

RECTOR'S SPEECH - 1999

Rev. Father Van Walleghem, Ladies and Gentlemen,

On the occasion of this Speech Day, the last of this millennium, it gives me great pleasure to welcome Rev. Father Van Walleghem, Rector, St. Joseph's College, North Point. When I served as a young master at St. Paul's, Father Van was already a Senior Administrator at St. Joseph's and he has had years of experience in the field of education. I understand that he has been recalled out of semi-retirement to serve as Rector of St. Joseph's, a tribute to his experience. Though the boys of St. Paul's School and St. Joseph's are rivals, the relationship between Rectors and Headmasters is extremely cordial. We are all there to help each other. It also gives me great pleasure to welcome this morning Mr. Kenneth Jackman, an old Paulite from 1914 and who, at 94 years of age, has made it here for speech Day from his home in the U.S.A. We also welcome his daughter and her husband, Mr. & Mrs. John Kemp.

At the end of last year we bade farewell to Mr. Ashok Thackur, Housemaster of Hastings and Senior Biology Master. Mr. Thackur had served us for 16 years and left to become Vice Principal of National Institute of Sports, Rai, Haryana. His wife, Mrs. P. Thackur who served as a Matron in the Jnr. Wing joined him a few months later. Mr. Nicholas Gomes also left as at the end of March this year, to become Vice-Principal of the Himalayan Academy, Jalpaiguri. Mr. Gomes was Housemaster of Clive House and a Senior Commerce teacher who had served for 18 years. His wife Mrs. S. Gomes also joined him by the end of May. Mrs. Gomes was Matron in the Pry. Wing. We wish both these couples success in their new ventures. Over the course of the year two senior members of the Admn. Staff retired, Mr. H. B. Chhetri, Cashier, at the end of April, and Mr. D. B. Tamang, Office Assistant, at the end of September. Both these gentlemen served the school for 23 years having joined and retired in the same year. They both brought with them a background of ex-servicemen from the Army. Both served with integrity and to the best of their ability. Since they live in Darjeeling we will be able to keep in touch over the years. We wish them a happy retirement. At the end of this year Mr. Thomas Mukhia will retire. Mr. Mukhia is a talented Commerce Teacher and is our Second Master. He has proved his loyalty and devotion to the school over the last 21 years. We will miss his cheerful, good-natured presence but at the same time wish him every happiness and contentment in the future.

We welcome on to our staff body Mr. Partha Sarthi Singha who joined us to teach Chemistry in October last year. Mr. P. K. Ojha joined to teach Commerce and Accountancy. Mr. Anil Deep Rai joined as an additional Games Master. Mr. Asish Sen, an Old Paulite, joined us as the new Art Master. All these gentlemen share a common feature, being modest, quiet and hardworking. I am sure they will grow from strength to strength, giving all their best. We welcome on to the Admn. Staff Mrs. Kalyani Giri Lama and Ms. Bindu Chhetri as Matrons. Mr. Alokesh Dutta joined us as an Office Assistant in the Bursar's Office. A warm welcome to all of them.

We also welcomed our GAP students who have helped out with the teaching of French and middle school Sciences. In the first term we had Adam Brand and Edward Mcgown. A cheerful ebullient pair who wrote and directed a special version of "An Urban Jungle Book" which they performed with the VIth Form taking lead roles. In the second term we have welcomed Mr. Paul Dicken and Mathew Ganazzini.

The ICSE and ISC results were declared at the end of May. Of the 73 boys who appeared for the ICSE Exams, 69 passed. We were, of course, dissappointed about the four boys who failed, yet, on the other hand, the qualitative results of these ICSE candidates was far better than before, with a greater number of distinctions being achieved in the various subjects. At the ISC level all 37 boys passed giving us a sense of quiet satisfaction. Congratulations to all those teachers who handled these boys in the course of their careers through the school.

