
EDITORIAL


Mr. Protap Roy took over as Housemaster of Cable in April and as Hallmaster of Lyon in March.

166th ANNUAL SPEECH DAY

THE RECTOR'S REPORT

7th October, 1989

Mr. & Mrs. W. R. King, Parents, well-wishers of the school and Old Paulites, it is a great pleasure to be able to welcome you here today in St. Paul's School on this occasion. To you Sir, Mr. Wilfred King, and Mrs. D. King, we extend a special warm welcome as it is the first time we have been honoured by the visit of representative from the Educational Board to which St. Paul's School is affiliated, during Speech Day celebration.

Mr. W. R. King has been in education for many, many years. First as a teacher, then since January, 1966 as the Deputy Secretary and now as the Secretary to the Council for the Indian School Certificate Examination, New Delhi. Sir, I appreciate your being able to take time off from other pressing duties to preside as Chief Guest at our Speech Day and Prize Distribution.


My task this morning is to review the school year - our 166th Year-which is now rapidly drawing to a close. In some respects it has been an easier one than those of the past though no less demanding, for each year brings its own problems, different from the preceding ones. It is no doubt these endless demands on our ability to tackle these problems which provides the spice of life

Life at St. Paul's continues to be a hectic round of activity. There is always something going on. And despite the usual day to day difficulties the year has been a reasonably happy one. We have been able to complete events and activities as planned and have had regular classes right from Day 1. With the reduced political tension in the district there has been a certain warmth of atmosphere and a greater family feeling about the school this year which is in such marked contrast to the atmosphere prevailing in so many parts of our country.

Our numbers were down last year but at the beginning of this year all vacancies filled and, judging by the number that appeared for entrance tests in August and September this year, it appears that we will have no vacancies next year either

Our medical staff have been kept extra busy this year with chickenpox in May and June and a viral fever in September. We were concerned about our jaundice cases, but with rest, care and the right diet, with the exception of our two newest cases, they all recovered in due course and are back with us in school.

For this I thank the medical staff of the school and the D&DMA for their regular care and attention, the Caterers and Assistant Steward and the Domestic Staff each in their respective fields of duty. I can safely say "Well done thou good and faithful Servants'.

In the recent past, experience has shown that after spending a number of years with us, many of our best students look for a change and a little more freedom, after Class X and so quite a few leave and join schools in their home towns. Those who return continue to receive an all-round training with us. Our examination results for Classes X and XII were about as good as we could have expected in the circumstances.

Our games have once again been keenly contested. They have been well-led and the participants have played hard and have always given a good account of themselves. P. T. and Gymnastics continue to be regular features in the school - you were given a glimpse of this a while ago - credit for this goes to Miss R. Rozario in Pry. Wing and Mr. Hardeep Sing in the Junior and Senior Wings. Well done, and thank you both and all others who help with games and sport.

House activities have also been well contested and the House evening in both Junior and Senior Wings have been very enjoyable with concerts and music of a good standard.

Drama is an important feature too, in St. Paul's. Those who attended the PW/JW concerts in May and the Senior Play, 'St. Joan' by Bernard Shaw last evening will no doubt agree that the standard has been good. For this I congratulate Housemasters/Mistresses of the PW & JW, Teachers, Mr. & Mrs. K. Mustafi, Mr. S. Chakravarthi and company and all others who were involved in teaching and training the boys. Well done and thank you.

Our clubs and societies continue to flourish and all parents and visitors if they have not already done so are urged to visit the exhibitions in the different wings to appreciate the efforts of our young artists in the various hobby sections that are available in the school. I leave you to judge

for yourself the standard of work done by the children and to commend both staff and students for the interest and care and attention to detail that they have taken.

Our Literary and Debating societies continue to maintain an exceptionally good standard too. Once again we congratulate the staff involved, Mrs. R. Sharma and Mr. K. Mustafi, for the excellent performence by our boys at the Inter-School Dr. Master's Elocution Contest. We shared first place with Loreto Convent, but, for us, it is the fourth year in succession that our team has brought back this prestigious trophy. Well done Cyrus, Ishan, Samarjit and Christopher! We also congratulate Ishan Chatterjee for being selected the best speaker of the even ing for 1989.

