





#### Editorial



### RECTOR'S LETTER

Any review of the year 1992 would reveal that the most traumatic event for all of us in India was the destruction of the Babri Masjid at Ayodhya on 6th December. Bad enough the Bombay Stock-Exchange 'scam' of April, what followed in December challenged the basic fabric of our secular society. Solutions will not be easy, nor speedy, but it speaks volumes for the resilience of the Indian Nation that we have taken both these events in our stride; when the dust finally settles we will emerge stronger.

Nearer home in Darjeeling we must be grateful that we had a peaceful year on the political front. Our major problem (in common with the whole of Darjeeling) has been the shortage of potable water. We had to purchase water the whole year through, having it ferried from 'jhoras' on Tiger Hill. This placed a heavy burden on the school's slender finances but we have borne it. After some years we emerged with a modest surplus in the school accounts. Over the winter of 1992/93, with the help of a generous donation from Mr. S. Karanjai and other parents, the Rectory Dormitories were expanded and the toilet facilities greatly improved.

The end of May brought the ISC and ICSE results and the 13 failures at ICSE level left us stunned and reeling. A careful analysis indicated that the troubled years of local agitation in Darjeeling over 1986-89 were now taking their toll. Over the year we laid great emphasis on academics and I hope that the Public Exam results of 1993 will bring its own rewards. At this point I would like to commend Mr. Myers, our new Senior Master and the Staff, for their cooperation. Satish Joshi, the School Captain, led the VIth Formers admirably and together the year passed off smoothly. It was a joy to meet so many Old Paulites and I would like to thank them for their cheerfulness and encouragement.

# RECTOR'S REPORT ANNUAL SPEECH DAY 1st October, 1992

Dr. Utpal Ray, Mrs. Ray, Ladies and Gentlemen.


On behalf of the Staff and Students it is my privilege to welcome you to our 169th Speech Day function.

I extend particularly a warm welcome to Dr Utpal Ray, an Old Paulite of 1964, and today an eminent Doctor in Calcutta. Utpal epitomizes what is best from a schooling at St. Paul's when it combines with personal integrity and a strong spirit of service to the community. I hope that many of the boys in the Hall today will be able to talk to Dr. Ray and meet one of the finest boys this school has ever produced. I am deeply grateful to you, Utpal, for so kindly accepting the invitation to be amongst us. Dr. Ray is also the dynamic Secretary of the Old Paulite Association which, in the recent past, has been responsible for much help given to the School both financially and in terms of goodwill.

Since last October the year has been eventful. Mr. Hira Khati and Mr. Asit Neogi, both Science teachers, left our services at the end of 1991 and in the new term we welcomed Mr. K. Chakravarthy and Mr. A. Sharma. Both these gentlemen have settled down well and done much to improve science teaching in the senior school. We also welcome to our staff Mr. A. Alva whose football prowess is remarkable; Mrs. I. Seal who teaches Bengali and Mathematics in the Primary Wing and Mrs. S. Dwivedi, as a Hindi teacher in the Junior Wing. These ladies having been part-time teachers, were familiar to us on the campus and have made an easy transition on to the full-time staff.

In April our new Senior Master, Mr. Ian Myers joined us and in this short time he has proved not only competent in his post but a cheerful and loyal worker who has relieved me of many of the strains of the day-to-day running of the School. It has been a pleasure having him amongst us, and I congratulate him on the mature way he has smoothly handled the boys and his colleagues on the staff.

At the end of May our Nursing Sister, Mrs. L. Moktan retired, she having served the school loyally for 22 years. The wrench of parting was softened when her daughter, Mrs. N.L. Bhutia, an ex. MNS Major, took her place. Sister Bhutia spent many of her girlhood years on our campus, and so she has settled

down cheerfully and with ease.

At the end of this year we will bid farewell to Mr. S. C. Basu, our Bursar, who superannuates. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Basu for sharing his wisdom and experience with me and for helping bring the school out of a financial crisis that occurred over the years 1989 and 1990. His has been a voice in the wilderness warning against impending calamity. Today he may feel happy that after many years we have 'inally closed the year with a modest surplus in the accounts.

Mr. A. K. Seal will also retire at the end of this year through superannuation. To this dedicated gentleman goes our gratitude for the selfless service he has given the school in ensuring that the food stores are properly stocked and arranging for the purchase of bulk-food at competitive rates. During the troubled years between 86 - 88, at considerable personal risk, he ensured that the school functioned on a full stomach. He has also guided me quietly on many of the problems that emerged over the course of the year.

