
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

RECTOR'S LETTER 1998

As the year 1998 draws to its close and the children have all left for the winter vacation, I can look back with quiet pride and satisfaction at the completion of the school's 175th anniversary. Founded in 1823, in Calcutta, as 'The Parental Academy' the school took a name-change to 'St. Paul's School' in 1846, when its affairs were taken over directly by the Church and the Bishops of Calcutta. It was in 1864 that the school transferred to Darjeeling at its present site in Jalapahar, where we have been ever since - 134 years in Darjeeling, which makes us the second oldest school in Darjeeling, and, with the entire history from 1823, the second oldest in Bengal (probably the third oldest in the whole of India).

As far as the boys are concerned they have had more than their fair share of activities. In June there were Mass P.T. displays accompanying the usual Gym. Display - this time over 400 boys participated. The Juniors presented the Operetta 'In Gay Havana'. In August an elaborate NCC programme was presented. In September the School Play, "The Importance of Being Earnest" was staged. There were elaborate exhibitions, not only of Art & Craft and Photography, but also Subject Exhibitions in History, Geography, the Sciences and Computers. Of particular interest was a whole room devoted to memorabilia of the school over its 175 years. The Choir rose to great heights during this year and performed at a Special Thanksgiving Service in Calcutta on 26th September. They also performed brilliantly for the Carol Services at the end of the year, where the Pry. Wing added in a special Nativity Play.

We were utterly delighted to have with us David and Sally Gibbs from Ireland, and Jeff Gardner from Dehra Dun. Their presence made the occasion fulfilling. Mr. Hari Dang sent his regrets for his inability to attend due to pressing earlier engagements. Mr. Michael Cross was very keen to come to India from Abu Dabai, but unfortunately was forbidden by his cardiologist; Michael had suffered a coronary blockage about three months earlier and was still recovering. He sent his warmest good wishes for the occasion.

The Old Paulites have been splendid in their enthusiasm for the occasion. There was a gathering of Old Paulites in London in May. A new branch of the OPA was formed in Sikkim in June. The Old Paulites

of Calcutta have held a series of 'Get-togethers' over the course of the year. A number of beautiful Souvenirs have been brought out by the OPA: Silver plated Coasters, T-shirts, Wall- clocks and Key-chains, the latter being specially designed and given as a gift from the Old Boys to all those presently in school.

To celebrate the year on a more permanent basis, the foundation stone of a new building to house the Staff was laid in late May by the Chairman of the Board of Governors, the Rt. Rev. (Dr.) D. C. Gorai. Bishop Gorai retires at the end of this year, having served as Chairman for the last 16 years. Also in train is the new Laboratory-cum-dormitory Complex coming up near the Junior School. Both projects are likely to cost in the region of Rs. 2 crores and we will need to bring together our efforts to raise the money. I know that we have plenty of well-wishers and that with a bit of gentle persuasion they will rise to the occasion!

We have had a successful year and I look back with gratitude to all those past Governors, Rectors, Staff, Students and Domestic Staff who laid such a sure foundation. With God's help we look forward to an even more brilliant future.







RECTOR'S SPEECH - 1998

Mr. & Mrs. Gibbs, Mr. Gardner, Ladies and Gentlemen,

On this historic occasion as we celebrate 175 years of the existence of St. Paul's School, it is my privilege to welcome as our Chief Guest, Mr. David Gibbs, the senior most of the Rectors of this school. Mr. Gibbs served as Rector from 1964 till the and of 1972 and subsequently went on to become the Warden of St. Columbas' College, Dublin. For his services to education he was awarded the O.B.E. Though Mr. Gibbs left more than 25 years ago I know that part of him has always remained at St. Paul's and today we are honoured to have him in our midst. We are also delighted to have with us Sally Gibbs who was a talented pianist in her own right and taught many boys music. During this period, music rose to great heights at St. Paul's. I am also pleased to welcome Mr. Jefferson Gardner, my immediate predecessor. Mr. Gardner had the difficult task of steering the school between 1985 and 1991 at the height of the local agitation. How he was able to preserve his equanimity is a lesson in itself. I also bring good wishes from Mr. Michael Cross in Dubai (Abu Dhabi). He was anxious to come out to India for these celebrations. However, his physician would not recommend his movement into a high altitude - he, having recently suffered a heart attack. Mr. Hari Dang has also sent his good wishes to the entire School community. Unfortunately he is tied up in Delhi in various environmental projects which demand his presence.

