



How true of this Chronicle!

RECTOR'S LETTER

As we review the year of 1993 we are left in little doubt of the massive changes that are occuring in our country, not only in the quality of life as lived by adults but also by the children whom we serve.

The aftermath of the Ayodyha incident in December, 92 was bombblasts and riots in Bombay, Calcutta and other places. Increasingly we began to hear of agitations based on caste lines in various parts of the country. National Integration became the catchword in the first half of the year and, fortunately, the collective will of millions of thoroughly decent, law-abiding citizens prevailed to resorte stability and decorum.

Over 1993 the New Economic Policy was spelt out clearly and took shape in a new era of International Business. India has entered a fast-moving world where little can be taken for granted. Exports quality control and free-market forces have dominated the business world displacing conventional ideas on socialism.

Today our students are bombarded with satelite information which includes a life-style often alien to our Indian ethic. However, there is no running away from satelite T.V.-it is here to stay. Uncensored video-movies have replaced the traditional movie hall form of entertainment. Four language and four-letter words are common place. Our childern are increasingly exposed to lurid details of violence and sexual degredation. The simple joys of playing hopscotch, seven-tiles, police and robbers has given way to gang-fights and mugging. The intensity increases in the metropolitan cities where each week, we read reports of terrifying murders and atrocities committed by teenagers.

The academic race for high marks for college admission brings inhuman pressures on our young students so that the temptation to use unfair means in an examination is very great. It came to such a pitch that one of our States had to actually legislate against cheating and a recent election manifesto declared that this legislation would be reversed if the party came to power.

What then is the role of a school like St. Paul's set in the relatively remote grandeur of the Eastern Himalayas? This school remains the perfect setting for National Integration in its finest meaning. Drawing students mainly from the commercial world, schools like ours have advantage of using an international language -English and increasingly our boys must learn not only to write the language but to speak it confidently.

To face the problem of dealing with leisure hours it is necessary to strengthen games, hobbies and club activities. We have tried all this with some sucess. Academic pressures are the best faced with self-motivation rather than constantly competing against others. The need of the hour is the development of moral fibre that will help face the challenges of the future. Such inner strengths are not to be found in selfish indivisualism but through a reaching-out within the community and learning to play as a team, Above all the ultimate realisation that, in spite of everything, we can achieve nothing unless we have God on our side.





RECTOR'S SPEECH - 1993

Mr. & Mrs. Mukerjei, Ladies and Gentlemen,


On behalf of the Staff and Students I warmly welcome you to the 170th Speech Day function of St. Paul's School, Darjeeling. We honour as Our Chief Guest this morning, Mr. S.K. Mukerjei, member of our Board of Governors, and senior retired I.A.S Officer, at one time Secretary to the Governor of West Bengal.

We are also grateful to Mrs. Mukerjei for being present and for graciously agreeing to give away the prizes later this morning.

. I bring the apologies of our Chairman, Bishop Gorai, and the other Board Members for not being present at this occasion, they having urgent work in Delhi.

I also extend a very warm welcome to Bishop Andrews, Bishop of the Eastern Himalaya who has recently taken over from Bishop J.E. Ghose, who retired in June this year. I take this opportunity, on behalf of the Board of Governors, to pay tribute to the work of Bishop Ghose, a member of our Board of Governors since 1972 and who took an active interest in all aspects of the school's progress. We also welcome to our Board of Governors, Mr. Gopal Krishna, I.A.S, District Magistrate, Darjeeling, and Mr. Som, Jt. Secretary, Department of Education.

