





As I write this, on 1st January, 2001, we are now in the 21st Century of the new millennium. But, future generations will never be able to decide where the millennium actually began - 2000 or 2001? The media hype for "Y 2K" with the International party that heralded in the year 2000 quite overrode logic and thus provided an excuse to have a second Millennium party in January 2001.

As far as the school is concerned the year has been a successful one with achievements in many spheres — academics, games, debates, quizzing and good health. However, there has been an undercurrent of worry with the resurgence of the local aspirations resulting from the creation of three new States in neighbouring Bihar, UP and MP. Another annoying factor is the frequency of 'Bandhs' being called in the district and at Siliguri. Such cat-strikes prove bad for tourism and morals, besides being highly inconvenient.

RECTOR'S SPEECH - 2000

Mr. Mukherjei, Ladies and Gentlemen,

On behalf of the entire school community it is my privilege to welcome here this morning Mr. S. K. Mukherjei, IAS (Retd) and a member of our Board of Governors. Mr. Mukherjei is the longest serving member of our Board and I have always been deeply grateful for his sensible advice based on years of experience in the IAS where, amongst other posts, he was Secretary to Ms. Padmaja Naidu the first Governor of West Bengal. We are doubly grateful to him for being here as he also stands in for Bishop P.S.P. Raju of Calcutta, who had to make a last-minute cancellation due to a personal tragedy in his family.

This year some new members have joined the Board. These include the Rt. Rev. Dr. D. K. Sahu, Bishop of Eastern Himalayas, Mr. Anil Verma, IAS, District Magistrate of Darjeeling, Prof. Dipak Roy, Principal, Darjeeling Govt. College. On behalf of the Board we would like to thank the outgoing members, Bishop Andrews, Mr. Naveen Prakash and Dr. D. K. Sarkar.

Over the course of the year we have bid farewell to some very senior members of the Admn. Staff. Ms. Pem Pem Tshering, Senior Matron attached to the Pry. Wing retires at the end of this month. She has served here for 30 yrs. and will be gratefully remembered by generations of Paulites. She is the daughter of Tenzing Norgay and has the distinction of having a father, a brother and a son who have all climbed Mount Everest. She is a leading light in the Sherpa community and we wish her success as she embarks upon new enterprises in the future. Mr. M. K. Pradhan, Secretary in the Snr. Master's Office, retired in July having served 30 years. Mr. Pradhan was a cheerful, hardworking person who always gave off his best. He was willing to put his hand to anything and yet maintain his own dignity. Mr. R. B. Gurung, Office Assistant in the Pry. Wing retired in June having served here for 21 years. Mr. Gurung was a painstaking worker and a talented artist who invariably stepped forward each year to help paint the scenery and

backdrop for the Pry. Wing plays. We wish all these persons a happy and peaceful retirement.

Other staff members who have left during the course of the year include Ms. Anjali Tshering and Ms. Tseten Norbu Tshering from the Pry. Wing. Ms. Anjali Tshering left to join her husband in Canada. Anjali served us for 13 years. She was a fine teacher and extremely artistic; she mounted beautiful exhibition each year and her artistic flair was clearly seen as she helped design costumes for the various school plays. Ms. Tseten Tshering left us to join her husband in Australia. Her service with us was of a shorter duration but her gentleness and cooperation was noteworthy. We wish her happiness in the future. Mr. S. D. Lama, who taught Mathematics and Physics left us in April when he was selected to become an Officer in the State Bank of India. I have recently heard from him that he now lectures new recruits on the need for correct attitudes towards work, drawing heavily on his experiences here at St. Paul's. Mr. Amlan Majumdar, who recently got married, will be leaving us in early November for personal reasons. Mr. Majumdar teaches Geography and has grown in confidence. We wish him all success in the future.

Each year as we comment on those who have left the staff body, we also take time to welcome those who have newly joined in. Mr. Arnold Mukhia joined us in March to teach Commerce in the Snr. School. Arnold is an old boy of the school and his cheerful presence has made him popular with the boys. Mr. Asish Kumar Das joined us in July to teach Physics. He has tried his best but has a problem in that his family is still in Calcutta and this tears at his loyalties. Mr. Rajesh Pradhan joined us in June as an Office Asstt. in the Pry. Wing and Mr. Subash Thapa joined us in August as an Office Asstt. in the Snr. Wing. Both these gentlemen are pleasant and I hope they enjoy working with us.

