads progressively so. We have shelved the idea of a full-fledged Meteorological Observatory, but the Micro-wave Terminal Station is still under consideration of our management. A large number of domestic staff quarters have been built, and additional staff accommodation created in the successful re-allocation of space, which has included the installation of a printing press yet to start functioning, and the new infirmary, on Edenfalls campus.

Academically, the year has been successful in increasing motivation, and improving classroom instruction and staffing."



Your Excellencies, the Governor of West Bengal, and Mrs. Vimala Pande, members of the Board of Governors, distinguished guests, parents, members of the staff and boys: It is the shared privilege of St. Paul's School to weclome you as Chief Guests to our 159th Annual Speech Day celebrations. The privilege is all the greater as we welcome you not only as the Governor of West Bengal and traditionally the patron of SPS, but also as a person of inspiring eminence who gave to the traditions of the Indian Civil Service which you headed as the Cabinet Secretary, particularly after independence, that aura of excellence, competence and integrity on which this great nation was reborn in modernism.

We are especially grateful to you, Madam, for giving us this opportunity of receiving you in our midst as examples towards which we strive.

Our Chairman of the Board of Governors, the Rt. Rev. D. C. Gorai, Bihsop of Calcutta and Dy. Moderator of the Church of North India, is not able to be with us today but joins us all in conveying our good wishes and prayers for the Rt. Rev. J. Amritanand who was our Chairman for a decade and retired to Allahabad at the beginning of this year after a long tenure of service to the Church and to education. I am sure you would all like me to convey our good wishes and gratitude to Mr. B. T. Brooks, Mr. S. Biswas, and Gp. Capt. A. K. Choudhuri, for the great strength and wisdom they have contributed towards the functioning and development of SPS over the years through their devoted guidance and support during their tenures as members of the Board of

Governors. Though they are no longer formally on our board, they continue to be a source of strength and wise counsel to us which we greatly value and we shall continue to cherish our association with them.

We welcome on our Board of Governors, Mr. S. P. Acharya, Chairman of the Shaw Wallace Group of Companies, Col. D. K. Khullar, Principal of the Himalayan Mountaineering Institute, Darjeeling, and Mr. C. P. Phillipose, Director (Finance), Shalimar Paints, by whose guidance and wisdom we gain renewed strength and confidence.

The Board of Governors having already met at School, under the chairmanship of the Rt. Rev. D. C. Gorai, in the presence of the Rt. Rev. J. E. Ghose, Bishop of Darjeeling, on the 24th and 25th of September last month, they have not been able to be with us today but we are grateful to Col. D. K. Khullar for his inspiring presence amongst us today. I am personally most grateful to the Rt. Rev. J. E. Ghose for his sustained support and guidance inspite of his own many preoccupations and heavy responsibilities.

This is my 13th annual report as head of a residential school. It is in fact fortunate for me for I have finally discovered an unexceptionable solution which will resolve your anxieties today in regard to the length of this report and the duration of my stand before you. The Rector's Report on Speech Day must cover all the important points and generally goes into ninety minutes to be comprehensive. Please be assured that today it will last less than thirty minutes as I read it, though the version which will appear in print is thrice as long. Since I am told that the audience generally goes to sleep on such occasions, and I speak through my experience, having had to sleep through, I beg your pardon, sit through elabroate similar reports at other institutions, while pretending to be alert and deeply interested in what the Principal was saying, it is unlikely that anybody would notice the abridgement or disapprove of it.

Today, we remember our founders, past Rectors and Governors, erstwhile members of the staff and Old Paulites, rendering homage to their services to the School. I would especially like us to remember with gratitude the services of Mr. Michael Cross, Mr. David Gibbs, and, particularly, Mr. Leslie Goddard, who I, know, would be remembering us today with fond affection from his house at Jalapahar in the UK.

We are meeting today with a unique sense of achievement and progress having on the 20th of March, 1982, actually occupied the new buildings and campus with our classes I to V, 23

thousand sq. ft. of additional floor space in three blocks around a central quadrangle inaugurated on the 9th of May, 1982, by our Chairman and the Board of Governors in the names of Metropolitan Bishop Aurobindo Mukherjee, the well beloved late Rt. Rev. Bishop Ronald Bryan and the Metropolitan Bishop Lakdasa de Mel after whom the three buildings are named. It is not brick and mortar of which we would be proud but the harmonious and unified effort which went into making this unique achievement possible in such a short time in the difficult mountain environment of Darjeeling and the unprecedented economy in expenditure in terms of costs and prices with which the construction was completed. That we have had to spend much more than the originally planned 15 or 20 lakhs to ensure completion, viability and safety by building expensive revetment walls and additional ancilliary and extra works, and that nearly Rs. 9 lakhs worth of bills are still pending to be paid our responsibility which weighs heavily on all of us but which we are sure with the continuing and sustained generosity of our parents and well-wishers, will be duly made. The architecture of the new campus is still not as attractive as our old quadrangle but it is airy, spacious and safe, with improvements continuing to be made as the buildings settle down and adjust to the noise of 230 boisterous little children. It is to me a deep sence of satisfaction which I am sure is shared by all well wishers of the School to see these children out of the earlier substandard accommodation in the old Primary Wing which has now been converted to continuing school use as the infirmary and other accommodation, releasing space in the Senior Wing rationally as advised by the Space Utilisation Committee.

