











## SPEECH DAY 1987

#### Ladies and Gentlemen

I am privileged to welcome Mr.Bernard Brooks, Principal, Dr. Graham's Homes, Kalimpong, on this very special occasion and am grateful that you have been able to spare us some of your valuable time.

Mr. Brooks and Mrs. Brooks, who I'm sorry has been unable to join us today, have long associations with St. Paul's School.

Mr. Brooks began his career as a teacher in St. Paul's in 1950, met a charming young lady, Miss I. H. Bowden, who joined in 1955; married her and after seven years of service in this institution moved on for further experience elsewhere.

Mr. & Mrs. Brooks finally joined the Dr. Graham's Homes in Kalimpong. I had the pleasure of meeting them in September, 1970 for the first time.

Mr. Brooks has been a member of the Board of Governors of St. Paul's School for a period of time and helped guide and advise past Rectors through many a difficult period.

Mr. Brooks has served 38 years in nurturing young lives and we congratulate him and his wife for the dedicated service rendered in this area. Mr. Brooks retires from the Homes at the end of this year and I know all principals in the neighbourhood and of Anglo-Indian Schools all over India are going to miss his warm, pleasing personality and valuable guidance at meetings and especially at our All-India Heads of Schools Conferences. Mrs. Brooks will be missed for her generous hospitality and gracious charming ways at various functions in the District.

I would like you to know, Sir, that we of the St. Paul's Community feel greatly honoured by your presence with us today.

I also welcome Parents, visitors, friends and Old Paulites. Without you today, this would be just another ordinary activity, but your presence does make it a very special occasion for all of us. Thank you for making the effort and sparing the time to come up and spend it with our children.

We opened School on 27th February, 1987 when the examination students arrived ready to begin their final examination on 2nd March. In spite of the tense situation and the anxiety of the adults who were called back to take care of them, the boys were calm and went straight to work on what they realised needed top priority.

The examination for Class X was completed on 14th March and while we said farewell to them, we welcomed the rest of the school on the 16th, 17th, 18th. The ISC class worked on, and after a prolonged break owing to the elections, finally completed their last paper on 6th April. The new XIs and this years XIIs joined soon after on 8th April.

From the point of view of external examination 1986 has been a very successful year. Our Class X results were good, but the class 12(ISC) were excellent. Hard, consistent work paid dividends. I congratulate both staff and students for bringing honour to the school. If the present lads, especially in X and XII work as earnestly and consistently as did those who passed out in March, then we can look forward to good, if not better results next year. I mention here, boys, it is only your sincere efforts that will make the difference finally. As it has often been said, School Masters can teach and advise but to follow the better things involves unremitting effort and ceaseless work. Work and discipline-without these two fundamentals being stressed in an individual, nothing can reach a stage of perfection. Each one of you should strive for perfection.

1987, so far has been a healthy year for the boys. We have had no epidemic at all. A few cases of Jaundice, some broken bones and the off and on fever, colds and coughs. For this happy state of affairs we have much to thank the Asstt. Steward, the Caterers and their team of workers, for feeding the children regular nursing meals in spite of the numerous problems and the criticism they

face every single day and of course the Doctors, nurses and their staff who keep a watchful eye on every single individual and give them the timely attention needed.

I must also thank the Bursar with his office helpers, the Secretaries in the different Wings, the Estate Maintenance department and all who work there. The Matrons, Hall and House Masters, Mistresses, all teachers who not only instruct in the class room but spend many of their daylight hours with the children coaching them and helping in Debates, Drama, Music, elocution, hobbies, on the games field, and in the gymnasium, striving to attain and maintain the vary best.

A sincere thank you is also due to the Heads of Primary and Junior Wings, my Second Master and the Senior Master for their cooperation and for keeping things under control in their respective departments. The Prefects under the leadership of an efficient school captain, Ananda Chatterjee, have carried much of the responsibility for the day-to-day routine and discipline of the boys.

Finally a special word of appreciation and grateful thanks to all officers of the Army and especially to the Commandants of the 107 Inf BN(TA) ,Col. TR Prasher, and the BSF Col. AN Ray for the regular and timely help they have given over this last critical period when the Municipal Water pump broke down. These two friends of the school very generously permitted us the use of their tankers to provide water three and four times a day. Without their willing aid we would certainly not have been able to survive. On behalf of the boys and our staff, THANK YOU warmly indeed.

