


Rector's Speech - 1996

Mr. O'Brien, Ladies and Gentlemen, on behalf of the Staff and Students it is my privilege to welcome Mr. Neil O'Brien as our Chief Guest this morning. Mr. O'Brien was until recently Managing Director of Oxford University Press for the whole of South-East Asia. He is presently Chairman of the Council for the Indian School Certificate Exams, and until recently, the M.L.A. in the W.B. Assembly, a nominated representative of the Anglo-Indian community. I had the privilege of serving with Mr. O'Brien on many committees in Calcutta and I am well aware of his wholehearted contribution to Anglo-Indian Education in general and to our W.B. schools in particular.

Also seated amongst us today is the Rev. Noel Sen who is presently the Vicar of St. Paul's Cathedral Calcutta, and who has just conducted the Commemoration Service in the Chapel. For many years Rev. Sen served on our Board of Governors, and , until August last year, he was our School Chaplain and Music Master. It is a pleasure to have him with us again on this occasion. I hope the Staff and boys have welcomed you warmly. In March this year we introduced the New Hymn Book in the Chapel (last year when he was with us it was a new Prayer Book) a fitting tribute to the work of Rev. Sen who not only revised the compilation but also ensured that all the necessary music was appropriately catalogued.

No sooner had we returned in March than we found a few spaces on our Staff-list created by resignations handed in during the winter holidays. Mr. P. Nedumaran, our Pry. Wing Games Master, resigned to take up a position in the Estate Department of Mount Hermon School. We wish him and his wife all success in their new appointments. Mr. Abhimanyu Sen, our teacher of French, suddenly lost his mother while she was visiting him here in Darjeeling. This changed his entire circumstances and he was obliged to return to Delhi to look after his own property and interests. Mr. Kaushik Dutta, our computer teacher, resigned to take up a more lucrative position in a computer firm in Calcutta. By the end of February, Mr. P. K. Roychowdhury, our Estate Manager for little over six years, resigned to settle down in his new home in Siliguri. This is a key position in any school and we are still in the process of filling up this vacancy. The situation was made a little more difficult in that Mr. Gokul Chetri, our Estate Superintendent, also reached the age of superannuation in March. Fortunately, being a local person he was easily available for

re-employment and has worked splendidly over this year. I would take this opportunity to thank Gokul for his loyalty and cooperation over the last 30 years. He has given us a lifetime of service and I know that we always ran to him whenever we wanted something done. His understanding of stagecraft was great and he has built many magnificient sets for the School Plays, year after year, with unfailing regularity. We will all miss his calm, good sense. At the same time we wish him and his wife peace and happiness as they enter into retired life.

At the start of this year we welcomed Mr. Prafulla Pradhan to our staff. A cheerful and talented young man, I hope he will enjoy his stay with us. Mr. Jaideep Chaudhuri joined us in June, 1996 to teach Computer Studies to the senior boys. With their help he has mounted his first exhibition, open for all to see. Mr. Asish Dutta of ICS replaced Mr. Maneer Alam in the Computer Department this year.

Once again the end of May saw the publication of the ISC and ICSE results. For the ISC (Class XII) - 31 students appeared and all were successful; at the ICSE - 64 students appeared with 63 successful. At the Class X level we were able to secure more distinctions in the individual subjects than in the past. At ISC level our Commerce stream results were remarkably good and the Sciences have begun to show a distinct improvement. This is all very encouraging and I would like to congratulate all the Teaching Staff for this improvement. It is always easy to assess the senior-most teachers by the result-scores of a public examination: it is not so easy for those teachers who do not prepare students for public exams. However, any senior teacher would be the first to admit that the success of his students depends entirely upon all the preliminary work that went in, starting from Class I, something taken for granted at Class X but without which, passing an exam would be impossible.