On the games field the year started with the cricket season. The highlight of this was the Edinburgh Cricket Match and a gala match against the Old Paulites. The present team lost both games though there was considerable enjoyment amongst the players. Other games played in due seasons included Basketball, Volleyball, Football, Table-Tennis, Badminton, Eton Fives, Squash, Marathon and Athletics. We have had varying degrees of success at these games, the most outstanding being from Dhendup Sherpa who won the Inter-district Junior Championship at Table-Tennis. The annual football fixtures against the Old Paulites from Sikkim brought great happiness in terms of reunion and success to the present football team. Our NCC troop functioned effectively throughout the year. The highlight of its activities was a parade and guard-of-honour presented on 15th August. I am deeply grateful to the Officers of the 5 Bengal Bn, N.C.C, who took a personal interest in our

troops. I would also like to thank the Commandant and Officers of the Army Cantonment, Jalapahar, for their help and cooperation throughout the year.


The boys entered a number of competitions at the local level. The Himachal Hindi Bhavan organised a series of activities in Hindi. Vishal Agarwal won first place at extempore speaking. Momocha Thangjam and Tenzing Dekeva won first & third places respectively in the Essay Competition for non-Hindi-speaking candidates. The Marwari Yuva Manch, in collaboration with 'The Statesman', organised an Inter-District Quiz Competition where our team placed first. At the N. M. Master Memorial Inter-School Elocution Contest we were placed third on the whole, with Birat Thapa winning the Jnr. Division.

The stage has been constantly used with a series of House Plays produced by the Jnr. Wing and Snr. Wing houses, plus the Second Language Societies: Hindi, Bengali and Nepali. The Pry. Wing produced their annual concert in May - "Ali Baba and the forty thieves". This colourful musical used a large cast and a choir of a 100 students. The School Play which we witnessed last night, "An Inspector Calls" used a small cast but demanded a high calibre of acting which the boys were able to carry through, successfully.

After Speech Day last year the school choir went down to Calcutta to sing at St. Paul's Cathedral for a specially arranged Service celebrating 175 years of the school's existence. The end of the year saw the annual Carol Services in all three Wings with the choir presenting special items throughout the programme. The highlight of this year's Chapel celebrations was a choir festival done in conjunction with the students of Dr. Graham's Homes. The choir of both schools' performed brilliantly, each employing its own distinctive style. This was a happy innovation and I hope we can draw the children closer in a true spirit of community welfare and joy. At the Trinity College of Music Examinations 21 candidates appeared for Piano and Singing; 18 were successful.

The year has been one of development in terms of the Estate with three major building projects all going on simultaneously. A set of six Domestic Staff quarters are being built on our Estate near Aloobari, this in addition to the set c. four quarters completed last year. Near the Basketball court a Staff Quarters Complex is nearing completion. It will

solve an immediate need for four staff flats with the longer-term-prospect of four more flats, (eight altogether). Hopefully this will be completed by the end of the year. By far the most spectacular of the building projects (and the most highly visible) is the Laboratory-cum-Dormitory Complex rising below the Main Field, near the Inr. School. When complete it will house four classrooms, three dormitories and four laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Computers. All going well this building will go partially into use by March 2000. These elaborate building plans became necessary in order to house structures and facilities which are currently at Eden Falls. The property known as 'Eden Falls' once housed an independent Prep School called St. Andrews. In 1976 the Board of Governors of St. Andrews School handed over its running to the Governors of St. Paul's School. After a transition period of two years the erstwhile St. Andrews became the 'Primary Wing' of St. Paul's School. By 1982, when the new Pry. Wing complex was completed on the St. Paul's Campus, the children were moved out but we retained the buildings for use as our Infirmary and to provide Staff and Dom. Staff living quarters. When we absorbed St. Andrews School in 1976, we had assumed that the property belonged to that school. Imagine our dismay when we discovered that St. Andrews had functioned in rented buildings. I know, because I was the first Headmaster from St. Paul's to administer the transition years when St. Andrews changed to St. Paul's.