Our Vernacular Language Departments continue their good work in their respective areas. We participated in the Inter-School Elocution and our boys performed very creditably. These evenings are not competitive, their purpose is to get together to promote, enjoy and share our language heritage in Bengali, Nepali and Hindi. Each department endeavours to maintain a good standard and we congratulate both staff and students for the very enjoyable evening organised on the 12th August and for the good work done throughout the year.

Our outdoor activities - On the 15th August it was uplifting to hear our boys sing praise to God in a special service attended by all boys from Classes 4-12, staff and some visitors. This was followed by the flagraising ceremony attended by the whole school. It is an occasion when each remembers and renews in his own simple and sincere way the pledge to our motherland. The NCC presented a guard of honour and the cubs and scouts renewed their promises. Our chief guest once again this year was Brig. G. S. Kahlon, Commandant 123 Mountain Brigade, Jalapahar. Our school captain addressed the boys in Hindi and the vice captain in English, both very forcefully and eloquently, reminding us of our duties as responsible citizens of our country. I thank one and all for their participation and the enthusiasm with which all activities were organised on that day. At this point I would like to say a special word of appreciation to Col. Sooch, his helpers and especially the instructors who came week by week to train our lads and were responsible for the outstanding turn-out of the NCC troup. A sincere thank you to them and congratulations to the staff incharge, Mr. U. K. Dwivedi and Mr. Ashok Thackur, and of course the boys.

Our environmental society has been active during the monsoon season. A number of saplings have been planted, and with care and attention we hope the school campus as well as the Senchal Lake area will have enough forested slopes to keep Darjeeling a good health resort and reduce the erosion so common in our hills. So we in our small way, under Mr. Umesh Dwivedi's guidance are trying to contribute our mite to what has now become a world-wide concern for environmental preservation, so that future generations may continue to enjoy what so many of us take for granted today.

The DEAS continues with Mr. S. Chakravarti in-charge. The scheme encourages the boys of SW to participate on a voluntary basis and learn from first-hand experience, how to plan, organise and make decisions. Reliability, perseverance and integrity are brought to the fore. These are the basic ingredients necessary for character building and this, among other things is our aim at St. Paul's. This year many boys have joined and have understood the aim of the scheme. They have participated in the different activity programmes and are in the process of completing their expeditions as well. Some groups are going out over this Puja break.

The residential project for the 6th Form was carried out in the Mary Scot Home & School for the Blind in Kalimpong where two groups of six boys each have been to live in with the blind children and have worked in various ways for the six days they were there. This experience has been an education for the boys and their time and service has been appreciated by the children and staff of the institution. Well done boys, and thank you Sunirmal for holding this responsibility and contributing so positively to this very important aspect of the childrens all-round education.

Along with this we link our adventure and mountaineering courses. I am grateful to the Principal and instructors of the HMI for their assistance in this. Here the lads learn not only the skills and safety measures necessary for this activity but also the importance of interdependence and sharing resulting in an ever deepening fellowship which binds them together with an enduring bond of friendship and understanding. This is necessary, not only in school but, we hope, will be carried out into society and the world outside.

Academics, however, in PW/JW/SW take top priority. Each wing has its own routine and ensures that the syllabus is followed. For this I thank the teaching staff for their work and regular day-to-day responsibility.

But our concern at St. Paul's has always been with more than mere school with more than just imparting knowledge and skills or preparing boys to pass examinations. It has been with preparing boys to make a worthwhile contribution to society.

At St. Paul's School we endeavour to educate our youth in values

which we hope, improve the quality of life of our society in time to come. We try to inculcate a sense of duty, and temper young ambitions with the vision of unselfish service, to imbue them with tolerance and a generous concern and compassion for those less fortunate than themselves, to strengthen their characters and so equip them to provide moral leadership in our country.

