





EDITORIAL

Perhaps the year nineteen eighty four at St. Paul's could aptly be named 'The Exodus', for, by a curious coincidence, several of the senior members from the topmost rung of the hierarchy left the school to take up other assignments to improve their career prospects or for personal reasons. Starting with Mr. B. S. Bhatnagar who relinquished his post to take up the Principalship at the Daly College, Indore, in April, 1984, the school also lost Mr. Chandak Chatterji who took over as Principal of Swarup Public School, Kanpur. A little later, Mr. David Howard and Mrs. Howard left St. Paul's to move to Calcutta where Mr. Howard became Principal of St. Thomas' Boy's School, Kidderpore. As if this were not enough, St. Paul's bade the Rector and Mrs. Dang a fond farewell at the end of the year when Mr. Dang decided to accept the Principalship of the Army Public School, Delhi. However, St. Paul's was extremely fortunate when Mr. and Mrs Gardner were selected to take over from Mr. and Mrs Dang. The impact of the exodus of these stalwarts will not be easy to bear. But it is reassuring to know that the momentum generated by the dynamism and dedication of these persons, who have been the pillars of strength in this institution for a great many years, will help us to carry St. Paul's forward on a fresh wave of surging enthusiasm and determination to maintain its famous traditions and distinctive ethos. With our new Rector at the helm, St. Paul's has been put on a steady course, and we look forward to the new shores that we must strive to reach and the new horizons that we must conquer. "Yesterday is not ours to recover, but tomorrow is ours to win or lose". Life is never static. As Rabindranath Tagore says in Gitaniali, "when old words die out on the tongue, new melodies break forth from the heart.....".

After a decade as Editor of the School Chronicle, Mr. Bhatnagar handed over charge when he left St. Paul's in April, 1984. It will not be easy to maintain the fastidious standards of language and lay-out, or to match that enviable clockwork precision in the general management of these publications. Taking up the editorship is a personal challenge that can only be met with the help and support of all those concerned with the Chronicle and Newsletter. I would like to express my gratitude to the Rector for his valuable advice and encouragement, and also to all those who have helped in so many ways to make my task a lighter and a more pleasant one.

RECTOR'S LETTER 1984

There is about St. Paul's School, its traditions, its Governors, the Church, the parents, the staff, and the boys, a kind of aesthetic which defies analysis. Whether the people and the tea-gardens, the fishing-rivers and the forests, and the mountain arcs from Sandakphu to Kangchenjunga and through to Sikkim and Kalimpong, have influenced this educational and moral aesthetic. is not easy to explain.

I remember Bishop Bryan, with a characteristic twinkle in the eye, the day after I joined St. Paul's in October'77, telling me how difficult it is in the radiance of Kangchenjunga to do anything wicked. Weakling human beings, whether the people of Darjeeling in their mountains, or we, we do try our best withal, and yet end-up being good!

And so the boys of St. Paul's have over the years succeeded in growing up well, and I am pleased as must the parents be, to see this moral growth in an aesthetic environment.

The British Public School tradition enjoins a ten year tenure for the Headmaster, but circumstances can extend or abridge the optimal stint. I found at the Air Force Central School, Delhi, that after the seventh year I was contributing few innovations, and when the invitation came to St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, it was without hesitation that over the telephone I expressed my gratitude and acceptance to Bishop Amritanand and late Dr. Nishit Kar DPI, when they and the BOG offered me the privilege of working for St. Paul's.

The decision now is more difficult, but I have been feeling this year the pull of Delhi, as well as the reduced inspiration. A Headmaster should leave or transfer before his contribution starts to be less than outstanding; 1984 has been, so far, a good year for us and we have ambitious programmes duly sanctioned and financed from our savings collected over the last 7 years, to construct a Primary Wing Prep Hall and an Auditorium, Science class-rooms and Dormitory Block on the JW Khud-side, additional water-storage capacity in the SW and JW, and have already completed the 12-lakh-rupee SBI Bank Branch, which now places St. Paul's School on a viable financial footing for a few decades.

It is with this background of a School functioning at optimal,

in an organised manner, with a good staff and a good studentbody, that I must now take my bow in this my last Rector's letter.

The new Rector will be a better man and I am sure, he and his wife will contribute more than we were able to do, to the continuing growth of the Institution, and it is with a sense of safisfaction and gratitude that we thank the St. Paul's family for their many kindnesses, affection and support for these seven wonderful years of our life.

When a Head leaves a good school after a successful tenure of 7 years, he leaves behind many achievements, many affiliations, but also many residuary and backlog problems, the 'functional detritus', which the new Headmaster has to clean and clear away. I am fully aware that Mr & Mrs Gardner will have their hands full in bringing fresh air and a fresh outlook into what must necessarily have become less relevant. I hope that with these problems, there are also bequeathed some assets, and it is with the deepest of regards and affection that we wish them sincere good fortune, support, wisdom and courage that they will need in the continuing difficult task and challenge, which is what the Rectorship of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, has always been, for "Upward" always, "the Old School Calls"!







SCHOOL NOTES

Trinity Term for the year 1984-85 began, as calendared, on March 12; the bulk of the school having reported back by the previous evening.

While the Class X students worked through their ICSE examination, which terminated on March 21. Class XI took their Council Examination (Internal) and the Sixth Form prepared for theirs. The ISC examination began on March 15.

The language laboratory—a Sonodyne system—has been set up under the supervision of Mr. Neel Kantha Gupta.

The Rector, Senior Master, Mr. B. S. Bhatnagar and Mr. N. K. Sharma called on the Governor of West Bengal, Shri A. P. Sharma, when he was in Darjeeling.

Rector addressed the school at the opening of Term Service. Talking to the Leavers, he said that they should understand that they would always be a part of the school-even after leaving it. In leaving they leave behind a part of themselves. He continued to say that although it was the end of a period for them, it was really another beginning.

The ISC batch of 1985 went out on expeditions to: Genda Tops in Nepal, escorted by Mr. Pramode Kumar and Mr. Nicholas Gomes; to the Torsa with Mr. Hardip Singh and Mr. P. C. Mali; and to Hyderabad with Mr. Arun Dash. They were all back in school on April 1, 1984.

The ICSE leavers attended a Bar-b-cue at the Rectory on the evening of March 17, as an informal farewell party.

For thoughts, words and works, pray we, O God, for forgiveness,


And repent with penance.











It might have been just another September but destiny had determined otherwise and from the very first days of the month the entire school community was caught up in a momentous swirl of events that left one bemused and contemplative.



