




FROM THE RECTOR'S DESK

Success over the year 1997 is not to be found on a global or an all-India scale, indeed, at those levels, events were generally depressing. However, at School there were a number of achievements which were heartening and which gave the quiet satisfaction of genuine success.

After a lapse of fourteen years we once again achieved cent-per-cent passes at the Public Exams of the ICSE and ISC. We had worked at our academics over the recent past and the Staff finally came through with flying colours.

Each year it is usual for us to lose some Staff members, six being the average. Over 1997 we saw an exceptionally large number of withdrawals mid-year, through retirement, as well as the promise of promotion as Vice-Principals in other schools. Replacing staff in out-of-the-way Darjeeling is not always easy and the remaining Staff rallied brilliantly to help close the temporary gaps. I am deeply grateful and admire the versatility displayed.

In the 50th year of our Independence there was much to be grateful for and the inevitable soul-searching was both necessary and vital for future progress. At School we produced a grand display of activities on 15th August where the entire School took part to produce an impressive variety of events from folk dances to a mass P.T. display; with rock climbing and a mock N.C.C. thrown in for good measure.

Over the last few years we at St. Paul's have lived through the summer months in a constant state of tension and irritability due to a shortage of water. The school has also spent large sums of money purchasing truck-loads of water, year after year. Over 1997, for the first time, we went through the year without having to purchase water, and, with an adequate (though rationed) supply of water throughout the year. This was no mean achievement, the success of which goes to our Estate Department.







RECTOR'S SPEECH - 1997

Rev. Mother Damien, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I am honoured to introduce to you one of the most outstanding academic persons in Darjeeling, the Rev. Mother Damien, Principal of Loreto College, Darjeeling. She is by far the senior-most of the serving Principals, and is something of a legendary figure here in Darjeeling. As my personal tutor I can assure you that she has one of the finest academic minds, and has helped innumerable students both women and men to make a success of their lives. Thank you for being with us, we are privileged.

Each year we inevitably lose some staff members and this year we have lost more than normal. At the end of May we bid farewell to Mr. & Mrs. Michael Calvert. Mr. Calvert left to become the Headmaster of Dr. Graham's Homes, Kalimpong. He served us with loyalty and devotion to duty and we know that he carries with him these qualities to the advantage of the Homes. This is, incidentally, the third Headmaster we at St. Paul's have given to the Homes. Early in June Mr. K. Lama, our Senior Secretary, retired having served the school for 37 years under seven different Rectors. He had a wealth of information at his fingertips and gave of his best. He has our best wishes for his happiness in his retirement. At the end of June Mrs. D. Paulose of the Primary Wing sought voluntary retirement, having served for over 20 years. A capable teacher she found it necessary to be with her children in Kerela as they stepped out into life. The next two staff members who resigned did so without much warning. Mr. Ajay Sharma, one of our senior Chemistry Teachers, left with less than a month's notice to take over as Vice Principal of Army Public School, Udhampur. We wish him success in his new post. The next to leave was Mr. Dilip Kumar, a senior Mathematics Teacher, who preferred to work at the Lawrence School, Lovedale, this being closer to his home town in Kerela.

Miss Caroline Hillier, our talented Piano teacher from the UK returned to England in mid-September when her visa expired. Besides her talents as a musician she was also our French teacher and freely gave of her time and talents. At the end of July the school community was jolted by the passing away of Mr. Kamlesh Kanti. Mr. Kanti had served us on the staff as a Hindi Master for 22 years when he retired in March, 1994. By that time he had become Acting Senior Master of the School. Our heartfelt sym-

pathy goes out to Mrs. Kanti and the children. With her changed circumstances it will no longer be possible for Mrs. Kanti to stay on at the end of this academic year, and she has sought voluntary retirement. I would like to place on record our appreciation for the services of a gentle and gracious lady who was always there when you needed her, and was ever ready to help any boy who came to her for advice and sympathy.