This is an awesome and fearful responsibility. It is also a great challenge - the challenge of so educating the youth that they will go out into the wider world, not merely as trained intelectuals, but as feeling intellects possessing the sensitivity to treat others as they themselves would like to be treated. Our society needs intelligence and expertise but without an accompanying concern for those with whom we live and work, these qualities alone lack what is at the heart of our very humanity and raises us above the level of mere robots for, unless we make a conscious and concerted effort to build on the idealism of every young person entrusted to our care, we run the risk of de-humanising society, - our society - Indian society.

We have had a number of changes since the end of 1988, we bade farewell to Mr. Subir Roy, Mr. Clyde Quieros, Mr. Pradeep Mall and Mr. Bhaskar Ganti who left for greener pastures.

Mr. DAV Prince our Music Director, has once again shouldered the full responsibility of the Junior Wing music classes, the JW & SW Chapels each day, the choirs, orchestra and sunday services. I am most grateful to you for keeping this department functioning in spite of difficulties.

For Our Bursur's office with all who serve there, our Secretaries, the Matron in the three wings of the school, the Dining room and kitchen staff, the Estate Department with all domestic staff essential in a residential school, "Thank you" is hardly sufficient to express my gratitude. But on behalf of all students I say it to each one of you for the service you do and the care you take in your respective departments.

At the end of the year more good-byes will be said. Mr. Ashok Drona, The Estate Manager will be moving closer to his home in U.P. Mr. SC Basu, the Bursar, will be finally returning after two short terms of extension. I wish each a very fulfilling future. Mr. Charles Srinarayan, our Computer Instructor, leaves on promotion and in his place we welcome Mr. T. Singh to St. Paul's School.

Mr. J B Paul, Head of the Mathematics Department accepted the appointment of Principal in a school earlier in the year. However, he realised that, to leave during the term, the ones to suffer would be the students. He reconsidered his decision and planned to complete the year with St. Paul's. I am most grateful to him for this. We congratulate him on his new appointment and look forward to hearing about his school in the near future.

It is a privilege for me and my wife to be your guests today. This is perhaps the second time that I am visiting your great institution officially.



Is it only to give the teachers the extra work of planning a special programme which the pupils enjoy? I would like to think it is much more than that. It should be a time when every one in this School community should remember the Founders whose thinking and planning has made it possible for you to be here today. Obviously, the seed sown then has taken root and grown and bears fruit a hundred fold and more. You are indeed lucky to be receiving a good education in these beautiful surroundings.

Your School celebrated the centenary some years ago and former pupils must have listened to visiting ex-pupils tell stories of their escapades in and out of School. They must have told them of dormitory feasts, ghost stories they had been told and of pulling somebody's leg - most likely a teacher's! They must have also related stories about dedicated teachers of their time and how they benefited from their teaching. Of course, ex-pupils always say the School in their time was much better than it is now. I myself say that of my old School which is almost as old as yours. I don't suppose you, as present pupils, are prepared to accept such a statement.

I remember ghost stories being told in my School just before lights out. There were dormitory feasts. Running the gauntlet to initiate a new member to a dormitory was in vogue - if he could take it, he was considered a "good chap". I wonder if you have similar activities.

You have much more to learn now than, say, your parents and grandparents had to learn in their time. You are, therefore, better off academically than your florefathers.

In games and sports, you have better coaching facilities now than your forefathers had. Your fathers and mothers perhaps did not have all these facilities in whichever school they studied.

You have to make use of all the opportunities which your parents have given you so that you better your prospects in this competetive age both in the classroom and on the games field. The growing numbers of pupils and the new buildings all speak of the progress of your School, and you can now say your School is better than it was, more than fifty years ago.

You should all be proud of the achievements of your past pupils. Many have fared well in public life, the defence forces, and in business. Your old School magazines will give such information.