I am still not happy with the space position in the JW where 220 boys continue to occupy space originally designed for fewer. Perhaps we could consider an additional block there of six or eight classes to give the JW boys more lebensraum.

Another exciting achievement which the boys are fully utilising, in mornings and evenings and which is only our first earnest of two more such for the excellent game suited to the long monsoon and a rapidly intellectualising school which needs opportunities for boys to sublimate their brimming energies in physical exertion is our first squash court between the old gymnasium and the Fives court below the Rectory, which was inaugurated on the 26th of September by Narendra Atal, Kipps to friends at the Doon School, President of the Squash Federation of India, and Managing Director of the McLeod Russel, Namdang and Mecum group of companies.

Though we have been able to bring the finances of the school under control and for 1980, 1981 and 1982 the budget has been

viable, with appropriate depreciation, gratuity and other funding, including of statutory provisions, inflation is continuing and the outlook for 1983 is bleak even if we successfully achieve the economies which we have planned. One major factor, apart from the others which have led to the school having deficit budgets till 1979 leading to heavy liabilities and overdrafts till then, has been delay in bank reconciliations of remittances and expenditure. You will all be aware of the decline in efficiency of banking services and it is with a sense of achievement that I can today announce that construction of the full-fledged State Bank branch at St. Paul's has begun at the entrance from the Jalapahar Road. This is approximately one-million-rupee project and is being financed through intricate systems of loans and possible refinancing, and once this independent branch begins to function, it will greatly aid our effort and sustain viability. The threestorey buildings with vault should be ready by next year but the bank branch may start functioning in November, 1982, itself in part of Goddard's Pavilion, if an agreement can be reached towards this. The school stands to gain recurring revenue also as a result of the rental for the building.

Having completed my five years as Rector and as a permanent resident of Darjeeling this month, I have come to appreciate not only the warmth and affection, industrious nature and generosity of the people of Darjeeling but also to understand the very real problems faced by the people of Darjeeling, the lack of understanding of which by the people of the plains occasionally leads to a communication gap and some mental prejudice. Those who have been born and brought up in Darjeeling will understand why we do not like to leave Darjeeling, and employment opportunities are limited to tea, education and tourism in spite of the government's valiant effort through the Hill Development Secretariat to develop the hills and the economy of Darjeeling. There is virtually unlimited potential for development of industries and employment oriented activities based on tourism, natural resources and skilled manpower. It is with this understanding and the support of the people of Darjeeling and the approval of the Board of Governors of this school that we are now proposing to launch an extensive programme aimed at creating of employment opportunities. The modest beginning for this ambitious Aloobari Project will be made with a St. Paul's Dairy Project along the Aloobari Road on school land with the permission of the authorities. The proposal is in its planning stage and is expected to cost over a million rupees. It will not only provide fresh and wholesome nutritious milk to the boys of SPS, but also offer direct employment to nearly 15 young people apart from indirect employment to many. If this project targetted for 1983/84 for completion succeeds, we have in mind several other similar development programmes for the benefit of the Darjeeling economy and indirectly of benefit to SPS. It will also be a measure of our gratitude to the people of Darjeeling for their support and affection for SPS.

Though academics statistics are available elsewhere, I would like to confine myself here to the results of the ICSE Exam, 1981. Of 51 boys who took the examination, 2 failed, (the lowest number of failure in the ICSE Exam at SPS so far). In the ISC Class XII Exam conducted in March 1982, there was one failure, a GOI Merit Scholar. Failure in public examinations is considered inevitable in small numbers at schools like the Doon and St., Paul's where there is no screening and all boys are encouraged to take the examination. We at St. Paul's do not accept this inevitability and feel that there should be no failure at all in public examinations if the system is functioning really well with no imperfections. We hope to achieve this optimality next year though one or two failures might still occur for another few years. It is the number of credits and distinctions which give the qualitative true picture and this is on a satisfactorily improving trajectory at SPS. Another criterion which we would consider more meaningful at SPS would be the successful ability of our boys to gain access to preferred institutions of higher education like St. Xavier's, Calcutta, St. Stephen's and Sri Ram College at Delhi, or the distinguished colleges in Bombay, Poona and Madras, as well as 'A' levels and baccalaureate courses at British and American Public Schools and University entrance in India, Europe and America by which standards our boys are again doing well.

Of the many criticisms levelled against expensive fee-paying autonomous schools like ours are a) their elitism, and b) their privileged position which is self renewing in that the sons of the privileged study at such privileged institutions and thereby become privileged in access to higher education and opportunities for development. I have always accepted the criticism of elitism as democratic socialistic aspirations but it is only the access to the quality institutions which needs to be socialised and merit based. Merit it is at the age of six or nine or twelve, as the criterion for admission to these schools depends on background, socio-economic and cultural and financial, and practical considerations of school finance make it desirable that at least half the intake we base on fee-paying parentage, the other half being on scholarship and bursary base. In a more perfect dispensation perhaps which might be less humane the intake would be entirely on merit base. In the distorted extremes of theoretical education psychology and philosophy as in Sweden, Denmark and parts of the USA, even merit would be considered undemocratic. So we are fortunate to be limited by constraints which render the needs of development, industrialisation and eradication of extremes of poverty important enough to override such theoretical considerations.