The loss of such a large number of staff has obviously necessitated the induction of some newer members. In March we welcomed to our staff Mr. Tony Sullivan in the Pry. Wing. He has already begun to gain the confidence of the students and has established himself as a keen cricketer. Mr. Devendra Kumar, an Old Paulite, joined our staff in April. Loyal and hardworking the fruits of his labour have already been seen as he produced and directed the School Play "TUGLAQ" by Girish Karnad which you saw last evening. Early June saw the selection and appointment of the new Senior Master, Mr. Sunirmal Chakravarthi. For Mr. Chakravarthi this was a promotion and he has thrown himself into his new responsibility with energy and flair. It has not been easy for him. Thrown into the deep-end in the middle of term he has faced various challenges with patience and goodwill. Mr. Stuart McMullen joined our staff in mid-August. He came out to us from St. Columba's College, Dublin. In this brief period he has established his credentials as a cheerful, hardworking person who is successful in the classroom. Mrs. Tseten Tshering joined our staff in a permanent capacity this October. She works in the Pry. Wing and has already begun to display an artistic temperament which is much appreciated. We also welcome on our staff body Mr. Abijit Banerjee and Mr. Santanu Das of the Computer Department. I hope they are able to fully utilise the new computer systems that have just been installed. I am told that the Computers are as reasonably upto-date as may be expected in a school. At the end of August we also welcomed two GAP students: Mr. Adam Brown and Mr. George Salmon. George is bilingual in French and English and Adam has been able to assist with Chemistry and some Mathematics. I am grateful for their services and hope that our senior students will benefit from their proximity.

In late May we were delighted to record 100% passes at both the ICSE and ISC levels, with all 97 students being successful. Such a success was last achieved 14 years ago and I take this opportunity of thanking most sincerely the entire staff body for the earnestness of their endeavour in guiding these students

to a fruitful conclusion of their school-days at St. Paul's. Today we will honour the present batch of students who have worked hard in the classrooms to achieve various levels of academic success.

On the games field the opening term is given to cricket. We did not have a special coach this year, yet the boys played commendably even though we lost the Edinburgh Shield to Mount Hermon. As usual, the annual cricket fixture against the Old Paulites was greatly enjoyed. We won the trophy for the second year running. The first term also sees the games of volleyball, basketball, tennis and gymnastics being organised. The Gymnastics team performed at the Gymkhana Club on 3rd June, 1997, where Bishop Gorai of Calcutta was our Chief Guest. The monsoon term was largely given over to football with indoor games such as Squash, Fives, Badminton, and Table-Tennis being played simultaneously. From the end of August starts the running or marathon season which leads directly into athletics. We have had rather a wet September so that getting through the standards and heats has been a bit of a problem. However, the climax of our athletics season was yesterday's school sports. We now look forward to Inter-School Athletics, hockey and tennis tournaments in the winter term.

The stage has been heavily occupied over the year. There have been four House Concerts produced by the Snr. Wing Houses, two House Concerts produced at the Jnr. Wing level and an Inter-House drama competition at the Pry. Wing level. This year just before the summer break the Pry. Wing produced their major production: the Walt Disney version of the musical, "Jungle Book". This was certainly an ambitious project and very well produced. Our congratulations to all those staff of the Pry. Wing who helped make it an outstanding success. I have already mentioned the School Play production of "TUGLAQ" and would like to add that this is the first time that we have actually produced a major play with an Indian setting. In addition to these major productions, on Independence Day, the Second Language Societies produced a 2 1/2 hour programme of One Act Plays and shorter items in all the major languages of Hindi, Bengali, Nepali and French.

By far the most outstanding event of this year was the elaborate preparations that went into the festivities associated with the 50th year of our Independence on 15th August. The NCC presented a Guard-of-Honour and March Past to Maj.Gen. A.R.Raikar, G.O.C., Eastern Command, who was our Chief Guest. Later the same NCC group put up a rock climbing demonstration

which included abseilling, vertical climbing, and mountain rescue operations. They also presented a Mock Battle, complete with smoke screens, live ammunition-the latter being safely fired off the field and the sound of various war cries being made by the boys. There was a mass P.T. display involving over 500 students of the Pry, and Jnr. School. This included figure formations involving the National Flag and the logo "We Shall Overcome". The Gymmastics team also presented a series of chair exercises and some horse-work. By far the most colourful event was a series of eight folk-dances chosen from various parts of India: Nagaland, Assam. Nepal, Bengal, Gujarat, Maharastra, Garhwal, and Bihar. An activity of this nature, involving just about everyone in the school, must activate all staff members and I am filled with admiration at the way everybody stepped forward to make this not only a glorious success but also a fitting tribute to our Golden Anniversary of Independence. Early in September we hosted the "Plus Two Fest" where students from Mount Hermon, St. Joseph's, Dr. Graham's Homes and St. Augustine's joined our boys over a 2-day meet which involved a wide variety of activities ranging from Chess, and Dumb Charades to Antakshree and Western Music competitions. Of far greater importance was the opportunity that these students had to meet their peers from the neighbouring schools and to get to know each other better in a happy atmosphere. At school level we have also conducted various competitions for quizzing, elocution and debates. This year we came second in the N.M. Master Memorial Elocution Contest.