I see from your School Annual Report that your academic performance has been very satisfactory and also your School achievement in games and sports. Congratulations to both the staff and pupils for this. However, I would like to sound a few words of caution to you all, both staff and pupils. The world is a competitive one and you have to strive to greater heights in your academics and sports. You have read of and perhaps seen our performance as a country in international competitions. In most sports and games we stand no-where. In academics, we have outstanding persons of international standing as also in the technical field. You as pupils need to restrict your reading of James Hadley Chase and Robert Ludlum books and get down to improving your academic knowledge. You teachers also have a great responsibility to see that you make your pupils high achievers. There should be no regrets later.

I would like to leave three important words with you to remember: understanding', 'wisdom', and 'integrity'. 'Understanding' leads to 'wisdom' and is followed by 'integrity'. Integrity is something we emphasise in the Council. Integrity, as I see it is being honest at all times with ourselves, those we work with and with others.


In all the rush and hurry of the day, it is good to stop and reflect on these words and their meaning, whether you are teachers, pupils or parents.

THE ANNUAL SCHOOL PLAY

SAINT JOAN by George Bernard Shaw

A REVIEW

After three acclaimed productions it was almost as if there was someone who resented having been overlooked; whose work as it were, had been neglected. The answer was suddenly all too obvious, as we discovered during a perusal of Pygmalion, a recently introdced text book. An inexcusable lapse and there was nothing for it but to make amends, and so St. Joan was selected for enactment as the year's major play.

And what more seemingly insurmountable problem could be faced in a school populated almost exclusively by tall, husky males, than finding a willing guinea- pig to play the all important role of the rustic girl saint?

Volunteers were few. In fact, if truth be told, volunteers there were none. After all, which self respecting senior would actually agree to opt for rouge, flounce and skirt? And so conscriptors were let loose on an alarmed brotherhood who were able to dish out failsafe excuses: 'Too fat, too tall, too shy, too small....." too small? "Umm.... yes, er..... actually I have a cold and can't speak....! And of course it wasn't a matter of catching hold of just any old person, I mean the fellow would have to be an actor or public speaker of some experience and potential.

It was therefore only after July that the axe finally fell, and Ishan Chatterjee (little did any one suspect what he would pull off), fighting bravely to the last, was dragged kicking and screaming to the library door. A quick shove and he was through - Joan was ours at last.

The critical problem resolved, all energies were now channeled into sweeping all other obstacles from our path in the effort to carry off yet another resounding success, and we were now, for all practical purposes, a hive of buzzing bees. The onus naturally fell on Mr. Kabir Mustasi's shoulders who had to coordinate between school schedules, the director of Music, Mr. DAV Prince, the costume department led by Mrs. Mustasi, production under Mr. Stolke and Mr. Chakravarthi and set design and execution by Mr. Phubu Tshering and Mr. Gokul Chhetri. And he had to direct the play as well.


And direct it he did. I have no ideas of what personal nightmares he was haunted by, but I do know that he gave us as little rest as was possible to give. Running from place to place, stage to costume room to the estate department and back to stage again, and dragging most of us along with him, the count-down to D-Day was one long helter skelter of youthful and not so youthful energy flowing from eager hands, minds, hearts and feet. And trapped in fetters of our own volition we were taken to task on and off stage, where perfection became the minimum level of performance.

While on the subject let me add that one of the things we have seen and learnt since Becket in '86, is the value of team work. For, having said that the onus fell on Mr. Mustafi, we can only hasten to add that there are onuses and onuses (with apologies to whoever found the word). There is the on us for costumes. For Becket, and Salesman and Bergerac and now Joan, Mrs. Mustafi, Mrs. Anietta Roy, Mr. Dominc Savio and their team slaved as hard or harder than anyone I know and as usual their dedication and commitment paid handsome dividends; for all those who have seen our plays of late will agree that costuming has not only been authentic and painstakingly researched but absolutely stunning in effect, down to the liniest detail of a pleat or a hose.