Mrs. Dang, as head of, Primary Wing, endeared herself to all who had occasion to deal with her, and the parents of the children of that Wing were heard to publicly voice their disappointment at her imminent departure. The domestic staff, children and other staff members will long recall the essentially personal touch with which the Primary Wing and the Rectory were supervised. Never one to cut corners where work was concerned, Mrs. Dang made it a point to see that all those who were responsible for the welfare of the children were equally alert, although, often it meant asking for more than was easily done. But then no one was led to believe that work was to be a bed of roses either. Mrs. Dang combined abounding enthusiasm with a basically innovative nature and the result was an active and smoothly functioning wing, arguably the best of its kind in the country, or anywhere else, for that matter. We understand that Mrs. Dang has no immediate plans to be working in a similar capacity in the future, that she would like to rest a bit, slow down a bit and perhaps relive the experience that was St. Paul's. Our hope is that the future brings with it all good things but above all a deep and satisfying sense of achievement and peace.

One word has always summed up the Rector: dynamic. He was nothing if not that, perpetually with several irons in the fire, he usually managed to sail through his several commitments with aplomb and utter conviction. His ability to extemporise when called upon to speak, his zest for field sports, his huge range of information as well as his fluent French, are now all familiar hallmarks of the man. Never the easiest of men to work with, or for, Mr. Dang demanded extraordinary standards from boys and staff alike and led by example as far as possible. He had the ability to be involved in a number of things at the same time and often achieved the most difficult objectives, particularly when they appeared least likely to materialise. Widely known, he and the school were constantly being visited by persons of eminence, and we believe that Mr. Dang is now but at the threshold of yet another strata of fame, and few doubt that we will be hearing of him frequently in the years to come. In face of this assured success we only add our good wishes to his immense potentials.

At the time of going to press, the Rector and Mrs. Dang are in Delhi, but Mr. Dang will be returning shortly to resume office and will continue as the Rector until the end of term this year, and it is a measure of his demand and successes that both the Board of

Governors of St. Paul's and the Directors of the Army Public School, Dhaula Kuan, New Delhi, are equally anxious: the former that he had not really to leave and the latter that he may quickly assume charge.

While we were still trying to adjust to the impending departure of the Rector and Mrs Dang, the untimely and utterly illogical passing away of Sudip Bikram Shah (HI/III) rocked the school in the early hours of 11th/12th September. The details as far as the school is aware, are published elsewhere in these pages in the form of a letter from the Rector to the Chairman of the Board of Governors, but we would like to record here our sense of deep shock and profound sympathy for Mr. and Mrs. Shah whose pain must know little solace.

The Rector happened to be in Delhi on 12th September, but when he returned in has a upon hearing about Sudip, he brought with him the further saddening news of the passing away of our most illustrious Rector of yore, Mr. Leslie J. Goddard. Another column in this Chronicle carries an obituary that only endeavours to do justice to the late great schoolmaster who was a legend in his lifetime. The school assembled in the prop hall on 13th September for a memorial service and later met in chapel at a very moving ceremony, the culmination of which, was the scattering of Mr. Goddard's ashes by his son, Mr. Michael Goddard, behind the Chapel at the foot of the cross. And as Reverend Noel Sen put it during his commemorative address, every time we pass that way and see the beautiful profusion of flowers, the memory of the wonderful man and all that he did and all that he stood for and all that he left behind, will be ever fresh and real.

But inspite of these sobering circumstances, school life perforce continues, with as much normalcy as possible. The special prize examinations were conducted, the period order drew to a close and class and other prizes were finally decided.

The annual boxing championships drew to a close after the many preliminary bouts and the finals were on 5th and 6th September. The finals on the 6th were presided over by Brig. J. N. Wadhwa, BGS XXXIII Corps.

Id was celebrated by the Muslim boys on 7th September, and on 8th September Cable House put up their annual concert, the last of the house concerts for 1984.

There was a musical evening on 16th September and on the 19th the Inter-School English Elocution Competition for the Masters shield was successfully conducted at home. St. Joseph's took the shield and the home team, tragically trailing a mere point behind. Loreto Convent, took third place. We did have, however, the satisfaction of having both our junior section participants coming first. The team was:

Earlier in the month the VIth form entertained the Loreto girls at a social and then attended a fete at the convent.

Our congratulation to Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin on the baptism of their son, Anshuman, in the school chapel on 10th September. Rev. Noel Sen performed the ceremonyand there was tea in the Rectory after the afternoon service.

We reproduce below the full text of the Rector's letter to the Chairman of the Board of Governors of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, pertaining to the passing away of Sudip Bikram Shah (H1/III):

From: The Rector St. Paul's School, Darjeeling.

To: The Most Rev. D.C. Gorai, Moderator, CNI and the Bishop of Calcutta, Bishop's House, 51, Chowringhee Road, Calcutta 700 071

Dear Chairman,

I am writing to report the sad passing away of Sudip Bikram Shah of class III in his sleep in the very early hours of Wednesday, the 12th of September, in bed.

Though we have had a very thorough postmortem conducted by the authorities under the chief charge of Dr. Nandi, Head of the Department from the North Bengal Medical College, Siliguri, and I came back from Delhi meeting the parents as they were going down for the funeral on the 13th evening at Kathmandu. We are still recovering from the shock of losing a boy in this inevitable and almost pre-ordained manner. According to the interim report and the assessment of Dr. T.Y. Pemba, PMO of D&DMA, the death was the result of natural causes and could have been cerebral haemorrhage, with no immediate objective causes since he was found dead in the morning with a little blood oozing out of his nose into the pillow. There were no other symptoms.

We now await the full report from the experts in Calcutta and the North Bengal Medical College. Circular and letters have been sent out to all concerned and the Rector with Mr. S. M. Pradhan and three senior boys will be attending the thirteenth day ceremonies at Kathmandu.

It has been a shattering experience, particularly the helplessness of it, and I am sorry to have to report to the Board that there was absolutely nothing that any of us could have done about it.

One positive upshot of the concert was that in all probability there will be three such calendered for 1985.

The annual exhibitions at St. Paul's are always a pleasure to visit, but this year in particular has produced some truly marvellous work. The Senior Art exhibition was excellent and Shasheesh Prasad's 'Twilight' Sarosh Pradhan's 'Peacock' on silk, Bhaskar Raj Pradhan's 'Horses' and woodwork and batik were not just memorable but works of art of the highest standards imaginable.

The photoclub as usual had some very fine work displayed and some of the colour and black and white photographs were very well composed and printed, indeed.


The lathe shop produced really professional looking lamps of all shapes and sizes as well as several other decorative wood pieces.

Brain of St. Paul's :




Mr. Gokul Chhetri has now been promoted to the rank of Estate Superintendent. Our congratulations to him.