Though we lack the services of a School Chaplain I am grateful to Bishop Andrews of Darjeeling for coming up to take Communion Services whenever he can spare the time. I am extremely proud of the achievements that have been made by the School Choir. They have now begun to sing with a high degree of finish and have produced a special anthem every month culminating in the anthem produced for the Commemoration Service that we have just attended. We have also sent up 23 boys for the Trinity College of Music Examination in both piano and singing. This is very encouraging considering that just three years ago we had nothing to offer in this field. Our School Brass Band has struggled along with a little bit of coaching over the month of June and July. I hope that we will be able to rectify this problem in the new year.

We were happy to welcome in our midst Dr. Allistair Smith

of Aberdeen University who spoke to our boys on Geo-political

movements over the 20th century. This was a stimulating lecture but left one wondering where we were heading in the 21st century? We also had a team of visitors from the B.B.C Television department. I wonder if any of the film they took will actually be published – it was such a grey, monsoon day! An article written in the Daily Telegraph of London declares us to be the last school in this area that still retains a tradition coming from an earlier period. I am not sure if this is a good thing or a bad thing!


In December last year we appointed Mr. O.P. Agarwal as the Estate Manager and Mr. Anil Kr. Sinha as the Estate Superintendent. The year has not been an easy one for them since they inherited a number of problems. However, the single most crucial problem on the School Estate has always been the supply of water to the children of the school, and by and large, this has been solved to a high degree. There will, of course, always be a shortage in the dry season, though this year we have been better off than usual.

We have also ordered some new furniture for the Chapel – 8 new pews which are an exact match of the existing teakwood furniture. The single most important project on hand is the need for new Laboratories and Dormitory space, as well as staff quarters and Domestic Staff quarters by the year 2000 A.D. when we give up use of the rented premises of Edenfalls. Preliminary drawings and sketches have already been begun and we hope that sometime next year we will lay one or two foundation stones. Such expansion must of a necessity, involve the raising of large funds. I hope that our parents and well-wishers will respond to the appeals we will send out in the course of time.

I take this opportunity of thanking all members of the Admn. Staff, the Resident School Doctor, Nurses, the Matrons, Caterers and the Office Staff for their loyal and supportive services to the boys of this school. I also wish to thank the members of the Dom. Staff for their loyalty and hardwork over the past year. We have wonderful neighbours in the Army Officers of Jalapahar who, with their Commandant, have always been helpful. There are also the District Authorities of Darjeeling who have always been cooperative and without whose help we could not have managed. Our grateful thanks to all of them.

As we began term in March this year, I was not well enough to take over the reins directly and under instruction from Bishop Gorai, the Rev. Noel Sen came up to assist me with the Opening of Term. At that time we were also short of a Senior Master and I am grateful to Mr. Thomas Mukhia, Second Master, Mr. Anthony and Mrs. Howard, Heads of Junior and Primary Wings respectively for their cooperation and help in ensuring a smooth start. I am deeply appreciative of all the help received and have been humbled by the goodwill of the Board Members, the Staff, parents and Boys.

Thank you for the warmth of your affection.

CHIEF GUEST'S ADDRESS ON SPEECH DAY

(REV. MOTHER DAMIEN O'DONOHOE I.B.V.M).

Mr. Howard, Rector, and friends,

First I must thank Mr. Howard for the pleasure and privilege of being here today. My association with St Paul's School stretches back over a period of thirty five years, and is largely based on my friendship with several of its Rectors, beginning with Mr. Leslie Goddard, my friendship with whom lasted until his death.