There is the onus for music. Often we have wondered, our director oftener than others, what we would do without Mr. Prince and his department. For he not only arranges the music but frequently advises and acts as a critic and we all benefit from his advice. And there is the onus of set design. From what we know, there are very few schools whose annual plays are visualised and conceptualised and designed exclusively by the staff and students and in this we were more than ordinarily fortunate to have the brilliance of Mr. Tshering on our side.... and luckless to have lost him to the Gulf just a little short of September. Yet he left an entire and detailed plan behind and supervised by Mr. Gokul Chhetri, experienced as he is by now, the extraordinary set came to be; creatively complemented by Sandeep Man Shrestha.

And there is the onus of production which fell to Mr. Chakravarthi and Mr. Stolke and to Hsuing Nien Lin and their team, or crew as they are popularly referred to. How they managed what they did, where they obtained what they did, is beyond anyone to document. Suffice to say that their support was exemplary and vitally,comfortingly reliable, their commitment unashamedly total.

And there is the onus of lights and sound. Every year we have had the luxury of falling back on the talents of at least one lights specialist and

this year it was Joydeep Ghosal who rose to the occasion. Advised by Mr. Roy and ably assisted by Neeraj Rana and their crew, Ghosal handled the whole and complicated lighting for the play faultlessly, without a singly error and without on-stage direction, something, Mr Mustali says, that had not been accomplished in the past.

And now, to the play itself. 4th October 1989, the first performance for visiting schools and invited guests. And then 6th October 1989 for parents and important official visitors. Our director opens proceedings with a speech with undertones of sentiment and then the lights dim, and as the paino softly fills the hall it builds to a thunderous crescendo, coinciding with the absolute darkness that the lights dim to. The curtains begin to open. A beautiful contralto Ave Maria seeps into that sudden silence and a single spot at centre gently brightens, to reveal a figure in peasant red kneeling in prayer. The spot holds, the song climbs and then descends, the spot gradually fading in its wake. And on the heels of this stirring innovation we are away into the first scene, raucously attacked by de Baudricourt (Pallab Sarkar) as he rails at his wincing, cringing little steward (Vineet Malhotra). Harassing the hapless steward de Baudricourt is almost apoplectic with rage when he learns that his hens wont lay because of a chit of a girl. In a towering rage he agrees to see her so that he can have the pleasure of making her grovel as well, and Joan blithely enters.

Ah, Joan! Let us pause for a moment and reflect on this gallant young man who so gallantly agreed to portray an even more gallant young lady. But gallantry aside, in this production at least (and befittingly in keeping with Mr. Shaw's views) there would be no petite damsel in distress, stealing the hearts of Dunois (Vijai Singh) and the rest with a coy blink of long lashes. No, Our Joan was decidedly, ah, robust, with a mid-range tenor instead of a seductive huskiness of voice. But what made up for all this was Ishan's amazing talent, for he emerged as more than a strong performer, he was a presence.

The play is one in which there are several major characters and each one, gave an exceptional account of himself. The powerful dialogue coupled with some outstanding innovations, such as the English tent on an extension, with Warwick (Ripundam Shahi), de Stogumber (Jaideep Banerjee), Cauchon (Indrajeet Mookherjee) framed in candle light; the inquisition in three tiers lit by individual spots for Cauchon, the inquisitor (Vikash Lall) and the other legal officers (Rajesh Kripalani Prasenjit Goswami, Deepak Bansal) and Stogumber; for brother John (Nitin Arora), the executioner (Deepak Mawandia) and Joan herself; the breathtaking stake scene and the stylised epilogue, all served to produce an effect that will live long in the minds of all those who saw the play.

Others too were rivetting in their performance: Mohit Agarwal as La Tremouille, Shashank Dubey as the archbishop, Sujoy Chaudhuri as the

Dauphin, Debasish Saha as Polly and Joydeep Barua as the truant English soldier from hell and Cyrus Wadia as the papal representative from the 20th century. Even those like Pranay Gupta (page to Dunois), Satish Joshi (page of the court) and Nikesh Sanghai (page to Warwick) who had relatively smaller roles to play did so with polish that was nothing short of professional.