In order to correct the situation the school entered into a 25-year lease with the owners and this expires in March, 2000. The owners were keen to sell the property to St. Paul's School but during the years of the agitation in Darjeeling the original property of Eden Falls was badly encroached upon so that it lost its contiguity with the Estate of St. Paul's. The main building itself was very old and needed constant expensive maintenance. Thus it was found more practical to let the lease lapse at the end of March, 2000, and to relocate in our own buildings on the campus. I have delibertely digressed to give you this background since, at the close of this year a whole chapter in the history of Darjeeling, St. Paul's School, and the erstwhile St. Andrews School comes to a close when we give up the property of Eden Falls. I must also confess that these projects have taken up much of my time this year. Any one who has built his own house will sympathise when I say that between Architect, Engineer and contractor, all the owner has to do is to keep arguing, complaining and paying the bills! However, I must take this opportunity to thank the Architect of these two projects. Mr. Somnath Sanyal of the Modern Design Group, Calcutta, gave us the architectural designs free of cost. Mr. Sanyal is the father of an Old Paulite, School Captain. He was a loyal parent for twelve years. Mr. Shashish Prasad of Darjeeling gifted us his talents and his architectural skills in designing the new Lab-cum-Dorm. Complex. This large and complicated structure that needs constant supervision has been supervised by him from its very inception. He too has gifted us his architectural services free of cost. I would take this opportunity of thanking the Estate Manager, the Estate Superintendent, and the Bursar for their constant help and support in supervising details related to the construction of these buildings. I must also acknowledge the help received from the local Officers of Darjeeling Municipality.

I am deeply aware of contribution made by our Doctor and Nurses to the health of the students and staff; the Caterers and Storekeepers who provide the food upon which the school marches; the Matrons of all the Wings who ensure that the boys are properly turned-out and their home-comforts ensured; the Office Staff who provide all the organisational back-up necessary to ensure smooth functioning. Above all to that vast majority of Dorm. Staff who privide all the infrastructure facilities of a day-to-day nature so necessary for the welfare of the students. My own burdens have been considerably lightened with the loyalty and efficiency of the Heads of Pry. Wing, Jnr. Wing and the Snr. Masier. A warm and grateful 'Thank You' to all.

I would like to pay tribute to the Prefectorial Body led by Amber Huria. Now that the year is almost over, I can confess to him that he has done a good job and that his Prefects have worked as a team to ensure that the boys have been happy and not bullied. Well done.

I would be failing in my duty if I did not reach out in gratitude to the Rt. Rev. D. C. Gorai, retired Bishop of Calcutta and, till January this year, Chairman of the Board of Governors. It was Bishop Gorai who first singled me out for honour in 1984 and who was responsible for sending me back to St. Paul's in 1991. He was Bishop of Calcutta for 16 years and in his person he coupled charismatic leadership with a deep concern for all persons and students at St. Paul's. We welcome in his stead the Rt. Rev. P.S.P. Raju, the new Bishop of Calcutta. Rev. Raju served on our Board of Governors as Vice Chairman of the Diocese of Calcutta; his elevation is one of degree and he has fitted into our system with ease, bringing a sense of continuity.

This year has been an eventful one for the country. We started with the trauma of the Kargil conflict. As news filtered through of the casulties it set one thinking of the need for such senseless hostilities. We made an appeal in the School Chapel and were able to send a gift of Rs. 10,000/- from the boys and staff for the war widows. Later we received news that Mr. Protap Roy, Old Paulite (1974), and Senior English Teacher here till 1994 had become critically ill in Bangalore and needed a liver transplant. Once again we raised another Rs. 10,000/- through Chapel collections. The first term saw us go through a severe water crisis. Darjeeling has an erratic water supply at the best of times but the weather Gods were cruel over the winter of 1998/99 so that we suffered drought conditions this summer. Even the Jhoras around us began to dry up. Fortunately we were able to get through the worst of the crisis on a highly rationed water supply. The month of September has seen us in India go through the elaborate exercise of a General Election. Now that we have a new Govt. in place, I hope we can all look forward to an era of stability, peace and prosperity as we enter the new millennium.

CHIEF GUEST'S ADDRESS ON SPEECH DAY 1999 Rev. Father G.Van Walleghem S.J.

Respected Rector & his gracious wife Evelyn, Staff, students and parents of St. Paul's.

I cannot begin without greeting Mr. Kenneth Jackman along with his daughter and son-in-law. To return at the age of ninety-four to a school where he began his studies in 1914 is certainly a great joy to him and says much about the loyalty and the love that former Paulites have for the school. It is indeed a great pleasure and even a greater honour to be invited to your Annual Speech Day. I have heard of this day for the past 50 years and often wondered what went on. When Mr. Howard phoned me three or four months ago, the dignity and the mystique or the mystery of the occasion made me hesitate and I tried to beg off. But your Rector brooked no refusal. That is the way of good Rectors. He simply gave me the date and the amount of time at my disposal. Limiting the time at my disposal was a wise move on his part so I decided to write out my speech to make sure I didn't ramble on till lunch time.