On the games fields, we began the year with the Cricket Season. The first of the traditional matches was played against the Old Paulites on the Easter weekend. The present students won. The Old Paulites presented a new trophy for this game in honour to Mr. Ajit Prasad (OP) as well as an individual medal for the best cricketer in the present team. Our school then went on to win the prestigious Edinburgh Cricket Shield, defeating Mount Hermon and St. Joseph's, North Point. During the first term volleyball, basketball, and tennis were also played. The Gymnastics team presented their display at the Gymkhana Club

on June 11th. Our Chief Guest was Mr. Dawa Pakhrin, Councillor for Sports, D.G.H.C. The size of the gym team was larger than before and this will provide benefits for the future. After the June break we settled down to football, table-tennis, badminton, squash, and Eton fives. We took part in the local Herlihy Cup Tournament in football but soon got knocked out in spite of having a fairly responsible team. The marathon season followed and we are deeply grateful to the Commandant, 123 Mtn. Brigade, Jalapahar, for giving us permission to use the Jalapahar road. For the last three weeks we have been preparing for Athletics, which culminated in yesterday's Sports events. Last weekend the Inter-School Athletics Meet was held - the seniors at North Point and the juniors at Dow Hills, Kurseong. I am pleased to announce that St. Paul's won the Open Div. (+2) and the B. Division with a third place in A. Division. We also won outright the Junior Grouping of C.D.& E. Divisions. Congratulations to the students and our Games Masters who helped and trained these children. When we return after this Puja break the game of hockey will be played. Unfortunately this game has suffered over the years by having a very short season and no Inter-School fixtures.

NCC parades were held throughout the year climaxing in a grand display put up on Independence Day. Our Chief Guest was Brig. S. Chowdhury, Commandant, 123 Mtn. Brigade, Jalapahar, who graciously presented a momento to the School. I would also like to thank Brig. Chowdhury for so splendidly coming to our rescue in late September when we had a severe water crisis due to the breakdown of the electricity supply from the town. He not only permitted the use of the Jalapahar road but also loaned us the Army tankers to ferry water. There have also been a number of DEAS expeditions for the Bronze and Silver Awards conducted through the year.

The stage has been constantly used for the production of 6 House concerts and the PW Drama competition. The Junior School presented their annual play on June 11th - "The Winslow Boy" by Terrance Ratigan - a slightly ambitious play for this age group but with very commendable performances by the boys. In August, we presented an evening's entertainment where all the Second Language Departments (Hindi, Bengali, Nepali, and French) put up One Act Plays or skits thus providing for versatility. The School Play, presented to you last evening was Moliere's "The Miser" a witty farce in the best French traditions. I would like to thank the boys and the staff who worked hard to

Competitions also have been held. A popular pastime with the students ranging from Primaries to the +2 level, this year we entered a team for the Bournvita Quiz (Zee TV) held in Bombay. We came third at the Semi-Final stage at the All India level. We won the N.M. Master Memorial Shield for English Elocution for the third year in succession. We also prepared students for the second language elocution meetings in Hindi, Bengali, and Nepali.

For the first time in Darjeeling, St. Paul's School innovated and hosted a "Plus 2 Fest" for the students of North Point, Mount Hermon and Dr. Graham's Homes. This was a two-day affair and greatly enjoyed by all. What pleased us most was the warmth and friendliness generated amongst the senior-most students of those schools, which hopefully, would last a life time.

The Second Term Examinations have just concluded and parents will receive the Report Cards from their sons as they leave for the Puja break. In addition to all the other extracurricular activities a large number of Prize Examinations have also been held. For the "Hindi Day" District celebrations our students stood first and second in the extempore speech section and second in the essay writing competition. Two of our class X students took part in the Programming contest organised in Darjeeling by the Computer Society of India and our team stood first.

It is in the sphere of music we have gone from strength to strength. The Trinity College of Music Exams were held on 12th September. 21 candidates were successful at Pianoforte, and this year, for the first time, we presented 4 students for singing - all passed with distinctions. After many years the PW presented an entire evening of musical entertainment which was delightful. The school choir now has a repertoire of anthems that would be the envy of most churches. I take this opportunity of congratulating all three of our music teachers. At this stage it is a little difficult to predict the exact status of Ms.C. Hillier's stay with us at St. Paul's. Her work-permit is due to expire at the end of this year when she will return to the UK. However, Ms. Hillier hopes to have her permit extended and, if she can, she would like to return to us; but there are many, many imponderables. I would like to thank Ms. Hillier for her unselfish service to the students. Extremely talented, she is a brilliant accompanist and a patient In addition to a full music timetable she has piano teacher. also accepted an additional load with the teaching of French.

hear glowing reports from her students and I know that she has spent hours with them encouraging them to greater achievement. Thank you.

