







### RECTOR'S LETTER, 1983


In the annals of St. Paul's School 1983 will probably be best remembered as the year when St. Paul's School matured beyond our traditional aims and achievement of good manners, high sense of discipline, good all round education, sports and games and co-curricular activities, and good character, to altogether different levels and dimensions of outstanding scholastic and academic achievement. Academic excellence and high public examination performance had never been the professed aim of the older tradition of St. Paul's School nor had these been our realistic ability. Nor, to be quite frank, is it still or now our major aim or target. This is what makes 1983 and the results of the ICSE Examination, and particularly, the ISC Examination, so commendable and memorable that without sacrificing any of our traditional ethos we were able this year to get the best results in India in the ISC Examination.

The goals of a boarding, or a residential school, as I prefer to call it, apart from what we have reiterated above are richness and variety and a 'serious philosophical commitment' to education in the broadest sense of intellectual and moral, physical and emotional growth, responsible citizenship, a code of values on ethics, channelling all resources towards individual student learning, counselling and growth and nurture of every talent.

What are the advantages of living at school away from home? Beyond the aim of an excellent academic achievement is the whole range of experiences without the classroom in a liberally controlled environment through the adolescent years to provide reflexive skills and decision making, self-knowledge and self-reliance and independent living tempered with co-operation and mutual respect.

St. Paul's School, today, provides all these and outstanding academic orientation with all, even if we do not always retain our position of pre-eminence of 1983 in terms of examination results, it has been a heart-warming and controlling experience on the staff and the parent body and the Board of Governors to know that St. Paul's School could do it even if it took us one hundred and twenty years to do so.

To make sure that we do not become complacent and to overcome any possible complacency, for 1984 we hope to think in

terms of increasing our facilities and covered space through a Centenary Endowment Fund which should also enable us to make our school accessible to the children not only of the rich or the not so rich but increasingly to the children of hard working honest people of modest means.

In this effort which will proceed simultaneously with our efforts to streamline the administration and financial controls and school systems so far based upon of a paternalistic outlook we shall not forego our academic focus and traditional ethos, nor shall we be able to do without continuing co-operation which we have always received from our parents and the partners in our educational process.

The Rector addressed the congregation and exhorted the leavers not to be influenced by superficial things of life but to remember the training they had here and to strive hard to succeed in the world at large. The service was followed by the farewell dinner at which Mr Champak Chatterjee. IAS, Deputy Commission, Darjeeling, and Mrs Chatterjee, IAS, were the Chief Guests. Mrs Chatterjee gave away the Old Paulite cravats and souvenirs to the passing out class. Mr Chatterjee, speaking to the leavers, said that they were going to get a lot of freedom outside the school and that freedom they must learn not to misuse. He also said that the sine qua non of the leavers should be to learn how to be a good loser as they had learned in the school how to be a good winner for they will probably face defeat more often outside the school than they had within it. Also present at the farewell dinner were Brig. Pranab Dutt, Commandant, 11 GRRC, Gol Negi and Maj. Achutan, and their wives.

The ISC boys left for home on March 26th.

In keeping with our contemporary thought and the rapid developments in science and technology St. Paul's has acquired, thanks to Rector's efforts, its first computer for the much dreamed of Computer Centre. It was installed in the Physics laboratory in the Lefroy Building on the 30th May, much earlier than most of us thought it would be possible. We have gone in for an MMC 101 type computer manufactured by Machinery Manuacturers Corporation (Digital Systems) of Mahindra and Mahindra Ltd. The deal also includes training facilities for staff and boys starting on 7th June. The formal inauguration of the Computer Centre was held in August this year.

One more laboratory— the Language Laboratory—is being established at St. Paul's. The basic aim of the language laboratory is to improve the spoken language, especially English and French, but all languages in general, of our students. A student working in a language laboratory perfects his language through listening and repeating and for this he is given pre-recorded tapes with specially devised drills and exercises meant to improve his enunciation, syntax and pronunciation. The audioactive comparative language laboratory which we hope to get in a 10-booth configuration will have a special feature of the student's twin-channel taperecorder enabling him to listen to the master programme as well as to his own recording, simultaneously.

On May Day we had cubs and scouts rallies and the Pioneer-Award boys went on expeditions. The Rector presided over the closing ceremony of the Scouts' Rally at which he was welcomed with Grand Howl. After he had given away the certificates, the Rector spoke to scouts and their scoutmasters. He said, "On this day I remember with affection and respect my friend and a Governor of St. Paul's, the late Bishop Bryan, who was the guiding spirit behind the cubs and scouts movement in West Bengal. Ours is the oldest troopCarmichael's Own—and we are proud of its achievements. Just as academics and accomplishment in music are important in your lives scouting is also essential in teaching you what life really means. All these and what you learn from jungle life, like stalking and hunting, have one important lesson to teach. Gandhi and Jesus Christ had many things in common but what impresses me most from their lives is their love for their fellowmen and their personal example of truthfulness, compassion and forgiveness. I am also reminded of what Dr Karan Singh said at a conference in Kathmandu recently. He said that the world had tremendously advanced in knowledge but not in wisdom; wisdom consists of compassion, of feeling for others and of love. I would ask you to think about Gandhi and Jesus Christ and try to emulate them."



Air Vice Marshal Suri at the Annual Gymnastics Display




Many boys of SW and JW and teachers attended a performance of the musical, Annie, on 29th July at Loreto, Convent School.






The school played host to some teachers and boys of the Assam Rifles' Public School, Laitkor, Shillong, for a couple of days during the Puja break.

The school reopened after the Puja break on October 18th.



The PW Carol Service was marked by cherubic singing and later the boys, guests and staff sang Auld Lang Syne around a bonfire.







### THE ANNUAL SPEECH DAY, 1983

The 160th Speech Day of the School was celebrated on 11th October, beginning with the Commemoration Service in the morning. The Chief Guest at the Prize Giving was Mr Siddhartha Shankar Ray, former Union Education Minister. The Rector, Mrs Dang, the Senior Master, and the Head of the Junior Wing received Mr and Mrs Ray on their arrival and then the Rector introduced the Chief Guest to the members of staff. The programme began with the singing of the School song. It was followed by the Annual Report presented by the Rector. Excepts from the speech are given below:

Mr Siddhartha Shankar Ray, Mrs Maya Ray, distinguished visitors, parents of the School, members of the staff and boys, I welcome you to the 160th Annual Speech Day of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling. This makes 120 years that we have been functioning as St. Paul's School from Darjeeling and dwarfed against this scale, I complete today only my sixth year as Rector.

The Chairman of the Board of Governors, the Rt. Rev. D.C. Gorai, Bishop of Calcutta and the Moderator of the Church of North India, has conveyed to us his good wishes and blessings as he is not able to be with us today, having recently visited us for a meeting of the Board last month We are grateful to the Rt. Rev. John Ghose, the Bishop of Darjeeling, and to Mr Champak Chatterjee, the Deputy Commissioner, members of the Board of Governors normally residing in Darjeeling who have conveyed their good wishes but are not with us today. Similar messages of goodwill and support have been received from other members of the Board who are pre-occupied with their own Board meetings, or are away on tour. We extend our felicitations to Dr A. K. Das, erstwhile Deputy Director of Secondary Education (Anglo-Indian Schools), a member of our Board of Governors, who has recently been promoted as Joint Director of Secondary Education and who made a visit to be with us at our Sports Day, but had to return yesterday. We are grateful to Mr C. P. Philipose, Finance Director of Shalimar Paints, and to Col. D. K. Khullar, Principal, the Himalayan Mountaineering Institute, Darjeeling, members of our Board, who are here with us today. We would also like to congratulate Bishop Ghose, on his hectic and successful tour of Scotland and Britain this summer.