Mrs. Z. Subaiya, Nursing Sister in the PW, will also be leaving our service at the end of this year to make her home with her daughter. I know that she will be greatly missed by the children of the PW. She has served under three PW Heads, Mrs. Dang, Mrs. Gardner and Mrs. Howard and from each of them she has won accolades. She makes a loyal friend who cares nothing for her own welfare. Today we can only say a heartfelt 'Thank You'.

I received information this morning that Mr. Ranjan Biswas will be leaving our services at the end of this year.

Perhaps the most traumatic experience we have had this year has been in the disastrous ICSE results of March, 1992. I have already explained to the parents the possible causes of this disaster and what steps we have taken to rectify the problem. It is a humbling experience for me to acknowledge with dismay – that of the 61 candidates who appeared, 13 failed. We are still reeling under the trauma of this experience which quite swallowed up any success we may have achieved at the Class XII level where 40 our of 41 candidates were successful. In analysing the probable causes of the disaster I have found that the need for a July Break is marginal; hence from 1993 this will not occur. I also intend to re-introduce the first lesson at 7 O'clock in the morning for the SW. We have already engaged the services of Mr. D. Subramanium to assist with extra science teaching since we found that this aspect of the results revealed a particular weakness. The response to these extra lessons has been heartening and I would like to congratulate Mr. Subramanium on inspiring the boys to greater effort.

Over the years we welcomed various eminent persons, who have addressed the boys on various subjects; Prof. Dennis Walder of the Open University of Milton Keynes, UK; Mr. R. Mackay from the British Council who conducted a Seminar on the English teaching; Air Chief Marshal, Arjun Singh who visited the school. The Members of the Board of Governors visited the School in May, and we were honoured to felicitate the Most Rev. John Ghose, Moderator of the Church of North India and Bishop of Darjeeling, and the Rt. Rev. Dinesh Ch. Gorai, Bishop of Calcutta and Chairman of the Board, on the award of Ph.D's granted by the Senate of Serampur, the oldest Theological University in Asia.

Over the year, through the courtesy of Doordarshan we have seen the World Cup matches, the Wimbledon and the French Open tennis Tournaments and the Barcelona Olympics. This has spurred the boys to greater heights and on the sporting field we have had our share of success. The Cricket season began with a young, though determined, team that played aggressive Edinburgh Shield games. We narrowly lost to Shaw Wallace by three runs where the last player had to hit a boundary on the last ball and settled for a bye; otherwise we won all the other games against the visiting teams. We lost the Edinburgh Shield to our School Domestic Staff team, and we were probably over confident, since, on paper, we had a winning team. Our Bustee team just played better. Since we could not win the Shield ourselves we were delighted when they took it from us — it all remains in the family.

The third week of May saw our Gymnastic team perform creditably at the Gymkhana Club after a gap of almost 7 years. The team is young and lacks exposure. Mr. Jagjeet Singh has very wisely begun to train the younger boys so that, in a few years, the standard will get even better. Volleyball, Basketball, Table-tennis, Squash, Eton Fives, Badminton have all been played with enthusiasm though not much outside competition.

We had a spirited and talented football team this year which played with skill and success against the Planters and various local teams. Inter-School fixtures tend to be somewhat restricted since our main school team is comprised largely of the Plus Two boys and the other schools are somewhat hesitant to play against the seniors.

The last six weeks has seen a successful Marathon, run in torrential rain; a satisfying Standards season; and the completion of all heats and the finals of athletics which some of you witnessed yesterday. Add to this the normal PT competitions and all the regular exercise of walking up and down to town and you may be sure that the boys of SPS are physically healthy. Sometimes a tubby

little boy arrives at the beginning of the year and by the end of the year looks slimmer, with his fat converted into strong sinew. Fond mothers often think that the boy is not looking "healthy" (read fat) yet if you ask the boy if he is happier without his excess weight, he beams with pleasure. I assure you, at schoolboy level, boys prefer to be slim!

Whilst on the topic of physical health I would like to pay tribute to Dr. Sharma and our three Nursing Sisters. In June we had a bad round of diarrhoea and in August this was followed by the spread of a mysterious viral fever. Batch after batch of boys would go in for treatment and the task of these Medical Officers seemed never ending. They dealt with the cases cheerfully and smoothly so that there were no complications.


Over this year we have been able to increase the number of trekking expeditions under the auspices of the DEAS. Last year three boys were awarded gold medals, 8 silver and 14 bronze. This year the number is likely to increase. Successful expeditions have a direct relationship to the stability and peacefulness of the town and the local environment. Every now and again I would receive worried calls from parents who are concerned about the political stability of this area. I hasten to reassure you that, other than a few minor inconveniences, there has been no disturbance.