And a perfectly satisfactory and morally just solution is to ensure that recipients of elitist advantage and privileged education will not use these only for their selfish and personal gain, but treat all such advantages and benefits as a trust on which they must return interest in the form of dedicated efficient service to their community and nation. Easier said than done. Nor can this valid philosophy and justification for elitism be readily accepted by all, for not all can even think broadly enough. It is too painfully noticeable that the rich become richer through better selection. training and education and the concept of service remains at best highly indirect and nebulous attempting to justify Rotary Club and Lions Club, etc. Charity, however genuine, will never balance the resentments and envy against the privileges of elitism. Only a dynamic service ethic which is seen to inform the lives of the alumni of such schools can compensate and convince and at the moment this is not happening.

However, while working on this service ethic and it is inculcating into our boys which incidentally also increases their efficiency through broad mindedness and liberal thinking, we at St. Paul's are fully pledged to ensuring these advantages for these boys not only through better personality development, versatile growth and progressively better academic results, but also through placement and career guidance. Personal relationships play a very important role in this and I have personally been developing this ability in SPS to place our boys in higher education in accordance with their needs and aspirations at colleges and professional institutions in India and schools and universities abroad. Parents wishing to take advantage of this special aspect of our relationship are welcome to contact us as many are now doing for help within India and also in the UK, Switzerland and the USA.

Increasingly, as most boys start attaining better and better academic results in the ICSE and the ISC Public Examinations not only do most ICSE boys wish to return for the +12 course to SPS but also the parents of those boys who have not been academically sound and are apprehensive about the academic performance of their boys are increasingly looking for ways to somehow improving their sons' academic performance. Some wish their boys to leave after ICSE and move into metropolitan day schools for financial reasons.

Another natural reaction is for parents to write to us to request us to reduce co-curricular involvements. One father went to the extent after a recent hockey accident to insistently request that hockey, cricket and football be banned at school and boys play indoor games! For the latter, I share your amusement. It is essential that the boys at the growing age take limited organised risk in these field games, in rock-climbing, and trekking, and outward bound activities, even in boxing, as well as leading lives of voluntary purposeful austerity and discomfort. But the first point is more pertinent if not valid. You cannot have good academic performance and genuine scholarship without co-curricular interest. Balanced personality development is the most fertile ground for outstanding scholastic achievement. It is only the bookworm who is the figure of fun and seldom reaches beyond the stage of higher education. Whether it is Einstein or Richofermi or Arthur Clarke or Kissinger or Galbraith, throughout human history it is the specialist who has fully utilised all his abilities who excels. We have no intention of reducing co-curricular commitments at St. Paul's. In fact we are constantly making efforts to increase extra-curricular facilities and opportunities.

The Edinburgh Cricket Shield which we had won last year we lost to Mt. Hermon in a freak debacle even when we had beaten St. Joseph's in an earlier encounter.

At hockey we have now emerged winners after a lapse of 45 years in the Tempa Shield and 28 years in the Pliva Shield, much to the discomfiture and envy of many. In fact, I was so anxious about the possible results of triumph that annoyed many boys by hoping that they would lose the trophy and retain instead, goodwill. We won the Pliva and our Estate Team won the Tempa Shield.

At table-tennis, annual fixtures of which began with La Marts in 1977, we finally won the shield this year in exciting matches against national level players.

Music at St. Paul's I regard as more than a hobby. Not only is the congregational singing at Chapel and the Primary and Junior choirs and the school choir drawn from these are of routine importance at Chapel but all music is part of our educational philosophy.

We are likely to lose Mr. Rufus Paul at the end of this year to the International School, Kodaikanal, where he and Mrs. Paul, herself an excellent teacher at Class I, would like to move for change. They have done a lot for pianoforte and Class I teaching

at St. Paul's and leave us with our blessings and mutual affection and will always be welcome back.

After the disastrous decline of the prefectorial system (I inherited a VIth Form of 38 boys of whom 31 at one time or another had been Prefects and been removed or resigned) the trajectory has been progressively improving. Though I lightheartedly expressed once to the current VIth Form when they were in Class X the view that in a really good residential school like ours the entire VIth Form should be given prefectorial responsibility, under the wise dispensation of the School Captain, Bidhan Chowdhury, and the three other House Captains and the Vice-Captain. This situation with the help of the prefectorial team has apparently transpired and we are very happy in the optimism that despite adolescent pressures our VIth Form due to leave us in March, 1983, will rise superior to the annual tensions and frictions that develop before farewell.

Relieved of the responsibility has also deprived me of the opportunity of classroom teaching leading to close contact with boys in a purely academic situation except for short periods when staffing problems, unanticipated, may lead to the Vice-Principal using my limited if versatile teaching abilities spreading through Chemistry and five other subjects, I have spent more and more time these last thirteen years as the head of school in understanding boys, their motivation, their minds, their emotions. Every year towards the end of term the VIth Form and the prefects develop some tensions and complexes which make them act in uncharacteristic ways. I am happy that this year for the first time at school in recent years there is a VIth Form and a set of prefects which are likely to establish a new set tradition of genuine stability of character based on a mature understanding, free of complexes or anxieties. As I say every year this is the best VIth Form we had.