Speech Day is an occasion for rememberance and thanksgivin. We express our gratitude to our Founders, past Rectors and
Governors, erstwhile members of staff and Old Paulites, acknowledging their services and dedication to the School which make it
possible for us to flourish today. We especially remember our
greatest Rector, Mr. Leslie Goddard, and his family, and pray for
them. It was good to hear that they were back in their home at
'Jalapahar' in England after Mrs Maisie Goddard's recovery from
illness.

Much has transpired in our School since I took up this podium precisely six years ago, to stand before you as the Rector-designate and made some ambitious and pious resolutions. In this, my sixth Annual Report, I am happy to be able to affirm that many of those resolutions have been successfully implemented, and also to regret that many promises are yet to be fulfilled. Through the seemingly endless paragraphs of this Rector's Report on Speech Day will be found evidence of progress and assurance of continuing effort for the future.

If last year we met with a unique sense of achievement and progress over the 'hardware' improvements in the School buildings, and completion and occupation of the Primary Wing complex of three blocks dedicated at the inauguration by our Chairman, the Rt. Rev. D. C. Gorai, to the Most Rev. Metropolitan Lakdasa de Mel, the Most Rev. Metropolitan A. N. Mukherji, and a friend of the School, Bishop R. W. Bryan, today we share with you with a sense of pride and confidence our 'software' achievements, in that the result of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, at the + 2 Class XII I.S.C. public examination in March this year were the best in India, and the softest of 'softwares', the character and personality of our outgoing boys, gives us satisfaction in their progress.

We are still hoping to put up another floor on the East Block to provide a spacious auditorium for the Primary Wing which is urgently needed for rainy months. Similarly, the Junior Wing needs an additional block of classrooms and a science laboratory. The equipment for this J. W. science Lab. has been generously endowed to an amount of Rs. 50,000/- by the firm of Dabur of Calcutta and Delhi, whose generations of boys have studied at St. Paul's School. The rest of the resources required for this Junior Wing Block will also have to be raised through the generosity of parents.

Another exciting achievement, which brings to our boys the contemporary micro-processor technology, in the Computer Centre with word - processor and printer, is the use and functioning of which numerous of our staff and, at a more rudimentary level, the students, have been trained-up at regular classes for nearly 3 months by an expert teacher, Mr. B Philipowsky, who has now, unfortunately, decided to return to Germany. The training he has imparted to our teachers will now in turn become part of our training to our boys in the use of computer technology, and we are grateful to the parents and well-wishers who have presented this computer to us at a cost of nearly Rs. 2½ lakhs.

The Finance Advisory Committee and the Special Advisory Committee both have just gone into the financial perspectives of the School for the next 20 years and parents will be relieved to learn that there will be no enhancement of the board and tution; fees for next year, in spite of the continuing inflationary trends and rising cost of living and prices of essential commodities and services. For the fourth year in succession, the budget this year is expected to be viable, with appropriate statutory provisions of depreciation, gratuity and other funding. One contributory positive factor in enabling us to plan and, to a greater extent, though still inadequately, control expenditure in our system and to improve finance and accounting, has been the opening of a full-fledged bank branch of the State Bank of India in St. Paul's School earlier this year. They will next year move into the new State Bank Branch building being constructed by the School and expected to be ready by next March. There is continuing need for economy and greater financial control and scrutiny, and this is now being pursued.

Though community service is a subjective educational need, in Darjeeling there is greater need for a substantial contribution to the improvement of the environment for an exclusively residential school like ours. St. Paul's School must do, and be perceived by the people of Darjeeling as doing something constructive and useful for them.

I had mentioned in my report last year the ambitious Aloobari Project. At that stage we were only thinking of a dairy project which could help in providing employment opportunities to the growing population of our own domestic staff families. Though there has been a delay in this project, which was scheduled for 1984, and

though we were still considering it, and it has not been given up, another project which appears to be moving faster towards possibly successful implementation, with the same aim of benefitting the people of Darjeeling, and providing on a much larger scale opportunities for employment of a more sophisticated nature, is the ambitious electronics project which we are recently now following up. This could be the beginning of a major thrust to the economy of Darjeeling. I will be speaking to parents personally about this; it is a Rs. 3.6 crore project in which the investment would not only be in a good cause, being guided by some of us from St. Paul's School. Darjeeling, in our individual capacities, as co-promoter with the help of the authorities and professionals, but also provide a valuable and profitable opportunity of investment in a 'backward area' industry, with tax and other benefits to the investors. It is important that some of us at St. Paul's School, in our individual capacities, ourselves through honorary and voluntary effort help in the development of the economy of Darjeeling, as is being done in different spheres by the Alumni Association of a neighbouring school.

St. Paul's School is an expensive, feecharging school but we have progressively tempered this elitism and privilege-base with Government of India Merit Scholars and a scholar ship—and bursary system. I am happy that the Board of Governors at their last meeting have approved of the selection of one merit scholar every year (or two every two years) from the hill subdivision of Darjeeling from a 'disadvantaged' means-based family background, who will be offered 12 years of completely free schooling at St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, to be known as "St. Paul's School Bhanubhakta Acharya Scholar" for which a committee is being formed by the Bishop of Darjeeling. These boys will be admitted at the age of six into Class I only.

I would like to share with you all our happiness at the completion of the silver jublee of dedicated service to the School of Mr A.K. Lahiri of the Bengli Department and Mr R. P. Tamang of the Bursary. To both I would like to offer our warmest congratulations and good wishes.

I would like to accord a warm welcome to all those who joined us this year.

After the Rector's report the prizes were given away by Mrs Maya Ray. The Chief Guest then addressed the gathering. In this short but impressive speech, Mr, Siddhartha Shankar Ray, expressed his happiness at visiting St. Paul's again after many years. He recalled his first visit in 1957 when he was a young minister in the West Bengal cabinet headed by Dr B. C. Roy Dr Roy was the Chief Guest at the Speech Day in 1957 but owing to some pressing reason he could not come to St. Paul's. He had then asked Mr Ray to be the Chief Guest saving that St. Paul's was one of the finest institutions of India and he had a great regard for it. Since his first visit to St. Paul's Mr Ray said, he has been keenly interested in it and has watched its progress with great happiness. Mr Ray's nephew, Sanjit, passed out of St. Paul's in 1976 and presently a grandnephew is here in the PW. Mr Ray exhorted the boys to remember that they are getting the opportunity of education and training in a great institution and that they have to prove to themselves, their families and the larger families that are West Bengal and India that they are worthy citizens of this country. He also said that our School Song teaches us to have courage, to move upward and to fight on and so we should strive and persevere and never think of honours which will certainly follow in due course.

Mr Ray spoke about the need and importance of English in our daily life and how we cannot do without it no matter our job is. The knowledge of English is also essential for us being world citizens.

While concluding, Mr Ray congratulated all those who had received prizes and then he had a word of encouragement for those who had not for he believed in the philosophy of the Gita, "Work is more important than the reward.

Mr C.P. Philipose, Director (Finance), Shalimar Paints, Ltd, a governor of St. Paul's School, proposed a vote of thanks and the celebrations ended with the singing of the National Anthem.








A Scene from Havelock House Concert




the Inter-Class singing attainments. I'm sure in the tuture years our experiment of having every boy of the Junior Wing take part in this type of music activity will bear fruit.