Over the winter of 1997-98 we bade farewell to Mr. Arun Dash who joined the Lawrence School, Lovedale, as its Dy. Headmaster. His wife, Mrs. G. Dash, one of our Matrons, joined him a few months later. We wish both of them all success in their new venture. Mr. Stuart McMullen, one of our English teachers out from Ireland, decided that he would not return in the New year. This left a vacancy in our English Department. Mrs. Meena Sobti, our Senior Wing Matron, also decided to join her husband who had decided to return to Delhi. We wish both of them success in life. Mr. R. S. Baoni, our brilliant and talented Art master for the last 21 years will retire at the end of this year. Year after year he has mounted excellent Art & Craft exhibitions, the present one is his swan song. I take this opportunity of thanking Mr. Baoni for his loyalty and devotion to the school; for his ability to draw out the artistic talents of the students in so many unusual ways.

A number of new members of staff have joined us this year Mr. Mahesh Chandra Kharga joined us to teach History; Mr. Wayne Peters is attached to the Pry. Wing; Mr. Amlan Majumdar joined to teach Geography; Mr. Punam Lama to teach Mathematics; Mr. D. K. Mishra to teach Hindi; Mr. Manas Dev joined the English Department. Mrs. B. Chakravarthy and Mrs. S. Vincent have joined us as Matrons. Mr. Subrata Das of ICS joined us to teach Computers studies: he shares the load with Mr. A. Banerjee, also of ICS. It is my pleasure to welcome all these charming men and women on to our Staff body. Each one of them has contributed to the life of the school and I know that their efforts have been deeply appreciated by the boys.

The ISC and ICSE Exams were delayed till mid-March this year due to the General Elections, otherwise the exams went off smoothly. We had a 100% success at the ICSE level for the second consecutive year with all 71 boys being successful. At the ISC level 41 boys were successful; we had one unexpected failure - a pity since this is normally an area where we have cent percent passes. I take this opportunity to congratulate the entire teaching faculty for their cooperation and contribution to the academic success of the boys.

Whilst I am pleased with the gradual improvement of the academic work of the school, I must confess that our games standards have not made much progress, even though we have played all the games in their seasons. No unusual talent has been displayed and the Colours, awarded have been few and far between this year. I think it is just a lean period; there is plenty of talent lower down which, I hope, will mature in due time. We were not successful at the Edinburgh Cricket matches this year. However, the Old Paulite Cricket Match played over the Easter Weekend was exciting. In this 175th year the OPs formed a branch in Sikkim and for the first year we played a football game against the OPA. The present boys won both the games.

In early June just before we broke for the short summer break we held an elaborate P. T. and Gym. display here on the Top Field. In addition to the usual gymnastics, chair exercises, mat work and vaulting, there was a mass display, involving 78 Pry. Wing boys of the local Khukri dance. Each of the Snr. Wing Houses produced a separate display of coordinated exercises involving the use of clubs, hoops and staves. The Jnr. Wing boys presented a series of flash-card displays. The NCC provided a display of fire fighting and rescues operations. In all, over 400 boys participated and every department of the school was activated.

This year our running season has been badly disrupted. An excessively heavy monsoon season not only created floods in the plains but also saw the frequent breakdown of road communications between Siliguri and Darjeeling. At one point of time, just when the running season had started, all traffic to and from Darjeeling was diverted through the Army road at Jalapahar, thus making it unsafe for the boys to practice. It is for this reason that we have had to postpone the running season to after the Puja break. I am deeply grateful to the Commandant, 123 Mtn. Brigade and the Officers at Jalapahar, for giving us permission to use the Jalapahar road.

We were honoured to have in our midst Brig. RL Singh as our Chief Guest on 15th August. It was a rainy wet day but the NCC cadets went through a Guard-of-Honour and March Past in the drizzle; the whole affair looked quite splendid even though it was wet - it speaks volumes for the efficiency of the staff and pupils that, in spite of all odds they can continue to perform at peak levels.

The stage has been well occupied with the various House Concerts both at the Jnr. and Snr. level. Just before the summer break the Jnr. School produced the operetta "In Gay Havana". As always, such musical productions demand great team work and the Jnr. Wing Staff are to be commended on an excellent production. The main School Play this year has been "The Importance of Being Earnest" by Oscar Wilde. This sophisticated comedy of London society at the turn of the last century demands a high calibre of diction and smooth finish for its success. Though the cast was small there was high degree of painstaking detail needed for sets, costumes and lighting. I congratulate all those who worked at this to allow the finished product which was acted last Tuesday. The Second Language Concert was held on the eve of Independence Day and saw fine productions by each of the departments - Hindi, Bengali and Nepali. Our standard of drama seems to be getting better and better.

In the sphere of music the school's choir has now reached a good standard, enough to allow us to perform at public displays in our own Chapel and at the forthcoming Thanksgiving Service in Calcutta. This year we sent up 13 boys for Trinity College of Music Examinations in Piano and Singing. All of them were successful. We welcome on to our staff Havildar K. Lama, retired Band Master from 11 Gorkha Regiment. Mr. Lama has just been with us for a little over six weeks and has already made an enormous difference to the School Band which was sadly

neglected. We look forward to great strides being made in this area. This year we have added to our collection of musical instruments with an expensive synthesiser and six Brass and Woodwind instruments.