St Paul's has notable achievements to its credit the Rector's report testifies to this - academic excellence, all - round development of its students, prowess on the games field, all of which merit our congratulations and appreciation. But the question I ask myself when I contemplate and endeavour to assess the contribution my own institution makes to society is this, by what criterion ultimately can we judge a school, a college, any academic institution? Some would apply the standard of examination results - not a reliable guide in my opinion, or success in the field of extra curricular activities, games and sports. All of these are important in their own way, but I think, in the last analysis. the greatness of an institution is more truly measured by the kind of young people it sends out into the world. This year we are celebrating the Golden Jubilee of India's Independence. Looking back over the span of fifty years we are grateful to God for the many blessings He has bestowed on our country. Unlike many countries which achieved independence about the same time as India, we are still a flourishing democracy. We have freedom of speech, a free press and all that goes with a true democratic state.


But there are features of our public life that we have reason to regret, even to deplore. The scandals that occupy such a proportion of the news coverage on the electronic media, that make headlines in the newspapers, are a reflection of something seriously wrong in our public life. Our Prime Minister, on Independence Day, made a passionate plea for the removal of venality in society, for integrity at all levels of our corporate living. But societies are made up of individuals, and if the level of honesty in society as a whole is less than what can be hoped for, then it is not surprising to find dishonesty on the scale which we see in the various instances that command such media attention today. To illustrate what I am trying to express: I will relate an incident,

apparently trivial, which happened in Darjeeling quite a number of years ago.

A film came to town, the name of which I cannot recollect, but it was a very popular film and everyone was keen to get a ticket for the only show the cinema hall was providing. Soon all the tickets were sold out, but there were not wanting persons who had decided to capitalize on the popular desire to see the picture and who began to sell tickets at black market rates. Two young men, past pupils of the school, were here in Darjeeling on a holiday and they, too, wished to see the film. They went to the cinema hall and found that all the tickets had been taken, but the black marketers rallied round and offered them two tickets at their rates. These young men were very well off and could easily have afforded the exorbitant prices being asked, but they spurned the offer as opposed to their principles. If even a sizeable number of people did the same there would be no black marketeering.

If each in his own sphere refused to pay bribes, there would be no bribery. We would have a clean public life. As long as there are numbers of people who are not honest in the humbler areas of society there will be scandals of the magnitude we are all too familiar with today. And this is where our Paulites can make a difference. If each of the young men soon to leave the portals of this great school were to bring principles of integrity, putting the common good before their own private ambition, bringing an example of devotion to the public welfare into whatever sphere they are entering, the business world, the professions, public administration, there would be a qualitative raising of standards in public life. It is what we most need in our country today. You have been given the privilege of the kind of education not available to the large majority of your countrymen: the lofty traditions of a great school, built up over a long period of time by a succession of outstanding men who have given the best years of their lives to St. Paul's. Give to your country what you yourselves have been blessed to receive. Be the leaven in the mass. Let your light shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in Heaven. That is my advice, indeed my plea to you and my prayer for you.






The year ended with a simple though moving Carol Service. The Primary Wing choir, with their melodious voices, sang the carols to perfection ushering in the season of Goodwill.


We have had a successful year and I am grateful for the cooperation received from all members of the Staff and the Children.






An Inter-Collegiate Exhibition Debate was organised by the Rotary Club of Darjeeling at Loreto College. The Topic of the Debate was:



A Few Words on the Play

Although the basis of the play TUGHLAQ is historical, TUGHLAQ is more than mere history, it is much more than just a political commentary. It has an intriguing quality which emanates from the schizophrenia of Mohd-bin-Tughlaq - the protagonist. The other characters are mere personifications of his own complex personality.

The whole play moves around the tragedy of opposites: the ideal and the real; divine aspirations and dexterous intrigues. These ambiguities and intrigues, are in reality, a mere projection of the inner conflicts within Tughlaq's psyche. Thus, although Tughlaq appears idealistic, in reality he perpetrates the opposite. The irony here is deeply tragic.

Tughlaq was undoubtedly the most idealistic of monarchs and, perhaps, also the most intelligent. .and yet he is one of the greatest of failures. From the moment he confidently strides on to the stage he begins his own disintegration. By the end of the play he is completely devastated.





At the same time the Quiz competition took off in the Prep Hall. Jessica Dahal of DGH, and Saswata Sanyal of St. Paul's took the honours in Creative Writing and Art respectively. In Chess the two representatives from St. Augustine made mincemeat of the rest of the competition by reaching the Finals. The Quiz saw a closer battle of wits over five engrossing rounds, at the end of which Bradley Mawer of DGH took the individual honours and St. Paul's the team title.