In spite of being short of an Estate Manager we have nonetheless undertaken a number of development projects during the course of this year. We have completely grilled all the windows of Cotton and Milman Hall that face the field. A new 100 KVA generator has been ordered complete with all the necessary wiring and a new building has gone up to house the Genset. This is scheduled to be installed after the Pujas. Our staff Gent's bathroom has also been completely renovated with tiling and all modern conveniences. All this in addition to the usual repairs and maintenance that place a never ending demand on our estate department.



His loyalty and devotion to the school is unquestioned. With a combination such as this, it must follow that success anywhere is assured. He leaves with our best wishes for his success in the future.

I take this opportunity to thank the Board of Governors

for reposing their trust in me and giving me their support. I hope that we can all move from strength to strength in the years to come.

Chief Guest's Speech on Speech Day '96 (Mr. Neil O'Brien)

Mr. Howard, members of the Staff, Parents, Ladies and Gentlemen, and students. At the very outset, let me say how delighted I am to be here today on the occasion of your Speech Day. I have been threatening to come to St. Paul's for the last three or four years, but something or the other has always kept me from coming. This year, however, everything worked out well. It has been more than ten years since I last came to St. Paul's and I have been extremely pleased to see the well-maintained buildings, the fine spirit amongst the teachers and the wonderful spirit of fun and comradeship among the students.

On this occasion of your Speech Day I wish to share a few thoughts with you. When you ask young people what they want to be you get answers such as doctor, engineer, architect, IAS officers, etc. If you ask parents what do they want their children to be their answers are very similar. There is one word to describe or summarise the myriad range of ambitions. That one word is: success.

Success, of course, is a relative term. Hitler was a successful man in what he set out to achieve and Mother Teresa is also a successful person but by any yardstick the two can hardly be compared. The meaning of success is different for different people; but there is one thing in common to all routes that lead to success: there are no short cuts.

The path to success begins in the mind. Without proper preparation in the mind any ambition becomes very difficult to achieve. What distinguishes human beings from other animals is that humans are endowed with intelligence; humans have intellect and this is what they must use in order to attain success. All success must begin in the mind. However, we must accept also that there are barriers of mind which must be overcome if we are to march on the road to success.

Young people must be told that there is nothing that is useless in the world. Why, even a broken clock shows the right time even if it is only twice a day! Youngsters must be trained to look upon themselves as individuals. Our own individuality is important to us and all education must encourage this individuality. I am particularly happy to see from the various prize winners today what a wide spectrum of talent is encouraged here in St. Paul's.

Here I would like to share a story with you; the story of "The Little Jester" by Anatole France. There was a little jester who was considered quite useless by the entire community and nobody wanted him. He finally managed to persuade the monks of a particular monastery to employ him as a cook in their kitchen. He worked hard in the kitchen; but nobody was interested in his real talent, being a jester. Then one day there was a great feast and all the monks brought various gifts for the Lord and offered them with sincere devotion. When everyone had left, the jester went up to the altar and started to do his little jig. After sometime the monks wanted him, but he was no where to be found. When they finally discovered him he was doing all sorts of acrobatics in front of the altar. The monks were very cross at this sacrilegious act. They scolded him and were prepared to inflict a punishment on him for desecrating their place of worship. Just then something caused them to look at the image of the Virgin Mary and they saw a tear roll down her cheek.

What do we learn from this story? Nothing is useless, every talent is considered great in the eyes of the Lord. The little jester did what he knew best and he did it to the best of his ability. Doing your best is what really counts. I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate the prize winners who have won prizes today. As for those who didn't win any prizes, I would want them to think and ask themselves: Did I do my best? If the answer is "Yes" then you have done yourself proud irrespective of whether you won any prizes or not. In that case there is nothing to be ashamed of. Always give everything you do your best shot. That is important.

My God bless all students, Staff, and this School. Thank you.

If we lost out somewhat heavily on the field, we definitely made up for everything in all the other areas of functioning.












At the commencement of the year, the house activities conducted, helped in breaking the ice and acquainting the new with the old.