The boys have fared reasonably well at various Inter-School competitions. At an Inter-State Quizzing Contest our team came first; at the "Hindi Day" Celebrations one of our students won the first prize at Essay Writing. We came third at the Inter-School Master Memorial Elocution Contest and the Plus Two section, who took part in the 'Fest' organised at Mount Hermon School, did remarkably well.

Over the last fortnight the boys have been hard at work mounting the various exhibitions which have been on display in the Senior, Junior and Primary Wings. The cultivation of leisure-time occupations is an important aspect of school life and each boy is encouraged to pursue some activity which best suits his temperament. You would have noticed the range: art, woodwork, lathe work, photography, computers, handwork in various forms. For the more intellectual types there are displays on History, Geography, Nepali, Mathematics and Science.

This year we have embarked upon three ambitious building projects. The first of them is a set of Domestic Staff quarters built on the slope facing Aloobari. Designed to accommodate ten families, the first phase of four pre-fabricated, eco-friendly buildings is complete. On 3rd June, Bishop Gorai, Chairman of the Board of Governors laid the foundation stone of the new Staff Quarters complex which is coming up below Dawkins. Work on this project will hopefully start after the Puja holidays. The most elaborate of the projects is the new Dormitory-cum-Science Laboratories complex which will come up near the Junior School. The drawings for this project are well under way and nearing completion.

On an occasion such as this, as we celebrate 175 years of Service to the Community it seems necessary for us to take stock: to look back in gratitude to all those who have contributed to make this present moment possible and to ponder on just where we are likely to move over the next 25 years as we enter the new millennium. There are so many questions which need to be answered and the way forward is not very clear. Ours is an era of mass and rapid communications - Fax machines, E-mail, Inter-net, Super Computers and so on. The electronic media has invaded our homes and permeates the very fabric of our life and society. There are no moral codes that control the type of entertainment


being shown. The most salacious sex scandals, illustrations of corruption in high places, vicious and sadistic acts are all displayed with an equal degree of unconcern. Have we taught our students how to deal with all this? The total quantum of knowledge doubles every year and is now too vast for any single person, to carry even if it is just in one aspect of a discipline. The only solution seems to be computers. How effective is our teaching? We teachers are the products of information more than twenty years old, have we made any effort to improve ourselves?

There are some answers to these questions, the effectiveness of which only time will tell. Here at St. Paul's we still value religious background and code of conduct that stresses honesty, decency and honour. These are timeless values and will always stand the students in good stead. In the end, though the passing of examination is important, increasingly it will be the mastering of machines that will be decisive. Taking an intelligent interest in the world around us will be far more important than actual knowledge - knowledge which can be recalled at anytime by just the press of a button. Lest this begins to sound like a Doomsday survey, let us take comfort from the fact that the human race has always responded brilliantly when placed under stress. The challenges of today will be met tomorrow and those who will meet them will be our own students. Let us have faith in their skills and encourage them to face life with courage and good sense.

I take this opportunity of paying tribute to the Doctor, Nurses and matrons who have looked after the health and physical welfare of the students. The Office Staff, the Estate Department and the Caterers have all contributed unceasingly throughout the year: theirs is often a thankless job. The Domestic Staff who work quietly behind the scenes ensuring that the systems function like clock-work and whose loyalty to the school is unquestioned – to these go our unfailing gratitude. I am also grateful to the local District Authorities for their cooperation throughout the year.

As I look out at you in the audience I am sensitive to the large number of parents and well-wishers who have come in. I also thank those numerous parents who wrote in to congratulate us on our 175th year of existence. I see amongst us numerous Old Paulites who have come up to share their loyalty and recall happy times. A warm welcome to all of you. The London Chapter of the OPA met in early June in the UK, and the new Sikkim Chapter of the OPA was started in July.

The old Boys of Calcutta have also contributed by bringing out numerous Souvenirs and co-ordinating arrangements for the Thanksgiving Service at St. Paul's Cathedral. Each year, we as Rectors, present somewhat dry reports of the school's activities which sound quite impressive, and yet leave one wondering if it really did happen! The proof of an endeavour is in the success and happiness of our past pupils. Take a look at them and decide for yourselves!

CHIEF GUEST'S ADDRESS ON SPEECH DAY 1998 (Mr. D. S. Gibbs)

Rector, Ladies and Gentlemen, Paulites All;

I think I am going to get into a muddle for which you should blame the hospitality of the Old Paulites at the back of the hall.