This year we welcomed Mr. S. Chakravarthi, Mr. & Mrs. D. De and Mr. and Mrs. N. Lawrence and Neil their little son. Having spent sometime with us and now familiar with their surroundings. I hope they will all stay on for many more years to give of their knowledge and experience.

Those who resigned were Mr. & Mrs. J. Goswami to take up a Principalship in Calcutta, Mr. and Mrs. M. Vincent to go and serve down South, Mr. & Mrs. P. Sen to work abroad and Mr. D. Banerjee who was drawn back to Calcutta. We wish them all every success in their new appointments.

Our games and extra-curricular activities continue. Even though there are many who raise their eye-brows when they hear how involved the lads are, they need to realise that there is a set time for everything and so we are able to fit these in along with academics.

Our boys have participated in Inter-House and Inter-School activities. They have won some events and lost others but in the process the boys have learned, that winning is not everything. It is the spirit in which they play the game and the physical fitness and the enjoyment they derive that counts most. However, we do need to congratulate our Dr. Master's Elocution team and their teachers for winning the Inter-School trophy for the second year in succession.

Well done all and specially those of you who brought back laurels to the school this year.

The DEAS, Pioneers, NCC, Scouts, Cubs and a new group inspired by Mr. UK Dwivedi's enthusiasm to create an environmental awareness in people have each made their contribution to the very worthwhile broadening of experiences of the boys.

All these activities in their own particular way help our young people to develop richer and more mature personalities.

Our young people come from families and homes with socio-economic advantages. Thus our aim is to educate these lads, your boys, in 'VALUES' which will slowly and unobtrusively but assuredly, we hope, lift our society out of its selfish materialism by giving them a wider understanding and concern, a feeling of compassion and tolerance and strengthen their characters so as to equip them to provide moral leadership in our world today-a world in which there is a falling of moral standards in the scramble for material gain. All this in my opinion, is a valuable contribution, small though it be, towards improving the future quality of life in our country

Our concern in schools like St. Paul's has been more than mere schooling-with more than just imparting knowledge and skills or preparing boys to pass examinations or even with just preparing boys for life in the world at large.

Basically our concern has been to direct those, for whom we have assumed responsibility, to what they can and should be in the world. I firmly believe BUILDING BOYS IS BETTER THAN MENDING MEN.

It is a great challenge-an awesome and fearful task and responsibility. Educating, really educating the privileged youth of today, so that they may go out into the wide, wide world, not merely as trained intellectuals, but, and perhaps more important, as feeling intellectuals possessing the sensitivity to treat others with the fairness and compassion they themselves would like meted out to them.

Society does need intelligence and expertise but without a concern for others we are not worthy of our God given humanity. I am certain many of our boys will be placed in positions of authority some day in various walks of life. It is vital that they be educated so that they become more concerned with their DUTIES rather than their DUES-so that they can be trusted implicitly by others to exercise their authority, their power and their influence for the

common good without a view to personal favours or gains.

Our country needs leaders in industry, administration, in the judiciary, in education, medicine and other fields, Leaders who are gifted with the vision of service-not an insatiable appetite for power, wealth and position.

Today more than ever before our country needs a change in the attitude of the individual, a change in the attitude of the adult and of the privileged youth in particular.

We therefore, as a church school, are here to pass on the meaning of the Two greatest commandments-first TO LOVE GOD above all else and second to LOVE and SERVE our fellowmen without counting the cost in terms of time or money.

Each day here, is begun with HYMNS OF PRAISE and PRAYER to GOD to make us mindful of the abundance of HIS blessings. Our Chapel services mean much to all Paulites. For these day to day arrangements and organisation. I take this opportunity to thank Mr. D. Prince, Miss E. Ricketts for the music and Mr. GR Anthony and the Chapel wardens for the regular, untiring service they render.

And finally, in the beautifully expressed words of the school prayer we do indeed praise GOD for our school and for the heritage into which we have entered. May HE remove whatever is unworthy from our midst; may HE help us to cherish and strengthen whatever is best and bind us more closely together in the spirit of loyalty and service, that our school may grow from strength to strength.