At the end of last year we said good-bye to Mr. and Mrs. S. K. Banerjee and Mr. Michael Enos. Mr. Banerjee joined the Assam Rifles Public School as its Vice-Principal and Mrs. Banerjee is teaching Hindi and Sanskrit at the same school. Mr. Enos left us for health reasons.

This year we say fond farewell with choicest good wishes and blessings to Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Paul as they move to International School Kodaikanal, and to Mr. and Mrs. Y. K. Gurwara. Mr. Gurwara takes up Principalship of a DAV Public School in Ranchi. In Mr. Gurwara we lose, I apart from a mathematician, an excellent cricket coach and in Mrs. Gurwara a qualified librarian. Mr. N. K.

Gupta who has been teaching French with us for two years will be leaving us to join Jawaharlal Nehru University as a scholar of philology and comparative linguistics and carries with him our good wishes and bon return since he intends to come back to us after the JNU course if there is still a vacancy by then.

We were delighted to welcome as a teacher of Physics in senior classes Mr. K. N. Srinivasan who was housemaster and head of the department of Physics, at Lawrence School, Lovedale, in the vacancy created by the unfortunate mid-term departure of Mr. S. P. Sharma who accepted a lectureship at the Govt. College, Ajmer. Mr. Srinivasan has already done much to strengthen the teaching of Physics and our Science Faculty under Mr. N. K. Sharma is today strong and effective.

We welcomed on the staff this term Mr. P. C. Mall from the Punjab Public School, Nabha, an alumnus of St. Stephen's College, as Senior History Master, in the vacancy of Mr. K. N. Dar, and Mr. U. K. Dwivedi as Senior Biology Master from Yadavendra Public School, Patiala, and Mr. Arun Dash as Senior Geography Master from the Doon School, Dehradun. We also welcomed in the PW this year Mr. Desmond Vida, Mr. Collin Watson, and Mr. L. D'Costa from the TTC, Mount Hermon School, and Miss C. McSweeny as Matron under Mrs. P. P. Tshering as well as Mr. S. Velu, currently caterer in the Primary Wing. We are delighted to welcome Mr. K. G. Samuel as senior caterer in the Senior and Junior Wings from Denmark who has qualified as a caterer from the Institute of Hotel Management and Catering Technology in Northern Switzerland and comes to us after a rich experience. Mr. Samuel speaks excellent Nepali and we wish Mr. & Mrs. Samuel a happy and long tenure with us.

It is our weakness and conceit that we headmasters take ourselves too seriously as not only responsible for all that goes at school but also the prime movers of the institution and motivators and its functioning such delusion of grandeur in this 13th year of my headmastering. I hope I may be forgiven for considering myself as having escaped. For the function of the Head of the school is truly symbolic. The better a school functions the less the Head is needed and the less he works. The obverse could also be true but only in a healthy situation. It is the staff, teaching, administrative and domestic, the parents and the boys who make the school function, and it is the environment of Darjeeling, the officials and the members of the Board of Governors who guide and advise and who are truly responsible. The Head is useful only when things go wrong. I am grateful to the staff for their unquestioning devotion to SPS and to the boys and parents for

their solidarity and support and their acceptance of what at times must seem like personal indiosyncrasies. To the Board of Governors of SPS, particulary to the Dy. Commissioner of Darjeeling, the Rt. Rev. J. E. Ghose, Bishop of Darjeeling, to the Chairman, the Bishop of Calcutta, I would render my most sincere thanks for their generous and selfless guidance, advice and support.

After the prizes were given away by Smt. Pande, the Rector asked H.E. the Governor to address the gathering. The Governor said:

Rector, teachers and students of St. Paul's School, ladies and gentlemen:

My wife and I are very happy to be with you today on the occasion of your School's 159th Annual Speech Day. Thank you very much for inviting us. It appears that every time I come to Darjeeling, I come to your school also.

I am always happy to visit a progressive educational institution like yours. St. Paul's School is an old institution and well-known for its high standard. An old institution necessarily has its traditions and the past to think back on but in an era of change, like ours, it must look to the future. Having a vision of the days to come and adapting to the times ahead, is our essential element of what makes a progressive institution.

Being a residential school, it provides opportunities to the students, who come here from different places, to mix with each other and develop lifelong friendships. They also exchange thoughts on various matters and help greatly in the promotion of brotherhood and national integration. In fact, living together one finds how much nearer we are to each other even though our homes may be far away from each other. Human beings all over basically share the same thoughts and emotions.

Student life, especially at the school stage, is an important formative stage. It is here that the foundation is laid. To be able to distinguish between right and wrong, what should be done and what not done is learnt here. One has to imbibe that everything else the country, the school, the teachers, the fellow students come before one's own selfish wants. What is overlooked here may not be easily learnt later on. How to lay this foundation is the task of your school and the teachers. I am sure that several of the old boys of this school will unhesitatingly say that whatever they have achieved in life is in a big way due to what they imbibed here. This is what I say to my own school.

Education is not mere acquisition of knowledge, but how to use or apply that knowledge. I will give a simple example. You have a knife and you have learnt how to use it. Do you use it to cut an apple or cut your own throat? The world today is facing this problem. We have discovered atomic energy. Are we going to use it for the betterment of human life or are we to destroy life on earth as we know it today? We have the capacity to do either. The impact of this is being felt all over the world. Rapid developments have brought about significant changes in human relationship.