So I've decided to begin my speech on a favourite topic of mine, the purpose of school education. Students come to school to learn and that is why undoubtedly parents send them to school. But to learn what and for what purpose? I'm sure that the parents here present scrutinise the term and the annual results very carefully as you are very anxious about how well your sons will do in life. Will they be able to succeed in any profession? Will they be sought after by the top firms? These are certainly reasonable questions, especially since you have sent your sons to one of the most prestigious institutions in the land hoping that they will have bright futures.

But the results you gauge this by are measurements of objective knowledge of the world out there rather than what happens within your sons. Students can learn the facts of Chemistry, of History, of Mathematics without developing as persons. They can write reams on subjects in the examinations, yet remain unto iched by the things they have learned, indeed unchanged. My proposition is that this can be quite dangerous and often is. St. Paul's is a school which, I'm sure, is aware of the inherent danger in this kind of knowledge and therefore has done all in its power to emphasise that the learning imparted here is not just facts and figures but results in a real transformation of each student.

My education bible is a book "To know as we are known" written by a man of deep insight, Parker Palmer. From him I've come to learn that education is really a spiritual journey, that to learn is to face the possibility of an inner transformation. We often avoid knowledge that calls for our own conversion. We want to know in ways that allow us to convert the world out there to our own purposes by dominating it, but not in ways that require us to change as well. And this is why I say, that though learning of objective facts may have its importance, it is not the main purpose of learning in our schools. Such learning must lead us to questioning how it relates to our own inner experience, how does it affect our relationships, do we come to an inner sense of the truth. The question that each school, nay, each teacher must ask is how can places where we learn to know become places where we learn to love.

HOW CAN PLACES WHERE WE LEARN TO KNOW BECOME PLACES WHERE WE LEARN TO LOVE?

True knowledge originates in compassion. As St. Bernard of Clairvaux said ten centuries ago, the more one loves, the more one knows. The more a teacher loves his students, the more he will know them, the more he will understand them, the more he will be able to relate to them, the more he will be able to lead them to a fuller life, the more he will reveal to the student an awarness of who he himself really is.

The same is true of married life, the more we love, the more we get to know our partner, the more successful the marriage relationship will be. The more we love the people we meet in our professional life, the more ready we will be to relate to them in a constructive, fruitful way. We are all aware that this world we live in is a very broken world and it certainly requires mending and this can only be done by people who have learnt to love.

There is a true story about the harm that can come from objective knowledge divorced from its relationship to one's inner self and its relationship to others. For objective knowledge alone easily leads to the passion of power, of self-importance. The Story comes from a documentary called "The day after Trinity".

"Trinity" strangely was the code name for the original explosion of the atom bomb over Hiroshima, Japan, in August 1945. The film is full of images of horror but the most fantastic horror image was that of intelligent and educated people enthusiastically working hard month after month, driven passionately by the power of their knowledge to create that bomb to find out how much havoc it could cause. Some even felt, it seems, that it might explode the atmosphere burning up the whole world, even themselves. Even so, the experiment went on as scheduled, the passion driving them to see the outcome of the knowledge they had that made it possible.

The outcome has been graphically described by Dr. George Hudson, a former Victoria, Kurseong student, in his book - "PIKA -DON", Japanese for lighting and thunder. Hiroshima had seen many planes pass over it for months on end but it had never been bombed and this lulled them into a sense of security. At 8:00 am on August the 6th. 1945, the whole workforce and school going population of Hiroshima was on its way to duties of the day. They looked up casually at two planes passing over the center of the city, but somewhat apart. As they watched, they saw that it was soon followed by another plane that flew on a line between the previous two. The third plane suddenly dropped a parachute and everyone excitedly watched it descend. Could it be true that an enemy was defecting to their side? Eagerly they questioned one another. Then suddenly a flash of light, an explosion and all the seventy thousand looking upward were instantly blinded. The air was full of the stench of burning flesh, the noise of crumbling buildings, and much screaming and wailing, all the result of technical arrogance that overcomes people when they see what they can do with their minds. Only on the day after did they begin to agonise over the outcome of their work.