The NCC continues to function under the guidance of Mr. R. Biswas and the Officers of the NCC HQs. We were happy to have with us on 15th August, Brig. Rangarajan, Commandant, 123 Mtn. Bds, who took the Guard of Honour. I am particularly grateful to Col. Murgai and the Officers at Jalapahar for their kindness to us at SPS in allowing us to use the Jalapahar road, and for their kindness to the boys of the school. We have Officers and their families; I hope we can grow closer together in friendship over the years.


In the area of entertainment we have completed seven of the eight House Concerts, with one to go next term. We have deliberately curbed the building of expensive sets for these House concerts and I report with joy that this has led to greater innovation and a higher standard of acting rather than dependence on extraneous effects. Given time the fruit of this will show when more talented actors begin to take their place at the major dramatic functions held in May and October. The JW & PW Concert held in May was a success and the climax of the years' dramatic activities was the production of "A Man For All Seasons" which you witnessed last night. Add to this a delightful concert given by the Bengali society on the occasion of Rabindra Jayanti and the combined concert staged by the three Second Language Departments and you begin to understand




Address of the Chief Guest, Dr. U. Ray (O.P.)

why the boys of SPS conduct themselves with confidence on a stage and in public situations. It is our proud belief that there is not a single boy at SPS who has not at sometime been on stage starting all the way from the PW concerts right up to the senior-most levels.

It is in the sphere of elocution and quizzing that we have been particularly successful this year. The PW elocution contest showed the introduction of choral speaking where every boy from Class III upwards was part of a team where speech was carefully modulated and controlled. For the second year in succession we won the Inter-School Master Memorial Elocution Shield. The JW Quiz team walked away with the Maggie Quiz contest held for the local schools. The Senior Quiz team brought home the ANZ Grindlay's Trophy for Quizzing. Congratulations to all those boys and masters who brought laurels home.

The monsoon period is usually a trying time since the children are largely kept indoors, hence it becomes increasingly necessary to keep them cheerfully entertained. Our 35 m.m. projector has been repaired and under the guidance of Mr. MP Yadav and the members of the A.V. Club the boys have seen a number of movies. If any parents among you would like to gift to the school something which the children would enjoy directly, I would suggest that we start a library of video cassettes suited to the various age-groups, so that the children may be not only entertained but be kept better informed.

At the end of July we were delighted to host about 20 boys and girls of the VIth forms from St. Columba's College, Dublin. This provided an opportunity for our boys to meet others in their peer group and exchange notes. When the group from St. Columba's left, Miss Jennifer Bulbulia stayed on to work with us in a voluntary capacity in the PW. Shortly after Miss Jessica Kavanagh returned from Ireland to join Jenny in the PW. I would like to share with these ladies our pleasure in having them with us and to appreciate their gentie handling of our PW boys. I am informed that the Class III boys who are handled by these young ladies are most protective about them and that, in their eyes, they can do nothing wrong.

On the topic of gentleness I would like to stress my firm belief that you can get discipline by appealing to a boy's finer instincts and that it is not necessary to be rough and hectoring. There are times, I must admit, when gentleness can be mistaken for weakness, and a show of firmness becomes necessary. However, such displays must be used rarely. I have been blessed this year in the choice of a particularly talented, humble and courteous School Captain, Satish Joshi, who was led the VIth form with dignity and above all courtesy. I would

like to thank the Prefects and the VIth form for being thoroughly decent and setting a good example. I now challenge the present Class XI, in the course of time, to improve on what they have inherited.

Perhaps the most serious problem we have faced this year has been an acute water shortage throughout the year. Even in the height of the monsoon we had to ferry drinking water to the school. The dry months between March and the end of May become extremely trying. I would like to sympathise with the EM & ES and commend them on dealing with this particular aspect. So often we on the campus complain of not receiving instant attention, yet if the entire time of the Estate department is taken up with such a fundamental issue as water, it leaves little time for the other things. Our buildings are in need of constant repair, and the demands of the children are never ending, add to this the constant care of a resident Domestic Staff, twice the number of resident staff, and you will begin to understand the burdens they have carried.