26 years ago at the end-of-term supper there was the usual excitement, splendid decorations of the dining hall and kind-hearted farewell messages to Sally and David – that is to my wife and myself. We missed the 150th celebrations by a hair, and the 200th, which will be something tremendous, we are more likely to enjoy in the spirit than in the flesh. So Sally and I are particularly grateful for the Rector's invitation to be here today. It is not only a great honour but also a nostalgic and delightful visit for us. And although he and Mrs. Howard are the only remaining members of the teaching staff of our time, we still have friends in the administrative and domestic departments, friends in the town, and of course many Old Paulites whom we rejoice in seeing again.

In thanking the Rector, I must also congratulate him on his excellent Report, and the staff on the very satisfactory examination results. The School Play ('The Importance of being Ernest'), the Sports and the Exhibitions were all of a very high standard, most enjoyable and a credit to one and all.

175 years is indeed an anniversary to celebrate with pride. It deserves some serious historical perspective such as has been supplied by the O.P., Kabir Mustafi, who is headmaster of Bishop Cotton School, Shimla. He asked me if I would read out a message from him, mainly as follows:-

"St Paul's and Bishop Cotton School have been inceptionally bound since the middle nineteenth century for it was the Rt Rev George Edward Lynch Cotton who founded the latter and who was instrumental in shifting the former from Calcutta to Darjeeling. Bishop Cotton's first headmaster, the Rev Samuel Slater, was the second Rector of St Paul's and St Paul's School's longest-serving Rector, Leslie (Pa) Goddard, was a young assistant master at BCS where he met Miss Maisie Fox, later 'Ma' to generations of Paulites. Mr and Mrs de Young, scores of other staff including the Rev Bentinck, several boys and the author of this commemorative note, are also links in the chain of attachment and it is therefore a

matter of especial pride for me to be able to write in acknowledgement of the occasion. I have no doubt that the inherent ethos and goodness of this great institution will continue to groom boys to deal with life and the world at large with fairness, integrity and tolerance, and that the 'Old School' is safe in the hands of Mr David Howard our present Rector, Mr Sunirmal Chakravarthi and their team and, above all, the boys themselves who are the living soul of the place."

Well, I cannot improve upon that; but I suppose I shouldn't stop there.

Any history of St Paul's is likely to note three phases in its development.

The earliest phase was when the School began in Calcutta and moved up to this dramatic site and lovely buildings.

The second phase was what is often referred to as the 'Goddard Era' - when the ethos of the School and many beautiful features were created and established by Leslie Goddard. His educational style has been disseminated far and wide by those headmasters and teachers (of which there are very many) who had been here as boys or as members of staff. A man of his stature is hard to follow - I should know - but a string of us have done our best.

The third phase - the present phase - began in 1981 when the Governors and Mr Dang decided not only to build a Primary Wing but to double the numbers in the School. Mr Gardiner had the unenviable task of steering an over-crowded school through the alarming local disturbances of his years. It has been more than interesting to hear from him about the School in his time. And now our Rector, Mr Howard, is well on the way to providing the necessary buildings and conditions for staff and boys to satisfy the long-outstanding demands of this increase. One can only admire the amount he has already achieved in so short a time and support the various ideas that he and his staff have for the future as their plans leave the drawing board for reality.

But what of the boys? 175 years prompts us to reflect upon time and the huge difference experienced by you, boys at school, and time as experienced by your parents and grandparents. Time accelerates. Clocks are misleading. You will know that until the sudden thrill of Going-Home-Day, time during the term seems endless. It does, doesn't it? But

for your grandparents (with whom I now identify) time flashes by. In their lifetime there have been colossal changes. To name a few: television, transistors, lasers, genetics, fibre optics, nuclear fission and fusion, computers, space travel, black holes, quasars and time-warps; and Indian brains have been at the forefront of many of these.

A hundred years ago, there was in England as Master of Balliol College, Oxford, a famous scholar about whom some wag wrote:-

"First come I, my name is Jowett, There is no knowledge but I know it. I am the Master of this college -What I don't know isn't knowledge."

Well - he wouldn't stand a chance now. It is said the sum of human knowledge doubles every ten years (a crazy statement of course) which even if vaguely true means that we are on an ever-steepening curve of knowledge somewhat like a parabola. So what will be the changes in your lifetimes? They are, perhaps, unimaginable; but computers, unless they burst under the strain, will at every point be essential to deal with them. Which is why it is often said that primary education should enable pupils to be literate, numerate and computerate. Here I should congratulate the O.P., Zubin Medora, who has established a web-site for St Paul's which I am told is marvellous. And at this point I should own up and say that I am not yet computerate: but you must be ! - not only to know how to use computers seriously but to know how not to be dominated by them.