THE ANNUAL SPEECH DAY 1984

The 161st Speech Day of the School was celebrated on the 30th of September preceded by the Commemoration Service in the morning. The Chief Guest this year was none other than Mr. Michael Goddard, son of the legendry rector, Leslie Goddard. The programme started with the School Song after which the Rector presented his Annual Report. Excerpts from the speech are given below:

Mr. Michael Goddard, Mr. Bhaskar Ghose, Commissioner, Jalpaiguri Division, Governors of the school, Ladies and Gentlemen,

The 161st Speech Day of St. Paul's School, and the 122nd anniversary of our foundation in Darjeeling, is in many ways, an important occasion, full of significance and portent. During the year preceding we lost Rev. W.S. Rajpal, distinguished member of our Board of Governors and Principal of St. Stephen's College. Delhi; Mummy Sam, our oldest living Old Paulite; one of our class III boys, Sudip Bikram Shah, of natural causes of cerebral haemorrhage or seizure in his sleep; and Mr. Leslie Goddard our greatest Rector who guided the destinies of St. Paul's School from 1934 to 1964. Sudip Bikram Shah passed away in the early hours of 12th September without there having been any previous ailment. injury, accident or complaint since he joined us in March 84. Mr. Goddard passed away on 11th September in hospital in England and was 82 at the time of his death. Those of you who attended the Commemorative Service in Chapel this morning saw his ashes which were brought by his son, Michael Goddard, being dispersed on the chapel slopes at the foot of the cross. May I ask all of us to stand up and pay silent homage for two minutes.

The Rector's report is in itself a dyanamic extension of a residential school like St. Paul's School. Though this is my seventh report to you as Rector, and considerable progress in all spheres of activities has been recorded in these seven eventful years, a great school like St. Paul's is an on-going institutional process and it is with some regret at unfinished and incomplete aims, that I must make this my last report to you. I submit with it not only my gratitude and the gratitude of Mrs. Dang for all that the Chairman of the Board of Governors, the people of Darjeeling, the staff of all categories, the boys and especially the parents have done for us through their support, encouragement and confidence, in enabling to do our work here as called upon to do so. I also offer our

apologies for not staying longer and having to move back to Delhi from whence I came here on Speech Day 1977, to take over for this seven year period, the destinies of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling.

It is known to all parents that in 1983, after progressive improvements in the ICSE and ISC results, the boys of St. Paul's School achieved possibly the best results in India. The reaction to such success and achievement may be anticipated, and has certainly been answered to the School and the boys through intense envy and jealousy, and our detractors have not let pass any opportunity of pointing out a relative decline in our ICSE and ISC results of 1984. Complacency and erratic evaluation may both be part of the causes and we would like to believe that there is no other and graver ulterior design behind this 'decline'. Suffice it to reassure our parents and the School Family that we have taken steps which are being implemented to ensure that in 1984-85 and thereafter, even erratic evaluation will not be allowed to dim the excellence of our results and the high academic performance and achievements through sheer hard work and intense motivation of our boys.

The computer centre, the language laboratory and the proposed Junior Wing science laboratory are some of the practical hardware projects for academic improvement, whereas greater staff and student motivation and involvement will ensure that we progressively achieve the best results we are capable of.

We had a very successful cricket season this year and won the much coveted Edinburgh. Shield convincingly, after a lapse of three years. The School played its annual fixtures against TISCO and Shaw Wallace at home. These matches were particularly interesting as both visiting teams were strongly represented by a battery of Ranji Trophy players. Although we conceded defeat against both, the matches were very close and defeat can be claimed to have been glorious. In an effort to promote wider participation outside the School level, the cricket XI toured Calcutta, Delhi and Bihar in the winter holidays playing matches against Shaw Wallace, TISCO, Delhi Public School, Roshanara Club, Delhi and the Indian Military Academy at Dehra Dun. The school squash team also played TISCO and IMA teams.

The widely acclaimed Annual Gymnastic Display was held before the May Holidays in the Gymkhana Club, Darjeeling. The guest list included many Old Paulited and parents. Rs. 1,500/-was collected for local charities and the display certainly lived up to all expectations.

Volleyball and football, boxing, basketball, tennis, badminton, Eton Fives and Squash continue to be as popular as ever and the participation in these games has not only increased but a distinct improvement in standards has been noted. For the first time, St. Paul's School brought home the keenly contested inter-school Table Tennis Championship trophy. The School squash team was equally victorious. A larger number of boys are swimming now, inspite of the absence of a swimming pool in school.

Instead of reading out what I have here as the report on games and sports at School, may I digress after mentioning that we have had a very good year in the sports arenas and that what we lay great stress on is not so much the winning of trophies by our selected teams, but the widest possible participation by our boys to ensure optimal fitness and physical efficiency. Given the constraints of a five month monsoon, it is apparent that an indoor sports complex is an essential requirement for St. Paul's School, Darjeeling. It shall be my endeavour to be in touch with the new Rector, and with the continued help of the Chairman of the Board of Governors. try to continue to support the idea of the Century Endowment Fund Raising Project so that the indoor sports complex may become a reality at St. Paul's School, benefitting subsequent generations of boys. This is one of the incomplete and unachieved ambitions for which I sorely regret the necessity of my move back to Delhi

I must confess that we have not been able to greatly improve our system of hobbies and club activities. One would have liked to have done something dramatic to offer really effective and wider options; but what we have found most useful is to take up activities and build them around our staff and it is here that we have been most successful, particularly in areas like Art and Craft, photography, electronics, language laboratory, computer centre and meteorology. The traditional hobbies continue and they are still popular, dealing as they do with some very important skills, but if we can add another three or four we would have covered at least 250 boys in each wing with some hobby that motivates them as well as proves immensely useful in later life.

Music is flourishing in School although it was a great loss when both Mrs. Moneesha Chowdhury and Miss Zarin Madan, our pianoforte teachers left; Mrs. Chowdhury to retire and Miss Madan to continue her montessori training in Calcutta. So far, our efforts to find one or even two suitable pianoforte teachers have gone

unrewarded, with the result that for the first time in the Seven years that I have been here, we were unable to send up any pupils before the Trinity College of London music examinations.

In every other aspect however, the standard of music appears to move progressively higher, particularly in the context of the School band. We now have a Senior Wing brass band as well as a Junior Wing Bugle and Drum band and Mr. Denzil Prince has performed marvels as parents and guests will have noticed and relished at Sports Day yesterday. Chapel music, Choir and Carol singing continue to be popular and beautiful. Speaking of the Chapel, Major Jackson, of the British Gurkhas, presented a cheque for £600/- to the school for chapel service books in memory of the late Bishop Bryan, member of our Board of Governors and at one time actively involved with the British Gurkhas. We hope that this is one area that may be further buoyed and improved next year by our attracting more members on the staff for the Indian Music and Pianoforte departments. It will be recalled that whenever our boys have taken the Trinity College of Music examination, the results have been very good indeed and last year in particular, they were excellent.

Our elocution and debating standards too have been steadily improving and participation in these clubs consistently on the increase. While we have not had quite as many inter-school debates as in previous years the number of internal debating meets ensure wide participation and exposure to this very important activity. In elocution we have done well at the inter-school level; doing very well at the Hindi, Bengali and Nepali non-competitive meets and coming second by a solitary point at the N M Master English Elocution competition. In our team of four, two of our boys stood first in their respective divisions.