Mrs Aruna Sunderlal the mezzo-soprano from Calcutta along with her accompanist enthralled us at an evening programme of delightful singing in the chapel under the title 'The Joy Of Music'. This presentation was in the form of a lecture - cumrecital. Mrs Sunderlal excelled in her presentation and had her young audience swaying and rocking with her spirituals. On the Sunday that followed her recital she as the guest singer was at the choral matins service when she sang for the congregation 'Just a Closer Walk With Thee'. What a beautiful and moving experience it was for the adult members! Her accompanist Mr Conrad Mathews played our chapel Hammond during the service which kept our choristers in the choir loft spellbound.



Professor Michel Rumi Vachha, an Old student of the school, and a concert pianist from the Conservatorio Di Musica Santa Cecilia (Roma), took the school by storm when he performed an evenings concert programme for music lovers and Paulites on Sunday, 11th September, Michel, who was accompanied by his father, became an overnight runaway success with the Sixth Form and our young generation of pianists. Michel's technical manipulation at the keyboard and incredible speed were the talk of the campus for well over a month. However the older and mature music lovers while appreciating the young artists aplomband skill kept their comments to a low key especially with musical themes that were well known to them and they failed to recognise in Michel's interpretation. Michel's programme will be long remembered by Paulites of this era.

At a second performance on Monday, 12th September, Michel proved his talent to a selected audience of senior Paulites by performing a concert with Mr Bhanu Roy, our gifted sitarist and head of the Indian Music Department. What a thrilling experience it was to watch these two excellent artists match each other sound for sound. While all the delicate quarter-tones of the sitar are not possible to produce on a pianoforte the main Raga or theme set by Mr Roy on the Sitar was very ably reproduced by Mr Vachha on the pianoforte. Considering they had rehearsed for just under a two hour time limit it was well worth the experiment for 'East Meets West' or as the master-of-ceremonies so aptly introduced them to the audience it was' Bengal Meets Roma'.

Tuesday, 27th September, found all Paulites and music lovers from the town assembled in the concert auditorium to hear another brilliant concert pianist, Dr Adi Gazder. Here was music interpretation at its finest. Dr Gazder being the sensitive music critic who reviews the concert scenes in Calcutta every week and who gets to meet every visiting artist from abroad knows just how to avoid mistakes that sometimes become routine or common to performing artists particularly the pianoforte on which he excels. We had numerous occasions to talk music over a cupof tea in the MCR and I am indebted to the doctor for his suggestions and advice for the improvement of our music standards.

We would like to thank these three music guests who found time from their busy schedule in the big cities to come over to St. Paul's to entertain and to expand our musical horizons. While bidding farewell to the Sixth Form students of the school choir, band and orchestra who have been my 'joy' and 'headache' for seven wonderful years of music and experiments, far too numerous to mention, I add an even fonder one to my musical mentor, Mrs Moneesha Chaudhuri, who has decided definitely to move away from St. Paul's at the end of term. 
With 1983 drawing to its inevitable close, I have been given an opportunity to reflect on the art and craft departments and to assess the achievements of this year.

The Anil Chaudhuri Art Prize Examination this year was conducted in April with 53 participants from differnt houses of the Senior Wing. Bhagwan Nagrani and Lalthanzuala were crowned the Artists of the year. But the water colour paintings done by others were also very good. Sarosh Pradhan and Sasheesh Prasad's names are worth mentioning in this respect.

The number of boys this year doing painting, batik and woodwork was very encouraging. As many as 230 tireless strivers produced many fascinating water colours, oils, graphics, batik paintings and innumerable wood carvings of a very high standard. The art and craft departmet gives an opportunity to 75% of the children to express their creative urge by encouraging them to opt for one or more branches.

With the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme activities like SUPW, craft services and hobbies are on the whole year and now three sections are bubbling with one or the other creative activity since morning till quiet hours.







# THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD SCHEME

The Duke's Award, initiated last year, caught on with full gusto this year. There were sixty-seven entrants at the Bronze Stage, fifty at the Silver Stage and forty-eight at the Gold Stage. With this response we were bound to run into organisational problems.

However, with the help from the entrants and the Adult Helpers we crossed most hurdles. Hours of paper-work, chart making, talks and training for the different fields of the Award went into the ground work at St. Paul's.

The Darjeeling Award Authority was revised and it now functions from St. Paul's School with Rector as the Adviser and Mr P. C. Mall as Secretary. Mt Hermon School and St. Joseph's College have also restarted this scheme which is now functioning smoothly after a lapse of six years.

From the beginning it was felt that the Service Section would be weak and so we tried to strengthen it. Today this section has been based an many activities and next year we will have fewer problems for those who have to look after this particular section.

This umbrella scheme has co-ordinated the varied and large number of activities in our school and we would like to express our gratitude to all Adult Helpers, too numerous to name individually, and to all entrants who have helped us at every stage of this scheme. There were moments of despair, personally for me, but the clouds were blown away by quiet understanding on the part of all concerned. Their kindness provided the impetus to carry on not to quit but to achieve - the core philosophy of the scheme. It is after all a challenge to the entrant himself and also to the Adult Helper who gives his time and organises the activity and ensures the standards. Both, we feel, have done a good job.

With the Youth Award leaders like Tashi Tshering, Himraj Dang and Sanjay Jain, we could ask for little else and as they worked towards their Award they provided the necessary leadership for the younger entrants. The success of the scheme this year is solely due to them.

Rector must be specially thanked for giving us the benefit of his experience he had had with this scheme and with the President's Scheme, of which he is the pioneer. He has been our source of strength in all fields and he has always dealt effectively with all the problems we were beset with

Four activities must be pursued at the Bronze, Silver and Gold stages. At the Gold Stage a fifth activity is added. These are under the broad headings of service, skills and interests (which may also include hobbies). physical activity (including games and sports) and

expedition. The fifth field at the Gold stage is the Residential Project.

Service: This was our weak point and we offered life saving, first aid, care of the ill, care of animals, fire fighting, community work, teaching (Bronze and Silver stages only), and mountain rescue.

First aid, teaching, life-saving and fire fighting functioned this year. Many of the entrants qualified in these. Next year under the Pioneer-Award Scheme this section will be further strengthened.

In mountain rescue our boys put up an almost professional demonstration for the NCC. The Director, NCC, mentioned that we were competent enough to train army Jawans in this technique. Tashi Tshering and Jamling Tenzing trained the boys, especially in the ropework aspect of this activity. We are grateful to Col. D. K. Khullar, Principal of the Himalayan Mountaineering Institute, Darjeeling, and Mr Dorji Lhatoo, a famous climber and instructor at the HMI, for training these boys. We would like to congratulate them for being chosen the leader and member, respectively, of the 1984 Everest Expedition.

Skill and interests: Here we made use of the multifarious activities at our school. Music alone had many areas and then we had painting, batik, woodwork, lathe-work, philately, dramatics (in four anguages), debating, fishing, natural history, ornithology, lepidoptery, calligraphy, cooking and many more. Here we faced no problems and all entraints have qualified.

Physical activity: We were quite strong in this activity for we had atheletics, swimming, hockey, football, squash racquets, Eton Fives, table-tennis, badminton, vollyball, basketball, tennis, boxing and gymnastics to offer. Most of our boys had little difficulty in measuring up to the standards in their chosen activity.