Whatever about the parabola of knowledge, human wisdom seems to continue in a straight line, sloping slightly upwards if you are an optimist, and downwards if a pessimist. This should be the main concern of your education. I expect a good part of it is given to the wisdom of the ancients and its application to current affairs, to the creative arts, to poetry and drama, to the great cultures we have inherited but, above all, to just why we are here at all? I hope so. Because a spiritual dimension in education would seem to me paramount. In this sense, and not in any denominational sense, all education is, or should be, religious.

Coming down to earth, a delightful feature of St Paul's was (and I hope still is) the way the boys refer to it as 'Our School' - a sense of ownership and pride which I share. Our School is famous. It has long been noted for understanding and tolerance. You will find in an old School Chronicle a list of 31 mother tongues of boys in the school when

there were also many religious denominations - and no factional or communal prejudice. At the time of the war with Pakistan in 1965, we had some Pakistan nationals in the school whose friendships were in no way impaired: there was much sorrow when they had to be sent home. That sort of understanding and tolerance has to be nurtured. It is a very precious reputation to have.

And then, of course, 'Our School' has long been noted for good manners, good discipline, a high standard of games, and for having produced very high achievers in scholarship, industry, business and the professions. We have to remember that other schools may also have these virtues and that it is only by enthusiasm, - enthusiasm in all these things, but particularly in the classroom, that this reputation can be maintained now that the School is so very much larger.

At this time in history you are lucky. India enjoys enormous respect in the world at large. By self-sacrificing financial stringency, and by resisting the blandishments of economic colonialists, she stands on her own feet with a sound industrial infrastructure, able to face the future with justified confidence. I sound a bit like a politician! And I must say I do hope more and more O. Ps will enter politics and the civil services. It is a good time to be growing up, and you must sort out what part you wish to play in it - and go for it!

'Our School' does have one unique feature (and it is not Jockey Cutlets, Calibre Pudding, the water supply or the bijli). It is the view. To spend years in this incredible setting really is the greatest privilege. It should inspire us all with gratitude to the people of Darjeeling who make it possible, and with a wish to give generous service to others less fortunate than ourselves. As you probably know, the Old Paulite Association is involving itself more and more in charitable work: I hope you will in your turn play your part.

I know what you are thinking. "Whenever is he going to stop?"

Now. Thank you. 'Go for it'. And God bless you.

You've always been special to us Sir. Thanks a million for everything.



Our marching proved to be the best once again when we won the March Past cake on Sports Day.




The three rounds of house activities held at different venues did help to strengthen the bond among the boys and the house teachers amidst fun and games.


The success that has been achieved this year has largely depended upon the team spirit of all the house boys – from the smallest to the biggest. "Thank you, boys!"

SCENES FROM THE PRIMARY WING INTER-HOUSE DRAMA COMPETITION





MANY YEARS LATER -A WALK DOWN MEMORY LANE

Everyman, I will go with thee, And be thy guide, In thy most need to go by thy side.

The first evening of a new term is just a little different from all other evenings which lie ahead. It is a restless, unsettled time when ties with home have been broken and links of another term are not yet forged.

Sitting on the edge of the bed, twirling a handkerchief round and round like contra-rotating propellers and puzzling over the feeling of strangeness which took long to wear off; the mind shuttling between the 'alien' home and this 'home' -the dormitory, with its rows of beds and lockers, gradually became familiar. Boys prepared for bed, struggling with knotted shoe laces or straining at pullovers which were turning into little woollen tunnels over head and tugging them off.

Miss Nongram, short (all of three feet and six inches), stout and a no-nonsense lady who was forever present (or so it seemed) would spell out the routine we were expected to follow. God forbid that any one should think of any kind of deviation. Shoes polished, hair combed, clothes properly worn, beds made out neatly – she ensured it all with the least bit of fuss.

The classes were always very friendly and supportive places to be in. We tiny tots had our work restricted to our classrooms - indeed, we did not have any Prep till we reached Class 4! Short breaks of five minutes (now extinct) punctuated the classes with a long break in-between. There being no tuck hall (incidentally, the present JW Tuck Hall used to be the Assembly Hall) we would run off to our dormitories where the ayahs would have stashed small packets of assorted 'grub' under our pillows. The linen rooms then served as 'larders'.

Besides the morning assemblies which took place in the present tuck hall, the hall had other purposes too. The beginning of the term invariably saw Mr Macdonald (the then HJW) imparting lessons on the do's and dont's on table etiquette, behaviour and general conduct. Physical demonstrations of how to wield the knife, fork and spoon were given alongside lectures on how not to stuff our 'post offices' with food and how to keep the trap shut while chewing the 'cud' To add icing to the cake, Mr Lobo introduced a fine of one candy for drinking water during meals - it was only either before or after that water could be consumed.