We have had a number of changes on the staff since last October, Mr. Ranjan Biswas left us at the end of October, throwing us into some disarray in the teaching of Mathematics at the senior level. Fortunately we were able to fill the gap with the lot of extra classes conducted by our present staff. It was with some dismay that on 1st December, 1992 we received the resignation of Mr. D.A.V. Prince our Director of Music. A popular and a well-loved figure on the school campus, Mr. Prince served us loyally for 16 years. His absence left a lacunae in the Music Department which we have filled only very recenlty. Mr. & Mrs. S. Mallick left our services in June this year as a result of pressing personal problems in Calcutta. Mr. Protap Roy and his wife, Annieta, left us in mid-September, he to become the Headmaster at Dr. Graham's Homes, Kalimpong. At the end of this year we will bid farewell to Mr. Kamlesh Kanti and Mr. K.L. Pradhan. Both these gentlemen are amongst the seniormost on our Staff and the School will miss their mature wisdom as they move into retirement. Mr. Kanti has served us for 22 years as Head of Hindi Department, Housemaster, Second Master and Acting Sr. Master. Under his guidance the Photography Club has reached great heights. Mr. Pradhan has

served us for an equally long period of 16 years. Quiet and unassuming he has cheerfully given a hand in every aspect of school life. I know the Hindi Parishad will greatly miss his valuable contribution for their Hindi Plays.

One of the most difficult aspects of administration in a place like Darjeeling is the recruitment of staff, sometimes at short notice, and more importantly, testing the calibre of the person who can endure the strain of an unbroken nine-month academic year and yet remain cheerful and co-operative. We have been fortunate to find a number of young teachers and I hope that, over the years, we can work together to maintain the great traditions of the school. On the Teaching Staff we welcome Mr. Dilip Kumar, Mr. S.D. Lama and Mrs. Anu Sheela Rai who help with Mathematics and Physics. Mr. O.P. Agarwal, Old Paulite, joined us in March to teach History. Mr. Subir Roy rejoined our services after a gap of five years to teach French and some English. Mr. Gautam Lepcha joined us in March as Music Master in the Pry. Wing. The Rev. Noel Sen joined us recently as Chaplain and Music Master to the School.

On the administrative staff Mr. Brian Cecil joined us in March to take over as Bursar. Miss Bishnu Tamang went into residence as a Nurse in the Pry. Wing. Mr. Asish Chakravarty joined us as Caterer. Mrs. Pooja Thackur, Mrs. P. Bagchi & Mrs. Diana Alva have joined us as Matrons.

With so many changes on the staff it is amazing how we have been able to function smoothly, especially in the classrooms, and I here pay tribute to Mr. I. Myers, Senior Master, Mr. G.R. Anthony, Head, Jr. Wing and Mrs. Howard, Head Pry. Wing, ably assisted by Mr. Thomas Mukhia, our Second Master. I am well aware of the strains they have borne and am deeply grateful for the smoothness with which they have rallied to solve problems. I can assure you that there has been very little disruption in the classrooms. Credit must also be given to the existing Teaching Staff who have rallied brilliantly over the year in the classrooms, on the gamesfield and in supervising all the various cultural activities we hold over the year.

Our academic results at the public exams. of March, 1993 have shown an improvement over the previous year. The ISC (12) exams. results showed all 46 candidates successful, with a substantial qualitative improvement in all subjects, particularly in Mathematics and Science. At the ICSE (X) level 66 out of 69 boys were successful, a great improvement on the year before when we were hit with 13 failures. We have been a little more careful this year

regarding academic achievements in the classroom and must now wait till May next year to see how effective we have been.

In a school such as ours outdoor games play an important part and we have run through the whole gamut of games from hockey, cricket and football to gymnastics, athletics, boxing, Volleyball, basketball, tennis, table - tennis, Eton Fives, squash and badminton. At the Edinburgh cricket games we came second to Mount Hermon School after a spirited fight. Our second game against St. Joseph's School gave us the edge. Since my last report we have had two Inter-School Boxing meets, against Dr. Graham's Homes. The Home's boys fared better on the whole though we were able to increase the number of individual boxers who showed promise for the future. We were unable to hold our annual Gym. display at the Gymkhana Club in May and rescheduled this for 15th August. This year Jr. Wing & Pry. Wing boys added in a mass P.T. with figure formations that was quite impressive.

The NCC has functioned efficiently this year and in addition to the usual marching and guard of honour parade for 15th August, the boys planted over 300 saplings and took part in a week long camp conducted by the NCC Officers at Katakpahar. Debasish Mondal and Abishek Jaiswal were selected as the Best Cadets and move on for a special training that entitles them to take part in the Republic Day Parade. The DEAS expeditions were popular, with treks to Rambi and Sandhakphu. For the Gold Award candidates more arduous treks to Dzongri and the Kanchenjunga Base Camp were organised.