Many of you will be joining college after some time for higher studies. You will have to think right now about the area of your specialisation. Some of you may like to become doctors, some engineers, some administrators, some teachers and so on. Independent India has opened up many new possibilities. True, there will be intense competition. Everything will not be easy sailing. If you are to make a correct choice you are bound to be successful in your future careers. Teachers and parents can help in giving guidance. This is a big responsibility. Teachers who come in intimate contact in a residential school like yours can help you greatly. The teachers have opportunities to study the aptitudes of the students and to suggest possible fields where their talents can be best developed and utilised. That the Rector and all the staff teachers are doing a job that is fully appreciated is seen by the steady and growing demand on the school for enrolment. The school is certainly looking into the future.

You are fortunate to be studying in Darjeeling which provides a most suitable atmosphere amidst beautiful surrondings. You are away from the din and bustle and polluted atmosphere of city life. I hope your stay here will also develop a love of nature and of the mountains. This will prove invaluable to you in later life.

With my best wishes to you all and thank you once again.

Col. Khullar, a local governor of St. Paul's School, proposed a vote of thanks and then the ceremony ended with the singing of Jana Gana Mana.


Review

THE MAN WHO CAME TO DINNER


The annual school play is an event one always looks forward to with earnest expectation, especially here at St. Paul's where the unerringly high standards seem to keep improving year by year. This year's production, "The Man Who Came to Dinner", by Moss Hart and G. Kaufman, the hilarious Broadway and Hollywood hit of the late '30s and early '40s, was no exception. At the end of a rip-roaring three hours of fun and frolic, the dominant emotion most felt by members of the audience was one of lingering nostalgia.

The action of the play revolves around a celebrity called Sheridan Whiteside who suffers the ignominy (and pain!) of a fall at the threshold of the Stanley house in Mesalia, Ohio, where he has reluctantly agreed to go for lunch. Arrogantly indignant, Mr. Whiteside proceeds to occupy a section of the house, in the process depriving the Stanleys the use of even their own sitting room. In the meanwhile, Whiteside's secretary, Maggie, gets involved and falls in love with Jefferson, the local newspaper magnate, and hands in her resignation. The tactful Whiteside, manoeuvring with the aid of his myriad admirers and contacts, almost manages to destroy Maggie's relationship before realising that the two are really in love. Through three hours of hilarious fare. Whiteside, who is sought to be thrown out by the Stanleys and deserted by his roughly treated nurse, comes out victorious in the end through the facility of his encyclopaedic memory which he uses to blackmail the Stanleys. Whiteside departs only to fall once more at the threshold, and as the final curtain is rung down the audience is left clutching desperately to their seats and at their stomachs, roaring with laughter.


Prasenjit Basu as Sheridan Whiteside is confident and absolutely fit for this role. His impeccable language and diversity of expression are his main assets, and, in fact, these carry the action of the play through. Vikram Menon as his felicitous secretary, Maggie Cutler, the only one constantly able to counter Whiteside's caustic taunts, is competent and looks his part. The encounters between the two are some of the high points of the play. Ajoy Bose as Jefferson of the Mesalia Journal has a difficult role which he plays commendably, and his drawl sounds authentic. Sanjoy Datta (Mr. Stanley) has an interesting face that can be moulded to put on any expression he desires. Bhairav Bhagwanji (Mrs. Stanley) is undoubtedly a talented actor and can improvise on the spot. His portrayal is simple and charming.

To lend variety and humour to the action, these main actors are supplemented by a number of extremely hilarious characteractors, each with his special brand of drama. There is Metz. the eccentric scientist friend of Whiteside, played perfectly by Subarno Chattarji, Beverly Carlton, the sensational and typical star of the silver screen, played brilliantly by Anil Welinkar with a rare degree of stage presence; Harriet Stanley, (alias Harriet Sedley-who killed her mother, and her father with an axe forty years ago), the sister of Mr. Stanley, who ultimately proves to be the latter's doom, played by the characteristically funny Indraneil Ray, Lorraine Sheldon, the smashingly beautiful actress who almost manages to lure Jefferson away to Lake Placid, but is ultimately packed cff in a mummy case by Whiteside, played very sportingly and well by Noel Maitra, Dr. Bradley, the doctor who commits the faux pas that results in Whiteside's infesting the Stanleys and generally makes a fool of himself, portrayed in a polished manner by Debasish Sanyal, and the irrepressible Banjo, played in inimitable style by Sudipto Sarkar, the showstealer of the third act who sends the crowd into fits of roaring laughter. Shiv Anand Lal as Miss Preen, Whiteside's much molested nurse, is an actor of calibre and confidence as proved by his frequent and humorous venturing on and off stage. Arup Bose as Richard Stanley, Indraneel Mookherjee as the butler, Padma Lochan as June Stanley and Sanjoy Bose as June's lover, Sandy, each played his role with charm and perfection. There were, besides, a larger number of minor characters, each polished and professional, and looking his part.

This brings me to the orchestra, conducted and led with characteristic flair and fervour by Mr. Denzil Prince. In keeping with St. Paul's traditional prowess in the sphere of music. The orchestra sounded soothing and very musical despite the reportedly very short time it had for practice. Kudos, Mr. Prince and your musical band!