We also welcome in our midst the GAP students from the U.K—Mr. Joel Bamford, William Hine, Mr. Richard Baker and Mr. Connor Short from Paris.

The ICSE and ISC Public Exams results were published at the end of May. 40 students appeared for the ISC Class XII

Examinations and all of them were successful. At the ICSE level 76 students appeared with 75 being successful. The quality of the results at the ICSE level has shown an improvement and this is encouraging. I take this opportunity of thanking the entire academic staff for these improved results. The glamour of success in training students for Public Exams usually attaches itself to the teachers of the senior school but such success is not possible without the combined effort of all the teachers from Class I upwards. All of you may glory in this success.

It is only right and proper that we should also here thank our Doctor and Nurses who work throughout to ensure the health of the students. Then there are the Matrons and the Caterers who ensure that the students are well cared for and fed throughout the year. The Bursar's office and those attached to the various offices work quietly throughout the year to ensure the well being of the students. The E.M., E.S. and Storekeeper work ceaselessly round the year to provide comforts of the students and to ensure proper maintenance throughout the year. The Dom. Staff work devotedly in the kitchens, dormitories and play fields. Without their help and cooperation living conditions would be difficult.

On the games field the beginning of the year saw success on the Cricket field as we shared the Edinburgh Shield with Mount Hermon and St. Joseph's School. The annual cricket fixture against the Old Paulites was a keenly fought contest with the present team being the victors. The school Volleyball team showed exceptional calibre this year. They took part in the H.D. Lama Inter-School Volleyball Tournament and were the Champions. This is no mean success since, in general terms, the local schools specialise in Volleyball; to defeat them is a singular success. In the second term football was the major game played. Here we had mixed success. The school hosted the Inter-School table-tennis tournament. We had visiting teams from 17 schools and the whole programme was spread over two full days. Our own team fared creditably though standards from other schools were better than ours. Over the wet season the boys have played Badminton, Squash and Eton Fives. The marathon season was

conducted successfully in the first week of September. I would here like to thank the Officers at Jalapahar for graciously allowing our students to use their roads for their practice runs. The recent spell of heavy rain has cramped for time the running of the heats for the athletics. However, a last minute spell of good weather allowed us to complete these events. Credit for all these games fixtures must go to our games masters and all those masters-in-charge of the various games in their different seasons.

The school stage and hall has been in constant use throughout the year with a variety of activities. This year we hosted the N. M. Master Memorial English Elocution Contest with our school coming second. The boys were also trained for Inter-School Elocution in Hindi, Nepali and Bengali. In addition there were the usual elocution contests in all three Wings. In the field of debating the boys have met regularly as a Society. This year we hosted the North-eastern segment of the All India Frank Anthony Debate conducted by the ISC Council. Our students won this segment and then went on to Calcutta where, in a second elimination round, we lost to La Martiniere. The Hindi Society took part in the local "Hindi Himachal Bhavan" competitions. The boys were adjudged the best at Quizzing and Poster Making. They also won the team championship for the most active participation. Quizzing forms an enjoyable entertainment in all three Wings and is keenly contested. Once again two of our students have qualified for the Bournvita Quiz Contest, the finals of which are being presently conducted in Mumbai.

Throughout the year the NCC troop functioned under careful coaching of the officers of the 5th Bengal Bn., NCC, of which our school is a member. On Independence Day they provided an excellent Guard of Honour and March Past for Col. Vijay Singh, Principal, H.M.I, who was our Chief Guest. The boys were also actively engaged in the Indian Youth Award Scheme. Large numbers of boys have qualified for the Bronze, Silver and Gold medals. The most enjoyable aspect of this scheme is trekking, and camping, followed by efforts with hobbies and handicrafts. Most of the work seen in the exhibitions is rooted in the achievements of these boys.