In closing, a final word about the stake scene. It was a daring attempt at authenticity and visual impact and while it paid off ten fold, it cannot be denied that the risks were enormous. Imagine a torch procession with Joan in chains through the hall to the stage, to the stake itself and the setting of it afire! It was brilliant, it was daring, it was frightening, and thank goodness for Lin and Chung and Imlong and their helpers back stage, prepared and coolly efficient to the last.

And so, an excellent production borne on the tides of sincere endeavour, and even now I think I can hear the loud and prolonged applause as it echoed and reechoed around the hall. With the one next year perhaps.


The Inter-House P.T. Competition saw Clive put up a great show but we narrowly missed the first place to come 2nd.


The Players:











The school band under the excellent guidance of our Director of Music Mr. D.A.V. Prince, played beautifully on this occasion.


We welcome Mr. R. Biswas, who will take over NCC as Master-incharge next year.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD SCHEME

1989 was a relatively successful DEAS year for us at St. Paul's. After the departure of Mr. P. C. Mall, the responsibility for organising the sheme was given to Mr. S. Chakravarthi. The first half of the year was somewhat quiet, but things began to happen after we returned from the July Break and by the end of the year we were able to look back on the year's activities with pride and contenment.

The activities began with a General Meeting where all the participants were told about the criteria for gaining the various coveted awards. The youth leader was also chosen at this meeting.

The activities this year were:

- 1) SERVICE: Apart from the usual service activities that have been followed in the past, this year a large number of boys at the Bronze level volunteered to help in the local Diocesan Hostel for under privileged children and did a creditable job.
- 2) PHYSICAL ACTIVITY: The standards this year were rather stringent as a result of which some boys at the various levels could not qualify for their awards. Apart from the games usually played on the school campus, there was keen participation at the rock. Rock climbing was a very popular recreation and we were privileged to learn the skill from Mr. Lopsang Sherpa and Mr. Dawa Sherpa, who are senior instructors at the Himalayan Mountaineering Institute.
- 3) SKILLS: The boys actively participated in the various interests and hobbies, honing their skills and raising their levels of preformance and enthusiasm through the year. Once again the standards to be acheived were strictly followed resulting in disappointment for some, but a sense of satisfaction to a very large number.
- rather disastrous note. On May 25th two groups of Silver expeditions marched out in the rain for Sandakphu. Cyclonic weather followed and the boys did well to reach Rimbik from Sandakphu but showed little initiative to move out from there where they were comfortably ensconced. Since there was

no communi-cation about their whereabouts for two days, we were worried. A search party was organised consisting of Mr. B.B. Tamang, Mr. P. Tshering and Mr. S. Chakravarthi. Following police information the search party first went to Sombarey in Sikkim, and two days later trekked to Rimbik where the boys were located. They trekked back the same night and arrived at Bijanbari at about 12.30 at night! Everyone was finally back in school on 2nd June. Both these groups were later disqualified for showing no inititative in getting out of, what was, a sticky situation.

The other expeditions were, however, all success stories. These included 14 Bronze groups to Lepcha Jagat, Rangaroon and Rambi. Inspection goups visited all the bronze camps - including the ones at Rambi which necessitated an hour long walk owing to landslides along the way. There were two successful Silver expeditions to Sandakphu. Three Gold groups went further to Phalut, including a group of the Lower Sixth Form who were originally meant to trek to Dzongri but whose route had to be changed owing to late monsoon landslides in Sikkim. They climbed to Phalut via Rimbik, Ramman and Gorkhey! Four boys from the Upper Sixth cycled from Siliguri to Binaguri in the Dooars for their Gold Award and pedalled back also, covering a good 232 kms!

5) RESIDENTIAL PROJECT: Two of the Gold candidates opted to stay and work at the local Padmaja Naidu Himalyan Zoological Park under the supervision of the Zoo Director, Mr. V. Rishi. It was a fruitful programme.

Ten other boys decided to live in and work with blind children at the Mary Scot Home and School for the Blind in Kalimpong. They went in two groups and participated in a very "moving, meaningful and purposeful" service to the visually handicapped. It was an unusual programme for us, as well as for the children and authorities at the Blind School.

