



RECTOR'S LETTER


RECTOR'S SPEECH - 1995

Rev. Father LeClaire, Ladies and Gentlemen.

At the very outset I would like to extend to Fr. LeClaire my heartful gratitude for his acceptance to preside at this morning's function as our Chief Guest. As Principal of St. Joseph's College (University Department) he has an extremely busy schedule and has yet taken time off to be with us at very short notice. I can only describe his response to my appeal as the sympathy of one Head of an Institution to another in a time of need. I am also delighted to welcome Mrs. Moneesha Chaudhuri today; a lady long associated with our school, as a parent, teacher and devoted friend.

One of the most difficult tasks of any Headmaster is to find suitable staff members. This is a problem made more complicated by the remoteness of Darjeeling and the difference in timing of the academic year between the hills and plains. The strain is more acute when Staff leave mid-session. No sooner had we opened the term in mid-March than Mr. Subir Roy, our French Teacher, resigned with less than a week's notice to join the Assam Valley School. Mr. & Mrs. HN Stolke left our services at the end of April to emigrate to Australia. Mr. Stolke served the school for 21 years, largely in the History and English Departments. A keen games player and member of the Edinburgh Cricket Team for many years, he was also a Housemaster in the Junior School and produced various plays, the most outstanding one being the School Play of 1994 "Conduct Unbecoming". Mrs. Stolke was a Secretary who served in many departments of the School for a period of 20 years. We wish them all success in their new appointments in Australia. The end of July saw the departure of the Rev. Noel Sen, our Chaplain, Music and Economics teacher. He was recalled to serve in the Diocese of Calcutta, at St. Paul's Cathedral. We deeply regret his leaving; his contribution to the school was wide-ranging and his presence added dignity to our Chapel services.

At the start of the year we welcomed on to our staff Mr. Michael Dutta, to teach Geography; Dr. Manoj Kumar to teach Hindi and Mr. Sean Manuk in the Primary Wing. All three gentlemen have fitted in easily and have already made their impact in the school. During the ensuing months, in July we welcomed Mr. Abhimanyu Sen from New Delhi, to teach French; in August Mr. S. K. Mishra from Raj Kumar College, to teach English, and in September, Ms. Caroline Hillier from the U.K. to teach music. We hope that they will all settle down to have a happy stay with us, I know that the boys have been happy to welcome them.

The end of May saw the publication of the ICSE and ISC results of March, 1995. This year 52 candidates appeared for the ISC(12) Exams and all 52 were successful. We were particularly pleased with results in Commerce and the Humanities where there were a large number of distinctions. At the ICSE 62 candidates appeared of whom 61 were successful, again with a substantive improvement in the grades. I take this opportunity to congratulate the staff members for their dedicated service over many years to obtain these good results. This year we have experimented by keeping boys back for the May and Puja holidays when they have failed to achieve a Pass' level in various subjects. It is hoped that we will be able to impress upon them the importance of academic work. I know that keeping boys back for the holidays is equally distasteful to the staff who might legitimately claim that they also need a break; however, it is a mark of our complete dedication to the interests of the students that the staff are willing to stay back, coach the boys, and set re-tests, all with the sole aim of assisting them to improve. We can only try.

On the games field and in the sphere of sporting activities we have had our fair share of success. The first term is devoted to cricket, the highlight of the season being the Edinburgh Shield games. This year all schools shared the shield, each defeating the other in turn. Our school team consisted of somewhat young students from classes IX to X. Recognising their inexperience we were able to employ with the help of the Old Paulites the services of a cricket coach. This proved successful and I hope that we can repeat this experiment in 1996. Other games played in this season were Volleyball & Basketball. The annual Gymnastics Display was held on 29th May, 1995 at the Gymkhana Club. Mr. A. K. Maliwal, IPS, Suptd. of Police, Darjeeling, was our Chief Guest and he was pleased to commend the staff and boys on a well rehearsed performance of gymnastics. The second term has been largely devoted to football, boxing, marathon and athletics. All four games have been reasonably successful and we now look forward to the Inter-School Athletics competition scheduled for mid October, '95, after we return from the Puja holidays. This year we have been particularly stringent when awarding Games Colours and the Special Prizes. We have tried to ensure the attainment of a degree of quality and standard with these awards; it is for this reason that many of the 'special prizes' for the year 1995 have not been awarded.