It is with some satisfaction that I report on Cubs. Scouts. Pioneer and the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme activities. Enjoying now the benefit of trained scout masters, the Cubs in the Primary Wing and Scouts in the Junior Wing have been able to achieve a good deal more than in previous years by way of assimilating the spirit behind these activities as well as learning the finer points of team work, leadership and initiative that these activities inculcate. Camps were organised and rallies held with great success and the disciplined manner in which these were conducted is indeed noteworthy. Pioneers in the Senior Wing is as

active as ever and there is much enthusiasm among the Duke of Edinburgh Award aspirants whether it be for field or service disciplines. The Naosena Darshan Course was organised during the winter holidays at the Naval Academy for class XI boys who were accompanied by Mr. O'Connor. A day after the ICSE examinations 17 boys along with Mr. A. K. Dash visited the Air Force Academy at Dundigal. 35km outside Hyderabad. Several class XI boys went canoeing in the Torsa river and others to the Genda Tops Game Sanctuary in Nepal. Bronze and Silver award expeditions went out after the half-yearly examinations and Gold award service aspirants will be going out shortly to the flood and landslide affected areas in this district. It is such exposures that we believe makes men of boys and provides a student with a richness of experience that is vital for the growth of character and valuable experience.

St. Paul's School has always been environmentally aware and in an attempt to offset the rather rapid deforestation that has taken place in these hills, our boys have been systematically following a tree-planting programme organised by our senior biology master. Mr. U. K. Dwiwedi.

News about Leavers and Old Paulites is encouraging. Two of our boys have obtained scholarships to the Milton Academy at Boston, Massachusetts, USA, and Jitendra Kapoor has been awarded a scholarship of Rs. 35,000/- per annum. Dip Kapoor, who is reading business management in Canada at the University of Alberta scored straight A's in his examination and Prosenjit Basu and Subarno Chatterji are actively involved in dramatics at St. Stephen's College in Delhi. Ajit Kumar Sahni (OP'62) passed away in an accident in Calcutta on March 15th this year.

Association that was founded by Mr. L. J. Goddard and celebrations to commemorate the occasion are being planned for the winter. Rev. Malcolm Maclean who was chaplain here between 1968 and 1970 visited the school and Mr. A. C. Burman who was one of the first to be associated with the original Parent Teacher Association (now known as the Paulite Parent Teacher Association) was a guest at the Rectory in April this year. Among the distinguished visitors to school this year were also Mr. Sasthi Brata, the well known author, Brig. Mulk Raj and Mr. Russi Modi.

After the departure of Mr. Aloke Bose as Estate Manager, we welcomed Mr. Ashok Drona as Estate Manager in May this year. Mrs. Drona is also with us as a matron in the Primary Wing. Mr. and Mrs. K. G. Samuels left us this year and Mr. V. Stephens, caterer in the Primary Wing left at the end of last year. Mr. Raymond Ruebens and Mr. P. Ahluwalia have taken over as caterers in the Senior-Junior and Primary Wings respectively, under the steward and bursar, Cdr. N. M. Lobo, Until Mr. Ahluwalia joined us Mr. Seal did an admirable job in the Primary Wing as caterer. Mr. Gokul Chhetri, who has been with us a long time now and several times proved his competence, has been appointed Estate Superintendent.

We were compelled to bid farewell to several members of our staff over the last few months spanning the end of 1983 and the early months of 1984. Col. Jakops, resident nursing sister in the Primary Wing, Mr. and Mrs. Stephens, Mr. and Mrs. Anderson, all left at the end of 1983. Mr. and Mrs. Samuels, Mr. K. N. Srinivasan, Senior Physics Master, whose aged mother was ailing at home, Mr. Bhanu Roy, Mrs. Moneesha Chowdhury, Miss Z. Madan, Rev. Dipen Ghosh and Mr. Gautam Paul left during the course of this year. Most recent among those who have left us, of course, have been, Mr. and Mrs Chattarji and Mr. and Mrs. Howard. It is significant that each of these three gentlemen are today piloting their own schools as headmasters: Mr. Bhatnagar at Daly College, Indore; Mr. Chattarji at the Virendra Swarup Public School in Kanpur and Mr. Howard at St. Thomas' School, Calcutta.

We are pleased to welcome on our staff, Sister Subaiya as resident nursing sister in the Primary Wing, Mr. Ruebens as caterer in Senior Junior Wing, Mr. P. Ahluwalia in the Primary Wing as caterer, Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin, teaching in the Senior and Primary Wings respectively, Mrs. Ranjana Yadav in the Primary Wing, Mr. and Mrs. Thakur in the Senior and Junior Wings respectively, Mr. P. Sen in the Junior Wing, Mr. Bhaskar Rao Ganti as librarian, Mr. Ashok Drona as Estate Manager, and Mrs. Drona, Mrs. P. Tshering and Mrs. D. Singh as matrons.

Mr. N. K. Sharma was appointed Head Junior Wing after Mr. Bhatnagar and subsequently has had to take charge as Senior Master. Mr. Kamlesh Kanti and Mr. Baljit Bawa have been appointed Second Masters and Mr. Rocky Miller is officiating as Head Primary Wing ably supported by the other house masters there, Mr. Colin Watson, Mr. Desmond Vida and Mr. Stuart D' Costa. Prince has been appointed Housemaster of Havelock house after Mr. Sharma and Mr. J. Goswami has assumed charge of Hastings house. Mr. Reggie Anthony has been appointed Head Junior Wing and Mr. B. B. Tamang will take over as Housemaster of Clive house after Mr. Anthony. Mr. Baljit Bawa is now the head of the department of English after the departure of Mr. Chandak Chattarji. Mr. Promode Kumar is head of the department of science and Mr. Anthony has been appointed head of the department of Hindi. Assistant housemasters have also been appointed in the senior wing to help to preserve a strong and truer pyramidal structure. Mr. Kabir Mustafi moved out from the Primary to the Junior Wing and I look forward to when this young man, an Old Paulite who has been here six years, will move into the senior wing after completing his MA next year.

Mrs. G. Kanti, Mrs. K. Z. Mustafi and Mrs. A. Goswami took the B.Ed. examination early this year and all three of them passed with first divisions. Mr. P. C. Mall and Mr. U. K. Dwiwedi have been put up for the same course this year. Mr. Daljit Singh has recently returned from a four month computer course at Loughborough in England and will be organising the computer centre to ensure wider exposure among the boys. Mr. P. C. Mall. senior History master, attended the 12th World Leprosy Congress at New Delhi in February this year. He also recrossed the Neora Valley as an instructor with the 48th Adventure Course Trainees of the Himalayan Mountaineering Institute, Darjeeling, and also later attended an international meeting of mountaineers and adventure course instructors in Srinagar in July 1984. The Rector attended

meetings of the National Progressive Schools Conference and the National Commission on Teachers at New Delhi.