On the 11th November the Awards Presentation Ceremony was held at a special function in the School Hall. Col. A. Roy, Principal, HMI, was the Chief Guest. He addressed the boys and gave away the Awards. We were also very touched and honoured by two of our special guests who had come a very long distance to attend the function. They were Major Elsie Hansford of the Salvation Army, who is the superintendant of the Mary Scot School and Home for the Blind, Kalimpong, (Major Hansford shared a few of her thoughts at the function) and Mrs. K. Medora who had rushed from Calcutta to be with us on that special day. Mrs. Medora is co-ordinating the Scheme activities in the East Zone.

Of the 106 entrants at the Bronze level, 29 received their awards (a vast majority should be fulfilling the remaining requisites by May, 1990).

There were 21 boys who were participating in Silver level activities, 17 earned their Awards. Of the 12 Gold Standard boys, 9 were proud recipients of the Award that day. They were: Shashank Dubey, Indraject Mookherjee, Raj Kamal Prasad, Jaideep Banerjee, Jitendra Sarkar, Hemant Coomar, Ritesh Agarwal, Sandeep Seth and Anup Kumar.

One would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who made it possible for us to have such an enjoyable and rewarding year - Members of the Staff, the EM, Doctor and his medical team, Mr. B. S. Roberts, the authorities at HMI, the Blind School, the Diocesan Hostel, Summit Tours and the zoo.

Finally, I would like to congratulate all participants in the programme. I hope it was fun and educative, as well as satisfying, meeting all those challenges you set for yourself!


MACHINE WORKSHOP





THE ORNITHOLOGISTS' CLUB

We began the year with a slide-show on the birds of the world, which was arranged by Mr. John Jacobs. This was followed by a meeting in which the various activities of the club were outlined. Soon the boys acquired their binoculars and we started fieldwork where the boys derived pleasure and gained valuable experience.

One of the first birds that the boys indentified was the Scarlet Minivet. Close observation of the brightly coloured Pericrocotus Flammeus made the boys aware of the fact that Darjeeling offers bird lovers a fascinating display of colourful avia-fauna. Armed with binoculars and Salim Ali's 'Field Guide to the Birds of the Eastern Himalayas' our keen bird watchers saw whistling Thrushes, Pekin Robins, Greenbacked Tits, Red Headed Tits, Warblers, Wagtails, Tree Sparrows, Tree Pipits, Rosefinches and many other species of birds.

During the course of the year, bird-tables were constructed and set up in different areas of the campus. With the help of these, the boys collected bird footprints and had the opportunity of observing the birds closely. A bird bath, nest boxes and feeders were also prepared.

Mr. V. Rishi (Director of the Darjeeling zoo), a keen nature lover, very kindly permitted us to use the virgin forest that belongs to the Zoo. Always ready for an outing, the boys walked down to the Zoo, where they had the opportunity to learn about the birds in captivity, and ramble through the forest. Apart from learning about the breeding of Khaleej Pheasants by creating their natural habitat, the boys were able to photograph the birds at the Zoo.

The next logical step was a visit to the Darjeeling Natural History. Museum. Here the boys could see the eggs of the birds that they had indentified and photographed many of the preserved birds.

As the time drew nearer for the exhibition the boys started completing their scrapbooks and prepared many interesting charts. Feather collections, photographs, flight silhouettes, old nests, egg shells and a preserved wedge— tailed green-pigeon were also put on display. To top it all, recorded bird calls were played to create the right atmosphere. Sameer Pradhan, Gurvesh Chowdhury, Christopher Gleich, K. S. Farzad, Sanjay Singh, Gaurav Roy, A. Rangoonwala, Sanjay Karamchandani, Piyush Lodha and the other members of club contributed to make the exhibition and the year a grand success. 