In the field of Speech and Drama there have been the usual six House Concerts presented by the Seniors and Juniors and a special Inter-House Drama competition arranged by the Pry. Wing. In addition, the Primary and Junior Wings presented their Annual Concert on 29th May, and the Senior School production of "Curtmantle" was performed yesterday. I would like to thank the Housemasters and all the teachers who have assisted in these dramatic

performances and to commend the Producer and Director of last night's School Play in being able to work together as a team. There have been the usual Inter-House Quiz competitions, debates and elocution contests in all the languages, in all the Wings. This year, once-again, we won the Inter-School N. M. Master Memorial Shield for English Elocution. In the world of music, in addition to the normal singing classes, the Pry. Wing has introduced the playing of percussion instruments. 28 candidates appeared for the Trinity College of Music, London, Examination in Piano and Violin and all were successful. Congratulations to our Music Staff. Our Chapel service have been greatly enriched by some fine singing by the choir. Last week we were happy to have with us Mr. John Jacob of the Scripture Union, and an Old Paulite; he made our daily Chapel services interesting, providing a spirit of freshness.

Over the year the school's NCC troop has practised its marching and turn-out culminating in a splendid display given on Independence Day where our Guest of Honour was Col. R. P. Ahlawat, Group Commander, 5 Bn. Btn., NCC, Darjeeling. Other outdoor activities have included the DEAS expeditions with the service criteria for the Bronze, Silver and Gold awards.

Our biggest daily problem in Darjeeling is the supply of water. Being above the Municipal tank we at St. Paul's are particularly at a disadvantage. This has necessitated of ferrying water on a daily basis, a system that is expensive and not very satisfactory. In an attempt to deal with the problem we have undertaken three water projects:-

The renovation and complete overhaul of the old rain-water tanks below the Tennis Courts; the renovation and overhauling of the rain-water tanks at Lefroy; a new concrete reservoir below the Municipal tank, complete with a Pump House and Pumping arrangements to assist water distribution from Dawkins. The entire project, though expensive, will only partially solve the problem during monsoon months. However, it is an attempt to face the problem squarely.

Over the winter we added a new toilet-cum-bath house to the Westcott Hall Dormitory as a result of which the boys no longer have to come downstairs to use toilet facilities. In the Primary Wing we had to put down ten supporting pillars to protect the cantilever section of the second floor. This allowed an extension to the PW Dormitory and the creation of a linen room. We were also able to install a new water boiler in the Primary Wing thus increasing the frequency of the baths given to the boys. The Chapel slope was completely resurfaced and the major landslide that occurred below the Chapel over 1993-94 was completely repaired.

We have also added some new lockers and furniture in the Dormitories of all three Wings and purchased a new overhead Video Projector which has made it convenient when we show films to the boys. We are no longer dependent on hiring 35 mm films from Siliguri or Calcutta. With the help of a number of generous parents and Old Paulites we have added to our cassette Library nearly 100 new cassettes.

We have always enjoyed good neighbourly relations with the Army Authorities of Jalapahar and I would like to thank Brig. Johar, Commandant, 107 Mt. Brigade and Col. Sharma, Commandant, T. A. Bn, for their assistance and cooperation throughout the year. Also, we reach out to the Local Authorities of Darjeeling town for their help and guidance in difficult situations.

Living conditions in Darjeeling are often trying in that there are always shortages of something or the other. These constant stresses call for a degree of patience, over and above the call to duty. The Staff, both campus and non-campus, have accepted these difficulties with the minimum of complaint. The Estate Department has been under constant pressure; the Bursary and Office Staff have frequently been under strain; the Matrons, Nurses and School Doctor have had to face shortages and epidemics, and the Caterers have somehow managed to retain their sanity in spite of everything, to ensure that the Army of St. Paul's moves on a full stomach.

I would like to thank all these persons for making life possible in a happy and congenial atmosphere. In addition our thanks go out to the great body of the Domestic Staff without whose cooperation living here would be impossible.