But, of course, no praise can be too much for Mr. Baljit Bawa, who, along with his wife directed, produced and compered the entire show with a rare degree of proficiency and perfection. Besides the acting everything from costumes and make-up to lighting and stage decoration had the unmistakable professional touch of the redoubtable Baljit Bawa. Considering this fourth consecutive school play Mr. Bawa has produced at St. Paul's his plays seem to improve year after year. "The Man who Came to Dinner" was indeed Mr. Bawa's masterpiece, a mammoth production involving a large team, a cast of thirty-nine including boys from each of the three wings, besides a large

number of stage hands. The teamwork, camaraderie and sheer professional touch had to be seen to be believed. The choir scene was particularly one of the most moving in many years. All this, and much more, was evidence of the meticulous hand of Mr. Bawa working behind the scenes to make this the most ambitious of projects stage-worthy. So, hats off to you, Mr. Bawa, and here's wishing you many, many more successful plays to come.

WESTERN MUSIC

The human harmonic progressions which are necessary and essential to the building of 'A SCHOOL CHOIR' comprising the junior and senior wings ended in discord after a very brief but enthusiastic beginning, with the result that the choir-master was compelled to re-enrol the immature, weak and broken voices of students of class IX to hold the heavenly harmonics from the choir loft at daily chapel services, Sunday services, and special services, which one gathers is of prime importance to St. Paul's.

However, the 36 members of the senior wing choir deserve full marks for the three special anthems: 'O FILLII ET FILIAE' with its 36 Alleluias at Easter; a sixteenth-century anthem composed by Adrian Batten 'O SING JOYFULLY' during the Commemoration Service and 'IT CAME UPON A MID-NIGHT CLEAR' at the candle-light carol service were well rendered and received, apart from these special anthems which needless to say are rather time consuming. Hard pressed for rehearsals the choir was able to lead the rest of the congregation with a number of new hymns and new versions of psalms.

The Choir had an opportunity to present itself on stage during the annual Bengali and Hindi concerts—thanks to Mr. Goswami and Mr. Kanti.

At the commencement of the first term pressure was laid on the shoulders of the choir-master to compile a new hymn book for use in the chapel—dateline Easter. Selection, compiling typing, proof-reading, and most tedious of all, finding the appropriate music settings to the numerous titles of hymns, canticles, psalms and carols sent to us as suggestions from various quarters kept yours truly turning the pages of ever-so-many music hymn editions. Easter gave way to the Commemoration Service in October. Commemoration Service gave way to the Carol Service in November. Even though the books are with us from the press I'm sure one will still have to wait for the gods to find the right occasion and time to make use of them. So much for the urgent need to have a new hymn book.

At the Inter-House Singing Competition Arindam Chaudhuri of Havelock was adjudged the best singer of the year. He was followed by Vikram Dutta of Clive; Tashi Tshering of Lawrence and Glen Gardner of Hastings.



The final scores for the competition were Lawrence in first position, having scored the top mark in the group singing section, followed by Havelock and Clive in 2nd position and Hastings in the 4th position.



Seeing the need arising when some of our very gifted and talented senior members will be leaving the band after a period of seven years and being unable to catch students from the Junior Wing for various unknown reasons 28 students from Class IX opted to try their skill at blowing and bashing in the dept. as part of their SUPW craft and service record. Within the short span of three months they had a band of their own. With the promise of a grand and high tea from the Head of the Primary Wing they rehearsed with great enthusiasm and dedication in order to perform for the Primary Wing sports. And they did! BRAVO, and Thank You, Madam.

At the annual prize distribution day Sanjay Ray Choudhury and Vikram Dutta shared Adam's Music Prize for 1982. These two young musicians who perform rather well on the saxophone and trumpet have been leading instrumentalists in the school band and orchestra. Congratulations, you two.

Arindam Chaudhuri and Vivek Arora have proved to the younger members of the Class IX band that learning an instrument and studies can co-exist if one has the dedication to practise and achieve. Using their free periods Arindam, an exceptionally fine bass player mastered the B-flat tenor saxophone and Vivek who excels on the trombone did wonders with the mandolin. These two young gentlemen performed on these instruments for their Annual House Day concerts.

This year every house was able to present a group of musicians on stage at their annual house concert. Havelock were able to use the services of Shankar Dev Chowdhury who tried his two hands at a wee bit of swing music on the pianoforte. Lawrence had the benefit of an exceptionally good jazz percussionist, Banu Nagrani. Clive had the audience rocking and rolling not so much

However, our soloist Arindam Chaudhuri, with his rendition of 'The Coventry Carol', the Jubilee Singers with 'The Calypso Carol' and a new innovation from the choir sixth formers 'Three Kings in Great Glory' did wonders to help make the service beautiful with the spirit of Christmas; Our vesper' On This Christmasday Morn' with a score from Brahm's wellknown 'Lullaby' brought the service to a close.

Leafing through the SUPW service and craft records of the 86 students of the school band, choir, orchestra and Indian orchestra, when required, I marvel at the efforts and programmes that have been presented this year by the members of the music department.



At Kaziranga wildlife sanctuary, we studied the behaviour of one horned Indian rhino and chital. There are plenty of Asiatic wild elephants, wild buffaloes, barking deer, otters, migrating birds, etc. We did some ecological work at that sanctuary.

Our most important work of this year was to visit Jorepokhri (18 kms from Darjeeling towards Mirik) to observe salamanders (Tylototriton), an endangered species of amphibia. Next year, we hope that the boys will be encouraged to do work on salamanders.