It is in the nature of things that my first year here had been devoted mainly to administration and improvement of the system required for school organisation — finance, labour, purchase, salary scales, Estate and Buildings, so that it would appear that I have had less time to be with the teachers who fulfil the basic requirements of an educational institution-education itself. To some extent this may be true and I would here like to give credit to Mr. T. Mukhia, Second Master and Mr. K. Kanti, Snr. Housemaster who together with the Senior Master relieved me of many burdens. I am also deeply grateful to Mr. Anthony and Mrs. Howard for so gallantly shouldering responsibilities of academics and the day to day organisation needed for the care of the boys in the JW & PW. I know that none of these persons would be able to function effectively without the cooperation of the entire staff body and on their behalf I commend your devotion to duty.

In spite of our best efforts we have not been able to fill a vacancy in the Piano-forte department. Mr. DAV Prince has soldiered on training generations of boys to play wind instruments and so build up the school's orchestra playing light music suitable for the school play and a fuller sound in the Chapel as the wood-wind section accompanies the choir at Commemoration Service. Against all odds Mr. Prince has produced delightful Carol Services each year for all three Wings. I wish to assure him his work is deeply appreciated.

As we near the Speech Day the boys work tirelessly over their handwork, craft and hobbies. They take great pains to produce work of a high standard which is mounted in exhibitions in all three Wings. May I request as many of you as are here to visit these exhibitions and enjoy the work the boys have so

lovingly presented for your views.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank in public some of our generous donors over the year. To the present VIth Form for their generous gift of Rs. 1000/- each to help defray the cost of resurfacing the entire school Quadrangle. To Dr. Rustom Roy, Prof. Emeritus, Solid State Physics, Pennsylvania, USA, and an Old Paulite, for his generous endowment of \$2000 for the science section of the Library. To the team from St. Columba's College, Dublin, for their gracious gift of \$500 which we will use to endow the Geography section of the Library. To Mr. Karanjai who endowed the Quizzing Prize and has agreed to build a new extension to the Rectory Dormitory at his own cost. To the Old Paulites we have accepted to bear the cost of repairs to science equipment and have accepted the responsibility of endowing the OPA prizes. I know that the O.P's are deeply concerned about the water crisis in the school and I am sure with their ingenuity they will be able to think out some practical way of solving the problem. I also record our thanks to Mr. K. N. Sahgal, Old Paulite, who has loaned us 16 mm films through the courtesy of Compton International Film Ltd., London.

In conclusion I would like to thank all our parents for their cooperation and encouragement over the year. It is your goodwill and the support of the Board of Governors that has made my task easier. I hope that I can serve the boys even better in the years to come.

## CHIEF GUEST'S ADDRESS

My wife and I would like to thank the Rector, Mrs. Howard and the members of staff for having invited us here on the occasion of "Speech Day".

When the Rector spoke to me in Calcutta inviting me to be here on "Speech Day", for a moment I was speechless. I spent 11 years in St. Paul's and made it to this stage only once (that also in KG-B). Better late than never, I told myself, and was delighted to accept. A message for you backbenchers, "There is still hope".

In the midst of Sports Day, the School Play, the impending holidays, not to mention the tea on the lawns, Speech Day was more like an endurance test. With time, however, one realised that this was in fact the corner stone of the foundation on which futures would be built. For me St. Paul's has always been home. I spent more years here with my adopted guardians than with my biological parents. The love, guidance, patience and understanding with which the teachers in school brought us up, was remarkable, and I have yet to meet a 'Paulite' who does not remember them but with thankfulness and warm regards.

There are many things I am grateful to St. Paul's for, but what I remember most are three quotes of the then Rector, Mr. Leslie Goddard. They were his favourite and if any of you were to guide your future lives on these lines, I am sure you will become good human beings, which I assure you, is a rarity these days.

He used to say, 'Take what you want, says God, – but you have to pay for it'. If you want your parents love and respect you have to work towards it, you want to come first in class, you have to study for it, you want to come first in the marathon or 100 meters, you have to train for it. Nothing in life is free, or can be achieved without effort. His second favourite quote was Jewish, and went like this "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? But if I am for myself only, what am I?" You are fortunate because I believe there can be no better place than St. Paul's where one can put this into application.

His third quote was "The poorest man in this world is the man whose only wealth is money". The parents of most boys in St. Paul's are endowed with plenty of money, it is to assimilate the wealth that they have been sent to St. Paul's.

As an old Paulite who has been through the mill here, I hope that what I have

to say will be of some relevance to you. India today is in the midst of exciting changes and your generation will take India into the 21st Century. Our own generation has been a transitional one between the fading of the British Raj and the emergence of the new India. You who sit here today will be the inheritors of the new India.