Expeditions: This means two days and one night for the Bronze, three days and two nights for the Silver, and four days and three nights for the Gold, to be spent out of doors after the initial training. We started off with the Bronze entrants and sent out ten groups of four to six boys and fifty-seven boys in all on 14th and 15th May. All group but one qualified and most achieved a high standard of excellence. Another two groups of six each went out and qualified for the Bronze after the Half-yearly Examination in

July and fifteen who had done their adventure courses at the N. I. M., Uttarkashi, and H. M. I., Darjeeling, qualified. In the May holidays three qualified for Bronze and three for Silver awards after completing the exacting expedition of the Neora Valley traverse. This was 'Operation Overkill' really but our boys did well. Govind Menon did very well on the traverse. This expedition was led by Col. Khullar, the leader designate of the 1984 Everest Expedition. Four boys qualified in the Gold Award expedition in Kalikhola, Bhutan, where we had gone on royal invitation to fish.

As the school closed for winter vacation, another seven boys of the Sixth Form went out on expeditions, three to Sandakphu and back, and four who went on from Sandakphu to Uttaray in Sikkim deserve congratulations for their courage and tenacity in managing on their own with absolutely no help at all. They were Mahesh Chhetri, Himraj Dang, Sujoy Dey and Ramanava Sengupta. This trek will now be our Gold Award trek after pioneering work.

The 2nd of November was a red letter day in the history of St. Paul's School when Tashi Tshering was given the Gold Award from St. Paul's. He was followed by Himraj Dang who won his Gold Award in November.

Residential Projects: These are presently being completed at the skiing course at Gulmarg, Naosena Darshan course at Cochin. and adventure courses at NIM, Uttarkashi, and HMI, Darjeeling.






The year 1983 proved very fruitful for table-tennis at St. Paul's. The table-tennis team, under the inspiring leadership of K. Chiang,

# **EXPEDITIONS**

# THE GOLD AWARD EXPEDITION

The lure of lovely snows, the love of freezing cold and the passion for tortured tendons adding to the post-exam hangover,

and, of course, the intense aversion to routine idling and eating in the holidays sent us packing straight after GHD into a very "cool scene" for the Gold Award expedition.

Starting late from Manebhanjang we spent the first night at Gairebas beyond Tonglu with just fleeting glimpses and a lovely feeling of freedom.

Sandakphu in the 12,000's was a trying and tiring experience. Lots of insane short-cuts and the ups-and-downs of a hard day found us excited with lovely views of Everest and Kanchenjunga and splendid conifer forests. We parted company as planned; Tashi, Glenn and Ajoy returning via Rombick, Arindam, Ajoy and Sanjoy Bose returning the way we had come and Mahesh, Sujoy, Ramnava and I carrying on.

The most beautiful part of the trek was the 24 kms to Phalut again in the 12,000's and above the tree-line. We passed through lovely rhododendron and spruce forests, dotted with picturesque tarns, and abounding in finches and thrhshes. What a track! The last climb took the wind out of our sails. The snows were inviting Everest and Nepal on the left and Kanchenjunga and Sikkim dead ahead. The water we drank, too, had a delicious tang to it.

Starting the following morning at 5.30 we crossed the mighty Singalola Peak (13,000's) which is at the trijunction of Nepal, Sikkim and W. B. with memories of belligerent yaks and thick yak milk.

On a short-cut in trying to bypass Chiabhanjang we got well and truly lost. We followed a stream in the valley through heavy scrub for over 5 hours and spent the night amidst tall hemlock stands, in a beat-up yak hut. We jammed in through those rhododendron thickets that looked pretty from above and blazed a path right down to Ultare (5000's) in Sikkim. Rector and Mr Mall picked us up 3 miles beyond and took us to Pemianchi where we gorged ourselves - the one visible way of expressing return to natural habitat.

It was a thrilling first experience for all four of us who completed the circuit which, had we not been disorganized and alone, would not have been that fulfilling. The trek did set a high standard for the 1984 Gold aspirants for we learnt our bearing on physical and mental strength.

## NAOSENA DARSHAN

We arrived at the headquarters of the Southern Naval Command, situated on Wellington Island, off the coast of Cochin, on the evening of 13th December.

Amongst the last to report at the Naval Academy, we were shown to our rooms, or cabins, as they are called in the navy. We were addressed by the Commanding Officer of NAVAC (Naval Academy), Capt. Virendra Singh, in the auditorium, where we also met boys from the Lawrence School, Sanawar, the Lawrence School, Lovedale, and the Doon School, Dehradun. We were then divided into three divisions, each under a lieutenant of the navy.

After breakfast, the next day, we were taken to INS Dronacharya, a training establishment on land. (All nava establishments are called INS, Indian Naval Ship). The Commanding Officer of INS Dronacharya briefed us for a couple of minutes after which the groups left for small arms firing, Seacat room trainer and anti-aircraft firing. Under the small arms category we fired the sten gun and the Smith and Wessen police revolvers. The Seacat room trainer was intriguing. An image of an aircraft was projected on to the screen by a computer and one had to train the image of the Seacat missile on the aircraft. After lunch boys of both the Lawrence Schools went yachting while Doscos and Paulites boarded the Vahak for a tour of the island. A slide show entitled, Lure of the Sea, was screened later in the evening. After the show we left for the residences of the Commanding Officers of the various establishments at the academy where we were invited to dinner.

We left for INS Garuda, a naval air establishment, the next morning. We visited the workshops where the Aluette and Seacat helicopter pads are put together. We were then taken, six at a time, to the Seacat simulator which is used in training Seacat pilots. We were told that the simulator costs thrice as much as an actual helicopter. After a briefing on safety drill we were then taken up in the air, four at a time, in Aluette helicopters for an aerial view of the island.

On the 16th we visited the School of Maritime War Tactics (SMWT). It is here that the navy actually 'plays games' of war. There are simulators, exact replicas of the birdge of a ship, which are entrusted to four cadets who solve tactical problems in an actual

simulated situation. The diving school which we visited next was fascinating. It is here that the cadets of the NAVAC are taught deep sea diving. The museum of the diving school contained exhibits as rare as the salvaged wheels of the ill-fated Air-India plane, Emperor Ashoka, different types of corals and various other interesting items.

What came next was the highlight of the whole trip. We boarded INS Nilgiri for a sea sortie to the Laccadive Islands. For most of us it was the first ever sea sortie while for others it was the first ever aboard an Indian Navy vessel. Hence the excitement was great. Another frigate accompanied us for about thirty knots and carried out various exercises which included shuttling some of the boys from INS Nilgiri to the other ship and back by means of a pulley called jackstay while the ships were on constant move.

We travelled throughout the night and arrived in Kadmat, capital of the Laccadives, early next morning. We spent the day on the island, swimming in the lagoon and beachcombing. Once again embarking the ship we travelled throughout the night to a neighbouring island, Bingaram, more beautiful than Kadmat. This island was occupied by Germans during the second world war and the houses built by them are still the only permanent structures there. The island is less than a kilometre wide and less than two in length and is full of coconut groves. The day was spent snorkelling and swimming in the crystal clear water that constantly washes the island's white sandy beaches.

A film was screened in the night on the helicopter deck. The helicopter, carried on the ship, is an Aluette. During war it is used mainly for anti-submarine purposes. Landing and taking off from the ship are extremely difficult tasks which are made to look easy by the expert pilot in the cockpit.

We disembarked at Cochin harbour on the 19th. In the evening there was a farewell dinner hosted by the Cochin Sailing Club. It was there that we met Lt Sandhu, an Aluette pilot, and the first Indian Naval officer to step on the Antarctic, and the Asian gold medallist yachtsman, Farooque Tarapore.