## A SUMMARY OF THE THE SPEECH BY THE

#### CHIEF GUEST, MR. B. T. BROOKS PRINCIPAL, DR. GRAHAM'S HOMES.

Mr.B. T. Brooks, Head Master, Dr. Graham's Homes, Kalimpong, was Chief Guest at this year's Speech Day function. His address was a little unusual but most touching and thought - provoking.

Mr. Brooks spoke of his association with St. Paul's. Thirty-eight years ago he had embarked upon a teaching career, as a young and callow master of English, here in St. Paul's, and now, he said, he felt a tremendous sense of satisfaction that in the year when he was going to retire from the profession he was being honoured as the Chief Guest at the school's Speech Day function. His teaching career had come a full circle, as it were.

For his young audience he had a simple message; BE HONEST. He underlined the importance of honesty and truthfulness in our lives by relating an enlightening story of an incident which occurred in Vanderbilt University, U.S.A., several years ago.

A professor of Mathematics had planned to give his class of forty-two students a test. But having been called away on an important assignment elsewhere, he was not going to be able to supervise the exam. He told his students to sit for the exam on their own and advised them; "you are sitting for two tests. One is Mathematics, the other is honesty. Whatever you do, if you have to fail, for heaven's sake let it be in Mathematics and not in the latter."

The next day the students took their test and some weeks later, when the professor submitted his marks to the Dean of students, he sent a note in which he proudly remarked; Passed in Mathematics 38; Passed in Honesty-ALL 42!

With this simple story, Mr Brooks conveyed a message which was not only aimed straight at the heart, but was positively inspirational. A message that we ought to keep uppermost in our lives, everyday.

Willy Loman is a travelling salesman, 63 years old, and at the end of an indifferent career.

However, he has always been a man of dreams, of intermittent vision and in this twilight of his years these dreams and visions are inextricably enmeshed with memories, bitter and sweet, and a reality at once harsh and unrelenting in its bewildering onslaught.

Linda, brave and strugglingly optimistic, copes with the situations as best as she can; with a hurt and petulantly autocratic husband on the one hand and two grown but undependable sons with their own problems on the other.

The play is arranged in two acts and spans little over 24 hours in real time but months, years and moments in the past.

### DEATH OF A SALESMAN A REVIEW

1986's runaway success 'Becket' was going to be difficult to emulate, we accepted that. But the standard set would also have to be lived upto.

As usual the first of our difficulties was to find a suitable play. We wanted something powerful, something that made people think, something that just would not go away, and finding such a play was very nearly too daunting. But finally, after countless books, we decided on Death of a Salesman and despite the awesome amount of work the play very clearly indicated had to be done, the die was cast and the cast carefully chosen.

When the curtain was raised on the main performance the visual impact of a novel three level stage was staggering. Designed by Mr. Phubu Tshering and executed by Mr. Gokul Chhetri and his team of carpenters, it was a visual treat. Such a setting just had to be complemented with a talented and be fitting performance; and it was the unanimous opinion of every member of a huge audience that the acting and the quality of the entire performance was simply excellent.

Ananda Chatterjee as Willy Loman, carried off a very difficult role with aplomb and SI Haider was delightfully natural as Biff, the errant but perceptive elder son. Vikram Singha as Happy, Biff's younger brother, Vineet Arora as Charley, Willy's long suffering friend and Sumit Arora as Ben, Willy Loman's dead brother, acted with a sense of commitment and sympathy that was so apparent that it made one wonder. Indeed, so caught up were they in the

lives they were portraying that it was difficult, much later, to dissonlate them from their roles.

Ripundam Shahi as Howard Wagner was despicably convincing and Munwant Chowdhury's handling of the part of Bernard was perhaps the pleasantest surprise. His portrayal of the transition of Bearnard from a hesitant, hero-worshipping book-worm to a confident, sensitive and successful Lawyer underlined the general standard of the play.

Even the smaller roles were complementary, and Nikhil Sant, Sujoy Chowdhury, Peter Howard and Sandeep Patodia, aided by some very stylish and effective costuming designed by Mrs. Kamini Mustafi and Mrs. Anietta Roy, not only looked their parts but acted them too.

I have deliberately kept for the end, mention of the two boys who played the most difficult parts of the play. Nishant Kamani, as the woman in Willy's seedy past and Indrajeet Mookherjee as his totally supportive, all seeing wife Linda, were quite astounding.