The Bengali and Nepali Elocution contests followed. The emphasis was on patriotic poems and extracts, much in keeping with India's Golden Jubilee of her Independence. However, in both the contests there was very little by way of competition for the Paulite participants. Both Tshering Wangel Ghale in the Nepali Section and Amardeep Banerjee in the Bengali competition were streets ahead of the rest.

The Dumb Charades, conducted by the Rector provided closer and more intense competition. Even as teams tried desperately to unscramble the names of books, films and songs through mime, the audience was regaled with 'desperate' acting and feverish motions. Gomes, who conducted the event with panache, had a difficult time upholding and rejecting objections, claims and counter-claims. The participants raised the roof with their hilarious and witty comments and even more rambunctious interjections. At the end of a side-splitting one hour, Karam Siddiq and Ankush Sachdeva of St. Paul's narrowly pipped DGH to win the event.

The "Turncoats" took to the stage next. In this event a participant had to choose a topic from a hat; he had two minutes to prepare and then had to speak for two minutes in favour of the

topic and spend the next two minutes criticizing his own self by speaking against the motion. Mr. Lawrence conducted this innovative event which drew lots of laughter and was fun-filled all the way till the end. St. Joseph's was head and shoulders above the rest.

The Quad, which was the venue for tea, was spilling over with boys and girls from various schools-all of them inter-mingling freely and laughing as they recalled the day's incidents and wondered what was in store on the morrow.

The 7th of September started with a lot of fire and brimstone as the teams discussed and vociferously debated the "Women's Reservation Bill" in a Mock Parliamentary Session. The Homes represented the views of the CPI (M), St. Joseph's represented the BJP, Mr. Hermon the Janata Dal and St. Paul's spoke as representatives of the BSP. The Congress were to have been represented by St. Augustine's but the latter chose not to be a party to the debate. St. Paul's was represented by Raza Ali and Julius Gomes in this event conducted by Mr. T. Calvert with the help of Mrs. R. Anthony. The participants exercised their vocal chords in full measure, and after sharp exchanges, the judges, who were all from outside, thought that the speakers from St. Paul's and St. Joseph's were most impressive and declared them the best teams on view.

Following the noisy debate was the more sedate and calm 'What's the Good Word' conducted by Mr. Devendra Kumar with help from Mr. S.K. Mishra. The going was a little slow but the competition picked up as the event moved towards the final round at the end of which, St. Joseph's were declared winners.

To revive the spirits of the audience, Hindi film music buffs took to the stage next and under the watchful eyes (and attentive ears) of Mr. Manoj Kumar, Mr. Michael Dutta (on the guitar) and Mr. Gautam Lepcha (on the piano) in a game of Antakshari. The competition was keen, the music adequate, the singing tuneful (with a few exceptions) and the audience participation full

throated. The contest was so close that a tie breaker had to be resorted to after which Dr. Graham's Homes pipped us to the winners' post.

All the participative singing must have increased everyone's appetite which was fully whetted at lunch which followed, in the dining hall.

After lunch, the last of the events-the Western Music Competition-took place. The standard of singing and accompaniment was of the highest order and it was extremely difficult for the judges, all of whom were from outside, to pick on the winners. Mr. S. Pande who had trained our boys, and who coordinated the event, deserves our warm commendations for a job well done! The contest was so close that even the partisan Paulite supporters were unwilling to stick out their necks and predict the winner. The school was represented by Vishwaman Rai in the vocal solo section; Shakti Rai and Bikash Gurung in the vocal duet section. All of them came first in their respective sections and to top it all we also came first in the group singing section.

And so another Fest came to an end. The competition had been good, the contests had been full of fun and two lively days of joyous fellowship came to a close with many a lump in the throats of the participants. The Fest had, in every sense of the term, been a success. New and lasting friendships had been made, there had been keen contests in good spirit and everyone had had a wonderful time. The teachers who worked behind scenes to train the boys, plan and put up programmes had the satisfaction of seeing the youngsters enjoying themselves, and to all the teachers who gladly gave of themselves, their time, and their talents one would like to say a BIG "Thank You"! And so to the next edition to the Plus Two Fest which, for the first time, moves away from St. Paul's and which, in 1998, will be hosted by Mount Hermon.