Thus ended a trip which will remain a colourful memory highlighted by colourful experience at NAVAC and on the Laccadive Islands. Thanks to the Rector for arranging Naosena Darshan for us and to Vice-Admiral Tahiliani, FOC-in-C, Southern Command, and his staff, and the Commanding Officer of NAVAC and his staff.

#### SKIING AT GULMARG

Twelve of us from St. Paul's participated in a three week skiing course at Gulmarg in the winter holidays. The course was extremely enjoyable and all of us were able to attain a commendably high standard in the sport of skiing.

We met in New Delhi and put up at the Youth Hostel in Chanakyapuri. That very evening we attended an Old Paulites' gathering at the house of Puran Sawhney (Cl-'37). There we met many old Paulites of the recent years. The next day we visited the Dabur factory at Sahibabad, near Delhi, which is owned by the Burmans, Old Paulites of the 1960's vintage—courtesy: Anand Burman. At the end of the tour of the factory Anand presented us each with a packet of the Dabur products.

On the 17th February we reached Srinagar by the Indian Airlines Airbus. The twelve of us comprised Mr S. M. Pradhan, Mr C. Watson, Tashi Tshering, Mahesh Chhetri, Sailesh Pradhan, Vikram Dutta, Sanjeev Jaiswal, Ajoy Bose, Sanjay Jain, Bhagwan Nagrani, Sanjoy Bose and myself. Rector also accompanied us and spent four days with us. From Srinagar we travelled in TCI cars to Tanmarg from where we took landrovers equipped with chains for Gulmarg. There was heavy snow on both sides of the road which was soon cleared by a mechanical snow cutter.

Gulmarg was quite a revelation to us and the 8 feet snow was quite a novelty for us. The only sore point there was our accommodation which was a ramshackle building called the Tourist Hostel. It was the headquarters of the institute and lacked basic amenities. Rector was invited by the Principal of the High Altitude Warfare School, Col. Surat Singh, and offered the use of sleeping bags by all of us. This help was welcome indeed:

The next day we were issued some light equipment consisting of snow goggles, ski boots and Austrian skis and ski-sticks. In the afternoon we tried just the very basics of skiing on the main road. By 18th evening most of the other trainees had also arrived bringing

the total number of trainees to 83.

Saturday proved quite trying as we lumbered up a nursery slope but we got a well deserved break on Sunday when we made it to Highlands Park Hotel, the heart of the skiing scene. Our longest trek was to Bhaleria Pass via Dodital. On the first day we trekked from Uttarkashi to Agoda. The next afternoon when we reached Dodital we found it was a beautiful lake of crystal clear water abounding in trout. We spent a day there.

The pass is at a height of 12,000 feet and is above the snowline. All of us had pineapple juice there at the pass and then we ran down to Dodital where a hot lunch was awaiting us. To this we did full justice. We did try to fish in the lake but without luck. It was a very cold night that we spent there and most of us had to sleep with all our clothes on.


On the last trek we had to go alone, cook our own food and to spend the night on our own. This was a strange experience and most of us braved the night without any mishap.





The boys put in a lot of effort for the Inter-House singing competetion. Thanks to the splendid performance by Samir Gidwani we were adjudjed the best House.


Solomon Cup has for some years remained out of our grasp but with the quality of our boys improving, I may be able to close next year's report by saying that we have at last achieved our goal.





The planted sloping shrubbery of camellias, junipers, azaleas, wisterias, etc., facing the quad brought forth their first blossom, as did rapidly grow the newly planted willow-bank behind North Block into a stretch of emerald green. The usual emphasis on class-room curriculum and following the syllabus certainly did not dent the spirits of the Primaries as school-life became more involved and hectic outside time-table hours. A six day week seemed not enough either to wash away the opening-of-term home sickness for one or two and discovering the joys of community living for others.

The Primary Wing offers opportunities for personal enrichment and strives to stimulate creativity and encourage independent study and growth. As confidence is established the personal contact grows with the term to promote and atmosphere of boy-teacher-house-master and Head relationship which is unique in its nature and understanding and so essential to a residential pattern of schooling.

For encouraging participation and excellence several House activities, societies and awards have been instituted as incentives and promoting an all-round character and personal development.

The faculty in the Primary Wing is of a special type, stemming from an awareness of child psychology. All academics and fieldwork at Primary Wing are governed by the motto and spirit "Moniti Meliora Sequamur" — Having been advised, let us follow the better path. Teachers collaborate closely with class students and House children. A caring spirit pervades the Primary School. Regular spotcheck of exercise-books, weekly-tests and assembly talks help

writing, spelling, tables and speech-training in the form of organised activities like essay competitions, recitation and elocution competitions, general knowledge and quiz competitions. Hesitation and limitations can be overcome by some students by coming into the limilight in at least one of the various activities as organised over the year, besides the usual studies, sports and games.

Regular class-room, dormitory and body-inspections kept up the cleanliness and hygiene standards over the year.

Drama, acting and music are inseparable parts of the Primary Wing education. "Pinocchio", the little wooden puppet, as he came alive on stage for the annual concert to the heart-rending music from the choir and the throbbing drum-beats given by a little Primary Wing boy, must have been a success if the applause that followed the curtain calls was the deciding factor.


Physical education, athletics programmes and sports and games were followed regularly in the early morning hours in the form of P.T. or a 'run' and in the afternoon as calendared according to the season. This developed such qualities as courage, confidence, self-discipline and sportsmanship. It is amazing how many reports in class achieved the "A" grade after a determined effort on the field.

The results and coverage of special Primary events can be read as individual reports written by staff-in-charge.





## OLD PAULITE ASSOCIATION CALCUTTA

#### ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1983-84

Last year it was our sad duty to report the loss of two distinguished Old Paulites who were Vice Presidents of the Association. Regretfully, in 1983 we also lost another very distinguished and much loved Vice President, who also had the distinction of being the oldest Old Paulite for a long time. I refer to Mrs Margaret Sam, who had shortly before her death, attained the rare landmark of celebrating her 100th birthday. Those of us who knew and dealt with Mrs Sam up in Darjeeling will recall affection the warmth and enthusiasm with which she received anyone and anything connected with St. Paul's School. Some of us will also recall that shortly before she left India to take up permanent residence in the UK with her daughter, Mrs Sam had entertained us at an OPA function with a song and dance routine which would have taxed the energy of much younger Old Paulites. Such love and devotion towards our Association belongs to only that rare breed of Old Paulites of whom Mrs Margaret Sam was an outstanding member. The Old Paulite Association is certainly the poorer with her passing away.

The most difficult task your Association always faces is being able to communicate with Old Paulites all over the world. As a result of this we are unable to established a two-day rapport of news and views between the Association and its members. In order to establish something concrete in this respect at a not too distant date, we had embarked a few years ago on compiling as register of known addresses of Old Paulites all over the world. However, it became apparent that without the help of a widely circulated newsletter it was an impossible task for us to achieve our objective. It was then that our President, Mr. Hari Dang, agreed to undertake the task through the School administration which was the obvious solution. As we await the completion of this list by the School, I would like to appeal to you to please let us have the names and addresses of any known Old Paulites, no matter where they may be. This will help us to supplement the list being prepared by the School. Once we have achieved this objective, your Committee can then decide how to establish an effective communication system to keep Old Paulites abreast of all happenings.

Speaking of communicating, a batch of Old Paulites under the leadership of Mr A N Roy, visited the School in May last year and our cricket team consisting mainly of veteran Old Paulites lost narrowly to the full school team. The visit was mainly sponsored by the Association and helped in maintaining a dialogue with the School. From all accounts, the Rector made special arrangements to ensure the success of the visit and we thanked him officially on behalf of the Association. We feel that regular visits of this sort should be encouraged.