Navraj Tiwari for Good Conduct; Arijit Chanda,




Tenzing House with (L-R seated) Mrs.S.Dwivedi, Mrs.A.Calvert (House Mistress) and Mr.A.Dennis

Hillary House was able to clinch three cups this year, for dramatics, football, and table tennis. The house was also a close runner-up for quite a few of the other competitions.





Formal music lessons were given to 45 students in piano (under Mr. S. Pande and Ms. C. Hillier) voice and violin (under Mr. S. Pande) and guitar (Mr. P. Pradhan). This year, 29 students were sent up for practical examination in music (piano and singing) conducted by the Trinity College of Music, London, in the month of September. The year 1996 marked the 20th year of the existence of the Nepali Society. The Society has certainly come a long way since then.




The serenity and beauty of the batik section was acknowledged with high praise and justified commendations......


Unfortunately, no colours were awarded this year.

If there is one thing in school that never ceases to surprise the undersigned, it is the tremendous enthusiasm with which students at St. Paul's approach the activities of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award all through the year. Come hail, shine, rain or snow nothing seems to dampen their spirit and this gives enough inspiration to the various teachers working as instructors and assessors to carry out their responsibilities from year to year with the same eagerness and keenness that marks the participation of the boys. 1996 was no different in this regard from the preceding years.

This year, corrective steps were taken to simplify the standards (without losing on quality) that are required for the various sports activities which had a slightly negative impact in 1995. The standards were rationalised and published early in the school term and this enabled the boys to make their choices in good time and pursue their acitvities in earnest from the beginning of the year. The end result was that though there were only two gold awardees this year, there were quite a number who would be interested in tackling the Gold standards for the coming year. This was certainly an encouraging sign.

In the course of the year we heard that the name of the Award scheme had been changed to International Award for Young Persons (India) though the activities and rules guiding the programme remained the same. Hence from the coming year, this report will bear a new title-but one hopes one will continue to report the continued progress and success the scheme is making in St. Paul's. In this regard one was happy to interact with Mr. Sandip Seal, Field officer from the Award East Zone office in Calcutta. Later in the year, it was a pleasure to meet Miss R. Banerjee from the same office who clarified a few details about the new arrangement. We are hoping that we, in St. Paul's, will be allowed to carry on as an Independent Award Authority since the programme has to be adjusted to the school's various working programmes. We await further clarifications on this ground.

To go back to the year in review, one is glad to report of a successful year for the awardees. All the activities were keenly tackled. The year began with 87 bronze candidates, 35 Silver participants and 6 hopefuls for the Gold. At the end of the year 24

boys got their Bronzes, 12 achieved the Silver standards and two achieved the coveted Gold Awards.

This year saw the revival of the Residential Project in the course of the academic year. In the recent past, boys had been undertaking this aspect of the programme during their winter holidays. Once again the boys who were eligible for the Gold Award spent a meaningful and rewarding five days at the Mary Scot Home and School for the Blind in Kalimpong. It was a novel experience for the boys and this was one activity that will remain etched in their memories for a long, long time. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Rector for allowing us to send the boys to the Blind school once again and also to Major R.K. Sahu of the Salvation Army in Kalimpong who so generously hosted our boys at the Blind School and offered them an opportunity that opened their eyes to a wholly different and new world.

I would like to record my gratitude to all those other people who helped in running the Award programme here in St. Paul's School. I owe a special of word of thanks to the Rector for his constant encouragement and guidance, to the Senior Master, Mr. I. Myers for his ready willingness to help whenever we sought his aid, and to all those teachers who smilingly, and without a single complaint, worked as instructors and assessors. I am also grateful to Dr. P. K. Sharma, to Mr. Gokul Chettri, the Estate Superintendent, and to the caterers Mr.A.K. Chakravarthi and Mr. S.R. Gurung - all of whom were so supportive in their efforts to see the programme through for another year.

Finally, I wish to place on record my sincerest thanks to my student secretary, Bir Birendra Rai who was quietly efficient and rendered invaluable service all through the year. It was regrettable that he missed his Gold Award this year after having broken his hand just a few days before the Gold Expedition was scheduled to march out of school Hard luck, Bir, but here's wishing you the very best in all that you do in the future. And thanks once again!

What is in store for 1997? I am sure it is going to be another fun filled, adventurous, exciting and rewarding year for all the Award activists and one can hardly wait for the new term to begin.