1997 has been a rather eventful year for the Music Department with a remarkable improvement in its general standard. At the beginning of the year it came as a surprise to many when Vishwaman Rai was appointed as the Music Secretary. Over the year, Vishwa not only earned the confidence and respect of the boys, but he also ably led the Plus II Music Club, trained boys at various levels (Junior and Senior House Concerts, Music Concert, Plus II Fest, Choir, etc) and was, doubtedly, one of the most popular boys in the hearts of the 'juniors'. He was awarded the prestigious Adam's Music Prize for the year 1997. Ms. Caroline Hillier, our Pianoforte teacher, left us to go back to England in the month of September. Apart from teaching piano, Ms. Hillier has also conducted Music lessons in the Junior Wing and has played the piano at all Junior Chapel services. She has also been a keyboard accompanist for the School Choir. Her contribution to the Music Department has been notable and indispensable.

Formal music lessons were given to 37 students in piano (Mr. S. Pande and Ms. C. Hillier) voice and violin (under Mr. S. Pande) and guitar (under Mr. P. Pradhan). This year, 28 students were sent up for practical examination in music (piano and voice) conducted by The Trinity College of Music, London, in the month of September. The examiner for this year was Ms. Michelle Lee, ARCM. Eleven candidates were sent up for the Theory examination in November.

This year we were privileged to have Mr. K. Lama from the 11 Gurkha Regiment, Music Platoon, to improve our brass and woodwind section. He gave individual lessons and trained the School Band. And the difference in the standard was noticed by all. I take the pleasure to thank the members of the band and especially Siddharth M. Rajbandhari and Abhishek Goenka who helped in training individual boys with their respective brass and wind instruments and also helping them with the theory lessons. Siddharth also conducted the Band at the School and Inter-School Athletics meet. He was also awarded the Rahoul Music Prize. Mr. S. Pande conducted the band at the NCC Parade on the 15th of August.

The highlight of the Music Department this year has been the Chapel Choir. Under the direction of Mr. Sudeep Pande, Choir Master, it has rendered an Anthem every month and at all Special and Festal services. Some of the notable ones that were sung were: 'God be in my head' (Davies), 'Ave Verum' (W. Mozart), 'Sing Hallelujah' (Stassen), 'Mine eyes thy beauty pine' (Howells) etc. The boy sopranos have done wonders with their innumerable heartlifting descants. Most hymns were sung in harmony by select Choristers. Bikash Gurung, an excellent baritone, conducted the anthem at the Commemoration Service. Another speciality of the choir has been the repertoire of Benedictional Amens - the Threefold, Dresden and the Seven-fold! At the Memorial Service for Mother Teresa, Schubert's 'Ave Maria' was sung by Mr. S. Pande. The choral singing in the Chapel culminated at the Junior and Senior Carol Services. The Processional was the Great Antiphons 'Veni Veni Emmanuel'. The Choir also sang. 'Personent Hodie', 'The Crown of Roses' (Tschaikovsky), 'Stille Nacht' (F. Gruber) and 'Ding Dong! Merrily on high'. Tsering W. Ghale, Havelock house prefect, and Momocha Thangjam read the first lesson, on behalf of the choir, at the Senior and Junior Services respectively. Siddharth M. Rajbhandari has played the Digital Horn at all Chapel services. Abhishek Goenka has played the Trumpet and Siddharth M. Rajbhandari, the violin, at all special services. Together, they have often played voluntaries- mostly classical. Congratulations to all the Chapel musicians.

The Annual Music Concert was held on the 27th of August. Mark Winn, FTCL, LTCL, PGTCL, PG Dip. St. Petersburg Conservatoire, from the U.K. was the Guest of Honour. It was a beautiful blend of classical, Negro spiritual, rock, pop, etc. The concert began with three choral pieces by the choir. Ms. Hiller gave her last performance, a combination of jazz and classical. A number of piano students also performed. Mr. S. Pande sang 'Free Me' and 'Before the Dawn' and Mr. G. Lepcha played a couple of violin pieces. A 'Male Voice Quintette' comprising Bikash Gurung, Vishwaman Rai, Merentoshi Jamir, Mr. S. Pande and The Rector sang 'Blowing in the Wind'. A host of vocal items (solo, duets) were rendered by Vishwaman Rai, Ashish Pradhan, Shakti Rai. Merentoshi Jamir, Bikash Gurung, Reevu Wangdi and Vaskar Sharma (popularly known as SPS Elvis!) and they all performed creditably. Reynold Anthony, an excellent boy soprano, sang 'Andrew Lloyd Webber's 'Memory'. Siddharth Rajbandhari and Abhishek Goenka played a 'Brass Fanfare' on the Digital Horn and Trumpet respectively. The concert came to a climax with the choral version of 'The Bohemian Rhapsody'. It was sung by the members of the Plus II Music Club and the Junior Choir. Ms. C. 