GENERAL REPORT ON THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION SOCIETY

PRESIDENT MR. J. A. GARDNER

The EPS was founded in the year 1986 by Mr. U.K. Dwivedi who is its Secretary at present. Since them the EPS has been working whole heartedly with the little resources at its disposal in the Senchal catchment region and on the St. Paul's School Estate.

The Senchal catchment region is the source of water for Darjeeling and other neighbouring areas. Despite its status as a wildlife sanctuary, the region has been denuded of its forests. As a result, the flow of water and the water retaining capacity of the soil has seriously been affected, thus severely reducing water supply to the Darjeeling town. Besides, due to overgrazing by cattle, the soil has hardened and leaching has begun. If this continues any longer, the soil will become unsuitable for vegetation.

Keeping all this in mind in 1986 the area was adopted by the EPS and a programme of afforestation, soil conservation and environmental awareness was put into application. Initially a 4 hectares site was allocated to the Society and after a strenuous period of clearing all undergrowth, plantation work was carried out and completed by August 1987. As at present a 80% survival rate has been recorded by the EPS.

Simultaneously, plantation work on the same lines commenced on the huge estate of St. Paul's School. Work here was also completed by around the same time.

In 1989, a project of larger capacity was begun in both areas once again. The plantation work in St. Paul's encompassed an area about 3 hectares in size. The Senchal plantation work had commenced after clearing the region, the arduous task of doing so being given to a co-operative group of jawans from 107 TA. By end-July plantation work was completed there.

The aims of the Society are being realized gradually, mainly due to the limited resources at the disposal of the EPS. However, besides afforestation, one major aim has been realized - roping in the youth to aid the afforestation drives to make them more aware of their environment. Boys and girls of local schools, mainly St. Paul's School and others are used for a dual purpose — to facilitate afforestation drives and also to educate them about their environment — essentially by making them more aware.

Other aims of the EPS, are in the process execution and include raising of voluntary protection forces in the Senchal region to educate and make aware both the rural and urban populations of the region to check grazing of livestock and to control pollution.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1989

1989 proved to be the most fruitful of the three years that the fledgling EPS has been in existence. Despite a rather slow start, work picked up speed and by the end of August the Society had planted around 800 saplings on the St. Paul's School Estate and nearly five thousand in the Senchal catchment area.

IN ST. PAUL'S SCHOOL:

By May, the Society was ready for take - off but due to unforeseen circumstances work started only in June — with a membership of around 50 boys from the School and another 200 at its disposal for work, Within a space of 30 days, 800 pits were dug, and on 1st July, a small inauguration ceremony was held. The Director of the local Padmaja Naidu Himalayan Zoological Park, Mr. Vinod Rishi, and the Conservator of Forests was the Chief Guest. The President of the Society and the Rector of the School, Mr. J.A. Gardner also spoke on the occasion. Mr. D. S. Rasaily, Secretary of the Federation of Societies for the conservation of forests and wildlife, Darjeeling, was also present. Over the next week, with the help from the Domestic Staff, around 750 saplings of Cryptomeria Japonica, Rhododendrons and Pinus Petula were planted on sites totalling around 3 hectares. A survival rate of 20% has been recorded.

IN THE SENCHAL CATCHMENT REGION:

By May the jawans of 107 TA had begun to clear the thick undergrowth that would prove to be a hindrance to the saplings. In early July the digging of pits commenced - at a small ceremony the inauguration of planting of was held. A total saplings of five thousand saplings were planted.

Previously too, the Society had worked on a 4 hectare site in the same region and had achieved a remarkable 80% survival rate. It is hoped that identical results ensue this year too.

The Society under Mr. J.A. Gardner, Mr. N.K. Sharma and Mr. U.K. Dwivedi has worked selflessly in the past year to achieve its goal of reafforesting the St. Paul's School Estate and the Senchal Catchment region. The next round of plantation work can commence only in May 1990 when it is hoped that the activities of the Society at both sites will increase and the complete charter of aims and objectives will be behind us






Betten House with The Head Junior Wing, The Rector and Mr. N. Lawrence (Housemaster).