In areas of community service, we have donated a television to the domestic staff community centre and are in the process of adding to their library which was also begun this year. The School has begun a Bhanu Bhakta Scholarship which will allow two deserving candidates to avail of education at St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, entirely free of cost.

In conclusion, I would like to repeat on behalf of Mrs. Dang and myself. how much we have enjoyed working here for these last seven years and it will be with a real sense of sorrow and regret that we will be saying farewell to St. Paul's and to Darjeeling. Thank you once again for your support. May I now call upon Mr. Michael Goddard to give away the prizes.

SPEECH DAY ADDRESS

The following is the edited text of the address by the chief guest, Mr. Michael J. Goddard, on the occasion of the 161st Speech Day of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, on 30th September 1984.

Rector, Mrs. Dang. Reverend Sen. Staff, Parents, Paulites past and present....

I feel deeply honoured. Rector, that you have invited me to be chief guest at Speech Day this year, honoured and very grateful. To return to Darjeeling and to St. Paul's is a privilege... this has and always will be my spiritual home.

You will appreciate that while I was happy to return as an old Paulite and son of my father, I did not think I would be returning to officiate at Speech Day so soon after the sudden death of my father.

On behalf of the family and his many friends, I am most grateful Rector, for the memorial Service you had for him in the chapel here. I am also most grateful for the beautiful service we had this morning. I feel his soul is now where it belongs—the finite has achieved the infinite, the mortal has been made immortal and

the imperfect, perfect. None of us who know or knew of him would want his passing to be an even of sorrow or mourning but rather a reason for the rededication of our lives for what he gave us in his life. To take pride in all the stood for and to cherish the memories of a man whose stature gave us all inspiration and who was able to be on a level with us all, irrespective of age, caste, colour or creed; so fundamental to his beliefs.

Let us thus dedicate ourselves to a great headmaster and born schoolmaster who dedicated 31 years of his life to this great institution; and to the service of India; and this becomes particularly pertinent just now as the Rector prepares to hand over office. He too will be leaving a very large gap, which will mean change but not something new to the school and its sound and very proud traditions.

Father claimed that the greatest influences in his life were Bishop Foss Westcott, who appointed father in February 1934 and a friend until the end and Mahatma Gandhi, whom he got to know through Foss Westcott. He admired both great men and with his constant search for truth constantly sought to emulate them in his life and in his dedication to St. Paul's. Father said of Foss Westcott that 'His greatness lay in his humility, generosity of spirit, breadth of humanity, compassion and regard for others; that the 'whole of India was his parish' And he wrotes of Gandhiji, ".... to him tolerance was an essential part of honesty..... he was beyond race. caste or creed..... he was so free of possessions - it was his unshakable faith in God and his goodness which gave him that astonishing sense of power..... Gandhi was not a christian in the accepted sense but he loved the sermon on the Mount, 'It is', Gandhi said, 'the most practical thing ever uttered.' How many christians would call it practical? Yet Gandhi not only spoke of it as practical but he practised it as fully as he could understand it."

Father had very firm beliefs on the essence of education, of discipline and the schoolmaster's responsibilities. He felt the chief aims, and I believe this to be as true now, of all schools, were to turn out men of character, men who can distinguish between the important and the trival; men who can be relied on in any circumstance; men who are above the distinctions of race and caste; men who are disciplined, from within; men who have learnt that the power to meet their problems and difficulties is to be found within rather than without.

Discipline was very essential to father's brand of schoolmastering. Self-discipline being essential to education, to leadership, to a man's contribution to society, to integrity. Thoughtfulness for others is the basis for good manners and discipline. The real work of a school is the development and nourishment of character. This depends on one thing only; the relationship between master and pupil. What matters primarily is what the school master is giving unconsciously..... what the master is in the depths of his personal life, is what is continually going over to the pupil; what India and the world needs is not school teachers — it needs schoolmasters — a very different type of person. The only test of a schoolmaster is what he does with himself when he does not have to do anything.

If a master's life is consecrated, if his aim is the Service of God and his pupils, there you have the most powerful force in the world for good.

I would like to take this opportunity to enumerate a few of father's achievements in the field of education and particularly at St. Paul's. Father was quick to appreciate the necessity of adapting the school for Indian students and it was in 1939 that he appointed the first Indian School Captain. Thereafter, a fine line of school captains have succeeded him. For father, St. Paul's was always the best, and though similar to British Public Schools, beyond ordinary comparison with them.

It was during his years that the existing chapel was constructed, the quad laid out as it is and the pavillion built. The list is long but includes the Junior School Blocks. Westcott Hall dormitory and the Milman Extensions.

For father, the chapel typified everything the school stood for simple and straight forward, and therefore beautiful, understanding and expression of truth. The chapel embodied also the christian ethos of worship and it is remarkable that to this day most people who have had occasion to visit the chapel irrespective of faith are awed by the aura of calm that pervades it.

Father lay great emphasis on teaching standards and realised that in order to ensure this, he had to trust his staff. He encouraged their strengths and helped overcome their weaknesses and delegated as much authority as he possibly could. As a schoolmaster, he was not pro-examinations but pragmatically stated that until a better

solution offered itself they would continue to be taken. Essentially, father was cosmopolitan in his outlook and so was the school as he shaped it. He was, first and foremost, a dedicated headmaster, one for whom St. Paul's always meant more than any thing else.

I would now like to conclude. Let us rededicate ourselves to St. Paul's. Let us honour and benefit from those who have gone before. Let us be proud of our traditions and heritage. Let us accept the challenge of change that lies ahead and accept with confidence for the benefit of succeeding generations of Paulites and this great country, India. I give you in conclusion, father's watchwords which directed his life and I hope will direct the lives of many of us: "Integrity, Initiative and Wisdom."

MESSAGE FROM MR. BHASKAR GHOSH, Commissioner, Jalpaiguri Division.

It is a great privilege and honour to visit this well-known and prestigious institution. I have had occasion to meet a few Old Paulites and was able to gauge the strength of the school thereby. I just wished to add that while being grateful for the opportunity of studying at a school like St. Paul's it is important that you remember the country and the situation that prevails. We started the year on a promising note when the Basketball Cup came our way. Thus, the team began with renewed faith in our motto - keep up the house spirit.





A small word of praise to the soloists Vishu Lama of class VI A for his 'Chinese Carol' - a delightful soprano voice used to perfection and to Rajesh Talwar of class VIII for his performance of "Behold I bring you good tidings' - Rajesh will be an asset to the senior choir next year as a Tenor. I also express my appreciation to the readings from the Bible by the juniors - they had a 'Touch Of Class' which the seniors could well emulate.

The Senior service of carols with its seven lessons received its highest praise from Rt. Rev. E.J. Ghose - as reported earlier: The choir items were presented with finesse and skill - especially the medley of carols old and new 'ALLELUIA! NOW A CHILD IS BORN! THE JUBILEE SINGERS - now very much a part of the service of carols - had many feet heads beating time with their rendition of that old negro spiritual - 'GO TELL IT ON THE

MOUNTAIN'. A Special mention is made of the head chorister. Shiv Anand Cama for being the driving force behing the choir practises and for his masterly skill at reading the lessons. Thank You. Choir.