Many things — both on a social level and professionally – have changed at a dizzy pace since I left here thirty years ago. However, my personal experience in that time has shown me that few things never changed, and many of these I have learnt here in St. Paul's.

Finally, I would like to end with a quote from the Bible, words that I heard many years ago in the chapel on a Sunday evening. It went something like this —"Finally brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, what so ever things are of good, if these be any praise think on these things".



Charlie Dunne's medal for 4x200 mts Inter School Relay for setting a




A scene from the Clive House concert





Finally I thank all the Havelockians for their valuable contributions made towards the House.












A scene from the Betten House concert.

FOOTBALL: Played mainly in the moonsoon season, football attracted a number of boys for early morning practice. The Inter-House matches were played on a league basis with each House producing two teams. This made for wider participation and the matches were keenly contested. Bivek Thapa, Sandeep Tuladhar, Sachin Pradhan and Arvind Gurung showed great promise on the field. Tenzing House finally won the Football Cup for this year.

A novelty match between the 1st XI (PW) and the Domestic Staff team (augmented by 3 staff members) was a great success. The spectators cheered on their "dajus" who ultimately lost at 7:4.

ATHLETICS: This exciting season which starts with the Marathon runs, provided an opportunity for all the children to take part in games. Athletics standards allow the children to contribute according to their abilities. Everest House finally lead the tally.

The following children showed talent and are to be commended: Jyoti Prakash (Victor Ludorum for Best Athlete in Primary Wing), Limhathung Ezong (Charles Dunne Medal for 2nd Best Athlete in Primary Wing), Anil kumar, Eric Manandhar and Avinashi Singh.

BOXING: This year the sport was kept open to all those who wished to enter but no house points were allotted. Surprisingly, over 80 boys from the PW registered their names, some of them willingly matched (weight-wise) with their counterparts in the Junior Wing. In order to give the Primaries a sense of freedom, over the year three town outings were organised. I would like to thank the boys of Class XI for helping escort the little ones to town, thus ensuring their safety. This year we innovated a House Activity Evening where the House Teachers played party with the children and got to know them better.

Over the Puja Holidays some staff members organised Expeditions for those children who remained at school. 

In conclusion I would like to thank the Rector, the Senior Master, the Bursar and the Estate Manager for their help and cooperation over the year.




Everest House with (L-R: Seated) Mr. A. Alva, Mrs. D. Paulose (Housemistress) and Mrs. I. Seal.




Hillary House with (L - R.: Seated) Mr. J. Bastian, Mrs. C. Lawrence (Housemistress) and Mrs. P. Calvert.




Scenes from the Primary Wing Concert.






Hunt House with (L-R: Seated) Miss A. Tshering and Mrs. S. Mukhia

The Primary Wing Cricket Team with (L-R: Seated) Mr. J. Bastian and Mr. P. Nedumaran.


## AN INTERVIEW WITH OUR NEW SENIOR MASTER, MR. IAN MYERS

- Q: First of all, Sir, congratulations on becoming the new Senior Master of St. Paul's. Sir, could you tell us about your educational background?
- A: I am a trained post-graduate in History. My early educational career began in a boarding school in Loyola, Jamshedpur. I then completed my education at the Frank Anthony Public School, Calcutta. Next I spent two years doing my teachers training at Mount Hermon, Darjeeling. While teaching I completed my graduation and post-graduation from Osmania University.
- Q: Handling the responsibilities of the SM is a tough task. How well have you adapted to your new post and new school?
- A: I think I shouldn't be answering this question. Others will be able to judge better. However, I would like to think that I have settled well and have been able to understand what St. Paul's is about. If I have made a success of this post then the credit does not go to me without the total support and guidance of the Rector, the cooperation of my colleagues in the teaching faculty, the obedience and faith of the boys, this task would have certainly been a difficult one. I owe a special word of thanks to Mr. Kanti whose mature views and experience have gone a long way in making my job an easier one!
- Q: Comparison between schools in the plains and schools in the hills is invariably a difficult task but since you were in St. Thomas' School, Calcutta, before you joined St. Paul's, what major differences do you find in the two schools?
- A It is true comparisons are difficult, especially when you choose two schools like St. Thomas' Kidderpore and St. Paul's which are two entirely different set-ups! Yet I may state with confidence that the students in both schools are wonderful to work with and that there is much talent in both institutions. St. Paul's however, due to its location and being primarily a residential school does offer far more in terms of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
- Q: Sir, what do you feel about the changes that have taken place in the Indian system of education over the past few years?