'Mackie', as the HJW was then popularly called, had spent so many years looking after boys that he knew more than most people about the workings of the 6 to 13 year olds' minds. He was always on duty and very often he would be seen making one of his systematic tours of the building to see how the boys were spending their time. Always encouraging, and often participating in our childish games, he would often be seen playing marble with us - and, boy, was he good at it! What loveable moments of school life. In the sand pit we built castles in the air and tried to turn them into reality with our dinky toys which substituted real Mercedes, Jaguars and Rolls Royces!

A true picture of the then Junior Wing would not be complete without the mention of the aftermath of the great boarding school practice of 'bunking.' Bunking was fun while it lasted, a celebration indulged in on rare occasions. To be caught, however, meant being prepared for the 'best-of-six' in the HJW' s office. The severity of the 'tickler' could be gauged by the fact that no sooner had the sixth met its target that we virtually jumped out of the office and vaulted in to the dormitory (the present JW Staff Room). Friends like OP - the current EM (sorry, Chum) were common recipients. However, before the passing of an hour we would be keeping wickets for 'Mackie' while he tried to swat the tennis balls out of shape with his cricket bat.

The Senior Wing (which was strictly out of bounds for those of us in the JW) was always held in awe by the Juniors. And why wouldn't we hold them in awe for to be in the Senior Wing meant to be privileged enough to have Sunday outings (one day leave and one walking leave every month), trips to Blacks and a fiscal hike in the pocket money allowance from a mere Rs. 5/- in the JW to a grand sum of Rs. 50/- every month!!

The two breaks (of a week each) in the summer and during Pujas were always greeted with a 'pinch of salt', if you know what I mean, since we were not permitted to go home and had to spend the holiday in town. In those days many boys preferred to stay back in school since

those who opted to stay in school would be taken on expeditions to places like Nainital, Haridwar, Delhi, Calcutta, Shillong and Kathmandu. Often, we would write to our parents seeking written consent for such trips and these permissions would most often come readily from parents who also did not see the sense in coming to Darjeeling holiday after holiday and staying in hotels.

Expeditions were always great fun. There was no NCC or DEAS/ IAYP in those days. In their place we had Pioneers. The Pioneers expeditions were far more gruelling and educative albeit this is a subjective perception. Walking to Sandakphu and back with a rucksack load of dry rations was a matter of routine. Indeed, even the Junior Wing spent nights out camping with teachers. I shall forever remember one particular camp at Tiger hill when the late Mr Kanti, in his black dressing gown and big black fur cap, was mistaken for a bear at night! How can I ever forget the excitement and commotion that followed. It is a real pity that boys today would rather ply homewards and worse still, go home only to be glued to their television sets. It is no consolation to be told that they watch nature programmes on TV. That sounds much like eating vitamin pills while one is seated amidst a plethora of fruits and vegetables.

At the end of it all (on the 23rd of November or thereabouts), Going Home Day (GHD) was an occasion! The old Buckeridge strain of:

"This time tomorrow, where shall I be?

Miles away from Lin-bur-y

No more spiders in my tea,

No more sleeping in a dormitory..." was modified and Indianised and made more pertinent to our local situation. The school would ring out boisterous renditions of this ditty that went something like this:

Going Home Day has come at last, do-da, do-da, Going home Day has come at last, do-da, do-da, day! We'll travel all the night We'll travel all the day, We'll travel in a rut-phat train, do-da, do-da, day......

......Coming back to School after a lapse of twenty years has had its bag of surprises. Changes in life are inevitable, and change is quintessential for the development of any institution, I suppose, after all, as the great poet once wrote:

"The old order changeth yielding place to new

Lest one good custom should corrupt the war add

The most glaring and obvious change is definitely the "madding crowd". From a 'meagre' 350 boys in our time in school, within a span of two decades, (and true to the Indian ethos, I suppose) the population has more than doubled -a wee bit too progenitive!!

But now being on 'the other side of the fence' gives me a more objective comprehension and empathy (as different from sympathy) for those on the other side today, and where I sat many a summer ago. I am now in a position to understand how the minds of those on the other side work - their juvenile pranks, their little irritants and how their minds think behind each move. With the passage of time it is not preternatural to expect changes in the outlook and behaviour of both faculty and the students.

The Sixth Form did have their share of privileges but in comparison to the present generation of Sixth Formers, we may have been said to have lived in a concentration camp. However, it is sad to see that, in spite of their free environs, there are many in the present lot of students who seem to be content in wallowing in mediocrity. It is almost painful to see the large drop in the number of all rounders who graced the rolls in the past. At the same time I cannot deny that the School's uniqueness in its ability to assimilate boys and staff from various walks of life, comprising different religious, social and racial backgrounds and mould them under one unifying banner, where fellow feeling and loyalty towards one another play an integral role, has remained undiminished over the years.