Getting senior boys to agree to play the female part in any play is difficult but what made our work so much easier was the fact that both these boys understood that unless they could carry off their roles there was no way that the play would be able to stand. They overcame an obvious shyness and reluctance and accepted the challenge with a sportsmanship that can only be lauded. And as if that were not all, they then set about perfecting a part they could not have been less suited for, until they showed us all what talent and dedication can achieve. There was not a person who was not awed by these two boys and no praise can be enough for a thorough performance from Nishant and one of commanding sensitivity from Indrajeet.

Dibyakar Chhetri, Prabhakar Thapa, and their harassed crew of electricians, as usual carried their job off without a hitch. We are going to be losing these boys soon and we hope that they will leave suitably trained juniors to take their places.

Mr. Denzil Prince, invaluable as ever, was there with us all the way through, a pillar of support and a wealth of sound advice, arranging and compiling an inspired score for the music for the play.

The play was a tremendous success, according to many, even more than Becket, But as always, successes are invariably the result of hardwork from every one involved and none of this would have been possible without the very active help and continuous encouragement of the Rector, Mr. Jefferson A. Gardner.

As a final word we would like to mention that both "Becket" and "Death of a Salesman" were fantastic experiences and the satisfaction of having been in association with these performances has been great indeed.












## HOCKEY REPORT





It was scheduled to be held as usual, in May this year but unfortunately, due to unavoidable circumstances it had to be postponed to September.



## **ENVIRONMENT PROTECTION SOCIETY**

The Senchal catchment area in Darjeeling is the main source of water for the Senchal Lake which in turn is the sole permanent reservoir of the Darjeeling water supply. It is reputed to be a wildlife sanctuary abounding in flora and fauna. However closer inspection reveals that its wildlife as well as water retaining capacity is being greatly undermined due to the presence of an insufficient number of trees. The result of such sparse forestation is rapid top soil erosion resulting in infertility and a paltry trickle of water to Darjeeling during the lean season.

Thus to prevent the above problems from becoming a crisis a newly formed Environmental Protection Society (EPS) has been established. It was inaugurated by Col. K. S. Mall, Deputy Brigade Commander 123 Mountain Brigade on 10th July, 1987. The President of the Society is Mr. J. Gardner, the Secretary, Mr. U. K. Dwivedi and Deputy Secretary Suman Thapa.

The first phase of the society's enterprising plans have been successfully executed and involved the reforestation of four hectares of land in the Senchal area. Boys from our School and the boys and girls of Ghum High School along with jawans helped in its undertaking. The area was cleared of weeds and shrubs and plantation work was completed by 1st August. The involvement of the youth of schools and colleges was an integral step in spreading environmental awareness. This will greatly reduce the difficulties faced by the EPS in its future undertakings.

In this series the second phase involves water pollution control in streams and rivers by proper disposal of domestic waste by digging pits specifically designed for rubbish and manure in the villages. To understand the importance of environmental protection is the key to living in a pollution free world. Keeping this in mind the EPS has tried to bring out a feeling of general awareness among the people by holding several handsomely awarded competitions related with the environment. Essay writing and Drawing competitions are a few examples of the

above scheme in which Paulites took part and received distinctions.

The EPS is receiving rightly deserved recognition and a few of the eminent personalities who patronize it are Mr. Rusi Modi-Chairman and Managing Director of TISCO and Mr. Pradeep Burman who is the Managing Director, Vido gum and Chemicals. The latter has donated Rs. 2,000/- from Dr. S. K. Burman Charitable Trust to bring out the newsletter of this Society.

The initiator of the EPS is Mr. Dwivedi, the Head of our Biology Department and thus it is with keen interest that we chart the achievements of the Society and our experience is enriched even more by being a working committee.

## MAKING THE HILLS GREEN

## Darjeeling Organisation undertakes forest protection

Darjeeling is famed for its beauty, but few realise that it is often more apparent than real. Take the Senchal catchment, for example. According to government files, it is described as a wildlife sanctuary and reserved forest. But a visit to the area tells a very different story: the wildlife has been virtually wiped out and the forest reduced to a few paltry trees: despite being the major source of drinking water in the area, deforestation has given rise to landslides and has severely handicapped water supply to the hill town.