We are pleased to inform you that we have sorted out our banking problems and have now established ourselves with the American Express International Banking Corporation. Therefore, we are now in a position to utilize Rs. 60,000/- from the funds for a separate scholarship fund which will enable us to endow the first scholarship at St. Paul's School of Rs. 6,000/- per annum to a deserving son of a deserving Old Boy from 1985 positively. That is an event we all look ahead to and it will be something done to help Old Paulites.

Last year we decided to have the Association registered under the Registration of Societies Act. We are pleased to report that all the necessary formalities have been completed and we believe that we shall obtain the final approval very shortly, once all the bureaucratic hurdles have been crossed. This step will enable the Association to establish a firm base here in Calcutta and open up further possibilities of starting branches elsewhere. The mention of branches brings to mind the Delhi Branch of your Association which is still doing sterling work under the stewardship of Puran Chand Sawhney, a senior Vice President of the OPA, in keeping all the Old Paulites in the Delhi area in touch with each other. We are still hoping that someone from Bombay and Madras will take the initiative in starting new Branches. One of our members put us in touch with a very enthusiastic bunch of Old Paulites in Hong Kong and now they have formed a Branch of their own. We hope this kind of enthusiasm will spread to other Asian cities like Bangkok and Dacca. The latter certainly has a sizeable population of Old Paulites dating back to forty years or more. If someone can help us in establishing these links, we shall be very grateful.

We held another very successful Annual Dinner last December where a great time was had by all those who attended. Rakesh

Casyab and his band of helpers did a grand job in making a success of the night and holding out promise of better things this year. It is always very pleasant to have guests from St. Paul's School with us at the Dinner, and we were very pleased to see Mr Hari Dang and his senior Masters with us on that evening. Mr Dang made a spirited appeal to the Old Paulites to help him with a fund-raising Jagjit and Chitra concert in Calcutta in aid of the SPS Centenary Endowment Fund. This concert was being held at the Kala Mandir on Friday, 16th of March and one of our members. A N Roy, put in a lot of hard work for the cause.

We also have the intention of organizing our own fundraising drive to raise sufficient funds to bolster our Scholarship Endowment Fund. For this purpose we need the dedication and resolve of a small band of volunteers to help us to implement the project. We have worked on this during 1983 but regretfully it fell through at the last minute due to lack of the kind of dedication it needed. We hope that some amongst you will rise to the occasion and give us the kind of help we need.

We are in a very sound financial position and there are sufficient funds available for any worthwhile ventures. That will be upto the new Committee to decide but we would welcome useful suggestions from you on this subject.

Our grateful thanks to Mr Raj Naidu, a Vice President of our Association, for having steered the Association through 1983 with his leadership and enthusiasm. I wish that some of the dedication of Old Paulites like him would rub off on the new generation of Old Paulites. The Association needs all of you and we seek your help and guidance in chartering the future course of events for the Old Paulite Association.

In conclusion, I personally wish to thank yet again all the members of the outgoing Committee who have supported me throughout the year in running the affairs of the Association. Thank you all for your time in attending the meetings and patience and I appeal to all others to spare a little of their time for the Association.

## MR GODDARD'S LETTER

'Jalapahar' 61, St. John's Road, Penn, High Wycombe Bucks. HP10 8HU

My dear Old Paulite,

Only a week or two ago, I received a letter from Hari Dang asking for a contribution to the Chronicle. I find I have not written since the 1980 Chronicle. It is most remiss of me.

There have been various reasons for my not having written. My wife has had three cataract operations and two bouts of bronchial pneumonia. But I'm glad to say she is now very well. However, the result has been I have had a lot of extra housework to do. And, as you can imagine, I am not very good at it. Moreover it takes a great deal of time and energy And the years continue to go past rapidly. Letter-writing gets more and more difficult and easier and easier to put off. Yet I have the feeling that my main problem is one of plain laziness!

But I really must put something together even though it is hurned. Whether it gets into the 1983 or 1984 Chronicle - or neither - remains to be seen.

My last letter covered fourteen pages. And that was for one year only! If I had the energy and the ability this might well turn into a book! One week they say in politics is a long time. Three years in the life of St. Paul's especially today must be an epoch!! But I will try to be as brief as possible.

First of all I will touch lightly on world events - that is if it is possible to touch lightly on such things. Reagan had only been President for a few months when an attempt was made on his life. Though he was hit in several places he seems to have come off lightly and was soon back in the White House. All the same it was a shattering event.

It was not long afterwards that a similar attempt was made on the life of the Pope in Rome. 1981 was a year for assassination attempts. Some stupid youth even fired some blank shots at the Queen in London as she was riding to the annual Trooping of the Colour on the Horse Guards Parade in June. That too was in 1981.

The Pope took longer to get over the attempt on his life than did the American President, but he was soon on his travels again. Pope John Paul II is nothing if he is not tough. And anyone who can go through all the strain and bustle that seems to be such an integral part of any American Presidential campaign must, even if he is only an actor, be by definition a 'tough guy'!!

If you take your mind off professional games and all the hooliganism which seems to have become more and more a part of them, old men still seem to be occupying the centre of the world stage. President Reagan is well over 70 and from what I gather, is now (1983) thinking of running for a secon term. Brezhnev passed off the scene something like a year ago. His place has been taken by Andropov who is not only getting on in years but doesn't seem to be in good health. In other countries, old men still seem to be in the ascendant and everywhere there seems to be more and more of them. I find there are times when the company is such that I feel almost young!!

At the same time women seem to be taking over from men. Not only do we have our Queen; we also still have Mrs Thatcher at 10 Downing Street. And we now have a Lady Lord Mayor (or Mayoress) of London. There is also a lady in charge of the London parks. And there are plenty of women who at Greenham Common and other places are perfectly ready to brave the English winters to make their protest against nuclear missiles. This is the third winter they have been protesting. I believe in Germany the ladies are even more determined. They are at least as tough as the Pope or the American President. And, of course, out in India you still have your Indira Gandhi. She too is a great survivor - and also a great human being and statesman or stateswoman.

It remains to be seen whether the ladies can do any better than the men have done. They connot do much worse! But it is certain we must revise our ideas as to which of the two sexes is the stronger.

Two things brought India back very very close this year. That an Indian cricket XI should win the World Cricket tournament was quite literally and amazing achievement. And they did it the hard way too, beating not only England but Australia and the West

Indies. Their victory was acclaimed over here on all sides. Such an achievement would have been thought quite out of the question in the days when I used to meet some of India's leading players.

But what to me was even more impressive was the film on Gandhi. Judy Sarkissian and his wife took us to the first showing of the film at a big cinema at Gerrards Cross. One could find small faults in it, of course; but by and large it made a tremendous impression. Ben Kingsley who played the part of Gandhi, was magnificent. He produced not only Gandhi's mental agility, his absolute honesty and humility, but his remarkable sense of humour. It was literally quite life-like. The film was a long one, but it was watched throughout - even by children - in complete and utter silence.

But the film left one wondering. Has the world - has India learnt anything at all from Gandhi? All his power came from renunciation. Yet we go on worshipping this wretched 'standard of living! The two things are diametrically opposed to one another. And what have missiles to do with either? Its not only daft to blow the world up (I am told that between them the Russians and the Americans can do it 50 times over); it is so terribly expensive. Every new missile costs more than the previous one. But I suppose blowing the world up is one way (though a very stupid way) of achieving renunciation. But enough of all this.