My friends, true education has to call us out of isolation and self centeredness into compassion and into the vast community of love. Truth calls us into relationships, patient dialogue, mutual transformation. It calls us to open up an inner space of heart and mind. Genuine solutions and authentic answers to the problems of our fractured world will come from within students trained to reflect compassionately, students led by their teachers and their school on a pilgrimage to their own center, to their own heart.

Fortunately, there are people in this world of ours who have been educated to love and be compassionate. One example that has touched my life is the story of a couple, Nellie and Joe Lemay. In 1952, this couple received a telephone call from the superintendent of the Milwaukee General Hospital. They had already, with a great spirit of sacrifice, successfully launched their own five children into the world and were looking forword to the rewards of retirement, travel and leisure. The superintendent said, "We have a problem and at a meeting it was suggested you might help us for a short time". Six months previously a child was born in the hospital with cerebral palsy. The child was like a vegetable, blind, without any movement, no signs of any emotion and kept alive only through forcefeeding. The parents in great distress had left him in the hospital where such children die very early. When the superintendent asked her to take on this burden, Nellie replied, "If I take the child, he will not die and I will take him".

She already knew what love could do. I cannot explain to you the long saga of thirty years during which she lovingly and patiently coaxed him to swallow and eat, at the age of eight to walk, at the age of twenty three to play the piano, at the age of twenty eight to speak, till at thirty he was ranked as the best pianist on American TV. When asked by investigating psychiatrists and psychologists how he had avoided dying, he simply said, "It is a MIRACLE of LOVE!" Yes, Nellie's love truly created him into a full human being. Love is the most powerful force we know of, it not only changes people but truly creates them.

Another example closer home is what two women, Mrs. Ranu Baneerjee and Mrs. Indrani Roy, are doing in Calcutta. Years ago they become concerned about handicapped children, especially spastics. Now they head the Spastic Society of Eastern India, and with great love are giving over 200 of these handicapped children the most modern education possible. When I visited their school in May, I was overwhelmed by how they are creating life for boys and girls who would have forever lived on the margins of society, neglected and scorned. One of them who can control only his big toe is running a computer with it. The intelligence bottled up in these handicapped bodies has been given free play and all of them are on their way to a loving, productive, fruitful life.

Again it is the creativity that flows from people who have learned to love and be compassionate. It is this kind of education that can change all of us from being distrustful of one another, or suspicious or prejudiced or violent and destructive, all so common when we are proud of the objective knowledge we have received when it is divorced from learning loving relationships.

All you teachers here have a great mission to unleash this creative power of loving in the students you meet daily in your classrooms and about the campus. The words you use have the power either to destroy or create. I don't think there is any other profession that can so effectively transform this nation into the nation of our dreams, a land

"Where", in the words of Rabindranath Tagore in his prayer poem,

"the mind is without fear and the head is held high; where knowledge is free;

where the world has not been broken up into fragments by narrow domestic walls;

where words come out from the depths of truth;

where tireless striving stretches its arms towards perfection; where the clear stream of reason has not lost its way into the deary desert sands of dead habit;

where the mind is lead forward by thee into ever widening thought and action -

into that heaven of freedom, my father, let my country awake."

Or again with Henry Wadsworth Longfellow in his poem, "A Psalm of Life",

"Lives of great men all remind us We can make our lives sublime And, departing, leave behind us Footprints on the sands of time."

It is to leaving these footprints behind that I beckon each one of you in this temple of learning.








Ms. Anjali Tshering broke the happy news that she was to marry Mr. Passang Tshering on 14th October. The Staff were invited to a grand

Special prizes were awarded on Speech Day to the following boys:













INTERNATIONAL AWARD FOR YOUNG PEOPLE (FORMER DEAS)

The basic framework of a school Curriculum forms the steppingstone and acts like an important parameter in judging what it has been contributing towards the personality development of the child. A dynamic curriculum is the need of the present day. In this regard, St. Paul's is a pioneer.

We are among the very few schools which have myraid activities, other than academics, through which the adolescents find a productive outlet of their latent energy they harbour as youth. One such activity offered by the school is the International Award for Young People (formerly called DEAS).