The Environment Protection Society (EPS), a newly formed organisation in Darjeeling, has decided to do something about the potential time bomb ticking away in the hills. The Senchal area has been taken over by the group for scientific afforestation, with the help of the West Bengal Forest Development Corporation (WBFDC). EPS secretary U.K. Dwivedi told Sunday that students from various local schools and Jawans from the Territorial Army

and the Indian Army's Mountain Division had already made a start by clearing the catchment of weeds, shrubs and bushes.

The EPS has also undertaken to combat water pollution in streams and rivers by removing weeds and ensuring proper disposal of domestic waste by digging pits specifically designed for rubbish and manure in the villages.

## PROJECT REPORT

The Senchal catchment area in Darjeeling has been adopted by the Environment Protection Society and a Programme of afforestation, Soil Conservation and environmental awareness is underway. This project was inaugurated by Col. KS Mall, Deputy Brigade Commander, 123 Mountain Brigade on 10th July, 1987. The following is a summary of the Project.

It was recorded that the Darjeeling water supply is from the Senchal lakes. A third lake- the Sindhab lake has been constructed below Aranya Sarani. Water from this lake is pumped to the Senchal lake as and when required. These lakes collect water from the hill sides and also from the "Jhoras".

It has been noted that due to the denudation of the forest in the catchment area, the flow of water and the water holding capacity of the soil have been seriously effected. As a result of this the water supply to Darjeeling, particularly in the lean season has been far below the required amount.

It has been further noted that due to unchecked grazing by cattle and other live- stock, the soil has hardened and its water holding capacity has decreased. If it continues for a longer period the soil will become unsuitable for vegetation.

The Senchal area has been declared a wild life sanctuary long ago but the wild life population in the 'Senchal has been decreasing over the years due to deforestation and human interference.

In view of the above facts the following steps have been planned and are being taken.

The Environment Protection Society started work in about four hectares of land in the Senchal catchment area. The boys of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, the girls of Ghoom High School, the boys of Ghoom High School, the Jawans of 123 Mountain Brigade and the territorial Army (courtesy Brig. S. Vijay Kumar), along with expert assistance from Mr. S. Dhoundyal, IFS, Div. Forest Officer (Wild life), Darjeeling and Mr. D. Biswas, IFS, Divisional Manager, W.B.F.D. Corporation have been responsible for the massive cleaning operation which took more than two months. The area has been cleared of weeds and shrubs. Plantation work in this four hectares of land was completed on the 1st of August, 1987. The Environment Protection Society has been able to achieve it by involving the youth, especially the students of various schools and colleges. Environmental problems can be solved by motivating and involving the youths and awareness created at grass root level giving the movement a broad base.

The Environment Protection Society is now involved in the second phase of its protection programme which involves the Institution of a voluntary protection force which will help in protecting the eco-system of the entire Senchal Catchment Area. The main aims and objectives of creating a voluntary protection force are as follows:-

- Maintenance of newly planted saplings i.e watering, fencing, eradication of weeds etc.
- To check illicit felling of trees by logical, legal methods. If the force is unable in its capacity to check it effectively, authorities will be asked for necessary action.

- To create awareness among the local population about the eco-system by means of talks, adult help, audio-visual aids, discussions, film shows etc.
- 4. To make relevant eco-studies of the area.
- 5. To protect and study the wild life of the area.
- To educate the villagers living within the Senchal Catchment Area about the alternate sources of energy like Biogas Plant, Smokeless Chullahs etc. It is essential to save the existing forest in the Catchment Area.
- To check live stock grazing in the Senchal Catchment Area by educating the villagers I iving within the catchment area and by providing alternate areas.

This is a mini project and an experiment which has wide ramifications not only for this area but which can be used throughout the country for similar purposes.




The electronics hobby in J.W. was reactivated after a period of two years and received with much the some enthusiasm as previously, especially from the ten members.







Boxing, a contact sport in which the boys excel, was lost by the narrowest of margin. The boys individually




dld the house proud. S. Dalmia a likely winner broke his arm a few days before the finals while defending goal during a hockey match.



More next year, I'm sure.



wrote accounts of the same. A couple of these appear elsewhere in this magazine.