In addition to these outdoor activities there have been various elocution contests in English, Hindi, Bengali and Nepali; Quiz contests in all three Wings, and debating in the Sr. Wing. This year we came second in the N.M. Master Memorial Elocution Contest.

A number of visitors brought in a breath of fresh air. Mr. Cyril Smith from Stratford-on-Avon, spoke to the boys on Shakespeare. With the help of the British Council we recently hosted the Mark Troop Chamber Music Company and were amused when, as a encore, they played a "classical" version of the recent Hindi Pop Song "CHOLI KAI PICHEY KAI HAI ". This week we welcome a team of Professors from Australia who spoke to the boys on educational opportunities in Australia.

We have had a particularly wet year which started sometime in April and carried on through September. You would imagine that with so much rain our water problem would be a thing of the past - quite the contrary. Frequent landslides along the pipeline that comes from Senchel Lake kept disrupting the supply. When the

water was there, there would be no power to pump it up, and when both water and power were synchronised, usually between 3 and 4 a.m, there would be no personel to man the pump! The incessant rain, with very heavy showers in-between, brought disaster to our main buildings. What appeared to be minor leaks the year before turned out to be major water-falls this year. By May the roofing of Milman Hall collapsed and a major renovation became necessary. No sooner had this problem been corrected when Cotton Hall collapsed with some classrooms totally flooded, and the hall grand - pianos drenched by leaking water. By July the side-aisles of the Chapel had turned black with mildew, and damp, and all that had to be repaired as well. It did not help when the Rectory building with its attached dormitories also revealed major cracks and leaks. To put this right has cost us a fortune but there was no alternative. If you see the school looking relatively clean and tidy today it is because the boys themselves have cleaned every nook and cranny. I am amazed at their co-operation and cheerfulness under adverse conditions. If all this was not enough, add to it a freak thunderstorm by a bolt of lightening which directly hit the school generator so that the motor and most of its cabling burnt out and then, in August, a major landslide on the north of the Estate which, to repair, would run into lacs. Still we will recover!

I have received news that very recently an anonymous poisonpen letter has been circulated to the parents. This is a sad piece of writing by some disgruntled element, which evokes pity. If the school's income were really three crores in the year we'd have no problems for the next ten years in terms of fees, it is not even half that! Under salaries and allowances we disburse a third of the income, another third on food and the balance on maintenance and other educational expenses. This proportion is about right for a residential institution such as ours.

In an effort to battle against the length of this report it becomes inevitable that I must condense my appreciation to the many persons on the Estate and the School in general who work quietly throughout the year expecting little recognition. The Estate Manager and his Staff, the Caterers, the Matrons, the Office Staff, the Nurses, the Secretaries and the School Doctor, to each of these goes credit for their total devotion to the children of the school. I would also like to commend the Old Paulites who have been so co-operative and helpful and the numerous friends and well-wishers who have assisted us from time to time with material gifts and expert advice. Above all I would like to thank the Board of Governors for their encouragment and understanding.

Chief Guest's Speech

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I consider it a special privilege to address this august gathering. St. Paul's, Darjeeling, is a school with a distinguished past and a promising future. By asking me to be the Chief Guest on its Speech Day which is an important annual event in the social life of Darjeeling, Mr. Howard has conferred on me a great honour. On behalf of my wife and myself, I thank him for inviting us to participate in this function.

The surroundings here are delightful indeed. It will, however, be sheer escapism to shut our mind to the horrors to which men are subjecting fellowmen all over the world, be it in course of the ethnic warfare in Bosnia-Herzegovina, the civil war in Somalia and the peace-keeping activities there on behalf of the United Nations, the racial violence in South Africa, the constitutional crisis in Russia, the communal riots in our own country or the sporadic acts of terrorism far and near. Whenever these days we turn on the radio or the television, we come across glaring instances of inhuman conduct all round the globe.