The other main event was, no doubt, the INDEPENDENCE



FIRST PAULITE ON MOUNT EVEREST

"In My Father's Footsteps".

My father, Tenzing Norgay Sherpa, discouraged his children from becoming mountaineers because it was dangerous. He knew, since he and Edmund Hillary were the first men to reach the top of Mt. Everest in 1953.

My father told us he had become a mountaineer so we wouldn't have to. He encouraged us instead to pursue other careers. So I did not become a professional mountaineer. I studied in St. Pauls School, Darjeeling and used to conduct and perform Rock climbing Demonstrations for the school during special events. Later, when I was studying in the United States, I had a job teaching rock climbing and ice climbing.

Despite my father's caution about mountaineering, and for reason I myself do not fully understand, I had dreamed about climbing Mt. Everest ever since I was six years old, but it remained a dream because it is very expensive to climb Everest. An expedition member must come up with a minimum of U.S. \$35,000 to climb Everest on a private expedition, and if you go on a commercial expedition one must come up with U.S. \$65,000, excluding personal expenses such as travel and hotel accommodations. I couldn't go as a "Sherpa", portering loads for an expedition, because I'd be dishonouring my father.

In 1995, the American Sagarmatha Expedition invited me to join their team. It was not a commercially guided group but a group of professional climbers. Each member was responsible for his own finances. I joined them but couldn't go beyond the Base Camp (17,500 feet) because I just couldn't come up with the money. But I enjoyed the experience.

My luck changed a year later. David Breashers, the leader of Mt. Everest IMAX Expedition 1996, was making a documentary about the Everest region, and he offered me a central role in it. I was also the deputy leader of this six-person (two women, four men) expedition. On May 8th, we planned to film our actual ascent to the summit of Mt. Everest. All six members Araceli Segarra, Sumiyo Tsuzuki, Ed Viesturs, Robert Schauer, David and I would

try to reach the top. Finally, after years of dreaming, training and

planning, I hoped to achieve my goal.

Once we were in the mountains, things quickly began to go wrong. On the day we were preparing to ascend Camp IV (also known as South Col 26,500 feet) from Camp III (24,000 feet), we noticed that there was a whole of crowd of climbers, about 35 people, ahead of us, also on their way to Camp IV. There were two commercial expeditions led by American Scott Fisher and New Zealander Rob Hall, a South African group and a Taiwanese team and everyone decided to go up that same day. David said we couldn't join this crowd because our plan was to film when only two or three climbers were on the ridge as they made their way to the top. He didn't want to shoot with that crowd crawling to the top. The weather, too was turning ugly. Thus, instead of going to Camp IV, we actually descended to Camp II (21,500 feet).

The next morning, there was more bad news. At ten o'clock, a Taiwanese climber at Camp III slipped and fell 60 feet into a crevasse. When the team leader, who was already climbing towards Camp IV, was informed about this, he told his Sherpas to rescue the climber and take him down to the lower camp to recuperate. The leader then continued his climb towards Camp Four. Some of our Sherpas who happened to be coming down the mountain helped rescue the injured climber, but he died later that evening. This incident was a portentous prologue to the great series of tragedies that were to follow.

The following day, May 10th, still at Camp II, around one o'clock, we observed through our binoculars the crowd of climbers making their way towards the summit and we became uneasy because they were very slow. We calculated that a route that would take us three hours to negotiate would take them six. So we anticipated problems, meaning that they wouldn't get to the summit or that there wouldn't be enough oxygen left for them to make a safe descent. Without oxygen, a climber becomes disoriented, dehydrated, hypothermic and can die very quickly. Around three in the afternoon, we heard over the radio that everyone was finally on the top. But this was not good news. The rule of the thumb on Everest is that you do not attempt to summit after one thirty in the afternoon. You must descend. On this day, why the guides and expedition leaders pushed past that deadline, none of us knew.

Like a deadly avalanche, bad news began to roll in. Sherpas on Camp IV at the South Col radioed to say only one or two climbers had returned from the summit and that many were missing. We became very concerned when we were informed that expedition leader Rob Hall was still on the South Summit, which is 28,700 feet, with one of his clients, Doug Hanson. To make matters worse, higher on the mountain where the climbers were floundering a fierce blizzard had developed. Winds howling at 80-100 miles per hour that quickly reduced visibility to a few yards, where the climber will see nothing but wind-churned snow. A whiteout!