A: Is there any such system which may be termed "Indian"? There is such a variety of systems that I'd wonder which one to term "Indian". Each state, region or board has its own way of doing things. I hope we will have a uniform educational policy and system for the whole country soon.

Q: In what areas of the school would you emphasize changes?

A: I would like to see a greater emphasis being paid to academic excellence no matter how idealistic we may be – there's no getting away from the fact that in India today, especially, academic results are important. I would also like to see the present boys of St. Paul's institute some new trends in various fields of school life, so that these may become the traditions for future batches. Blindly following traditions for tradition's



- sake can be dangerous for don't we have the example of "Sati"? It is now a criminal offence and yet it began as a voluntary, pious practice!!
- Q: Sir, how long do you plan to be associated with the Paulite family?
- A: Ha! ha! I'm basically a very stubborn and determined person and now that I've begun to like it at St. Paul s and be happy here, it's going to be difficult, getting me out! I guess the only way will be for the log team to physically carry me away!
- Q: Lastly, what advice would you want to give the boys?
- A They say advice is one of the cheapest commodities going around. However, I would ask the boys to get their priorities in order. I often wonder, on what basis do they arrange their deeds and actions. It is necessary for the boys to come to terms with certain realities of the world. Mr. Ray Mckay, a professor from Scotland, who trains teachers in Hong Kong, was our guest speaker this year. We were privileged to have Mr. Mckay talk to the society on English Poetry. Staff members of the English Department

also attended his workshop on Literature teaching methods and many were pleasantly surprised to find that Mr. Mckay was familiar with the methods used in Indian colleges and universities. His knowledge of the needs of the students, the demands of the syllabi and the examination system made the workshop most interesting and meaningful.

Realising that it is often difficult to find a suitable date for a debate during the busy schedule of the school, next year, for the first time the Inter-House Debates will be listed in the School Calendar. This year, Pranay Gupta won the Saraf Short Story Prize, Sakraney Medal for Elocution, Air force Trophy for the Best Speaker and G. V. Swaika Medal for Drama. Rahul Rana took the Carter English Essay Prize and the Nilima Bose Medal for Excellence in Theatre. The Nanibala Dey Literature Prize went to Samarjit Bhattacharya. While we congratulate the winners of the prizes we also commend the participants who made a sincere effort in the various activities. We hope to see you winning Laurels in the future.

The year has been an exceptional one. Much has been achieved by a combined effort. I take this opportunity to thank the staff who assisted in facilitating the clockwork like functioning of the Society. 1993 promises to be a year which will make greater demands on us but in the spirit of co-operation I am sure we will remain undaunted.

### HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The play is in the 16th Century England, in the reign of Henry VIII. Sir Thomas More, one of the greatest scholars of his time, and who was Lord Chancellor of England, had to choose between his loyalty to the King or his loyalty to the Church. He ultimately followed his conscience and so became, with Cardinal Fisher, the first of the Catholic martyrs of England.

The immediate cause of the problem was Henry's desire to divorce his wife, Catherine of Aragon. When the question was first openly raised (1527), Henry and Catherine had been married 18 years. During that time the Queen had borne Henry seven children, but all had died in infancy except one, the Princess Mary – and no woman had yet reigned in England. By this year it was obvious that Henry would die without a male heir unless he married again. Such a prospect was dangerous to the Tudor dynasty and might lead to another Civil War. Besides, Henry had formed a violent passion for Anne Boleyn, a lady of the court. To make Anne queen it was first necessary to get rid of Catherine.

Henry appealed to Pope, Clement VII to annul the marriage. The Pope, however, was not in a position to offend the Spanish party. For Catherine was aunt of Emperor Charles V who had just occupied and sacked Rome and the Pope was now the Emperor's prisoner. Cardinal Wolsey was entrusted with the task of pleading Henry's case and when he failed he was dismissed from service and stripped of his wealth. The office of Lord Chancellor was given to Sir Thomas More (1529).

The Pope made no move to annul the marriage and Henry proceeded to take his own steps. With the help of the Archbishop of Cantebury he divorced Catherine, hastily married Anne Boleyn and through a rapid series of Acts of Parliament severed all links with Rome and set himself up as Head of the New Church of England. He then proceeded to attack church properties and humiliate the Roman Catholic clergy through his hatchet – man, Thomas Cromwell, one of the most ruthless persons known in history.