Since one's memory at 83 is almost non-existent, I will not pretend to put any news I have in any kind of order or precedence. I'll just put things down as they come into my mind. And I must apologise at the outset for everyone and everything I forget.

Malcolm Macdonald died in January 1981. He was the son of the first Socialist Prime Minister of England. He was also High Commissioner in Delhi and presided at Speech Day at St. Paul's in 1960. Judy and David went up to his Memorial Service at Westminister Abbey. Strangely enough James Clarke and I had been two of the last people who saw him. We visited him in the autumn of 1980 when we were staying down at Otham. I had always been very fond of Malcolm.

We have been down to James's place again on more than one occasion to stay. He is older of course, but the same as ever. He has been up here too. He is still doing nothing in particular, save

looking after his old father. And few people I know are able to do 'nothing' better than James Clarke! I am always urging him to write, but he says he must go back to India first for inspiration. That of course is nonsense. I have met very few people in my life more gifted than James Clarke. All the same, I know how James feels about India. He'll soon be out there again.

The last time we saw James was a month or two ago when he brought Margaret Sam along just after her mother's death. He was very good to her, though whilst they were with us they argued all the time.

When I see Margaret again, I want to write an appreciation of her mother. Had the old lady lived another day or two she would have been 102. Few mothers could have had such a devoted daughter as Mummy had. Margaret was the soul of devotion.

But Mummy's death removes the last connection any of us had with Dick Carter, who was the Rector at St. Paul's at the end of last country. Carter's years were 1878 to 1899; in fact he was still in charge of the school less than 90 years ago. That is almost impossible to believe. It was in Carter's time that the Hardinge bridge across the Ganges was built as well as the broad gauge railway up to Siliguri. Then the construction of the Darjeeling Tramway (as the toy railway was then called) threw Darjeeling open to virtually the whole of India and Burma. What had hitherto been a month's journey from the Shan states in North Burma could now be done in less than a week. Boys soon found that it was much less exciting. The journey can now be done of course in a day!

I have had recent reminders of Carter's time. The daughter of a man we knew in Darjeeling as "Daddy" de Vine, wrote for details of her father's school career. He spent all his time there with Carter. Unfortunately I was unable to give her much information apart from a few personal memories of the time when I knew him intimately. But he was then about my present age.

And a few months back an Old Paulite rang me up and asked if he could come and see me that evening. He must have been well into his seventies. Unfortunately I had already arranged for a very young Old Paulite to come along that day. I don't even remember the old OP's name now. He was a boy in Darjeeling long before my time. The young OP was Jaitly who left in the late seventies and had

just finished his course at Wye College. The old man was leaving for New Zealand the following morning. I therefore had to make a snap decision. And I naturally saw Jaitly and heard about recent developments at the School. Jaitly had entered St. Paul's under David Gibbs and left in the days of Hari Dang.

Of course I have seen, or been n touch with, countless other OPs during the past three years. As the list is bound to be incomplete, I will just mention the names that come to my mind. At the same time, I must apologise once again for the many names I am bound to omit.

John Billington comes down here three or four times a year. He has always been very faithful. He still teaches at Repton. I believe he has gone to India this Christmas and met Hari Dang and Dr. T Y Pemba. James Clarke was out there two or three years ago. Raymond Wilson (who has that beautiful house and garden in Penn, but now lives in Bath) was in India again too. Both he and James brought me back news of Monty Palit (1937), Puran Sawhney (1937) and Samiran Nundy (1954).

Monty Palit spent a lovely Sunday down here (in 1981 I think) Michael was home from Doha at the time. We had a most enjoyable day.

Michael is now out with Shell in South Africa. As far as we are concerned here, he might as well be on another planet. South Africa seems to be on the way to nowhere. Michael has never settled down there; he cannot stand the political atmosphere. Anyway, he will be home in March. But where he goes next is anyone's guess.

Judy remains with her husband at Haileybury. It is a lovely place. One of the boys in their house is Promeet Nag, son of Bulbul (1942). We have seen Bulbul over here. He is getting on in years and is obviously running a very flourishing business in Poona.

Another elderly OP living at Poona is Michi Seth (1940). Michi is now retired. He came down with his wife to see us. He has also been on the phone again a few weeks ago en route to America. He too has clearly done very well indeed in the business world.

Another OP who is always coming and going to America and who invariably calls in at Penn, is Amar Singh (1950). He is still

head of John Wyeth in Bombay. Both Bulbul Nag and Amar Singh took us out and gave us the most fabulous lunch at the self service restaurant. Amar Singh's son Nikhil is also at St. Paul's with Hari Dang.

Only a week or two ago, P. N. Roy (1958) came down with his wife to visit us. He brought with him a friend who worked with his father at the Gt. Eastern Hotel. P.N's younger brother A.N. (1961) rings us up regularly from Calcutta. He has always been so kind. A. N. has a son at St. Paul's so we always get plenty of news.

John Martin (1942) keeps regularly in touch. He never forgets Christmas or my birthday. He and his wife are very faithful. John's brother, Leon (1948), rang up a year or so ago when he was passing through London; alas, he had no time to get down here. I have always been very close to the Martins. I was with their father when he died in Darjeeling at the end of the war.

The Mackertiches are another Armenian family we see or hear from regularly. Raymond left in 1937. He like Seth has retired. We hope to see him again over Christmas whilst we are staying with Judy at Haileybury.

Other people we see or are in touch with in England are numerous. There are Joe Hammond (1960) and his wife. As far as I know, Joe is still lecturing on "Vibrations" at Southampton University. The elder Horseman (Gordon) (1945) came down with his wife, from Warwickshire to visit us. Gordon is a policeman and very contented with his lot. He tells me he has been in the same village for over twenty years. He calls himself a plain 'village bobby'! His younger brother (Peter) (1946) is doing some big job over in America but I would be surprised if he is as contented as Gordon.

F.L. (Paddy) Smith (1944) is now retired. He lives down in Wiltshire and is continually asking us to go down and stay with my wife still in the hands of the eye specialist. May be we will get down some time in the spring.

We have seen Samiran Nundy (1954) over here on one or two occasions. He is the same as he always was. He must now be one of the outstanding surgeons in India. I gather he is fairly central in the OPA in Delhi. But Nundy tells me the real driving force in the OPA in Delhi is Puran Sawhney (1937). Knowing Puran, I think that is more than likely. It is ages since I have seen Puran but I have heard

from him on more than one occasion. In his last letter he told me that his younger brother, Devi (1938), was alive and well. We had heard over here that he was dead. I saw from the Chronicle that Puran presided at the Gym Display in Darjeeling in 1981.

A contemporary of Puran's was Ronobir Roy (1937) - the eldest of that talented family. Ronobir rang me up from his sister's house in Harrow some weeks ago and suggested that we met. But his time was limited and we could not arrange a convenient time So he went off to Bangkok without our meeting. Ronobir kept goal for us - and very well too - in the Herlihy Cup Final in 1937. I have only recently had a Christmas card from Ronobir in Bangkok.

Raymond Mackertich was playing in that side too. He was always a-very strenuous and determined player. I fancy that Monty Palit was also in the XI. How long ago it all seems now.

It is Ronobir's brother (the third of the five brothers we had at St. Paul's) Rustum (1939) who has made such a name for himself at Pennsylvania University and in the world of Science generally. He sent me a copy of his book "Experimenting with Truth"; various other people sent me copies too. The book gives in printed form the series of Hibbert Lectures he gave in 1979 at London University. I heard the first of his three lectures and thought he was absolutely brilliant.