In this Award Scheme the activities are carried out on a non-competetive basis: the only competetor being one-self - i.e., to out do one's own earlier performance. In other words, the scheme is merely a platform to give recognition to an individual's ability to come up to the standard in the activities that already exists in St. Paul's.

In the beginning of the year we were visited by a team of officials from the East Zone Award Authority, Calcutta. They came with a proposal of introducing a system of Registration for the entrants undertaking the Award Scheme at a nominal fees of twenty five rupees. A one time registration will be eligible at all levels of Award. The Registration will also fetch the entrants with Record Books, Identity Card, Certificates and Badges for three respective Levels. Accordingly 175 boys got themselves registered this year.

The session began with introductory lectures by the master-incharge in the Prep Hall for classes IX and XI. The boys were briefed about the objectives, purpose, various activities, qualifying standards, rules and regulations, maintenance of log book and the procedures concerning the programme.

The monsoon started early this year. During the rains, 114 boys undertook their Bronze expedition to Rambi, 24 boys went to Sandakphu for Silver and 2 boys went to the Base camp for Gold.

I convey my sincere thanks to the Rector and Senior master who were always encouraging. I am grateful to our Residential Doctor P. K. Sharma, Sister N. L. Bhutia and Mr. Dawa for providing the boys with first-aid-kits. Thanks are also due to Mr. A. K. Chakraborty and Mr. Gurung, our school caterer and Mr. O. P. Agarwal, and Mr. A. K. Sinha from the Estate and his department who considerately attended to the last minute expedition lists.

This award is extremely beneficial as it also brings the entrants into an international fraternity of young like - minded people. It is a challenge to the adult to give off his time and help the young entrants to achieve standards and to help assess these standards.

And so another year has come to an end. One now looks forward to the new millennium when I hope all will return more determined than ever before to succeed and usher in greater glory.

This years Gen. Virendra medal for excellence in NCC was awarded to Sgt. Rupesh Kumar.



Like Footprints
School life leaves
its golden trail of memories

What I have gained is-me-all that I stand for - my ideals, my dreams, the power to face competition, the will to do, the perseverance to strive on and to achieve the target set and more: what I have learnt and experienced.

The sights and sounds of the Old school- the booming voice of the teacher next door trying to outshoot his pupils, the shadowy figure of the Senior Master on patrol, the tolling of the Bell, the masters encased in their gowns with 'Mr. Murdstone' like expressions and the fairy-tale setting of the school itself - all of it- the joys, sorrows, comforts and discomforts make us what we all are proud to be - Paulites.

A question most often asked - what changes have there been in the school during your time? And the answers which comes promptly to mind is- None! There have been no changes - the tradition, routine, dress have not changed, they have been merely altered to accommodate the present circumstances.

But there have been 'Changes'- drastic ones - the metamorphosis which cannot be physically seen, but can only be felt. Feelings of growth, improvement of mind, broadening of views, enhancement of perception and most importantly, self reliance and independence. This is by far the greatest gift St. Paul's has bestowed - the courage and the ability to stand on one's feet, to never feel the need to lean on anything or

anyone- in every sense its given us the 'will of a man'. All you actually need to do is to look at yourself through someone else's eyes -to know the difference - the difference between men and Men.

Your ways, habits, your gait, conversation, your sense of dress, mannerisms - there is a certain dignity, a certain modest pride-bearings of a great man-bearings of a Paulite.

All this I have learnt, albeit, after much complaint and cribbing, but today, seven years later, as I pass out into the world, this lesson shall serve me well.

Of all the places in the school, the secret nooks and cranies, my favourite place, is the Chapel. It is a symbol of unity, of togetherness- a monument to those wonderful friendships made and kept along the road to the end. That is another gift which St. Paul's has given us - our friends. And there is a saying 'Those who pray together stay together'.

I am leaving, like many others before me with these two gifts, the value of which can only be realised when you yourself have gone. And all you will have left is your memories. I am sure that as I go through the pits and falls of life I will remember that precious motto - 'Moniti meliora Sequamur' and as I go further on I will hear my Alma Mater in the pattern of my favourite lines:

'Everyman I will go with thee And be thy guide And in thy most need Go to by thy side.'