#### SHIPWRECKED

It was a pleasant morning, The sun was shining brightly, The birds were flying high up in the sky. Suddenly my brother came on the scene. He looked very excited and happy, He shouted "Hey, pack up " I did not know what was happening until we had packed our things and reached the airport. Then my brother said that we were going to fly to New York and from there go on a voyage to South Africa with our father. At first I did not believe my brother, but when he showed me the ticket I was so excited and overjoyed.

At 4.30 p.m. we landed in New York, from the airport we went to a restaurant and we could not help ourselves eating! It was getting dark so we paid our bill and waited for a taxi. It was lucky for us that we found a taxi to take us at a fair price to Bayport. We reached Bayport at 8.30 p.m. and we reached our house at 8.56 p.m. From the window we could see our father sleeping and at the side of him a man was sitting. We thought the man was our uncle but when we entered our house we found that the man was a doctor! Soon we also found that our father would not be able to accompany us on the voyage because he was seriously ill. We ate our supper and went to bed.

Next morning we had a heavy breakfast then said our father "Good-bye" and set out for New York with our uncle who had gone on many dangerous voyages and knew very much about the sea. We reached New York at 8.30 a.m. and went to the same restaurant. Then we started for the sea port and we came to know that our ship's name was The Sea Eagle. There were twenty-one men in the ore and all together there were twenty eight men on the ship. Among them was an old man of about 63 or 64 years. We spent our night in a hotel, then started our voyage the next day. My brother was three years older than me. He was fifteen and I was twelve years at that time. It was a very dangerous voyage because we had to cross the Atlantic ocean and we did not know what was going to befall us.

In the morning we were to start our voyage, it was cloudy, black and grey clouds covered the sky, so we postponed our voyage to the next day. That night our uncle Mr. Joe Smith told us how to behave and all the possible ways of helping the crew. We spent the night at the inn.

The next morning we woke up early and had our breakfast. Then we got ready for the voyage. We got in the ship with the crew and then my uncle got in with the Captain Mr. H. Kennedy. My uncle went into the cabin with Mr. Kennedy, while we stayed with the crew watching how they set the sails. Soon the ship began to move from the port and began to speed. We were very fascinated. On our voyage we also saw many sea creatures. Some also tried to attack our ship, like the sharks and the sword fish. Soon we had our tea and biscuits and talked with the old man. He told us stories and we shot questions at him and he gave the answers to all our questions. It was getting darker and colder. My brother and I went inside the cabin and played cards and talked and then went to sleep. We did not have a comfortable sleep because it was our first time sleeping on a ship.

The next morning we woke up and had our breakfast and started looking around the ship and talking to the men or the crew. Days passed by, and weeks and months passed by. We started feeling home-sick and started grumbling to ourselves. We longed to be at Bayport with our father and mother. All around us was water. We were in a water desert.

One morning the crew started shouting "land ahead". We were so happy that we sprang out of our beds and ran in our night suits to the crew who were still shouting Land was visible but it did not seem that we could reach there in an hour because the nearer we went the farther it seemed. But, it was possible for us to reach land by nightfall. Soon we reached the "Cape of Good Hope" and were just about to reach South Africa when suddenly a terrible storm started and it was dark and misty and nothing could be seen. We did not even know where we were being pushed off to. All of a sudden we dashed against a rock and "crash"! The front of the ship was broken and water started pouring into the ship. We were horrified. The

crew threw the life-boats and we grabbed whatever edible things came our way, wore life-jackets and dived into the water. We did not know what was happening until Uncle Joe threw a life-boat. He told us to jump in while he would get the eatables. Soon Uncle Joe came and he flung himself into the life-boat and we rowed away from the "Sea Eagle"; just as it started sinking. We kept on floating for days and weeks in the water. We saw the sun set and sunrise.

Suddenly, one day while we were sleeping Uncle Joe shouted - "Get up boys", We are approaching land" After a short while we reached land. We jumped out of the boat and started to run for the sea shore. Then we came to know that we were in the Island of Reunion. We went around and looked for food. We found a river. Close to it many palm trees grew. We managed to get some branches and twigs and built ourselves a house on a treetop. Years passed. We stayed on the island. Then one day when we were fishing we saw a rescue ship coming in search of us.

My uncle got the fishing rod and put a handkerchief on it and waved. The ship came and rescued us. We were very happy to be rescued and soon we were at New York with our parents. ### OUR CLASS EXCURSION





Ecc. 7 Vs. 11 & 12