A frightening feature of these brutalities is that the victims are mostly innocent women and children. And the irony of this state of affairs is that many of these atrocities are being inflicted in the name of religion. It is as if nation after nation is engaged in competitive cruelty. It will be no surprise if the last two decades of the twentieth centrury go down in history as a period when religious fundamentalism ran amuck.

Man is now on the threshold of the twenty first century. Are we going to succumb to the orgy of violence that is raging all over the world? Is the final holocaust just round the corner in which mankind will be wiped off the face of the earth in a conflagration of its own making? Or is there any hope for the survival of civilization?

The prospect before us is forbidding indeed. There seems to be darkness all around. Still, to my mind, there will be hope for mankind so long as there is the mother struggling to bring up her children against tremendous odds, there is the teacher trying to instil in his pupils the sense of right and wrong, there is the peasant toiling away to earn a living for his family. They are the salt of the earth. Knowingly or unknowingly, they have decided about their priorities. And the basis of their conduct can only be charity or love, that love which is the core of Christ's teaching and which has been so eloquently expressed in chapter 13 of St. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians:

"THOUGH I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass, or a thinkling cymbal.









In the Brain of St.Paul's Quiz, Lawrence did well. A. Rangoonwala stood 4th and Prashant Poudyal 5th.


Finally, we would like to thank Our House Master Mr. A.D.

Mr. Subramanium left us sometime in May, we welcome Mr. S.D. Lama in his place to teach Science in the Jr. Wing.










Lady Luck deserted us this year and the Athletics shield slipped out of our grasp.



October with the magnificent team of Ritesh Pandey. Cable won the Quiz Cup without much difficulty.


We bade farewell to Mr. S. Mallick and welcomed Mr. S.D. Lama, Mrs. A. Rai and Mr. S.Roy to the House.


This year we had a responsible group of House Monitors who were very helpful throughout the year when ever needed. These monitors are:











THE SCHOOL PLAY

-a review

One of the highlights of the academic year at St. Paul's is the School Play. Our school has a tradition of brilliant acting and able direction, and this year was no exception.

In 1993, we did not have any pontificating about 'causes' to be upheld or subtle 'messages' to be conveyed. Instead, this year's School Play, a murder mystery, based on Agatha Christie's "Ten Little Indians", provided sheer entertainment and kept the audience spell bound in suspense until the very end. The dialogue was simple and straightforward, the direction and production under the Rector, Mr. D. A. Howard, very competent, and the acting by the eleven performers, a treat to watch. Although suspense was the watchword, there were intermittent doses of situation comedy and the humorous dialogue to provide comic relief. These served to heighten the overall effect.

The plot goes like this ten men and women, each of whom is suspected of having taken a human life at some stage in his or her life, are trapped in a house on an uninhabited island. As in the well-known nursery rhyme, each 'Littly Indian', one by one, meets with his or her death, until there are only a few left. Each of those who die goes out in his own peculiar way, and no two deaths are repetitive. The murderer is a very clever but deranged person. The end comes as a surprise, after a rough and ready sort of poetic justice is meted out to each of the 'Ten Little Indians'.

Special mention needs to be made of the acting of Samarjit Bhattacharya, Samrat Bhusan, Saswata Sanyal and Rahul Rana. The stage setting was typically English and modern. The huge background painting of the sea, done by Mr. R.S. Baoni was breathtaking. The sound effects of the seagulls and the storm were quite slick, too.


Unfortunately, on the day these reviewers watched the play, the tape-recorded voices were a bit muffled and the pistol shots, flat. The scene in which there is a murder during a blackout tended to be a bit confused, and matters were made worse by the momentary power cuts in the Prep Hall.

Credit for this successful production goes not only to the Rector




The Madhuka Rana Nepali prize was awarded to Pranay Rai for his essay on Religion.





Indeed, the Duke of Edinburgh's Award is a marvellous scheme which contributes to self-improvement as, perhaps, few other programmes do. Having said this, I must, however, admit that in comparison to previous years the Award activities this year were relatively low-keyed. 


And so another year has come to an end and one now looks forward to 1994 when I hope all of you will return more determined than ever to succeed and push ourselves to greater glory.