At our Camp, it was chaotic and frustrating. I was translating messages being radioed by Sherpas about missing mountaineers, but because it was already dark and the weather terrible, we were helpless. There was nothing we could do for the rest of the night except wait-and hope and pray that somehow the missing mountaineers would either find their way back to their tents or survive the night outside, a chilling prospect.

Naturally, sleep was out of question. Even under normal conditions, you don't sleep very well when you are in the high mountains. At three or four in the morning, we started getting calls again. Many climber were still missing-or dead. The blizzard had died down, so four of our members, Ed, Robert, Araceli and David headed up to Camp III to establish emergency relief, David had also sent a message saying that anyone at Camp Four was free to take our oxygen bottles, food and other supplies we had stored in our tent for our own climb. Sumiyo and I stayed behind at Camp II to organize our own rescue work. Again, I was busy doing translations and interpretations as simultaneous calls came in from Sherpas and foreigners. I sent our Sherpas to gather medical supplies and other necessities from other expeditions, and as survivors such as Sandy Pittman were brought down to our camp, we gave them soup and tea, massaged them and gave medicines. Frankly, I don't recall the next two days because we were so busy with the rescue work. We were no longer climbers but emergency medical personnel.

Near Camp I at 19,500 feet on the top of Khumbu Ice-fall, members of our expedition flattened out a helipad, pouring Kool-Aid into the shape of a cross to indicate to the rescue helicopter pilot his landing position. At Base Camp, ten different expeditions merged into one huge rescue station. In those 48 hours, we helped many survive their ordeal, but not all.

After the helicopter flew out with the casualties, we assembled at Base Camp to relax and make preparations for our own attempt on the summit. Even though our supplies had been used up, we gathered what we required from other expeditions since of the ten expedition teams, two-thirds decided not to continue. But we remained optimistic and five days later, we once again headed for Everest.

On the South Col, at Camp Four, our final rest before the climb to the top, after five hours of sleep, I woke up at eleven at night. I had some tsampa (roasted barley dough) and dried meat, washed down with Ramen soup. Next, I gathered my equipment and put them in my pack-oxygen bottles first and I had to make sure that the regulators were working, tea in a flask, M&Ms and candy bars, extra goggles, gloves, socks and batteries for the lamp. This fifteen-pound pack was the only thing I would carry. I adjusted my oxygen mask and harness, clipped on my crampons, put on the hat and switched on the headlamp. Then the ice axe and stepped out into clear, cold dark night.

As if to make up for its part in the recent tragedy, the weather appeared ideal. The wind, which can be the curse of climbing, was gentle, like a refreshing breeze, it was calm and quiet all around. This mild weather I felt was a good omen.

Ed, David and a few Sherpas had left an hour before and had broken the trail. Sumiyo was the only one who would not go to the top. Her health had deteriorated and she remained at the camp.

The first half hour was gradual climb on rocky, icy, crevasse-splintered terrain, but this gentle sloping ended abruptly at a steep, straight ascent. The easy part was over. And for the next eight to ten hours, I was going to have to use every resource I had, every trick I had learned as a climber, this was my final test of all my years of learning. It was going to be climb, crawl, clutch at the fixed ropes, trudge a few steps, pant for breath and rest for a few seconds and then start all over again using hands, feet, ropes, axe-everything at my disposal to go up and not crawl back down.

As I climbed, especially when it was still dark, every step I took with care, everything I did, I did it deliberately. Among these massive mountains, I was nothing. A splinter that could be blown away by a whiff of a breeze. And I said my prayers, especially when I suddenly came upon the dead body of Scott Fisher below the

South-East Ridge (27,500 feet). It was perhaps three in the morning. It was still dark and my headlamp first picked out some ropes and clothes. I thought I had stumbled upon the remains of a previous camp. Then I noticed a pair of boots with the feet in them. Immediately I knew it was Scott's dead body, even though I did not look at it directly. A few steps past his body, there was another dead body, but it had been there for much longer, perhaps for two to three years already. For the first time, I became very scared. It was the only moment during my climb that I was caught by surprise and became unexpectedly frightened. In the Sherpa culture, it's very bad luck to come upon or touch a dead body. That is why I did not "look" at the bodies. I hurried past them, if you can "hurry" in such a situation, murmuring the "Om Mani Padme Hum" prayer many, many times.