All said and done it gladdens my heart to see that in its own way, St. Paul's continues to produce leaders in every walk of life. Many, many years ago Mr Goddard had once said, "If men are to lead, there is one essential prerequisite - character. This can't be taught in the classroom, nor from books. It is caught, not taught." It is one of the greatest joys in my life to see that St. Paul's, even after all these years, still provides the environment that moulds great character. To that extent, so much has changed and yet nothing has changed.

(Mr. D. Kumar studied in St. Paul's School, Darjeeling, from 1967 to 1978. He returned in 1997 to take up a teaching assignment in his alma mater and is currently serving as a Master in the English Department)

I have no doubt that the inherent ethos and goodness of this great institution will continue to groom boys to deal with life and the world at large; with fairness, integrity and tolerance and that the 'Old School' is safe in the hands of Mr. David Howard our present Rector, Mr. Sunirmal Chakravarthi and their team, and, above all, the boys themselves who are the living soul of the place.

May God bless each one of you in your endeavour to set and maintain exacting standards of excellence in education and in the exercise of living. And may He bind you "more closely together in a spirit of loyalty and service, that our school may grow in spiritual strength and may become an ever increasing power for the extension of His kingdom in this land..." and move safely into the new millennium and the centuries beyond.

The year started on a rather exciting note when the result of the Theory Examination, November, 1997, was announced. All eleven candidates passed with 'Distinction' including one who secured 100%!

Formal music lessons were given to 18 student in piano, voice (by Mr. S. Pande) and violin (by Mr. G. Lepcha). This year, 13 candidates were sent up for practical examination in music (piano and voice) conducted by The Trinity College of Music, London, in the month of September. All of them were successful. The examiner for this year was Mr. George Lee, LTCL, GTCL, A Mus TCL, ARCM. Fourteen candidates were sent up for the Theory Examination in November.

Retd. Sgt. Major K. Lama, our Bandmaster, needs to be specially commended for an excellent work with our brass and woodwind section. He gave individual lessons and trained the School Band. This year many new boys have joined the band. Most of them even appeared for the Theory Examination. I take the pleasure to thank the members of the band and especially Siddharth Rajbhandari and Abhishek Goenka who helped in training individual boys with their respective instruments and also for helping them with the theory lessons. We are indeed very grateful to the Rector for buying us new brass instruments and for a new synthesizer. The Band played creditably at the NCC Parade on the 15th of August and at the Annual Athletics Meet.

The Chapel Choir has not only been the highlight of the Music Department but of the school in general. As our former Rector, Mr. David Gibbs, wrote in his letter to me, '....what pleasure it gave us to hear the exceptionally high standard of your very large choir. Many congratulations and thanks - I am sure it exceeded the standards of our day'. Under the direction of Mr. Sudeep Pande, Choir Master, it has rendered an anthem every month and at all special and Festal services. Some of the notable ones that were sung were: 'Love is come again' (Martin Shaw), 'O Taste and See' (R. Vaughan Williams), 'Almighty God, who hast me brought' (Thomas Ford), etc. The boy sopranos have done wonders with their innumerable heartlifting descants. Most of the hymns were sung in harmony by select choristers. The Choir was indeed at its best form

at the commemoration service and at the 175th year Thanksgiving service held at St. Paul's Cathedral, Calcutta. (Details of this will be found elsewhere in this Chronicle). The choral singing in the Chapel culminated at the Junior and Senior Carol services. The Processional was the Great Antiphons 'Veni Veni Emmanuel'. The Choir also sang 'Personent Hodie', 'Angels from the realms of glory', 'Away in a manger' and 'I saw three ships'. Tarak Nand Joshi and Uday Gartaula read the First lesson, on behalf of the Choir, at the Senior and Junior Services respectively. From this year, the choir has been robed.

The Annual Music concert was held on the 15th of August. The Guest of Honour was Sr. Marcelline of the Religious Order of St. Cluny. It was a beautiful blend of classical, negro spiritual, pop, modern, etc. The Choir sang a choral version of 'The Hills are alive to the Sound of Music' and the negro spiritual 'Good News'. There was a beautiful combination of Eastern and Western Music in an instrumental played by Mrs. P. Bhattacharya (Sitar), Mrs. P. Thackur (Tabla), Mr. S. Pande (Piano), Mr. G. Lepcha L (violin), Zakee Shah, Namgyal Sherpa and Tenzing Lama (Guitar), Reynold Anthony (Keyboard) and Anil Gurung (Drums). Mr. Pande rendered a couple of counter- tenor solos and Mr. Lepcha, violin. Select choristers sang a choral version of 'Where is Love?' from Oliver. There were piano solos by the TCL Piano students and vocal items by the Junior and Plus II Music Clubs, including a haunting Baritone solo by Bikash Gurung. This year, we also had a Dance which was directed by Roden Sherpa. The Master of Ceremony was Amardeep Banerjee, the School Captain.