So much for singing the praises of the Choir - now for some hard trumpet blowing! On the 1st April - All Fools Day - we made our selections of personnel in order to establish our second marching band: A Drum and Bugle Band from the junior wing. We choose 15 students from class VIII C. In the group singing section we were compelled to use well loved hymns from the chapel repertoire, as we are still without a competent key board specialist. The Selections were made by the respective house captains with a single week set apart for rehearsals. Clive chose 'IN THE SWEET BY AND BY! Hastings - 'KEEP A SONG RINGING IN YOUR HEART'; Havelock - even though it was far too early in the year to sing carols chose 'GOD REST YOU MERRY GENTLEMENT' and Lawrence topped the score card with 'THERE IS A GREEN HILL FAR AWAY', sung to the setting of 'HOUSE OF THE RISING SUN'; Our chief guest of the evening Mr. Michael Goddard complimented the soloist and groups for

their delightful performance; he described the programme as good, simple and beautiful. Thank you, again Michael and Thank You to the team of judges-Mr. N. K. Sharma. Mr. K. Mustafi and Mr. G. O. Connor.

The school orchestra were privileged to perform for the annual school play 'MIDSUMMER MINK' by kind courtesy of the director and producer - Mr. Baljit Singh Bawa; The eleven piece ensemble comprising seven students and four members of staff accredited themselves well. Thank you, Mr. Bawa and Thank You to Mr. Phubu Tshering - flautist; Mr. Kaysang Tshering - guitarist and Mr. R. Rubens - percussionist for being a part of our musical heritage. Cheers to the boys for keeping alive the school orchestra and musical traditions of St. Paul's another year. Thanks fellows.

Annual house concerts of the senior wing still rely on house instrumental combo grown ensembles to boost their morale on stage; Although many hours of practice are required to get a finished performance for these rather odd combinations of instruments and more so in the students free time; these instrumental groups are beneficial to young musicians and provided a much needed platform for more major productions at school level.

The Adam's Music Prize on Speech Day was awarded to a fine young musician - ALOK KANTI for his excellent progress as a clarinetist from the year Dec'76; Alok has taken part in numerous Orchestra and Band programme both on stage and field; While I congratulate him for his sincerity and dedication I add a warm Farewall and good wishes for many more musical years to come.

I've saved a very special place in this report for the choir of the Junior wing; their annual concert on the 26th May melted the hearts of the varied and distinguished audiences that came to witness 'THE SELFISH GIANT'; The demands made by the director and producer - Mrs. Rajee Sharma and Mr. Kabir Mustafi along with the conducton D.A.V.P. could have driven them to insanity. LIBRARY NOTES

The basic difference between a library and a storehouse of books is, that in a library, every book gets its reader, and every reader should get his book. After all books are for use and if the process is quick, that is, if the reader's time is saved and the service is fast the reader will have an incentive to make his visits to the library more frequent and fruitful.

There are limitations imposed by the growing nature of the library in acquisitions, demands, and inherent problems. But then, what else is challenge?

The present holdings amount to 20,000 books assisted by 50 different periodicals. From next year, to make the information retrieval and disemination efficient, the Dewery Decimal Classification, 19th edition, which is followed by around 78% of the major general libraries of the world, shall be introduced. This is supplemented, symbolically speaking, by Anglo-American cataloging rules, Paris, 1975. The net result, once the system is in operation is an example of pure efficiency. In addition to this, regular readership surveys will also enable to gauge the demand as also scent the trend.

The question of inter-library loan is typical in the sense that today a Librarian is not limited by the holdings of his Library alone, but has the whole world holdings at his disposal, by having access to the major Bibliographic Tools. If this concept is introduced to the student at an early stage he shall be able to judiciously chalk out his information collection needs.

Apart from books, funds, and staff, a library needs responsible readers. And I am happy to mention here that except for a few juvenille acts of mischief and the customary temptations of removing coloured plates occasionally, the Paulite is fairly responsible and enthusiastic about using the school library in the most sensible manner. May it be like this always.



THE DUKES AWARD

The Award Scheme as re-activated sees its 2nd year at S.P.S. Initially, the future didn't seem promising for it, inspite of the enthusiasm and the large number of Award entrants. However, things picked up and the ensuing momentum snowballed with very pleasing results.

The three Darjeeling Award executive meetings helped to synchronise activities and were a service of support and inspiration to all concerned. This culminated in the 1st DEAS Award Function at which Awards were presented. We hope that schools other than S.P.S. and N.P. will join in soon. However, we are doing a rather satisfying job and are not disappointed that others havent joined in Whenever they wish to they are welcome and shall be joining a healthy and functioning body.

The Award promotional material and badges and ties arrived by April. The intensive chart making and initial meetings were adequately dispensed with and the stage was set for pursuing the Awards.

At S.P.S. we had a phenomenal 167 Bronze Award entrants, 70 Silver Award entrants and 16 Gold Award entrants making a total of 243 entrants in all.N.P. had another 28 entrants.

Skills: This section continued to be strong and we were able to add Yoga to the already wide field of activities this year. Music-Eastern & Western classical, pianoforte, violin, the band, batic, woodwork, painting - water & oils, photography, Natural History, electronics, computer, dramatics, debating, public speaking, reading calligraphy, the Spanish guitar, to mention the bulk of this section. were actively pursued. Adult helpers were persecuted (!) and qualifications were stringently allowed.

Physical Activity: Here the school games provided the field and each had its own enthusiasts. Cricket, hockey, football, basketball, volleyball, Table Tennis, Tennis, Squash Racquets, swimming, athletics, the marathon, badminton, boxing and Eton Fives provided the necessary outlets.

Service

Service: This was a much strengthened activity and the P.A. system and the M.E.T society were incorporated this year. Fire Service was a casualty. However, Mountain Rescue, First Aid (which seems to have acquired a very large following) and life saving (pool) were actioned with zest. An example of the keeness is the life saving qualification in the Silver Section on 27th Oct. at 6:30 p.m. and four Bronze level qualifications on the 7th of Nov. in village pond conditions and freezing water! An excellent rock climbing and Mountain Rescue demonstration on the 26th of Oct. saw several more qualifications in this section. The stretcher traverse and the seat-harness traverse were spectacular but the Jumar accent with a casualty as the most demanding Teaching continues as another service.