I suppose that to a closed school community such as ours, what effects the life and security of the Rector becomes a matter of significance. It is true on the 20th July I experienced a mild heart attack. I was taken down to Siliguri and Calcutta for treatment. I know that this threw the school into a degree of uncertainty and concern and I can only commend, very warmly, all members of the staff and students for the way they stood firm in their duty and their sense of responsibility. I commend the Senior Master who had to carry most of the burden, the Second Master and Heads of Junior and Primary Wings for their loyalty and service. I take this opportunity to thank the Old Paulites in Calcutta for their concern and care over me. In particular Dr. Michael Lall and Dr. Utpal Ray for ensuring that I have the best possible care and attention. I would like to thank the OPA for accepting the cost of my hospitalisation in Calcutta and the Rev. Noel Sen who allowed me to be his guest in the Cathedral House for over three weeks as I recuperated. I am happy to report that, for the moment,


and God willing, I have recovered. I thank all parents, friends and well wishers for their prayers and kind thoughts. To the Staff and Prefects of this year goes a quiet Congratulation' for their splendid efforts and the way they have soldered on through all uncertainties.

Well done. May I now request Father Leclaire to address the school.











Anderson won the Lawn Tennis Cup. Credit goes to V. Basal, K. Macdonald & B. Gurung.









A WORD ON 'CURTMANTLE'

Henry Plantagenet was born in 1133, grandson of Henry I. During his boyhood England was suffering an eight-year-long agony of civil war, fought between his mother and Stephen of Blois. At the age of twenty-one he was King, and the wealthiest ruler in Europe. At 56 he was dead, the sword of State pawned, his heart broken. But he had laid the foundations of the English Common Law, upon which succeeding generations would build.

Between these two dates there is a seething cauldron of events, conflicts, purposes, errors, brilliance, human endurance, and human suffering, which could provide, in those 35 years, all that we need for a lifetime's study and contemplation for mankind. A few facts have been manipulated to convey 30 years in one almost uninterrupted action.

The play has two themes: one a progression towards a portrait of Henry, a search for his reality, moving through versions of 'Where is the King?' to the unresolved close of "He was dead when they came to him." The other theme is Law, or rather the inter-play of different laws: civil, canon, moral, aesthetic, and the laws of God; and how they belong and up not belong to each other.

Just as 35 years of his reign contain a concentration of the human condition, so his character covers a vast field of human nature. He was simple and royal (his nickname of "Curtmantle" derived from the plain short cloak he wore), direct and paradoxical, compassionate and hard, a man of intellect, a man of action, God-fearing, superstitious, blasphemous, far-seeing, short-sighted, affectionate, lustful, patient, volcanic, humble, over-riding. It is difficult to think of any facet of man which at some time he didn't demonstrate, except chastity and sloth.







'CURTMANTLE' - A REVIEW : BY MR. JOHN WEST

A parent wishing to make a complimentary comment on the school play 'Curtmantle' suggested that a video recording of the play would be a good idea. This would enable a video audience to appreciate the excellence of the production. All those who had been unable to attend the live performance would come to know the high standard of the St. Paul's dramatic productions. I agree with the sentiments involved in making such a significant suggestion.


On Monday 25th. September, we settled down as part of the audience to experience the dramatic sequences portrayed in 'Curtmantle' by Christopher Fry. For those unfamiliar with the play, the Rector gave a useful introduction taking us back to the England of the 12th. century. Two figures occupied centre stage during the latter half of the century – the King, Henry II and Thomas a Becket, first Chancellor and then Archbishop of Canterbury. 'Curtmantle' was the nickname given to the King on account of the short cloak he used to wear. The play focuses more attention on the King than on Becket. This allows the playwright to develop his themes without getting tied up with the conflicting views surrounding the death of Becket.

As the lights of the hall dimmed, our attention was immediately drawn to the stage. A carefully developed Prologue, played competently in front of the main curtain, set the tone for all the minor parts. Each and everyone of the supporting players contributed whatever was necessary to the development of the plot. When a play has a large cast, those with smaller parts must wonder whether they really count. Of course they do. The playwright included those parts because of their necessary dramatic impact. Congratulations to all the bit players for bringing their talents to bear on the roles assigned to them.

When the main curtain opened we could appreciate the careful work of those responsible for the sets. As other scenes unfolded, it was clear that considerable expertise had gone into the sets right through to the final burning of the city of Le Mans, as Henry lay dying. In this context, we must also mention that necessary scene changes were carried out well.

As scene succeeded scene those characterizing the major roles performed their tasks with aplomb. It would be invidious to compare the one with the other. Each one displayed a competence of breath-taking dimensions. We have to say "well done!" to each and everyone. Also, notwithstanding the reservation expressed above, I must say that Akhilesh Kumar as King Henry II provided everything necessary to hold the whole performance together.