We, under the membership of Bengal Natural History Society of Darjeeling, are planning to organize next year a regular and systematic spot-study of nature and life.

CRICKET

Despite the fact that our cricket team looks, on paper, one of our strongest for years, and we had begun the season with a flush of victories, the team collasped inexplicably in the final Edinburgh fixture against a team we had literally blasted off their feet earlier. Thus a season that had begun in a blaze of glory ended in less than a whimper, with the team losing also to the Dooars and barely managing to outlast the Army XXIII Corps.

The year began with the traditional fixture with the staff which the boys also, traditionally, won handily. But the season really got off its feet with the first fixture against Mt. Hermon who were given a sound thrashing the bowling of Naidu and Atiqur proving too much for them to cope with. Earlier, Utpal Banerjee had scored a blistering unbeaten century (123 runs) to take our score to 206 for 6 declared. Their reply was a paltry 47 runs.

The class X and below A-XI also gave a sound beating to the St. Joseph's team, beating them by 122 runs. Chettri's immaculate seam bowling proved virtually unplayable and St. Joseph's could only score 38 runs in reply to our total of 160.

Cricket Team

The prestigious 2 day fixture against Shaw Wallace Executives, was as is its wont, an enthralling match. It began with a tremendous opening partnership worth 144 runs between Mahajan and Seal. Seal was out first playing a masterful innings of 62 while Mahajan scored the highest, 91 runs. Bidhan (39) and Basu (22) also made useful contributions to the score of 256. The irrespressible Naidu (5 wickets), aided ably by Mr. Watson and Deepak Gupta (2 each), restricted them to 181 and we once again won this annual fixture. Mr. D. Das Gupta, the Captain of Shaw Wallace team, who played for South Zone had high opinion of our fielding and presented prizes to Naidu, Mahajan and Bidhan for their good bowling, batting and fielding, respectively, in order to encourage these young players.

The match against TISCO of Jamshedpur was sadly abandoned due to rain after Naidu had struck two stunning blows to bag the scalps of 2 Ranji stars, including Hari Gidwani. Gupta had also got an important wicket and the match seemed evenly poised with them on 74 for 3 when the skies opened out.

Edinburgh Fixtures

The Edinburgh Shield campaign began happily with a facile victory over St. Joseph's. Naidu, in three sustained spells of aggressive bowling, held the opponents on a tight leash, taking 3 for 13, while Gupta and Rahman chipped in with 2 a piece to send St. Joseph's tumbling to 127 all out. The target which never really looked out of reach was attained, with six wickets and 17.3 overs intact, i.e., with little difficulty, Seal contributing a strokeful 44 and Mr. Watson a hard-hitting unbeaten 23.

Then came the shock of the season. Playing on the St. Joseph's field, our batting line collasped in the face of the astute captaincy and tight, though mediocre, bowling resources of Mt. Hermon. After Naidu (4/14) Atiqur (2/10) and Mr. Watson (2/10) had bundled Mr. Hermon all out for 115, our batting wilted under pressure and collapsed to 53 for 9, only Seal (11) reaching double figures. A spirited rearguard action between H. Kumar (not out 20) and D. Gupta could only take the score to 74, but could not ward off defeat. In one of those great paradoxes of cricket, we were beaten hands down by a team we ourselves had humbled by an even larger margin earlier and the Edinburgh Shield slipped out of our hands.

With the Edinburgh Shield already won and lost, the last fixture against the Highlanders Club was only of academic interest. We piled up a mammoth 261 for 9 declared, H. Kumar contributing a delectable unbeaten 50, U. Banerjee a characteristically enterprising 43, and B. Chaudhury a chanceless 41 at the end of which he was unfortunate to be run out.

The Highlanders were given the honour of facing the bowling of each of our players except wicketkeeper H. Kumar but were dismissed for 57. Naidu had the superlative figure of 9 overs, 7 maidens, 6 runs and 3 wickets.

The next match was our annual fixture against Dooars, which we lost for the first time, at St. Paul's ground by 39 runs. The first time during our season our bowling was not on top except for Mr. Gurwara who captured 3 wickets for 14 runs and our opponents made 157 runs. Our batting collapsed once again and we were bundled out for 118.

The season was rounded off with an exciting fixture against the XXIII Corps of the Army. We made 191 in our allotted overs with all 9 batsmen who batted getting into double figures. A. Chatterjee top scored with 34, holding out promise for the future. The Army fell short of their target by just 7 runs as they ran out of overs and we won a thrilling victory.

At the end of the season Bidhan Chaudhury's fine leadership throughout the season, as well as his good batting and excellent fielding, won him deservedly Major Colours. Major Colours were also awarded to A. Rahman, H. Kumar, R. Mahajan, P. Basu and D. Gupta.

The Inter-House Cricket Tournament was keenly contested and the trophy was won by Lawrence House.




Our annual gymnastics display was held on the 22nd of May and we were honoured to have as our Chief Guest, Maj. Gen. S. C. Ghosh.





JUNIOR WING NOTES










Scenes from the visit to Prima



CHAPEL NOTES

The commencement of the year saw the retirement of Bishop Amritanand as Bishop of Calcutta and in the installation of Bishop Gorai (formerly of Barrackpore) as the new Bishop of Calcutta, and Chairman of the Board of Governors. To Bishop Amritanand goes our fondest regards and gratitude for the keen interest he took in our school and chapel services over the years. To Bishop Gorai we extend a warm welcome.