David and Ed were waiting on the South-East Ridge for the Sherpas who were carrying the camera equipment. Resting on the Ridge, we witnessed a gorgeous sunrise and spent the next two hours filming, resting and fortifying ourselves with water, tea and chocolate bars. My next extended rest was going to the South Summit, a steep, three hour ascent over deep snow.

Throughout the climb. I felt strong and confident. It was the strongest I had ever felt in my life. I thought of my father, of course. He had been on this mountain 43 years ago. I felt his spirit and his support. That is why I knew in my heart, "This is it! I will be on top too!" Once the sun was out, during most of the climb, I had my oxygen mask off my face because it was uncomfortable. The hole in the mask that you breathe freezes up and every few minutes you have to stop and break it up. So as I breathed through the mask, my goggles outside the mask would fog or ice up, and I'd have to stop to wipe them. I decided that the best thing was to climb with oxygen mask and my goggles on and off. Because I felt so strong and confident, I also was using much less oxygen, around 1.5 litres per minute instead of the normal 3 litres.

I knew I was doing well, yet at the same time, I felt anxious. I just wanted to be on top. But I told myself to be careful. You look to one side, you see Tibet, and on the other side, you see Nepal, and each a scary, sheer drop of 8,000feet. I got a little unsettled looking down, looking around. So I just looked up, waiting to see the summit, but it's not there! You climb, cross a ridge, climb some more-and there is another ridge. When I arrived at the south Summit, I was just 300 feet from the top, but I still couldn't see it.

I then negotiated the treacherous traverse to get to the Hillary Step, a very precarious spot because you are totally exposed to the elements. I took care of that one too, and I began to think, well, yes, I've now seen and climbed these landmarks I'd heard so much about. But where was the top? There were two more ridges I had to get over. Just when I thought I'd never get to the top, I saw Ed coming down, and he said, "Hey, it's right there". We hugged and congratulated each other. With renewed strength and spirit, I continued.

I realized I was on the summit when I saw the prayer flags, left there by Sherpas before. I saw David and gave him a hug. I thanked him because he had made it possible for me to fulfil my childhood dream. Then I cried, I was so happy.

I thought about my parents and prayed. I scattered some rice grains in the air and did puja. I left a prayer flag, a khada (a white, ceremonial scarf), pictures of my parents and His Holiness the Dalai Lama. I also left a small toy of my daughter's, just as my father had done.

I looked around. The summit sloped gently. You could fit 20 people comfortably.

The view was stunning. I felt I could see everything everywhere stretched out far, far away and far down below. Little puffs of clouds and gleaming Himalayan peaks, all beneath my gaze. I had my oxygen mask off but I had no trouble breathing. I only wore the thin polypropylene gloves. Even on top of Mt. Everest, there was little wind. We stayed almost two hours photographing and filming, savouring our success.

I called Base Camp and asked to be connected to my wife in Kathmandu. I told her, "Hey I'm on top of the world!" She too was excited, but told me to be careful coming down. Well, there I was, flooded with a great sense of personal accomplishments yet I also felt truly humble and grateful. I said "Thu Chi Chay" (thank you) to the goddess Chomolungma (Mt.Everest) and asked her to safely get me down. More people get hurt or killed going down. For me and the Sherpas, climbing a mountain is a pilgrimage because the mountains are sacred to us. A foreigner sees a mountain and he wants to climb it because it is the highest or the more difficult. He wants to conquer it, subdue it. But for us, there is too much sacredness, too much culture attached to these

mountains to merely look upon them as something to simply climb and conquer, as if mountains can be subdued by us mere humans. That was why I felt humbled, and that was why I cried. Goddess Chomolungma had granted my lifelong wish. I was very happy. My family was even happier. I had promised my wife and my family that after I climbed Mt.Everest, I would never climb another mountain again.

Mountains are sacred places, these are places where the gods live where humans are not built to survive in, so when we go climb a mountain we always treat the mountain with a lot of respect hoping that the mountain gods will be in favour of our climb.