Expeditions: This was where the Paulites literally 'freaked out'. In early march two groups comprising of 13 boys from the silver section went down to the Toorsa for initial training canoeing and then journeying in these. Paul Clarkeson from. Atlantic College in walles was the instructor. All boys grasped the initials soon and

two learnt the Eskimo Roll. Canoeing had come of age in St Paul's. This exciting and beautiful sport was introduced thanks to the efforts of Col. Khullar of the H.M.I. and we are thankful to the army for all their unstinted help and watermanship demonstration. After initial training thirteen groups for the bronze Award comprising of 114 entrants and six groups for the silver Award comprising of 37 entrants went out on a very rainy 7th of July. This total of 151 lads was a literal nightmare to equip, manage, assess and finish the usual aftermath. Yet we rose to the occasion and everything worked smoothly and efficiently. However, it was only with the return of the last group that we could start to breath again. The H.M.I, the Youth Hostel, our Pioneer Stores and Summit Tours did the equiping Mr. Ashok Thakur is to be thanked for dealing with the tents and rucksacks. Mr. B. B. Tamang for the assessments done over three sleepless nights and Mr. A. Drona, our E.M. for risking his neck and driving us all over in the school jeep. A sight that comes to mind is the mule track from Bajora to Rumbi under 6" to 12" of running water overgrown with vegitation and bumpy with huge rocks negotiated at night! Rangaroon, Rumbi, Tiger Hill, Dhuri, Chatta, Lepcha Jagat, Ghoom rock, Bagora (several sighs) and Mungpo were invaded by boys pitching tents, digging pits, cooking food and then leaving without much evidence of their visits. There were 21 disqualification of the bronze level and none for the more experienced silver entrants. The 6 groups of silvers further visited Sandakphu, Jhorphokri, Soom, Bagora, Singla, Badamtan and Manjithar.

Another group of 6 for the bronze visited Rangaroon on the 20th of Oct. Sikkim also served us well with Rangpoo as the base Three groups trekked to Mungsong and further had to trek from Tista to S.P.S. as they had no option! The road being blocked by landsliders! All this in three days of pouring rain.

The Golds trekked to Halembu from Kathmandu. We thank Mr. Kalden Sherpa and his Sherpa Travels for organising this for us. There were treks to the Sandakhphu - Phalut areas in March, May and October. The last group came down to Rimbick and trekked to Bijanbari. Yet another group of 6 trekked from Yuksum till beyond Dzongri.

All in all it was a gratifying year for this section and some of the logs were masterpieces in that art. I wish I could quote some of the observations and poetry!

Residential Projects: The Gaida Tops provided the opportunity for studies in wild life and ecology so ably handled by Mr. N. Gomes. Then five of our boys qualified for the R.C. dispensary in Manibhanjan. I was skeptical about this at first but the work done and the reports from the dispensary adequately proved that all fears were ill founded and the lads had done a commendable job.

This year the ISC'85 boys had not been able to take advantage of our usual skiing, Naval and adventure courses.

The Award Function: The 28th of October saw our 1st Award Function at the Gymkhana club. The boys rose to the occassion and a tremendous amount of work was done in filling in Award books, putting up display charts, Calligraphing Certificates, giving out invitations, arranging the hall, putting up the P.A. system etc. etc. etc

Col. D. K. Khullar, leader of the successful Indian'84 Everest Expedition was the Chief Guest and presented the Awards with S.P.S. attaining 66 Bronze, 38 Silver and 8 Gold Awards and N.P. a further 12 Bronzes and 8 silvers, His was an unenviable task. In all 112 Awards for S.P.S. and 18 for N.P. were presented. Father Mcquire of St. Roberts, Mr. Gautam Lepcha and Mr. Denzil Prince are to be thanked for the excellent music produced that afternoon.

Excerpts from speeches:

Father German S.J., Chairman - So often the tendency is to go and blast throw if out, try something else at another blast, stopgo blast somewhere else - I mean blasts of concentration which dry up. The Duke of Edinburgh is asking for an enthusiasm which continues and makes you more mature and responsible in life. You've got to persist and I hope one day you will all get the Awards so be it."

Mr. P.C. Mall, Secretary - "The Award itself is an umbrella organisation that takes in most of the other schemes. What makes the scheme so beautiful is that it reaches out to even the handicapped -In fact, it reaches out to anyone young, persistent and capable."

At each level persistence is esential. This is where the role of the adult becomes significant. It is a challenge to him to help and be sympathetic. It does not mean that if he feels that the entrants feelings will be hurt he just signs up. The fact remains that the

Adult does give the Award. The entrant himself works for and achieves it and wears that bit of metal in pride knowing that he has earned it. The challenge is to yourself and not to be in competition with someone else. Your enter the Award at a certain level and qualify at a certain level - you have accepted the challenge - you have achieved. It is your achievement over a certain rigid span of time. The integrity of the Adult helper and the entrant lies here.

The fields from which the entrant can choose his activities are very wide and varied. The idea is that the more versatile the environment the more interested the entrant is. That it is a leisure time activity must always be kept in mind. May you progress and achieve.

Col. D. K. Khullar - What makes the scheme stand out is its total vastness. I am glad that we have started at the Public Schools in such a big way. At the same time, it should not be confined to just the elitist groups. We should come to a juncture where the common man can also participate as it will do the nation a lot of good. In any nation where there is a spirit of adventure - that nation will thrive, that nation will survive';




FOOTBALL 1984


CABLE HOUSE REPORT 1984



It is with great pride that we can say that inspite of a very tumultous year with changes in personnel at St. Paul's the chapel continued to flourish and came into its own towards the end of the year with three wonderful carol services each bidding to outdo the other. An excellent precedent for the future when this beautiful spot will positively become the core of the community that goes by the nomenclature Paulite.

The year ended with a touching, beautiful, and dignified senior wing Carol Service on 18th November. This was conducted by Bishop J.E. Ghose, Mr. Denzil Prince continues to be a source of inspiration with his stupendous achievements with the choir. His enthusiasm is not only catching but positively contagious. He did wonderful things to keep spirits from flagging.

OLD PAULITE ASSOCIATION CALCUTTA ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1984-85

The Old Paulite Association is now fifty years old and it is a tribute to all its members that this fellowship has outlasted many trials and tribulations that have often threatened to break up the Association. It is now up to the future generation of Old Paulites to ensure that it goes from strength to strength and remains a worthy Association to be proud of. Therefore, it is in the fitness of things that I ask you all to pay your homage to the memory of the one man who was responsible for all of us getting together on occassions such as this. I refer to our most revered Rector, a legend in his lifetime as a teacher and administrator, Mr. Leslie Goddard, who passed away suddenly in September last year. It is sad that he could not live to hear about the Golden Jubilee celebrations of the Association he had founded in 1934. We are all the poorer at his loss since he continued actively to keep in touch with all the affairs of the Association and never missed the opportunity to offer his counsel where necessary. Gentlemen, let us rise and observe a minute's silence to the memory of that great man who was a mentor and inspiration to many generations of Old Paulites. On your behalf I have already sent our message of condolence to Mrs. Masie Goddard and her family.