Opening of term services were held on 14th March for boys in the Junior and Senior Wings, and on 26th March for the Primary Wing boys.

Tragedy struck us on the night of 17th April when our efficient and popular caterer, Mr. Desmond Martin, asphixiated by carbon monoxide poisoning in his quarters, the result of a 'sigri' in a closed room. The tragedy was intensified when we discovered that two young Mount Hermon teacher trainees, Dion Farquahar and Dale Godoin had also been in his room that night and had suffered the same fate. The boys and staff kept vigil over the three bodies on the night of the 18th in the school chapel. A funeral service was held on the 19th for Desmond at the chapel of Our Lady of the Snows conducted by the Jesuit fathers of North Point. Our grateful thanks to Rev. Johnston and the staff of Mount Hermon for their help and understanding, as also to father Prabhu, SJ, and Father Sharma, SJ, of North Point for helping with the funeral services and arrangements. To the families of each of these youngmen go our heartfelt sorrow and sympathy in their angiush.

Memorial services were also read for P. K. Saraf, (OP-'78) who was tragically murdered in Calcutta and Mr. V. C. Lall (OP-'37) who passed away in Delhi. We also read the memorial service for Mr. A. R. Gupta, Principal of Mayo College, who passed away in Ajmer. In September we heard of the peaceful demise in Siliguri of Mr. C. K. Bhattacharya who had been our school accountant for over 30 years, and who retired in 1974. The school mourned the loss of an old and trusted friend. Memorial prayers were also said for Canon K. O. LeBlond and Bishop Foss Westcott in September and October, respectively.

The highlight of this year's chapel events was the inauguration of the Primary Wing buildings. A special service was devised, with the help of Bishop Ghose of Darjeeling and the service was conducted by Bishop Gorai of Calcutta. The P. W. choir sang beautifully and, on the lovely bright morning that

it was, the buildings looked impressive. To Rector and Mrs. Dang go the credit for this splendid achievement in so short a space of time. On 26th September dedicatory prayers were read for the inauguration of the first squash court at St. Paul's, declared open by Mr. Atal, Chairman of Mcleod Russel Company.

Our guest speakers at Chapel this year included the Rev. Noel Sen, vicar of St. John's Church, Calcutta, Father P. Thorman, Superior of the Oxford Mission at Calcutta, Mr. N. J. Kamath and old Paulites, Jehangir Patel, Mr. Peter Holroyd-Smith, and Noel Sarkar.

Holy communion services were held on Friday mornings whenever we were able to get the services of a visiting priest. Here we would specially like to thank Bishop Ghose who always finds time to serve us communion whenever he is in station.

Commemoration service was held on 24th October, and the choir, ably conducted by our choirmaster, sang a lovely anthem. Father Thorman conducted the service. On 3rd October the School Band played the entire matins service, a refreshing change in our normal Sunday matins service. This year we brought in more Evensong services on Sunday, especially during the cricket season, and this was a pleasant re-introduction into the chapel services. Our End-of-term carol services went off smoothly in all three wings with some refreshingly 'modern' carols and songs to ring in the festive mood.

This year Primary Wing were able to hold a weekly service in the chapel every Friday morning (after Holy Communion) and here our special thanks are due to Mr. Denzil Prince for so ably and willingly stepping forward to help conduct these services. For the Junior Wing we were able to increase the amount of music in their services with the help of Mr. Rufus Paul and Mrs. Moneesha Chaudhuri who shared the organ playing for the J.W. chapel services. At the end of this year we bid farewell to Mr. Rufus Paul, our Pionoforte Teacher and Organist. Mr. Paul has played the organ for us for seven years and we are going to miss his talents sorely. Thank you, Mr. Paul, for all your help over the years.

For many years we have long wanted a school Hymn Book that would, in one volume, incorporate the canticles, selected psalms, hymns and carols. This year, under the inspiration of the Rector and the enthusiastic support of the Board of Governors, we were able to compile our first ever St. Paul's School Hymn Book to include all aspects of song in our chapel services. Our school prayer books have been rebound and, after over ten years of service in their present form, need to be replaced. We envisage a new Prayer Book in modern English to be in line with new trends being set by the CNI. We have requested Bishop Robinson, now in retirement at Delhi, to help us with a new edition.

Our chapel wardens this year were Anil Welinkar and Rajiv Mahajan, both of whom have served the chapel for many years with love and dedication. Our grateful thanks also to the school 'malis' who keep the chapel flowers in such excellent display.

He has, however, sent his best wishes to all of you and hopes to see a number of you up in Darjeeling in May when the Association will be sending a contingent of sportsmen to play friendly festival cricket, squash, Eton Fives and other matches against the school teams.

Our thanks are due to Mr. S. V. S. Naidu, a Vice-President of our Association, who chaired the Annual General Meeting. As long as we have people like him to give advice and counsel in charting our course, the future of the Old Paulite Association is assured.

In conclusion, I personally wish to express my gratitude and thanks to all the members of the outgoing Committee who have supported me even though I was unable to devote the usual time in running the affairs of your Association. Thank you for your understanding, all of you, and I appeal to all others to be active Old Paulites and serve your Association.