Our music department continues to go from strength to strength. This year 23 boys appeared for the Trinity College of Music Examinations in Piano and Singing. All of them were successful. Our School Choir now sings with almost professional skill. They have produced new anthems every month and joined in for a special choir service at Dr. Graham's Homes. We were happy to share and rejoice with the Homes, as they complete their Centenary this year. Our Brass Band continues to make strides. This year the annual music concert given by the students who study music was of a particularly high standard.

St. Paul's has always boasted that its students can hold their own when facing an audience. We attribute this to the constant encouragement the students receive to perform on stage. Training in dramatic productions starts all the way in Pry. Wing with their annual inter-house drama competitions. It extends into the Jnr. Wing and Snr. Wing through the House Plays and the Annual School Productions. At the end of May the Jnr. Wing presented an adaptation of Gilbert and Sallivan's opera "The Mikado". The Senior School has worked hard to produce Galsworthy's "Loyalties" which was performed yesterday.

Over the last two years the school has embarked upon an ambitious building programme. This became necessary as the lease for the property of "Edenfalls" expired in March this year and we handed back the property. The largest and the most complex structure is the new Lab-cum-Dorm. Complex. Estimated to cost Rs. 2 crores the building is nearing completion. It comprises four classrooms, three dormitories with attached toilets and bathroom space; three staff flats attached to the dormitories to enable proper pastoral care, and four laboratories—one each for Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Information Technology. The four classrooms are already in use and the three dormitories will ease conjection in the existing Jrn. Wing Dormitories. As part of this project we will not only landscape the area to provide two basketball size playing fields but also an underground water reservoir to harvest rain water upto two lacs litres. We hope to install solar panel heating devices to provide hot water in the bath rooms. We have also completed the new staff quarters building near the school basketball court. Currently this "Gibbs" building houses four staff families with inbuilt facilities to expand this for a further four flats. A large number of our Domestic Staff used to live at Edenfalls and these persons had to be relocated. This was done on our south facing slope near Aloobari village where we have constructed 11(eleven) semi detached pre-fabricated houses. These have all gone into use. The Staff Quarters and Aloobari Project together come to another Rs. 1 crore. As you can appreciate such an expansion programme, though necessary, is also extremely expensive. We have recently sent out a special appeal to our parents and we have begun to receive a positive response. I take this opportunity of thanking all our parents for their help and cooperation.

At a personal level I am pleased to inform you that I was ordained a Deacon in the Church of North India by the Rt. Rev. P.S.P. Raju, Bishop of Calcutta, at St. Paul's Cathedral. I am deeply grateful to Bishop Raju for detecting any potential he may have seen in me. I was once told by Bishop Bryan that sometimes the Church needs a person and when that happens, it is one's duty to serve. I leave behind this message for all of you that, in the final analysis, we are all called to serve. He who can do this cheerfully and obediently will be happy.

CHIEF GUEST'S ADDRESS ON SPEECH DAY 2000

Mr. and Ms. Howard, Ladies and Gentlemen,

Because of the tragic death of Right Reverend Bishop P.S.P. Raju's grandson within a week of his birth and the state of the mother's health, he has been unable to come. Therefore the onus is on me to address this gathering.

I have been associated with St. Paul's Darjeeling, for some time. It shall be my endeavour to analyse the reasons why this School occupies a unique position in the field of education in West Bengal.

St. Paul's is a residential school. Its students come from different families and from different backgrounds. But in the School they get the experience of living together as members of a community; they learn how to share and care. In the process they realize that as opposed to the way of life they have been accustomed to there are other ways of living. Their vision gets widened, their views become broadened, their judgement becomes enlightened and they are turned out as citizens with a tolerant and compassionate outlook in a vast country with a population of almost infinite diversity.

The School instills courage and the spirit of endurance in its pupils. It achieves this through games, sports and trekking. The students are thus prepared to face life and its problems with fortitude.

The School lays stress on the intellectual development of its students. The last few years have seen a progressive improvement in the performance of the boys sent up for the ISC and ICSE examinations. Training in computer science has recently been arranged so that they may step out of the School well-equipped to face the twenty-first century.

But the School imparts not only knowledge. It stimulates the students to acquire wisdom, that is, to apply knowledge not for

destruction but for constructive purposes. Thereby the quality of integrity is developed in them. In the classroom and in the playing field, they learn that justice and fair play are more important than mere worldly success.