In the "PLUS-2" Fest, Amardeep Banerjee represented our school in the Bengali Elocution. He stood first and we congratulate him on his success.

2.Mr. S. Chakravarthi – Senior Master-St. Paul's School-Darjeeling. "An excellent show as usual! You boys make us proud"!


3.Mr. Rajiv Lochan old Paulite – "I am proud to be a Paulite after looking at this exhibition".

A video recording was shown to the members on the Public Hearing which was held in Darjeeling in April.







Junior Doubles: Kunal Choudhury and Vikash Atal


Senior Doubles: Deepak Agarwal and Dibyadyuti Ghosh.

BASKETBALL



There is a lot of potential among the boys from classes 8 and 9. I hope they carry on with the game.





Towards the beginning of the First Term the Master-in-charge, Mr. Sunirmal Chakravarthi, left for Sweden on an Exchange Programme, for two months. The undersigned took over charge during his absence. A busy and interesting schedule for two months ended very fast. One fine morning Mr. Chakravarthi was back in school. Within a week of his arrival he had been appointed as Senior Master in the school. with more responsibility. The little opportunity of invovlement in various activities during these two months drew much of my fascination and, in a way, revived the need for such involvement with the students, which a school like St. Paul's demands. DEAS proved to be one such avenue to attain this goal. Now giving it up was the last thing I wanted to do. My sincere thanks are due to Mr. Chakravarthi who found me capable of running the programme and made me the master-in-charge. Indeed, a big challenge lay ahead!!

From this year the name of the Award Scheme has been changed from DEAS to International Award for Young People, India. The Programme encompasses various activities for different levels of the Award Scheme. Boys then chose the activities they were interested in. Preparatory classes were taken where lectures were delivered to enlighten the boys about the aims, objectives, norms, camping rules, methods, precautions and maintenance of the Log-book as required by the programme. On the whole it is the outcome of team work which enables the Programme to be carried on successfully year after year.

The year began with 98 boys aspiring for Bronze, 21 Silver







It symbolises a site of tranquility, discipline, faith, honour and holds a significant place in the heart of every Paulite.

It was indeed a great pleasure to have Reverend Noel Sen amidst us towards the beginning of the year. A rather eventful year started with the commencement of the ICSE and ISC examinations from 3rd. of March, followed by morning prayers every morning of the exam and a special service, for those leaving the school, on 8th.March. The opening of Term service was held on the 9th. March, followed by a special service in the Prep Hall for the Investiture ceremony on the 17th. March when the Prefects were appointed for the year 1997.

For the rest of the year morning services were held separately for Junior and Senior Wings from Monday to Thursday. The ashes of Mrs. Moneesha Choudhury were sprinkled around the chapel on All Soul's Day.

The chapel music this year has been of a considerably high standard. The choir has rendered an anthem practically every month. Their repertoire includes Latin, Medieval, Georgian and Anglican Church music. At the Carol Service they sang five special carols. The Plus 2 Choral Society also sang a negro-spiritual at one Matins Service. Siddharth Rajbhandari has played the Digital Horn at every service. We hope to get the Hammond Organ repaired over the winter months. The choir will miss Miss Caroline Hillier, a brilliant and experienced accompanist. She left school to return to England in September.

They recorded the entire Carol Service. They left fully contented.

A lot of repair has been done in the chapel. Eight new pews exactly matching the existing ones have been made, to accommodate the boys comfortably. New lights have been installed to make the chapel a brighter and better place. A fresh coat of paint added to its glow. All this was thanks to the Estate Manager.

All throughout the year the chapel was kept clean and tidy by the Junior and Senior Wing Chapel Wardens. They spend some time on Saturday afternoons preparing the chapel for the Sunday service.

Mr. Kamlesh Kanti retired, Acting Senior Master of St. Paul's School, was the Chairman of Himalayan Academy Rajganj. He was a very good and well known teacher.