In 1534 Parliament passed the Act of Succession whereby the crown would pass to the heirs of Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn. All subjects were required to swear the Oath of Succession or be charged with high treason. Sir Thomas More and Bishop Fisher refused, and were imprisoned. In July 1535 Sir Thomas More was tried and convicted because he had "traitorously attempted to deprive the King of his title of Supreme Head of the Church of England". It was only after he was condemned that he opened his mind to the Chancellor who presided. A week later he was beheaded.



### A MAN FOR ALL SEASONS - An Appreciation

On Wednesday, the 30th September, the School Play, 'A Man for All Seasons' by Robert Bolt was performed before an audience of parents and guests. I had the privilege to be present and I was requested by the producer/director, Mr. Protap Roy to put pen to paper as if I were a drama critic. The play is surely one of the greats of the 20th century and one cannot but admire the spirit and determination on of all concerned to bring its dramatic impact to life in Darjeeling. The young thespians of St. Paul's always perform above themselves and this year was no exception.

I am writing my impressions based on jottings made during the performance. The play seemed to get off to a slow start. One or two scenes were to pass before we were on the edge of our seats awaiting the next revelations in the unfolding drama. We are much indebted to the Common Man for injections of humour and well – delivered throwaway lined. This is, of course, the dramatists device for keeping things moving but I think Samarjit Bhattacharya achieved more than just being the 'continuity man'.


What is there to say about Sir Thomas More himself? Any weakness in this characterisation and the whole play collapses and that was not so. Pranay Gupta was Sir Thomas More without dominating. One feels he captured the essence of humility in the character which in later centuries led to Sir Thomas More being canonized as St. Thomas More. A vignette remains firmly in the mind – Sir Thomas More attempting to break his friendship with the Duke of Norfolk.

All minor characters occupied their parts well. Thomas Cromwell was suitably evil and I was happy with Cardinal Wolsey even though we saw so little of him. King Henry was suitably regal and reminded us that despite his later reputation, the King, in his youth, was active, learned and highly regarded.

I have reservations about asking young men to take female roles, yet it never ceases to amaze me that Paulites handle such situations with apparent ease. Yes, 'Ladies' you were great! Your farewell to sir Thomas had me reaching for my handkerchief to wipe away a tear or two – truly moving.

To complete all this acting talent we were treated to neat and elegant sets. Nothing more was needed.

I want to say 'thank you' to all concerned in the production of 'a Man for All Seasons'. We were given a rare treat. This leaves us waiting the next production in eager anticipation.






## MACHINE WORKSHOP



The Inter house matches were keenly contested and Havelock eventually won the Maggi Rolling trophy. The final house positions were as follows:—





hand springs and of course, then it's easy to go ahead with exercises on various apparatus that are of a higher and more dangerous standard than the rest.



(This report was presented at the Annual Awards Ceremony held on 18.11.92 in the School Prep Hall)

Rector, Col. Badgel, Members of staff and boys,

On behalf of the Rector, the School and the Darjeeling Award Authority, it is my proud privilege to welcome Col. B. K. D. Badgel, Vr. C., a distinguished soldier who is at present the Commandant 107 Infantry battalion of the Territorial Army. Sir, you honour us by being present in our midst today.

We are gathered here this afternoon to give away the awards for the year ending 1992 but before we do so, it would, perhaps, not be out of place to say a few words about this wonderful scheme so that Award winners – and those who are endeavouring to achieve medal standards – can see the programme in its proper perspective. The Scheme emphasises the qualities of perseverance, responsibility, self reliance, service to the community and above all, personal discovery. The Scheme is not a competition in the sense that we know: here one does not compete with others; but with one's ownself – to do better, to push oneself to achieve higher levels of performance. If at the end of the year, assessors in the scheme think a candidate has pushed himself to the utmost to achieve better standards then the candidate has pushed himself to the utmost to achieve better standards then the candidate is declared successful so that he can be prepared for the tougher tasks ahead at the next level of the scheme.

Today, I am very happy, indeed, to report that there are a total of 51 candidates who have successfully completed their programme and have found themselves on the Awardees list. Of these 23 are successful bronze candidates, 19 silver awardees and 8 who have attained the Gold Standard!

I have often heard it said that some of the standards we set out for boys in St. Paul's are "tough" – some even venture to opine that they are 'unfairly tough' – if you think it is "tough" – one is glad. And I am not glad for myself so much as for your own sake; because this means that you have tried so much more harder to achieve the standards that have been set and improved your own person. This means that you have won that competition with your own self – with that part of yourself which said initially that the levels to be achieved were difficult. That you have succeeded at the end of a tough test must surely come to you as a source of great satisfaction. On behalf of the school I would like to extend my congratulations to all the successful candidates.