But I mustn't go on. I meant this to be a short letter. But, despite my years, I am quite incapable of writing anything short. I suppose that is the main reason why I have practically stopped writing letters altogether. When I remember that Jokhey, my Estate Manager, is now 74, and Chatterjee, (my secretary) is 70 (both had their birthdays this month) you can guess how old I am and feel; I am still closely in touch with both Jokhey and Chatterjee. No man could have had two more affectionate and loyal friends nor any school two more hard working and devoted servants. The School's debt to them is incalculable. Alas, I see from the Paulite that C. K. Bhattacherjee, the Accountant who worked so closely with Jokhey and Chatterjee, is dead. He was another loyal but very quite servant of the School. I find it difficult to picture St. Paul's without Bhattacherjee, though it is good that his son is now the Accountant.

But there are various other people I must mention before I bring this to a close. The first, of course, is Judy Sarkissian (1956).

He still lives here at Penn and still works with I.C.I. at Slough. I hope he does not go abroad again. I like him best in England. His wife teaches at the local school and has established for herself a great reputation which I need hardly say is richly deserved. They have two very talented daughters; the elder one has just taken her degree in music at London University; the younger is not only intelligent but a very fine athlete. Jennie is now Captain of her school at Beaconsfield.

No one could be kinder to us than the Sarkissians. We go round there most Sundays to lunch. And wonderful lunches they are too. Both Judy and Edwina are splendid cooks. We never see enough of them; they have so much else to do. But just to know they are only half-a-mile away is wonderfully reassuring. Apart from other things we meet lots of other OPs there and hear of many others.

One of the people we meet down there is Derek Avery (1956). And of course there is Khundkar (1954). Khundkar and Judy have always been very great friends. I met him last year over at Haileybury with Tutu Bose (1952).

Margaret Sarkissian had a 21st birthday party back in the summer. The Elloys were up for that. Malcolm and Nora are inevitably getting older and much slower but they are reasonably well. They remain very interested in the School. Nora still misses her sister, Phyllis Jansen. They were always very close to one another. Betty is doing very well indeed and I found her most interesting to talk to.

At the Sarkissians we hear a good deal about Judy's brother Nosey (1956). Nosey is in Canada with the rest of his family. They all seem to have settled down there. I gather they see a good deal of Frank West who, for most of my time in Darjeeling, was one of the Jesuits down at St. Joseph's. Though he was never Rector, he always seemed to be a central figure at North Point.

I ought not to omit here a long letter I had from the elder of the two Doha brothers, A. R. S. (1943), who is now Foreign Minister of Bangladesh. I believe Hari Dang met him at Dacca. I gather other OP's out in India are aware of the exalted heights he has reached. Obviously he is doing very well. Our M. P. here at High Wycombe, Ray Whitney, knows Doha well. Some time back, Whitney worked in the High Commissioners office in Dacca.

Then we get more and more Indian connections over at Haileybury. The local pub there is called the East Indian Arms. A man in the pub, knowing that I had been a schoolmaster, was telling me the last time we were there that to educate boys today all we needed to do was to teach them to "fiddle". That was the only way to get on in the world, he thought. I immediately pictured a timetable with a daily period of "Fiddling" on it! It certainly set me thinking. Before my visit to Haileybury was over, I had made up my mind that the man most certainly had a point.

But the man who brings me the most regular news of the School is Kamal Sahgal (1945). He has a son there, he is often in Darjeeling and he is obviously a very successful business man and is for ever travelling. I doubt whether there is an OP anywhere with such an intimate knowledge of the School and what is going on there. We spent a lovely day with him and his wife early this year. Michael was home from South Africa at the time and we were all together at Haileybury. With Judy there too, the conversation was very animated.

Another business man, who must be a good deal older but almost as prosperous as Kamal Sahgal, is Brian Jefford (1937). He spent a couple of days with us in 1980 but I had not heard from him again until a few weeks ago. He then wrote from America but I imagine he is still based in New Zealand. He says he is keen to help the School with further buildings and in other ways. I am putting him in touch with Hari Dang who has been in correspondence with Brian. After all these years I wouldn't know what to suggest. Nor would I be so presumptuous as to try. St. Paul's is obviously a very different place from what it was in my day and I imagine it is still changing and at an ever-increasing rate.

A day or two after we had seen Sahgal at Haileybury, we had a much postponed visit from the present Rector, Hari Dang and Renuka Dang. That was a day to remember. The Dangs' two sons came along, too. Alas they were late but through no fault of their own. Hari Dang's mother was very ill and was in a coma back in India. And this meant they all had to leave hurriedly and early. In a way it was most frustrating but absolutely inevitable. Hari Dang's mother eventually died. Whether her son saw her alive again I have never heard. But though everything was so rushed, it was a great pleasure to meet the man at present in charge of St. Paul's

and to know how rapidly the place was expanding and developing.

As we talked of the School, it seemed that we were discussing two different places. I still cannot visualise a school at Jalapahar, even with all its new buildings, containing over 700 boys. I thought it was bursting at the seams when during the war we had just over 300. Nor can I picture a school at which boys learnt archery and candle making, as well as electronics. The new buildings too, and the Post Office and Bank, were difficult to imagine. Certainly things are changing there and changing very very fast.

But the recent examinations results clearly show that quality is not being sacrificed for quantity. I can well understand that competition to get into St. Paul's goes on increasing. I read the Chronicle and Paulite regularly and am always delighted at every sign of further progress. May it long continue. Not only India, but the whole world, needs more and more good schools.

# **OBITUARY**

# ELIZABETH PATRICIA GORDON-CUMMING

Paulites from 1965 will be saddened to hear of the early death of Patricia Blackley (as they would have known her). In her three years at St. Paul's she influenced strongly those whom she taught because she was a very exceptional teacher. History was her subject and she loved it. But whether it was History, English, French or Latin she had that rare ability of making her lessons as enjoyable as they were demanding. She shared her boys' enthusiasm and they shared hers. However much they might exasperate her she was entertained by them and fond of them and they knew it and were fond of her.

Her father had been Governor of Libva after the war at whose house my wife and I first met when Patricia was 12. She was educated at the Godolphin School and Dublin University (Trinity College). She declined the headship of a notable Irish girls' school in which appointment she would have been the youngest headmistress of her time. She was herself a good musician and before coming to India she was on the staff of King's College Choir School. Cambridge. So she was able to bring to St Paul's the best possible experience of western choral music. She took the choir in hand and was responsible for two exquisite Carol Services the tapes of which still surprise me by their quality. Do you remember S. Chatterjee singing "What can I give him, poor as I am?" She enlarged the repertoire of hymns, Be Thou my Vision and My Song is Love Unknown becoming special favourites in chapel. She will probably be remembered too for a spirited performance as Edwina in Trial by Jury.

When she returned to England she taught in a new show-piece primary school at the Barbican in London while taking a Diploma of Education in which she won the Gold Medal. Later she was Education Officer at the London Museum, lecturing on history to school groups with all the "props" to hand. She was an educational expert.

In 1974 she married her cousin, Sandy Gordon-Cumming, a widower with a little girl, Penny, of five. Their daughter Mary was born and they lived for some years as diplomats in Washington D.C. It was at the height of her happiness when she was struck by illness which she fought very bravely for another seven years.

Upheld to the end by a strong faith, she died in August at her childhood home in Ireland surrounded by her family. If any of her friends and past pupils wish to write to her husband or her mother, Gurrane, Fermoy, Co Cork, Ireland, would be a suitable address.

D. S. GIBBS (Rector, 1964-1973)