Above all, the School implants in them a sense of values. It fashions an ordering of their minds. They learn that while animals survive by depriving a weaker member of food and shelter, Man has a sense of right and worng which guides him when he acts. They discover that in the scale of civilization Socrates occupies a higher position than Alexander, Newton than Napoleon, Albert Schweitzer than Adolf Hitler, Mother Teresa than Catherine de Medici. If the students carry away in their hearts this sense of right and wrong and continue to be guided by it when they leave the School, they will not only have peace in their souls but also contribute substantially to the building of a new India.

Ladies and gentlemen, I now call upon you to give a hand to the Rector and his staff for the manner in which they have been maintaining the traditions of this institution.

Finally, I thank you for giving me a patient hearing. I convey my best wishes to each and every one present.







Progress and application prizes were awarded to:


Sagar Jain of Class 1. Nitesh Kandoi of Class 4A. Abdulla Siddiqui of Class 4C.







LOYALTIES

Loyalties is perhaps John Galsworthy's finest play. It is a play in which the dramatist deals with the subject of class prejudice or caste-feelings. It is basically a cry against racial prejudice shown by the upper class Christian people to the noveau riche — Ferdinand De Levis, a Jew. Different kinds of loyalties are presented in this play. The most noticeable being the loyalty to race, friendship, loyalty to profession and to married life.

The central episode of the play is a theft of about a thousand pounds from the bedroom of De Levis, a young Jewish guest of Charles Winsor. The other guest of Winsor's are General Canynge, Margaret Orme, Ronald Dancy, and his wife Mabel. De Levis accuses Dancy of having stolen the money. Such an accusation against a 'Gentleman' assumes alarming proportions and becomes a conflict between two races. In the course of this conflict various kinds of loyalties get displayed. The different loyalties and prejudices cutting up against one another can be conspicuously seen through the course of the play.

The main theme of the play, however is that Loyalty to one's class, though better than selfish egoism, still comes short of what is required of us. Class-feelings isolate; only sympathy and co-operation unite.





"LOYALTIES"—A CRITIQUE


I do not think I have ever met a few. Certainly, a few has never been part of my social world. However, I am well aware of the prejudice against few that has existed in Europe for centuries. Thus John Galsworthy's play "Loyalties" touches a raw nerve. I am also in a position to appreciate the conflicts arising between those on different sides of the class divide. These two points mean that rather than being an objective reviewer of the St Paul's School Play 2000 "Loyalties" by John Galsworthy, I almost feel that I was myself part of the action. This was action that was slow to get started but during the second scene of Act I the class conflict was beginning to come through. General Canynge played by Rabin Pandey was showing some strong points as might be expected of a military man. Into Act 2 and the action improves with General Canynge coming across strongly. In Scene 2 of Act 2 the conflicting lovalties begin to emerge. Ferdinand De Levis played by Anirban Sinha starts to make an impact on the course of the drama. 



Some of the notable ones that were sung were: 'Lead me Lord'—Wesley, "Adoremus in Aeternum"— Allegri, "Crown of Roses'—Tschaikovsky, 'The Three Kings'—Cornelius, 'Ave Verum'—Mozart, 'O Taste and See'—Wesley, 'Now that the Sun has veiled its light'—Wesley and 'Lord, for thy tender mercies' sake'. The boy sopranos have done wonders with their innumerable heart lifting descants. Most hymns were sung in harmony by select choristers.

We had a choir Festival at Dr. Graham's Homes along with their choir. Each of the choirs sang six anthems, the repertoire having a wide range. This was indeed a grand occassion which fostered the spirit of harmony and friendship between the two schools. A repeat performance of the festival was held at our own Chapel with His Excellence Shri Viren Shah, the Governor of West Bengal, presiding over the Service. The choral singing in the Chapel culminated into a peak at the junior and senior carol services. The choir carols were : 'Veni Veni Emmanuel', 'What child is this'-Greensleeves, 'In Dulci Jubilo'-Pearsall, 'The Shepherds' Farewell' from 'L' Enfance Du Christ', 'Dormi Jesu'-Lloyd and 'Ring Christmas Bells'. A solo version of the 'Cantique de Noel' was sung by the Head Chorister, Sonam Ghale. The other soloists at these services were Alexius Dhungel, Vineet Pradhan, Kalden Lama, Karma Ghale, Ayush Shrestha, Tenzing Lama and Tenzing Kutsabpa. Sonam Ghale and Vishal Pakhrin read the First Lesson, on behalf of the choir, at the senior and junior wing services respectively.