I shall now break up this report into the four parts that go on to make up the Scheme:

#### SERVICE:

Inspite of the very limited opportunities to serve the community at large, the boys deserve our congratulations for the service they render the school community in various ways as members of the Audio-visual Club, reporters of the school newsletter, and chapel wardens. Further there are several who learn First Aid. We hope that in the coming year we will be able to extend the scope of service avenues eligible for consideration under this scheme, without adding to the already busy co-curricular schedule of the school.

## PHYSICAL RECREATION:

Sports is extremely popular in St. Paul's; ironically, as in the last two years, this year, too, this was the area in which most boys stumbled and failed to qualify because of the fairly high standards. It is hoped that those who found the physical recreation section difficult will try harder to achieve the standards which, so many others, achieve with aplomb. No promises are being made, but, should everything go well we may be able to reintroduce rock-climbing in the new year, which was so popular earlier.

#### SKILL:

There are very few schools which offer the wide variety of hobbies that our school does. We must be proud of this fact, and more so of the very high standards that you are able to achieve. I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate you all – whether you are receiving an award this year or not – on the excellent works produced by you during the exhibition week. Amongst the popular hobbies offered for assessment were machine workshop, batik, public speaking and dramatics, art and woodwork. There was also an excellent collection by a single numismatist.

#### **EXPEDITIONS:**

This continues to remain one of the most compelling reasons for joining the Award programme. There is always quite a scramble to get into one of the groups heading into the forests of Rambi or the heights of Sandakphu and Dzongri. Because of the hectic school schedule, a fewer number of expeditions were sent out this year. Altogether 23 expeditions went out, comprising 13 bronze expeditions to Rambi, 6 silver expeditions to Sandakphu and 4 gold expeditions to the West Sikkim Himalayan region of Dzongri to an altitude of 13500 ft. It was always amusing as well as very educative going through the log accounts of the expeditions which included details of almost everything from how not to burn omelettes at breakfast, avoiding leech bites to being chased

down mountain sides by yaks. To all of you who survived the rigours of the day long treks, and nights in the rough and tumble of the countrysides, I'd like to say "Well done!"

## RESIDENTIAL PROJECT:

Gold awardees are expected to complete a residential project by serving and living in an environment other than their own for 5 days. This year's awardees gave of their time and care in nursing homes and schools for adults and those for the underprivileged. All of them undertook their project work during the holidays and worked to the satisfaction of the school and nursing home authorities. At this point it gives pleasure to inform you that we are hoping to renew our contact with the Blind School in Kalimpong from next year and this may work to the advantage of the Gold candidates.

Before I take your leave, I would like to gratefully acknowledge the support I have received from several quarters in carrying out my duties as Secretary of the Darjeeling Award Authority. Firstly, I would like to place on record my gratitude to the Rector, Mr. Howard, for his constant help, support and guidance at every stage. I am also grateful to Mr. Myers, our Senior Master, who coordinated the activities this year. I am also thankful to all House Masters and members of the staff who have worked enthusiastically as instructors and assessors. If the Scheme is a success here at St. Paul's a great portion of the credit MUST go to you all! I'm also thankful to Dr. Sharma and his medical staff, Mr. Roy Chowdhury and to Mr. Roberts, who always ensured that no expedition party had to trek on empty stomachs. With due respect to all the teachers involved in the programme I need to take time out to place on record my indebtedness to Mr. B. B. Tamang and Mr. Krishnendu Chakrabarty who, not only went on inspection trips but the latter was a wonderful help even at other times in executing the Award Programme through the year. Finally, there is one person I need to thank for the time spent in the planning and execution of the programme. A quiet and efficient help, his presence was always a source of comfort because I was confident in the knowledge that he would always be there whenever I needed honest appraisal, constructive criticism and hard, sincere work; this, of course, was none other than this year's student secretary - Dinesh Deokota. Dinesh, thanks so much for everything.

So another year of moderate success has come to an end, Those of you who have succeeded at one level will, I hope, return even more determined to succeed at the next higher level and those who could not make it this year, will, I hope, come back fully resolved to make the coming year a positively successful one.


At the Awards Presentation Ceremony, Anurag Goel who is working towards his Gold Standard, entertained the gathering with a delightful piece his saxophone.






Sgt. I. Chakravarthi was adjudged best all-round cadet for the year 1992 and was awarded the Gen. Virendra Medal for NCC.

Matins remained a prominent feature, throughout the year but we did not have a solitary evensong this year.