A number of music students have performed creditably at their respective House Concerts, mostly vocal and a few instrumental. They were all of a fairly high standard. From this year, we also re-introduced the Inter - House Singing Concert in the Senior Wing. Most of the training and directing was done by the boys themselves. In this connection, I would like to specially commend Merentoshi Jamir and Bikash Gurung on excellent work with their respective House boys.

On Speech Day, Bikash Gurung was awarded the Adam's Music Prize and Abhishek Goenka was awarded the Rahoul Music Prize.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the Music secretary for excellent work over the year, Merentoshi Jamir (Head Chorister) and Abhishek Goenka who have been strong pillars of the Music Department, and the Rector for his utmost co- operation, motivation and help in all the musical activities of the school.









CRICKET REPORT - 1998

Yet another year of activities started in St. Paul's School and this year was not like any other normal year for St. Paul's. It was the School's 175th year. Though it was a special year, there was no change in the sporting calendar of the year and as always, the year began with the gentleman's game – Cricket.

There was no cricket captain appointed this year. Mr. A. Alva took over the responsibility of M.I.C. Cricket from this year. It was quite disappointing to hear that the coach would not be coming this year too, but Paulites are not those who put their heads down and crib but face every problem that comes their way with courage.

In the season opening match between the Staff and the Sixth form, the former turned out to be too formidable and had an easy victory over the boys. Put in to bat the Staff piled up a massive total and declared at 317/6. Mr. A. Dennis (126* off 71 balls) and Mr. A. Alva (71* off 45 balls) were the major contributors. The boys were bowled out for a paltry 109 runs in 19.5 of the allotted 35 overs.

On the 4th April, the Staff played a friendly match against the District Magistrate's XI. The D.M.'s XI comprised of Mr. Navin Prakash (D.M.), Mr. Siddharth (Principal Secretary, D.G.H.C.), Mr. S. K. 

INTERNATIONAL AWARD FOR YOUNG PEOPLE IN INDIA- 1998 (FORMERLY KNOWN AS D.E.A.S)

Towards the beginning of the year great excitement and enthusiasm was seen among the boys. The spirit of 'we'll do it this time' was looming large among the hopeful aspirants. And for those coming to class 9, the very concept of DEAS is new to them. During the course of the introductory lectures when the various programmes under this scheme were introduced to them, they are the ones who really get thrilled. This enthusiasm among the students is enough to make the instructors and assessors of various activities under the programme remain on their toes.

The season began with a few introductory lectures in the prep hall. This is specially meant for the class 9 boys and the new comers in class eleven. The boys are told about the various activities under different programmes, expedition procedures, rules, norms, precautionary measures, and cooking and maintenance of the Log Book. Practical demonstration is given to the boys on how to pitch the tents. A meeting was held to update the instructors and the assessors about the standards for different activities.

The IAYP programme encompasses various activities for different levels of the Award Scheme. The qualifying criteria and standards for the physical recreation, skills, service and expedition (after deciding in the meeting) were published. The boys were then briefed. Accordingly the boys choose the activities they are interested in. The performance of the boys are closely monitored and assessed by the instructors of different activities. On the whole it is the outcome of team work which enables the Programme to be carried on successfully year after year.

This year the monsoon arrived early. Few spells of torrential down-pour caused many major land slides along the trekking route undertaken by the Bronze groups. As a result the number of expeditions were less compared to the previous year. 46 boys went for the Bronze expedition and 17 boys went for the silver expedition. At the end of the year 18 boys qualified for Bronze Award and 14 boys for Silvers. There were no aspirants for the Gold Award this year. Those who were interested could not undertake the expedition. They had to attend the Thanksgiving Service held in Calcutta during the Puja-break, the time when the Gold

Expeditions normally take place.

I would like to place on record my sincere gratitude to all those who helped in running this programme successfully:

The Rector and the Senior Master were always encouraging and to them I owe my special thanks and also to the masters who worked as instructors and assessors. Without their help and cooperation the programme would never have gone forward at all. Thanks are due to my colleagues who have volunteered to go to inspect the expedition team on various occasions. I am also grateful to Dr. P. K. Sharma and Sister N. L. Bhutia for providing the boys with the first-aid kits during the expeditions, Mr. O.P. Agarwal, Estate Manager, Mr. A.K. Chakrabarti and Mr. S. Gurung the caterers, who were also considerate and often overlooked the last-minute expedition lists. Finally, I acknowledge the sincerity and dedication with which the Student Secretary for 1998, Manoj Singh, rendered his service all throughout the year. Well done, Manoj, and here's wishing you the very best in the future.

1998 has been a challenging year which has been thoroughly enjoyed by the IAYP activists. Unfortunately, the Certificates and Badges could not be distributed to the boys. They didn't arrive in time. The same will be given next year at the beginning of the year. I am sure 1999 will see us go much higher, faster and further.