The Annual Music Concert ("A Minstrel Evening") was held on the 2nd of September. It was a beautiful blend of classical, negro-spiritual, pop, modern etc. —both vocal and instrumental. The choral items, the Male Voice Quartette and an instrumental of Eastern and Western combination were the highlights of the evening. The concluding medley of 'Be what you wanna be' and 'My Way' brought the show to a rather nostalgic end.

A number of music students have performed creditably at their respective House Concerts. They were all of a fairly high standard. The Inter-House Singing concert in the Senior Wing was indeed a great success. All training and directing was done by the boys themselves. In this connection, I would like to specially commend Tosanlang Kharsati and Tenzing Lama on the splendid work with their respective music groups.

This year, I was fortunate to have been invited to Shillong to take part in western classical music concert as a tenor soloist and piano accompanist. It was indeed an enriching experience. His Excellency, Mr. M. M. Jacob, Governor of Meghalaya, was the







INTERNATIONAL AWARD FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

(Formerly D. E. A. S.)

The basic framework of a school curriculum forms the stepping-stone and acts like an important parameter in judging what it has been contributing towards the personality development of the child. A dynamic curriculum is the need of the present. The entire curriculum in St. Paul's revolves around a common centre that emphasizes "the overall development of child's personality". This necessiates both 'in' and 'out' bound activities. In this regard St. Paul's is a pioneer.

The basic objective of IAYP is very simple, logical and applicable. The activities under the scheme provides an outlet to the latent energy an adolescent harbours within him in a productive way through a myraid of activities.

The activities under the Award Scheme are carried out on a non-competitive basis: the only competetor being one-self i.e. to out-do one's own earlier performance. In other words, the scheme is merely a platform to give recognition to an individual's ability to come up to the standard in the activities that already exists in St. Paul's.

The sessioin began with an introductory lecture by the Master-in-Charge in the Prep Hall for classes IX and XI. The boys were briefed about the objectives, purpose, various activities, qualifying standards, rules and regulations, maintenance of logbook and the procedures concerning the programme.

The duration of Silver Expedition has been reduced to two nights. Five boys, accompained by the Master-in-Charge set out to fix the new route to suit the time constrain arising due to the introduction of weekly test system in the curriculum.

The new route, thus, is:

DAY 1: SPS - Rimbick - Rammam

DAY 2: Rammam - Sandakphu via Molley

DAY 3: Sandakphu - Maneybhanjang - SPS.

This year there were 97 new entrants who registered themselves under th IAYP.

The early onset of monsoon did not mar the enthusiasm of the youngsters. They braved it through the rains —dampness, wet fire wood, saturated soil, wet sleeping bags, leaches... etc. 104 boys undertook their bronze expedition to Rambi and 17 boys went for silver expedition to Sandakphu. There were 8 aspirants for gold this year. Unfortuantely, the monsoon were prolonged too long for the Gold aspirants to go for their expedition.

Finally there were 53 boys who managed to qualify for bronze and 14 boys qualifed for silver.

I convey my sincere thanks to the Rector and Senior Master who were always encouraging. I am grateful to our Residential Doctor P. K. Sharma, Sister N. L. Bhutia and Mr. Dawa for providing the boys with first-aid-kits. Thanks are also due to Mr. A. K. Chakraborty and Mr. S. Gurung, our School Caterer and Mr. O. P. Agarwal and Mr. A. K. Sinha of the Estate department, who considerately attended to the last minute changes in the expedition lists.

This Award is extremely beneficial as it brings the entrants into an international fraternity of young like-minded people. It is a challenge to the adult to give off his time and help the young entrants to acheive standards and to help assess these standards.

And so, another year has come to an end. One now looks forward to the year 2001 when I hope we will return more determined than ever to succeed and usher in greater glory.

Congratulations to all of them.