The programme gives a long list of credits indicating that the production we so much enjoyed on 25th. September was successful because of excellent teamwork. My heartiest congratulations to all concerned and a special word of thanks to the director Mr. M. S. Calvert and producer Mr. S. Chakravarthi. The director and producer have placed us in their debt by their undertaking which brought to us the excitement of a live stage performance of a classic drama.

Paul 's Cathedral. Before leaving, Father Noel gave a piano recital which was greatly enjoyed by all who attended the concert. We were pleased to welcome Ms. Caroline Hillier from the United Kingdom as our new pianoforte teacher. She is a music graduate from the University of Bath and has done her Performer's course from the 'Royal Academy' and 'Guildhall School of Music', London. Before joining us, Ms. Hillier was teaching music in a school in Oman. Apart from teaching some piano students, she has also conducted singing lessons in the Junior Wing and Played the piano at the J. W. Chapel Services.

This occasion has had as walking "six feet tall" well done ! on a successful operation.




The traditional log team comprising of boys from the VIth form did various exercises with the log, putting up a commendable performance. They certainly need to be congratulated for their hard work.



DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD ANNUAL REPORT, 1995

Just as in the past, one continued to be thoroughly impressed with the participants' enthusiasm in the activities that come under the ambit of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award programme here in St. Paul's. This was most marked at the Bronze level; but at the higher levels there are traces of growing disinterest that we need to look into urgently. As yet these are only 'traces' but I think the problem areas, which have been identified, need our immediate attention before the malaise becomes more deeply rooted.

One of the reasons for the lack of interest shown this year was the interminably long rainy season which began sometime late in March and persisted through the better part of October! Of course, we have no control over this factor. The other reason that contributed to a lowering of interest was the outcome of a decision taken some years back when we began to make the requirements for the Silver and Gold Standards more stringent and in the process made the obtaining of School or House Colours mandatory to be eligible for these awards under Physical Recreation. This year the School authorities raised the standards very high for obtaining these school and house honours - and I would think rightly so. However, this has affected participation at the Gold and Silver levels because, except for a handful of boys obtaining school and house colours under the new school standards, for the others this will remain a wild dream. The end result was that when students realised the tough standards they began to drop out from the Award Scheme. When the new term begins next year I think we will need to think a fresh about standards in physical recreation for the Award Programme without compromising on quality.

Inspite of all these problems we began the year with 90 bronze entrants, 48 Silver hopefuls ad 9 gold standard candidates. I am glad to report that of these, 22 candidates won the Bronze Award; 5 achieved Silver Standards and after a gap of one year we again had two candidates who won the coveted Gold Award! There are, even today, about six candidates working towards their Gold Awards.

This year the activities under Service, Skills, Physical Recreation and Expeditions remained more or less the same. NCC has become an integral part of the Service programme; but this year we discontinued First Aid at all levels. We hope to revive this in a more meaningful manner next year along with active Social Service like adult literacy, if possible.

This year, thanks to the prolonged monsoons - which seemed ever so reluctant to withdraw - the number of outward bound expeditions dropped quite sharply. There were a total of 16 expeditions spread throughout the year. The bronze expeditions trudged around Tiger Hill, halting overnight at Rambi and having bath at Khong Khola the next day; the Silver hopefuls went to Sandakphu via Phalut and Rammam (and all the while cursing yours truly on the uphill stretches from Siri Khola and Gorkhey). The long gold expedition headed for Dzongri in Western Sikkim but had to return after the first day's trek because a key bridge had been swept away by the swift mountain river (and a fool hardy plan to cross the river in spate had to be given up mid-stream when better sense prevailed.) They later walked the Silver trail in lieu of the original trek!

I would like to place on record my sincere gratitude to all those who helped in running the Award Programme successfully: The Rector and Senior Master were always encouraging and to them I owe a special thanks as also to all the masters who worked as instructors and assessors. Without their cooperation the programme would never have gone forward at all. I am also grateful to Dr. PK Sharma, Mr. PK Roychowdhury (EM) and to Mr. AK Chakravarty ad Mr. R. Gurung the caterers who were also considerate and overlooked last minute expedition lists! Finally, I owe a very special word of thanks to my Student Secretary for 1995, Yusuf Jamal Siddique, who worked quietly and rendered dedicated services all through the year. Well done, Yusuf, and here's wishing you the very best in the future.




In the month of September, from the 3rd to the 7th, thirty-five cadets
























the 5th of September. All throughout his stay in the school it has been a big change for the boys in the Chapel humming the new hymns which he taught.