Whilst I am talking about Mr. Goddard, I am sure all of you will be very pleased to know that the first OPA scholar at St. Paul's School will be known as the "Leslie Goddard OPA Scholar". That is our tribute to the founder of the Association. On this subject there has been a slight hitch in awarding this scholarship due to the change in stewardship of St. Paul's School. With Mr. Gardner firmly in the saddle now we hope that with his help we can find the first deserving son of a deserving Old Paulite to receive the honour. It will be worth about Rs. 6000/- a year to the recipient.

Since the last Annual General Meeting, I am happy to say that your Association has kept up the good work of trying to achieve some of our objectives. The Old Paulite Association is now registered as a Society under the West Bengal Act XXVI of 1961, with its headquarters at Calcutta. We had always felt that this was necessary to consolidate the functioning of the Association.

Speaking of consolidation, your Association requires funds

to enable it to serve the members in a more meaningful manner. The scholarship is only a beginning. For one thing, there can easily be several such scholars. The Association needs to expand to other parts of India and overseas. Delhi has a branch which functions quite well but the parent Association needs to distribute funds to others who want to start branches. To achieve this, the active help of all Old Paulites, not just the Committee members, is required to organize fund-raising drives. The Association can then also help the school much more than it has been able to do in the past. May I remind you that at least two Old Boys associations of other schools have shown how with the co-operation of all its members, substantial amounts of money can be raised and put to good purpose. Why then should the Old Paulite Association lag behind? Therefore, this appeal to all Old Paulites to come forward and suggest ways and means of doing something on similar, if not better, lines.

In order to communicate better with all Old Paulites far and near, we had mooted the idea of compiling a register of known addresses of Old Paulites all over the world. The last Rector had undertaken this task over the last few years, but I am sorry to report that the resultant directory that has just been published is an exercise in futility. If you look through a copy you will find your address as the one that you had when joined the school. In most cases they have long since been changed several times over. It was revealing for me to discover that I once lived at an address I had long since forgotten! Therefore, yet again we shall require Mr. Gardner's a help to put this right. Once we have a proper Directory of addresses, we can decide on how to establish an effective communication system to keep Old Paulites abreast of all happenings.

In this year of the Golden Jubilee of the Association, we did organize a few celebrations but we could have done better with a little more enthusiasm from the members. Apart from a festival cricket match between Old Paulites at the Mohun Bagan ground which was enjoyed by a small band of members, the big occassion was the Golden Jubilee Dinner held at the Bengal Club which was a formal affair with a memorable dinner attended by a sizeable group of Old Paulites of all ages. I feel that those who missed it really missed a big opportunity to renew Old acquaintances. The only negative factor to the celebations was that although invited, none of the members of the Governing Body thought it fit to

attend except for Mr. Kalyan Bose and his wife Nilu who attended more on the Old Paulite ticket. This is a sad commentary on the relations between the Old Paulite Association and the Governing Body of the School. This is something on which we have to do some public relations work.

The Association is on a fairly sound financial base as far as the routine work is concerned and our Treasurer will give you all the details. However, as I mentioned earlier, we need to build a large fund to enable the Association to undertake projects for the benefit of its members and the school. For this purpose, we need the dedication and resolve of a new generation of Old Paulites as volunteers and I appeal to all of you to pass the word around so that we can find a group, which rise to the occasion.

As provided in our Charter of Association, Mr. Gardner will now become the ex-officio President of the Association. We wish him well in this capacity and look ahead to big things. We also wish him, his family and all at St. Paul's School the very best for 1985.

My grateful thanks to that small band of dedicated Old Paulites headed by Raj Naidu and Puran Sawhney who have kept the Old Paulite Association going. The Association requires many more of their kind in order to charter the future course of events for the Old Paulite Association. If I may, on your behalf I would like to send our felicitations to one such dedicated Old Paulite who also looks after the Delhi Chapter as its Secretary, Dr. Samiran Nundy, for having the Padma Shri conferred upon him by the President of India. We are indeed proud.

In conclusion, I personally wish to thank all the members of the outgoing committee for their help and support in running the affairs of the Association for the past one year. I appeal to all of you to ensure that your interests as members of the Association are kept alive and active.



OBITUARY

MR. LESLIE GODDARD

Mr. Leslie James Goddard, OBE, for thirty years Rector of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, and an influential educationist in India, died on September 11 at the age of 84.

After taking a history degree at Trinity Hall, Cambridge, where he played football for the university, he went to Westcott House where he passed the General Ordination Examination, after which he spent four years as a house master at St. Lawrence College, Ramsgate.

When Goddard arrived to take up his post at St. Paul's in February, 1934, he found the buildings seriously damaged by the great earthquake of the previous year and a mere 134 pupils, whose standards of discipline and academic acheivement were disconcertingly low. However, he resisted the temptation to return to Ramsgate where he had passed four happy years and went on to transform St. Paul's into one of the finest schools in Asia.

Although a devout Christian, insisting that the Chapel was to be the centre of life at St. Paul's, Goddard was no dogmatist.

Every faith was repressented in the school, which rapidly became international in character, with boys from all parts of the sub-continent. Britain, Thailand, Burma, Iran, Singapore and even East Africa, working and playing together in remarkable harmony.

Goddard was chairman of the Conference of Heads of Anglo-Indian Schools after the war.

In 1947, when India acheived her Independence, Goddard decided to stay on and continue his work as one of the country's most respected headmasters. In that year he met Mahatma Gandhi, a week before the latter began his fast to bring to an end the communal strife in Calcutta. That meeting had a profound influence on Goddard's outlook on life and religion.

In 1956, he was awarded the OBE for his services to education in India. In 1958 he had to be flown home to England to undergo major brain surgery. Within a year, however, he was back in Darjeeling, with impaired vision and speech but as enthusiastic and purposeful as ever for a further five years of headmastership.

After his retirement to Penn in 1964 Goddard played host to countless Old Paulites and former colleagues from India. He was a man who transcended the barriers of race and creed.

He is survived by his wife, son and daughter.

"Wanted: More Goddards. Leslie Goddard's O.B.E. will perhaps please the largest number of young Indians; this most excellent Rector of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, has provided the Government and mercantile firms with more officers than perhaps any other school in Eastern India "(Hindustan Standard 2nd June 1956)."

Under Mr. Goddard's stewardship, the school has during the past three decades developed into an institution noted for its academic and athletic achievements." (The Statesman, 30th June 1984).

It is also in the field of School sports activities that Leslie Goddard will be remembered widely. Since 1935, he frequently captained the School Cricket XI, which on several occasions won the Edinburgh Shield. In soccer, too, he often played for the School, He captained the team on many occasions.

His energy, courage, wisdom and foresight, his tenacity and his combination of idealism and realism were responsible for transforming a crumbling monument into one of the finest educational Institutions in Asia, renowned for its academic and athletic achievements, for its highly disciplined, well-mannered boys and its healthy cosmopolitanism.

As a final word we can say what Hamlet said about his father, "He was a man, take him for all in all, I shall not look upon his like again."
